Grant Scholarship gives the gift of Ouachita to Brazilian student



For Catarina Figueiredo, August 2011 changed her life. That month, a recruiting team from Ouachita visited her Rio de Janeiro high school, and that meeting, along with the generous support of OBU's Grant Center for International Education, put her on the path to becoming a Ouachita Tiger.



"I had never thought about coming to study in a different country," Catarina said. "I was kind of afraid, but after this amazing semester I can say that I have no regrets. God really knows what is best for me. Ouachita is the dream that God has dreamed for a long time for me, and I had no idea until 2011.

"I thought it would be impossible to come here because it would be really expensive to my family," Catarina added. "However, I received the honor for being blessed by the Grant Scholarship. This scholarship has been the way to make it possible and real every day in my life."

Catarina is entering her second semester at Ouachita and is one of two international students benefiting from Grant Scholarships. Nearly 30 OBU students are supported by other scholarships from the Grant Center this year.

"OBU has been a gift," Catarina said. "Words cannot express how thankful I am for this opportunity, so the only thing I can say is thank you so much for trusting, for giving me the chance, for blessing me!"

After completing work in Ouachita's English as a Second Language program last fall, Catarina will begin regular classes this spring, working toward a pre-med degree. She has already gotten involved with OBU's International Club and took part in the filming of the university's recent LipDub music video. She has also given back to the Ouachita and Arkadelphia communities by volunteering at the annual Donor Banquet and Tiger Serve Day.

"It is unbelievable how much has been changing in my life since I got here," Catarina said. "I have been learning about different cultures and learning how to get closer to the Lord. I have been working on my English, making new friends; in other words, I can say that now I see the world in a completely different way because of Ouachita.

"OBU has been a gift," she said. "It is one of the greatest things that has already happened to me."

Over Fall Break this year, the Daniel & Betty Jo Grant Center for International Education and the English as a Second Language Program sponsored a 3-day trip to Memphis and Nashville, Tenn., for 24 students. This annual field trip primarily targets ESL students who take the American History and Culture class. International Club students and MKs are also always invited and eagerly respond.



Matt Douglass, instructor of the American History and Culture class, worked with ESL Coordinator Sharon Cosh to plan the trip. Grant Center staff members who accompanied the students included Ian and Sharon Cosh; Douglass and his wife, Angela; Nathan Fayard, ESL instructor; and Tanya Jackson, administrative assistant. A charter bus provided safety on the road and allowed faculty, staff and students to interact during the travel time.

The group visited the Civil Rights Museum in Memphis and ate at the original famous Corky's BBQ restaurant for a taste of the delicious cuisine in the area. Dinner in downtown Nashville at the Wild Horse Saloon allowed students to be introduced to "boot-scooting" for the first time.

The following day, the group toured The Hermitage, President Andrew Jackson's elegant plantation home, and spent the afternoon at the Opry Mills Mall. For the evening's entertainment, the group enjoyed the Grand Ole Opry, a delightful experience at the heart of country music!

On the final morning, the group returned to downtown Nashville where some visited the Country Music Hall of Fame and others shopped. The students particularly enjoyed the fascinating culture of cowboys and country music.

After an afternoon in Centennial Park, a visit to the Parthenon and a free concert, the group headed home. Arriving late Saturday evening they were tired but clearly contented with having made life long friendships with one another.

Field trips for internationals provide an all-important introduction to American culture. The experience builds relationships and allows the students to follow a path of living history while learning together about their new and fascinating culture. The memories made and the relationships deepened are priceless!
