DEAR STUDENT,

As we think back over the school year of 1953-54, many scenes pass by the mind's eye in kaleidoscopic form, pictures that will linger as after-images for years yet to be.

There was the coming of that young fellow to be Ouachita's new president . . . and the waiter in the dining hall who "told off" the new brass the first day because he thought the guy was an upstart freshman. There was the football team that surprised everyone (except loyal Ouachitonians) and mowed down every foe save one . . . even if it took heart-stopping lastminute rallies to win one or two. There was the basketball team that promised to be a title contender until two key men were lost with injuries and despite this managed to stay in every game until the last minutes. There was the abrupt action of former athletic rivals who decided they did not want to romp with the Tiger again . . . especially since his claws had grown sharp once more. There was Operation Cleanup in the ravine when we lowered trees and raised blisters by the hundreds . . . and fished wouldbe Tarzans out of the sweet, pure waters of the ravine's creek. There were the many parties . . . Christmas parties in the dorms with carolling afterward, the hobo party at the Student Center, the Valentine party at Mitchell, and others. There were the concrete engravers who sought to immortalize themselves in the new walk in front of Conger Hall . . . and mortgaged themselves instead. There were new departments, new courses, new teachers, new plans for a fully landscaped campus, new engagement rings, new letter sweaters.

The confidence is that you will, as a loyal son or daughter of Ouachita, always bring honor to your school by living up to the ideals that you have known here. The hope is that Ouachita may always live up to the high place you have given her and may be an ever-increasing source of pride for you.

But not only are they the club presidents and so forth, but also they are those that you see over and over as a member of a committee to get the cookies for a party, or decorate the student center, or plan a chapel program, or get the students back to Sunday School, or draw up pages for the annual, or write a story for the paper, or one of the dozen of other little things that have to be done. They are representative of that phase of college life showing their friendship to the students here and their dependability in anything that they do.



Because the Tiger Spirit is not the spirit of the few; it is the spirit of the entire group, and it will surely always find itself successfully reflected in the life of the student of Ouachita College.












