Since its birth the Alpha Kappa Society has been steadily increasing not only in numbers but its individual members have shown marked development along executive and literary lines.



# The Ouachita Signal






We are proud of our past record, but we are striving by the help of our King to do greater things in the future. The members are all young men, full of zeal, determination and loyalty for the cause which we represent.





Throughout the year one-act plays and scenes from long plays are presented for public approval.


All students in Ouachita College are eligible to membership in the club, but it is composed mainly of expression students, who gain much by the study of drama and dramatists.












### Orchestra

### The Reserve Officers' Training Corps


It has long been common knowledge that our country, the United States of America, would be practically helpless if it depended upon its standing army entirely to protect it against foreign powers. Therefore, the War Department has established the Reserve Officers' Training Corps throughout the country at various selected colleges. These units send into private life every year men trained so that in the case of an emergency the Federal Government can call them into active service to lead its armies in the field.

Ouachita College has had some form of military training in her curriculum since 1896, when the college authorities realized the benefit the country, the college and the men would receive from such training. The present organization was established in 1919 just after the Students' Army Training Corps was demobilized, and much credit should be given to those army officers who have labored so faithfully to keep the standard of the unit high.

In establishing the Reserve Officers' Training Corps at Ouachita, Milton's definition of an education seems to have been accepted. He said: "I call a complete and generous education one that fits a man to perform justly, skillfully and magnanimously all the offices, both public and private, of peace and war."






COACH MORLEY JENNINGS




SAM D	ARDNNE, JR	Lackle


EDGAR DARDNNE .


Scott's lack of experience was the principal hindrance to his placing as a regular. The games he participated in he performed creditably. Another season with the same old punch and Dale should be a regular.

# Review of 1921 Football Season



HE past season in many respects has been the most successful one in several years. In the games where the supreme tests were made, the Tiger team, coached to perfection, came out very much victorious. In other games, where the odds were entirely too heavy against it, this team displayed such fight and ability that it was highly respected.

Starting with a wealth of new material, but with a lack of experienced men, Coach Jennings developed one of the best teams in Ouachita's history. Even though the work toward development was strenuous and the daily grind monotonous, the spirit of the men

was unusually good.

By way of summary, games won totaled 5, lost 3. Points by Tigers 177, opponents 69. No team in the Arkansas Athletic Association scored a point against the Tigers, which proved their great defensive strength. The season opened at the A. U. Williams Field with the defeat of the Magnolia Aggies, 48-0. By holding the Tigers to a 20-0 score the previous season, the Mule Riders entertained high hopes of humiliating them. One quarter of play was enough to prove the superiority of the Tigers. By this game Coach Jennings was able to get a line on the qualifications of his new men.

Next came the tilt with the Mississippi A. and M. at Starkville, Though outweighed and conscious of the fact that they were battling one of the South's best, the Tigers displayed such fight and aggressiveness that the first half ended 6-0 in Ouachita's favor. The Aggies, by wearing them down in the last quarter, scored three touchdowns and the

game ended 21-6.

The following game was doped to be one of the football classics of the season: Tigers vs. Razorbacks at Little Rock. The game was purely defensive until the last quarter. O. B. C.'s crippled backfield allowed the university to complete several forward passes which proved the undoing of our defense, and they acquired 28 points. Cole's work in this game was the big feature of individual playing.

The Conway Pedagogues offered the opposition for the following week. Estes' team proved a big disappointment to the fans, and the Tigers rolled up a score of 58 points. The Tigerettes were given an opportunity against them in the final quarter.

Next the Tigers played Little Rock College in the "City of Roces" and won, 16-0.

Lack of teamwork in this game kept the score low.

The following week came the real setback of the dope. The game at Ruston with

the L. P. I. was added to their win column, 20-0.

Then came the period of strenuous training for the two major games of the schedule, and the result was evident when the Tigers, on Armistice Day, literally mowed down all the opposition the Hendrix Bulldogs could bring into play. The score stood 35-0. The

Tigers fought as one machine and each player was the star of the game.

On "Turkey Day" this wrecking crew crowned their brilliant work by their defeat, 14-0, of the Henderson-Brown Reddies. They showed, both on offensive and defensive. such a drive and stability that there could be no argument as to their superiority. Thus ended the active part of the 1921 season, but the talking circles are still vibrant in their praise of the Tigers.



### "Tigerettes"

The scrubs of '21, although the games in their win column are not numerous, deserve much credit for their rapid development and the valuable assistance they rendered to the varsity. Starting out with a wealth of material in so far as size and number was concerned, but with a woeful lack of knowledge and experience, they came through with a good team before the season closed.

Much credit is due Coach Dwight Crawford for this improvement. His persistent effort and helpful assistance were greatly appreciated.

From the Tigerette squad a great number of the Tigers come, and by this year's seasoning several of them have acquired sufficient experience and shown such aggression that their promotion seems to be dependent only upon the arrival of the next season.







## Basketball

GREAT amount of interest has been exhibited the past season by the followers of the indoor sport. With the return of four veterans of last year's quintet prospects were exceedingly bright from the beginning of the season. New material, and substitutes of last season had a chance to display their

ability in the R. O. T. C. contests. Coach Jennings was enabled to get a line on his material. The team through the entire season has played at times brilliant, but always consistent basketball. Every member of the team gave forty minutes of hard, determined effort each game, and this, coupled with the team work perfected through Coach Jennings' efforts, was the chief determinant of the Tiger's success.

Galloway, "Ikey," Forward. The goal seems to have a magnetic attraction for the ball when Gally shoots. This can be explained only by his speed, hard work, headwork and accuracy. As captain of this year's team, he has made an excellent leader. His work the past season has established the fact more forcibly than ever, that he is the state's best forward.

Chambers, "Mug," Forward. Mug is another forward much respected by opposing guards. His passes are swift and accurate, his teamwork on a par with the best. Chambers has one more year with the Tigers and it promises to be exceedingly bright.

Montgomery, "Hos," Center. "Hos" seems to like his athletics. After winning his "O" in football and baseball he turned his attention to the indoor sport and has made the team an excellent center. Though not fast, he is always in there fighting, and for this reason is found in practically every play.

Hunter, "Sloppy," Center. Another center of the consistent type. He is a good passer and plays a steady game. This is Hunter's first year with the Tigers, and he has shown well.

Cole, "Bob," Guard. Bob's quickness and knack for breaking up the opponents' team work make him a valuable man in the vicinity of the opposing goal. He has one more year and much is expected of him during that period.

Turberville, "Tubby," Guard. "Tubby" plays basketball as he plays every branch of athletics, putting his best in the game. He works the floor well, passes hard and accurately, and is a good shot. He also plays a good defensive game. He will be back next year.

Much credit is due the three "Substitutes," Bayers (forward), Bratt (guard), and Benson (center and guard). These men performed their duties in an excellent manner every time they were called upon and much is expected of them next season.

S. Anderson, "Sullie," Forward. This is Sullie's second year with the team. Although a sub last year, he has proven to be a valuable man this year. He has shown considerable speed and skill this season. We expect great things of him in the future. He has two more years at Ouachita.









# 1922 Baseball Prospects



S we approach the baseball season of '22 optimism keen and well founded is our one outstanding characteristic. Though probably football to the taste of the collegians is more popular, a winning baseball team is quite as big a drawing card, and always receives unreserved support in its season. Indi-

cations point to one of the best in the history of Ouachita for the coming spring, and enthusiasm should be rife among the student body and other supporters.

An added indication toward a great season is the fact that other teams of the A. A. are to be represented by fast clubs, and that others with whom games are scheduled are equally as strong. The fight for the State Collegiate Championship should be one of the closest and hardest fought in several seasons.

With an aggregate of nine letter men, composed of three pitchers, four infielders, and two outfielders, Coach Morley Jennings has a strong nucleus around which to build an excellent team. Several new men and substitutes of last year are slated to perform well, and the selection for each position promises to be from a group of keen competitors.

There is one vacancy in the outfield. Rowland and Abraham, however, bid fair to hold down the wings of this territory. Walter, playing his fourth year on the squad, is captain. Twice he has been selected on the All-State Nine, and should be a strong contender this season. He is without doubt the most accurate fly chaser the Tiger squad has had in many years. Lucien in right field is also consistent in his fielding and should swing the bludgeon with more success in future games.

The infield certainly has a strong frame-work on which to build. Montgomery displayed his wares as a receiver last spring and is expected to place among the state's best this season. The initial sack will be covered by Turberville, whose ability is conceded. He is strong in every department and his swings from the left should be a big factor in the team's offense. Galloway at second can be depended upon to cover well that vicinity. He has an abundance of speed and is a very sure fielder. Harry Slade is again on hand to cavort around the hot corner. Though not speedy, he is accurate and led the squad in batting last season.

Three of the old moundsmen will again be seen in action. Sam Dardnne, Jr., whose pitching proved so effective last spring, will probably do the bulk of the twirling. Campbell and Cargile are counted on to add several games to the win column. Promising new additions to the staff are E. Dardnne and Sanders.

Other material from which Jennings will complete his team is: Infielders, Gunn, Riffey, Ogles, Bryan, and Coleman; outfielders, Walton, Benson and Irwin.
