THURSDAY.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The Arkansas Baptist State Convention met at 10 o'clock a. m., November 1st, 1883, with the Baptist Church at Fayetteville, Ark.

The President read the 19th Psalm, the congregation sang No. 45, in Gospel Sougs, "Jesus keep me near the cross." Prayer by J. P. Eagle.

A Committee on Enrollment was appointed, viz: M. F. Locke, G. W Reeves, M. D. Early.

The Convention engaged in singing and afterwards had an earnest talk by Dr. Clark on the needs of the State.

The Committee on Enrollment returned and made their report. See roll.

On motion of R. M. McConnell the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for J. P. Eagle as President of the Convention. This was done by unanimity.

On motion of J. Dunagin the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for M. F. Locke and W. T. Box as Vice Presidents, which was unanimous.

On motion of J. Dunngin the President was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for J. B. Searcy as Secretary of the Convention and W. A. Clark Assistant Secretary, which was unanimous-

On motion of M. F. Locke the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for J. M. King for Treasurer, which was done by a unanimous vote.

The following rule of meeting and adjourning was adopted, viz: Meet each day at 9 o'clock, a. m., adjourn at 12 m., meet at 1 p. m., adjourn at 4:30 p. m., meet at 7 p. m. and adjourn at will.

Mell's Parliamentary Practice was adopted as our rule of order.

The order of business adopted last year was adopted for the present session,

On motion the rule to adjourn was suspended ten minutes.

A Committee on Constitutional Amendments was appointed consisting of McConnell, Locke and Dunagin.

On motion adjourned till 2 o'clock p. m. Prayer by G. G. Wise.

THURSDAY 2 P. M.

The Convention met. Prayer by J. S. Thomas.

On motion, H. Hatcher and S. W. Marston, of the General Association of Missouri were invited to seats in the Convention, Dr. Ray of the Flag and J. A Moore of Texas, were invited to seats. Each of these brethren made talks.

The President retired to make up his report of Committee, Brother Locke took the chair, Dr. Marston made a good speech.

On motion the business of the Convention was suspended to hear the conventional sermon by Dr. W. D. Mayfield who preached. Text, "But Christ is all and in all." Col. (iii, 11. The sermon was one of sweetness and in wer.

The President called the Convention to order.

On motion adjourned till to-morrow 9 o'clock a m. Prayer by M. D. Early.

FRIDAY.

FRIDAY, 9 O'CLOCK, A. M.

The Convention met for business. Prayer by Rev. O. M. Lucus. The minutes of the previous day were read and adopted.

The President called Rev. S. J. Thomas to the chair and asked permission of the members for the State Mission Board to retire and prepare their report.

During the absence of the Board, the Conventian spent the time in devotional exercises.

The members of the State Board returned and the President resumed the chair.

Rev. C. W. Callaban offered a resolution that the State Convention send a telegram of condolence to Rev. B. Thomas, D. D., of Little Rock, former Secretary of the Convention, who is nearing death's door with cancer. The resolution was adopted, and a voluntary contribution raised to pay for the telegram.

The Corresponding Secretary read the report of the State Mis

sion Board, which on motion was made the special order for Saturday

night at 7 o'clock p. m.

Rev. C. W. Callahan reported that he sent the telegram to Brother Thomas, and that he paid \$1.25 for the same, the receipt for which he presented to the Secretary. He also reported \$2.85 still in his hands as an over plus of the voluntary contribution for telegraphing. On motion Brother Callahan was ordered to turn over that amount to the Ladies' State Central Committee of Womans' Work.

The Committee on Constitutional Amendments read their report which was discussed and on motion re-committeed with Rev. M. D. Early added to the Committee.

Rev. S. Cornelius read the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools, which was on motion made the special order for 7 oclock p. m.

On motion adjourned till 7 o'clock p. m. Prayer by Dr. Marston.

2 O'CLOCK, P. M.

Rev. W. D. Mayfield read the report on Publications, pending which, an invitation from the President and Faculty of the State University was received, asking the Convention to visit that institution of learning instanter, which invitation was on motion accepted, and the Convention visited this grand metropolis of learning for the State.

At 3:35 o'clook p. m. the Convention returned and resumed business.

The report on publications was further discussed, 275 subscribers to the EVANGEL was pledged, and the report adopted. (See report.)

On motion adjourned till 7 oclock p. m. Prayer by Rav. G. C. Harris.

7 O'CLOCK P. M.

Met for business. Prayer by G. W. Reeves.

The special order for that hour was taken up and the report on Snaday Schools was most eloquently discussed for more than two hours, when a motion prevailed to re-commit the report adding Rev. J. S. Thomas and J. B. Permenter to the Committee.

SATURDAY MORNING.

Convention called to order at 9.30 Eld. J. B. Hall led in prayer. Minutes of Friday read and adopted.

the report of the Committee on Sunday School work was read, and after amendment was munimously adopted.

The report on Co stitutional Amendments read and was discussed by Brethren Reeves, Danagio and Mayfield. Adopted.

Under question of privilege a tolegram was read from Dr. B. Thomas as follower "Dispatch received, your prayer is answered, 91st realm 3nd verse. My prayer for you, Ephesians 3nd chapter 16th to 21th verses inclusive." This was followed by a prayer by W.D. Mayfield.

Report of Committee on State Missions read and adopted.

Report of Committee on Resolutions read and ofter remarks by Brethren Engle and Walker was adopted.

Report of Committee on Womans' Mission Work read, and after discussion by Breth on Early, Scarcy and Reeves was adopted by a rising vote, and the State Central Committee of Laidles Mission Society received to sents in the Convention.

Report of Committee on Education read, and after discussion by Brethren Starcy, Lucas, Mayfield, Woaver, Thomas and White.

Pending the vote the hour of adjournment arrived, adjourned with prayer by J. B. Permenter

SATURDAY P. M.

Session opened with prayer by P. A. Haman.

The discussion of the report on Education was resumed, speeches by Elds. Harris and Moore, of Texas, Eld. White of Eureka, and Brother Atkinson. Report adopted.

The appointment of five commissioners to execute the purposes of the report on Education was referred to the Committee on Nominations.

Report on Obitparies read, and recommitted with instructions.

A special resolution concerning the St. Louis Publishing Company was read, and after remarks by Dr. Ray was adopted.

A resolution was offered by Eld. M. D. Early, refering to the cm ployment of a Financial Secretary, and discussed by Brethren M. D. Early, G. W. Reeves and Dr. Maylleld; and was adopted.

Ou motion Brother J. C. Crudup and Sister A. L. Crudup was

invited, as visitors, to seats in the Convention.

Roport on Foreign Missions read and after remarks by Dr. H. Hatcher.

The time of adjournment having arrived, the adjournment was by vote postponed at will, and the consideration of the report was also suspended in order to take a collection for Foreign Missions. Collections amounted to \$61.00 cash and \$220.00 in pledges as per list.

Order of business resumed, and the Foreign Mission report was amended and adopted.

Report of Committee on Nominations read and adopted.

Report on Obitmaries read and adopted.

Adjourned to meet at 7 p.m. Prayer by Eld. B. N. Hultsman.

SATURDAY 7 P. M.

Opened with prayer by Rev. J. A Moore, of Texas.

The special order being the report of the State Board. A summary of the report was read; and after remarks by Brethren W. D. Mayfield, H. Hatcher and J. B. Searcy.

Pending the vote a collection amounting to \$1,010.00 in pledges and \$10 40 in cash, total \$1,02 \,.40 was taken up. \$62.00 of the pledges were cashed. Report adopted.

J. S. Thomas, W. A. Clark and H. Hatcher made a few remarks and he school adjourned for presching.

APPENDIX.

REPORT OF THE STATE BOARD.

[A]

Your State Mission Board would respectfully report that we met at Lonoke immediately after our appointment. Organized by electing J. P. Eagle President, and J. B. Searcy Corresponding Secretary. During the year the Board has met twice at Lonoke, twice at Little Rock, once at Morritton, once at Pine Bluff, once at Russellville and once at Fayetteville.

APPOINTMENTS.

At the first meeting we appointed W. A. Clark, State Evangelist, at a salary of \$100 per month, one half to be paid by the New York Home Mission Society.

We also continued the appointment of S. Cornelius, as Sunday School Missionary for the State under the same, conditions of the previous year.

Both these brethren accepted, and entered at once upon their work, and have pushed it vigorously during the year with good success.

J. S. Thomas was appointed missionary pastor at Bateaville, at a salary of \$200 per quarter. The Home Mission Society of New York

Brother Thomas dutered non

Brother Thomas entered upon the work, and although the New York Society discontinued its co-operation with us in June, leaving our missionaries under the appointment of that Society without the support coming from that quarter it e hardest time of the year, yet the little aid they received in the first part of the yearstimulated them and Brother Thomas and his noble little band have worked through and kept their heads above water, i. e. the old members, while many of the new ones have gone bereath it.

J. S. Morris was appointed as missionary of Grand Prairie Association, with his headquarters at De Witt. His commission was approved by the Home Mission Society of New York for \$20,00 per

quarter, one half of which it ey were to pay.

He did good and faithful service, but suffered the same disappointment in June, as that mentioned in the case of the prater at Batesville. He continued work however upon the meager talary left him.

G. G. Thomas was appointed missionary pastor at Carlisle and

commissioned by the Home Mission Society at a salary of \$50 per

quarter one half of which they agreed to pay.

Brother Thomas, like the other two brethren under the appointment of this Society entered upon his work and did well, but was greatly embarassed by the withdrawal of the co-operation. We might state here that the State Board was powerless to relieve the wants of these brethren. But they have battled on and held the fort.

B. W. N. Simms was continued under his appointment of the previous year as missionary pastor at Fayettoville under the support of

the Home Mission Society.

The Boars approved the application to respond Brother Simms, but the New York Society declined upon the ground that their liabilities were too great, and Brother Simms left our State, much to our

regret, for he was beloved by all who knew him,

W. E. Paxton was appointed by our B and as missionary pastor at Fort Smith. But the Home Mission Society declined to approve the appointment as in the Case of Brother Simms. Brother Paxton, however, entered upon the work, and believing that relief would arise from some quarter he worked on with most delightful results till the 9th of June, when our dear Lord said to his weary servant, "It is enough, come up higher." Like a noble soldier he died on the field.

T. H. B. McAlister was appointed by our Board as missionary prator of Concord Association. But the New York Society declined to approve him also for the reason mentioned above. He continued

his work however with success.

A. J. Fawcett was appointed missionary pastor at Pine Bing and commissioned by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Bapilst Convention at a salary of \$150 per quarter, half of which they agreed to pay. Brother Fawcett entered upon the work, and has met with encouraging success. He has received his pay with promptness and

is continuing his work.

I. M. Wise was commissioned by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptis' Convention as missionary pastor at Camden at a salary of \$100 per quarter, half of which the Board agreed to pay. Brother Wise did good work till the close of the quarter. September 30th, 1883, but feeling that he needed to continue his education, resigned at Camden and is now in the Seminary at Louisville, Ky. at school. He received his pay promptly.

T. E Jusper was comulsaioned as missionary paster at Helena by the Home Mission Board at a salary of \$5) per quarter to supplement the salary paid him by the church, one half of which that Board was to pay. He did good work, but his health and that of his wife failed,

and he resigned and left. But he received his ray promptly.

O. M. Lucas was approved as missionary pastor at Alma and commissioned by the Home Mission Board at a salary of \$50 per quarter, half of which that Board agreed to pay. Brother Lucas entered upon the work and has met with amazing success, and is receiving his pay.

R. A. Lee was approved as missionary pastor at Warren and com-



missioned by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention at a salary of \$50 per quarter, half of which that Board agreed to pay. Brother Lee is succeeding well and is receiving his pay.

G. C. Harris was approved as missionary in the Bentonville Association and commissioned by the Home Mission Board at a salary of 875 per quarter, half of which that Board agreed to pay. Brother

Harns is doing a noble work and is receiving his pay.

J. B. Barry was approved as missionary of Russelfville Association, and commissioned by the Home Mission Board at a salary of \$50 per quarter, half of which that Board agreed to pay. Brother Barry has occupied the field with a good degree of success and is receiving his pay.

R. T. Yates was approved as missionary of Friendship Association for three months, at a salary from the Home Mission Board of 850 per month, half of which that Board agreed to pay. Prother

Yates did fait ful work and has received his pay.

M. D. Early was approved as missionary pastor at Morritton and commissioned by the Home Mission Board at a salary of \$125 per quarter, half of which that Board is to pay. Brother Early is on the field meeting with signal success and is receiving his pay.

S. Cornelius, Sanday school missionary, reports as follows:

this year, as last, I have given the body of my labors to the more destitute places, spending my Sundays chiefly with the country churches and visiting the railroad towns for the most part between Sundays. It has seemed to be my duty to devote my attention mainly to portions of the field not heretofore reached by me. For this reason, I have attended no Associations this year which I attended list year, preferring to go where no Sanday School Consentions have heretofore been organized.

My increased knowledge of the nature and wants of the field have enabled methrough the divine blessing, to accomplish much larger results than last year, especially as regards the mumber of Sunday schools organized, and the amount of money collected.

The statistics of my labors are as follows:

Miles traveled, 3,350; sermons and addresses, 258; prayer meetings attended, 42; families visited, 500, churches visited, 94; schools organized, 50; institutes held, 16; associations and conventions attended, 18; Sunday school conventions organized, 5; pages of tracts distributed, 12,000; books sold to the value of \$400; gits of books secured for ministers and others to the value of \$75; hibles and testaments sold or given away to the value of \$200; collections to the amount of \$350.24.

The Corresponding Secretary has performed evangelic labors as tollows:

Miles traveled in evangelic labors, 2,150; sermons preached, 117; baptized in connection with my lacor, 56; amount raised for State Missions, \$161.78; salary for services, \$300.

Aggregated summary of State Mission work:

We have had for a part or the whole of their time during the past year eighteen missionaries, who report 382 works of labor, they have preached 1,852 sermons, delivered 358 addresses, made 2,779 religious visits, attended 360 prayer meetings, organized 3 shunches, organized 53 Sunday schools with 870 pupils, organized 5 Sunday school attended 5 Sunday school attended 5 Sunday school attended 5 Sunday prid for church repairs \$790, received from Womans' Work \$168.80, conversions reported 333, namoer baptized 334, by letter 521, miles traveled 15,829, paid missionaries \$4,971.13, case on hand \$337.11, total \$5,308.25.1

EXTENT OF THE PIELD.

Nearly the whole field cultivated last year will need assistance another year to make them senf-sustaining. While scores of important places that we have not yet sided are calling loudly to assistance and we cannot afford to turn a deaf ear to these calls if means to relieve them are placed within our reach.

OUR RESOURCES.

The Home Mission Board of the Scathern Baptist Convention continues to give as assurance that they are willing to help us if we are willing to help ourselves. But it would be an absolute injury to Arkansas Baptists for that or any other Board to supply all our mission funds and leave us to do no hing. We have the numbers and the wealth and if we had the consecration we could easily raise a handsome fund for our State work. We want twenty brethren to give \$25 ach to this work the coming year, twenty-five to give \$20 cach, fifty o give \$10 cach, one hundred to give \$5 cach, two hundred to give \$2.50 each, five hundred to give \$1 each one thousand to give 50 cents each, two thousand to give 25 cents each, five thousand to give 10 cents each, which will make \$5,000. That a roll book be ket in which the name and amount of each donor be enrolled.

In addition to the foregoing amounts we want every friend of missions, especially the children to send a nickle each, and have their

names recorded in the roll book.

The Baptists of Arkansas cannot afford to lag behind the tide of lightment. We, your Committee would therefore suggest that this avention take steps toward the means and best plans of endowing

a first class institution of learning in this State. If we believe the Baptists hold the principles of God, why not send our children to those instructors who are imbued with these principles? We now have the following Baptist schools in the State which we recommend to the patronage of the brethren, Buckner College located at Wichen ville, Sebastian county, Arkansa ; / Centennial Institute, Warren, Bradley county; Arkadelphia High School, Arkadelphia, Clark county; Judson University; Judsonia; Euroka Springs Baptist College, a new ly chartered institution, now is in successful operation, and its healthful location suggests at once the propriety of its establishment. At this school wearly half of the States in the Union are already represented: It, therefore, is a point that we should guard carefully. This school has a corpse of four experienced and successful teachers, and is chartered and owned by the Baptists of this State. We would also recommend that the Convention do all in its power to encourage the education of the Colored 1 opulation of the State. In view of the great necesity of education, we would say, let us come up to the work let us start now toward the endowment of a school, concentrate our energies upon it, pray for it and by the blessing of God, we will soon have schools that will be creditable to the denomination of the State. It is further recommended that an Educational Commission be appointed, consisting of five men, who shall consider the advisability of establishing a Baptist State College, and if thought advisable, to take steps at once to found and fully organize such an institute of learning.
