Call for petitionary letters for membership. Received letters from Shiloh, Clark county; Walton Valley and Caney Fork of Pike county. Upon motion, were received into the fellowship of this body, and the hand of fellowship was extended by the moderator to the delegates.

A communication was read by Bro. Jameson from Providence church in relation to the death of Bro. John Aaron, which was received with tears, and ordered to be printed in the minutes.

Call for correspondence—Bro. Wm. Brown, of Union association, Bro. Isaac E. Welch, of Caddo Association with letters, were received as messengers, and cordially invited to seats in the body.

Brothers S. S. McDaniel, J. H. Holt, A. G. Stuart and the pastor of this church were appointed a committee to arrange preaching during this session.

Bro. Harper, delegate from Bethlehem church, asked to be excused for sickness, his request was granted.

Bro. N. J. Davis, moved that this body hold a prayer-meeting at 9 o'clock on Sabbath morning, and the subject of prayer be, that God would impress upon the churches of this Association the importance of better supporting their pastors. Motion carried, and Bro. Merrell was appointed to conduct the meeting.

Bro. G. W. Clingon by his request, was excused from preaching on Sabbath at 11 o'clock, as alternate for Bro. J. T. Jenkins by appointment at last ession, and the committee on preaching appointed Bro. J. M. Weeks to fill his place.

Committee on preaching reported that Bro. D. D. Corbin preach at night at Bethsaida church to be followed by Bro. Z. T. Rogers, Bro. J. D. Jameson at this church, to be followed by Bro. Merrell.

On motion, adjourned to 8 o'clock Monday morning. Prayer by Bro. Merrell.

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SABBATH.

The prayer-meeting was conducted by Bro. Merrell, as appointed at 11 o'clock the house not being sufficient to hold one-third of the congregation seats were carried to shady places near the house Bro. Weeks after reading 6th chapter of Romans, preached to a large and attentive congregation, setting forth the doctrine and belief of our denomination in a plain and forcible manner. Bro. Jameson, by request of the committee on preaching, followed in behalf of Home Missions, and after very impressive remarks, a collection was taken up, amounting to \$46.15. At 3 o'clock the stand was filled by Bro. Isaac F. Wetch, of Caddo Association, followed by Bro. Bell. At night Bro. Price preached, followed by Bro. Davis. At Bethsaida church Bro. Z. T. Rogers preached, followed by Bro Welch. During the Sabbath day and night the brethren filled the hours as appointed, and fuithfully preached the word.

MONDAY MORNING.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment and after singing, "O for a closer walk with God," prayer was offered by Bro. Hamlin.

The body was called to order by the moderator.

Renewed the call for correspondence and invited visiting brethten to stats. Bro. J. M. Weeks from United Association was received as a visiting minister.

Called the roll and marked absentees.

Bro. Merrell, chairman committee on obituaries, read his report.

Dear brethren; I started out on my missionary work about the 1st of Nov. 1882, and have traveled and peeached over five months during the associational year. Total num-ber of sermons preached, 82, churches organized 1, families visited religiously 101, num-ber baptized 5, miles traveled 552. We were received with gladness of heart and treated kindly by all the people in the destitution and the gospel seemed to have the desired effect. Many were heard crying for mercy and several converted. To God we give the glory for all the good work done in his holy name. E. MERRELL.

Bro. Kenedy, chairman committee on education, read the following as his report which was adopted, after the importance of education was freely discussed.

We your committee on Education submit the following:

We your committee on Educator submittic the following: Dear brethren, There is no greater responsibility resting upon us than the education of our children. God has given them to us, and we are responsible for their early de-velopment. The key note of our age is progress, and while other people are alive to this, we as Baptists should arouse from our spirit of slumber and see to it that our chil-dren have the advantage of this mighty power in helping to perpetuate the glorious truths and doctrines of the gospel. Shall we sleep and let others educate their children while ours grow up in ignorance? The day is coming when ignorance will ne longer be bliss, but he who enters the ranks unarmed with this mighty power will be driven from the field. We would recommend the Jrethren all over the bounds of our associa-tion to prayerfully consider this important subject and see to it that as Baptists we be not only forward for the truth but forward also for all the advantages God has given mankind for dispensing the same, and among the first of the e advantages is education. We recommend the Baptist High School at Arkadelphia, which is now under the con-trol of Prof. Dunn, a fine educator, a thorough Baptist and worthy of our confidence and trol of Prof. Dunn, a fine educator, a thorough Baptist and worthy of our confidence and patronage, as being the place for the education of our sons and daughters. We should make this school a specialty, it being the property of the Red River Association and ac-cessible to all within the bounds of the same.

We would therefore urge that the members of each Baptist church in this Associa-

tion meet every Sabbath for the study of God's word and to teach its holy precepts to. both the young and old. This service of study, of teaching and training will both de-velop the strength of church members and lead the unsayed to the blessed Lamo of God. If the church would take up this work and press forward in it with a tearful and prayerful interest in the great work of evangelization, it's believed that God would put his approbation on it by saving many precious souls. And in order to assist in the or-ganization of these Bible schools in all the churches now without them and premote the growth and healthy devalopment of those already organized we would recommend growth and healthy development of those already organized, we would recommend that a committee of four persons at some central point be appointed to arrange for holding at least one Sunday school institute during the year in each section of the Associatien, and that this committee name the churches which shall compose or constitute each of the four setions, and make all such arrangements as may be necessary to hold happy and successful meetings or institutes.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. When the delegates of the several churches shall assemble at the place appointed When the delegates of the several churches shall open the business by praise and prayer in person, or by proxy. If the former Moderator or Clerk be absent, the Asso-ciation shall appoint one, pro tem.
Immediately after the opening session, the church letters shall be read by persons

whom the Moderator may appoint, and the names of the delegates enrolled by the

Clerk. 3. When the delegate's names are enrolled and called by the clerk, the Association shall then elect by ballot, a Moderator and Clerk, the plurality of the votes governing

4. All motions and amendments to motions must be seconded before they can be entertained by the Moderator. When motions, or amendments to motions are made, the last one made shall be first in order, and so on in inverse order to the original motion

but the mover may at any time withdraw his motion.

5. Any person wishing to make a motion or to speak of any matter before the Association shall rise to his feet, and respectfully address the Moderator, and if he be in order, the Moderator shall signify the same by calling the person or otherwise, and no one, thus in order, shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject, or personal reflections, nor shall any member speak more than twice on any subject, without leave from the Association or to explain some of his former remarks.

6. Whenever sufficient time has been allowed for discussion of any subject before the Association, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association, and declare the result, a plurality governing in all cases except those provided for.

7. No member may vacate his seat without the consent of the Moderator, while the body is in session.

8. When one member shall speak to, or of one another, he shall call him brother.

9. The Moderator may have the names of the delegates called whenever it is necessary. 10. The Moderator may speak on matters of debate as other members, by calling some one to fill his seat while speaking, but not until all others have spoken who de-

sire to speak. 11. The Moderator may invite visiting members in good order to seats in the council,

who may speak, but not vote.

12. The Minutes of the Association may be read as often as it think necessary.

13. The Moderator shall be judge of order; the objector may appeal to the body, a majority of whom shall determine the point of order.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This union shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of "The Red River Baptist Association."

ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of delegates from the churches in the union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches, before they take their seats.

ART. 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual association, and continue in office until their successors are chosen. ART, 4. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of

ART, 4. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed, it shall regard them as independent bodies in matters of internal government, and shall only act as advisory counsel, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied from the very nature of the compact. It, nevertheless, claims authority over its own members, the delegates from the churches, and, in justice and propriety, must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches which depart from the spirit of this compact, by becoming heterodox in faith, or disorderly in practice. It should, therefore, regard all churches united under this constitution, with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the Kiugdom of Grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the Gosple, and the means in accordance with that Gospel, to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially those united in this Constitution.

ART. 5. Newly constituted churches or churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union by their sending up three delegates to the annual meeting of this Association with a petition for admission, and by their delegates agreeing to the abstracts of principles herewith published. ART, 6. The churches of this union shall transmit to every annual session of the

ART, 6. The churches of this union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association, a written communication, specifying the names of their delegates, their number in fellowship, number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated, restored, or deceased, since last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which shall be read and minuted accordingly.

ART. 7. This Association shall have a fund, to be supplied by voluntary contributions of the churches, and all the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committees of Finance, to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot, and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association; he shall retain and manage the funds, agreeably to the order of the Association, and present annually, for inspection in the Minutes, a clear and sufficient statement of all the receipts and expenditures.

8. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are the ordinances of Jesus -Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of Baptism, and that Immersion is the Apostolic mode.

ART. 9. This Association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from the church-

es, unless they have endeavored to solve the same, and have failed; nor of any difficulty between the churches, unless they have pursued the directions in the 18th chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them. Then the Association shall take such matters into consideration, and act upon them at its discretion.

ART. 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to keep a regular file of the printed Minutes of each session of this body, and deliver over the same to his successor in office.

ART. 11. This Constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of the Association, by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members then present; provided, such alteration or amendment be approved by the churches composing the Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

We believe in the one true and living God. 1.

5. We believe in the doctrine of election according to the foreknowledge of God, the

Father, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience, and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

We believe in the doctrine of originals in by the fall of Adam. 1

5. We believe in man's incapacity, of his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imparted righteousness of Christ, only. 7. We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace and never fall finally away.

he Apostolic mode. 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and in the general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal. 10. We believe no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Gospelibut

one who is regularly baplized, called and comes under the imposition of the hands of the Presbyter.

11. We believe that none but regularly baptized members have a right to commune at the Lord's table.

12. We believe that the Lord's Day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ARKADELPHIA BAPTIST HIGH SCHOOL.

Be it resolved by the Red River Baptist Association, in this, its twenty-eighth ses-sion, held with the County Line Church, on the sixteenth day of October, A. D., 1876, being in the county of Howard, and in the State of Arkansas, that we adopt the follow-ing Constitution for the organization and maintenance of a High School for males and females, to be located in Arkadelphia, in the county of Clark, in the interest of the Baptist denomination.

ARTICLE 1. This institution shall be known a the Arkakelphia High School, and shall be under the joint control of the Red River Baptist Association, and, a joint stock company contributing to the building, furnishing and endowing of said institution. ART. 2. The Red River Baptist Association shall have and maintain the right to ap-

point five of a Board of Trustees, to hold their offices seven years, and to fill all vacancies that may occur at any time among that number, and the five appointed shall work jointly with seven other members, who shall be elected by the stock company, and hold their office for a term of seven years, the stock company filling all vacancies that may occur at any time among the seven.

ART. 3. The members of the Board of Trustees appointed by the Association shall proceed at once, as if they were a full Board, to open books for taking stock, and to transact such other business as shall be expedient for the opening of the school, and as soon as a company holding one hundred shares shall be obtained, they shall call for an election of the seven members, to be of their own number, to be added to the Board of Trustees, after which there shall be a meeting of the whole, who shall organize by electing a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer of the Board of Trustees.

ART. 4. The joint stock company shall be composed of persons contributing one or

more shares of stock into the company. A share shall consist of twenty dollars, and shall be secured by note, payable in three installments; the first in three months, the second in six months, and the third in twelve months. The first installment to consist of five dollars, and the other two of seven dollars and fifty cents each. ART. 5. The members of the stock company shall be entitled to vote for the mem-

ART. 5. The members of the stock company shall be entitled to vote for the members of the Board of Trustees personally, or by proxy, by ballot. and additional ten shares, or fraction thereof, not exceeding ten votes, which shall be the largest number of votes allowed to be cast, by any one man. The members of the Board of Trustees thus elected, must be members of the stock company.

ART. 6. All property for the use and benefit of the Arkadelphia High School shall be held by the joint Board of Trustees of said college, in the name of the "Red River Baptist Association and Arkadelphia Baptist High School," and shall be secured by all proper and legal titles to the same.

ART. 7. The Bo ard of Trustees of the Arkadelphia Baptist High School shall transter all business pertaining thereto. After a full board of twelve shall have been contiluted, seven members, at least, shall be required to form a quorum for business. ART. 8. The Board of Trustees shall elect all teachers in the faculty. The teachers

Arr. 8. The Board of Trustees shall elect all teachers in the faculty. The teachers may be elected for any length of time the trustees may see fit, and shall be subject to reprimand or dismissal by them for any misconduct. inconstancy, or incapability at any time. No teacher shall be elected who cannot produce a good recommendation for good, moral habits, faithfulness and bunctuality. One of the teachers shall be elected President of the Faculty, to preside at all meetings of the Faculty, and to superintend the order and regulation of the school, and shall be a member ex-officio, of the Board of Trustees. It shall be required of the President of the Faculty, that he shall be a memor of the Baptist Church in good standing, and "experienced as a teacher, and a good ministrator of school government, having power of self-government, a failure to mainthe which, shall subject him to a reprimand or dismissal.
