## PROCEEDINGS.

The Friendship Regular Baptist Association convened with Sardis Church, Grant County, Arkansas, September 18th, 1886, and was called to order by Rev. J. A. Fawcett, who read the 103 Psalm and offered prayer.

The clerk being absent, Bro. J. W. McPherson was chosen clerk pro tem.

Sardis Church, through her Pastor Eld. T. J. Varnell, bid the delegation a kind reception and hearty welcome, and the Association through Eld. W. H. Cash responded with thanks,

Eld. J. H. W. Overton, the appointee to preach the introductory sermon being absent, by request it was preached by Eld. M. A. Gunter; text Romans, xi, 1.

### 11 o'clock A. M., SATURDAY.

The roll of churches was then called, their letters received and read by D. W. Campbell and H. C. Moring, and delegates' names enrolled.

On motion, proceeded to ballot for officers for the present session, which resulted in the choice of Eld. A. J. Fawcett, moderator, and H. C. Moring, clerk and treasurer.

An invitation was extended to corresponding messengers, and Bro. A. Tucker and W. C. C. Dorough responded from Pine Bluff Association and were enrolled.

A recess of two hours was given for refreshments, which were furnished on the grounds.

#### SATURDAY, 2 O'CLOCK P. M.

The Association was called to order by Eld. A. J. Fawcett, prayer by Eld. J. G. Taylor.

The report of the executive board was read by Eld. A. J. Fawcett, the president, and was heartily endorsed by the brethren, and on motion was adopted. See report A.

#### SATURDAY, 7:30 P. M.

Preaching by Eld. M. D. Early; text, Matthew i, 21; at the close of the sermon many presented themselves for special prayer. Just here Bro. Early made the following proposition, to-wit:

That an alms be offered up with the prayer in the way of a contribution for home missions, and the sum of (\$15,60) fifteen dollars and sixty cents was contributed. Prayer was then offered by Eld. M. A. Gunter, which closed the services of the day, and judging from the expressions of the brethren all were delighted.

#### SUNDAY, 9:30 A. M.

The pulpit was occupied by Eld. M. A. Gunter; text, Daniel ii, 44.

### SUNDAY, 11 'A. M.

The Missionary sermon was preached by Eld. A. J. Fawcett; text, John x, 10. This was one of Bro. Fawcett's happy hours, and the sermon was fully up to the expectation of the brethren. After the sermon a collection was taken up for home missions, amounting to (\$16,25) sixteen dollars and twenty-five cents. The congregation was then dismissed for refreshments, which were furnised on the grounds.

#### SUNDAY, 3 O'CLOCK P. M.

The congregation assembled in Sunday School Mass Meeting and speeches were delivered as follows: Eld. L. Quinn on the relationship of the Sunday School to the church; Bro. J. L. Hunter, the duties of superintendants and teachers, and Eld. W. H. Cash on the duties of parents

to their children in Sunday School. Following each lecture was sweet music by the choir.

## SUNDAY, 7:30 P. M.

The pulpit was occupied by Eld. M. D. Early, who preached a magnificent sermon to a large congregation; text, Titus ii, 14. At the close of the sermon an invitation was extended and many presented themselves for special prayer, A very feeling prayer was then offered by Eld. A. J. Fawcett, and thus closed the services of a day well-spent in the service of the Master to whom be all the glory.

#### MONDAY, 8 O'CLOCK A. M.

Met pursuant to adjournment; prayer by Eld. W. H. Cash. Minutes of Saturday and Sunday were read and adopted.

The committee on Sunday Schools made their report, which was adopted. See report B.

The committee on nominations made their report, which was referred back with instructions.

The committee on obituaries made their report, which was referred back with instructions.

The committee on publications made their report, which was lengthily discussed and adopted. See report C.

The committee on education made their report, which after many able speeches, was adopted. See report D.

The committee on home missions made their report, which was adopted. See report E.

A recess of two hours was given for refreshments, furnished on the ground.

### MONDAY, 2 O'CLOCK P. M.

The Association was called to order by the moderator; prayer by Eld. C. A. Gartman.

The committee on finance made their report, which was adopted. See report F.

The committee on obituaries made their report, which was adopted. See report G.

The committee on foreign missions made their report, which was adopted. See report H.

The committee on nominations made their report, which was adopted. See report I.

The secretary of book depository made his report, which was adopted. See report J.

The committee on ministerial education made their report, which was adopted. See report K.

The committee on documents made their report, which was adopted. See report L.

A number of resolutions were adopted which—see in their regular order.

On motion, proceeded to ballot for brethren to preach the annual sermons at the next session of this body, which resulted in the choice of Eld. M. A. Gunter to preach the introductory and Rev. A. J. Fawcett the missionary sermon.

On motion, adjourned to meet with Star City church, Lincoln County, Arkansas on Saturday before the third Sabbath in September, 1887, at 11 o'clook A. M.

A hymn was sung and the parting hand extended a-mid tears of joy and love. Prayer by Eld. M. D. Early. Thus closed the Fourteenth annual session of the friendship Association.

Resolved, That the thanks of this body are hereby tendered to the brethren and friends of Sardis church and neighborhood for the very hospitable manner that they have entertained us during this session. Resolved, That Sardis church petitions the Association for a letter of dismission.

Resolved, That the clerk superintend the publishing of the minutes, and that he have 600 copies printed and distributed among the churches according to the amount sent up for that purpose, and that he have \$15.00 for his services.

N. B. It will be remembered that the Association made a contract with Bro. Early to publish 600 copies for \$20.00 of 12 pages, and if more than 12 pages there was to be a less number of minutes in proportion.

#### REPORT-A

To the brethren of Friendship Association at Sardis, September 18th, 1886: Dear brethren it becomes the duty of your executive board to report what we have done during the past Associational year. Soon after our appointment we met and organized by electing Eld. A. J. Fawcett President; Bro J. M. Wharton, secretary, and Bro. H. C. Fox, treasurer.

We held various meetings during the year at which we attempted to devise ways and means of forwarding on the work committed to our hands.

It was the purpose of your board to do the greatest possible amount of work at the most available places in the bounds of your body. We attempted to carry out the policy clearly indicated by the Master and his apostles as well as our predecessors in office, of cultivating first, the center of population and influence. We, therefore, concentrated our operations at Star City, Kingsland and Rison. We supplimented the salary of local pastors at these places.

At Star City we employed Eld. L. Quinn for one-half of his time; at Kingsland, we employed Eld. J. B. Lumbley for one-half of his time; at Rison, we employed Eld. W. H. Cash for one-half of his time.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

The church at Star City under the faithful labors of Eld. L. Quinn, has made satisfactory progress; the board is assured that the church is prospering and the cause ison the upward tendency in that town. The Baptists have more prestige there now and the prospects are more encouraging than ever before in the history of that church.

At Kingsland, though there were difficulties in the way, yet by the prudence and energy of Eld. J. B. Lumbley, a church was organized there in February of 13 members, a Sabbath School was soon organized and one of the neatest houses of worship in the bounds of the Association was built. The board rejoices to report that the cause is well established in that prosperous and growing town.

At Rison, the board employed Eld. W. H. Cash as Missionary pastor and under date of June 14th, Bro. Cash writes: "The church at Rison (Mt. Zion) was organized on the third Lord's day in February with 12 members. The outlook is very encouraging. We are now taking steps to build a church house. A Sabbath School was also organized with 19 members and by June 14th, the number had increased to 47." The board feels assured that good and efficient work has been done at this place and it will not be long before there is established a progressive and self sustaining church at Rison and a handsome house of worship built.

The board feels to say, in concluding these remarks, that far more good has been done by the work having been concentrated than if it had been scattered promiscuously over the bounds of the Association. Our policy has been to do one thing at a time and do that thing well.

It has been said that it is easier to learn than to unlearn, therefore, it is necessary to have a Sunday School in every church that we may be able to make impressions on the minds of the young, for if the mind is filled with trash, error is likely to creep in. Therefore, brethren, let us teach the young to remember their Creator in the days of their youth.

#### D

Your committee on education beg leave to report that as a denomination we can no longer afford to neglect this all important duty, and we are proud to say that our denomination is waking up on education. We now have a state college at Arkadelphia with a good patronage and we take pleasure in recommeding it to our people.

If you can not send your children to college, send them to some common school, and not be satisfied with tending them a few weeks, only during the leisure season, but make sacrifice by sending them. Some parents work their children until they are grown and send them into the world without an education, where they become tools for political demagogues and slaves for the educated.

But our brethren say, we are too poor; my brethren, take the horse you expect to give your child, sell it and send the child to school. We call special attention to the rural districts. We, as a people, must give more attention to this part of our work, for this is the only way we can reach the masses. We would not forget ministerial education.

This is very important and is becoming indispensible to our denomination; but as no stream can rise above its source, and the preachers are what the people make them, it is not probable that we will have an educated ministry until the people make it. We need more consecration tothe work of the ministry, and who are the consecrated preachers of to-day? Certainly the educated. And who are plowing, working in machine shops and other secular pursuits? Certainly the uneducated. Then this shows that the educated employ educated preachers and support them so that they can consecrate themselves to the work, and uneducated people employ uneducated preachers to preach for them, and pay them but little for their services and say the preacher ought to work as well as his congregation.

Finally, my brethren, until we have an educated pew, we are not likely to have an educated pulpit.

Your committee on home missions beg leave to report that we find at Kingsland, Eld. J. B. Lumbley has been employed for one half of his time for one year at \$150.00, \$75.00 of which has been paid by your executive board, and \$75.00 by the state board, and that Eld. L. Quinn has

been employed at Star City for one half of his time, and has been paid \$75.00, supplimenting his salary as pastor for one year by your board. And that Eld. W. H. Cash has been employed for one-fourth of his time at Rison, and paid at the rate of \$75.00 per year for the last three quarters by your board.

That of \$220.00 pledged to your board at the last association all has been paid.

We rejoice to say that each of these mission stations has made satisfactory progress and done much good. We find great destitution in the bounds of your association, opecially in the Arkansas river valley.

The State board has done a grand work in the main centers of population throughout the State. Yet, neither yours nor the State board has been able to meet the demands for help.

For a more efficient and systematic missionary work we recommend that every church in the association undertake to raise fifty cents for each member and that a live active member of each church be appointed by the association to collect the funds in his church and pay the same to the treasurer of your board.

We recommend financial co-operation of your board with the State board, and that one-third of the money paid to your board shall be paid to the State board. It being agreed that all money collected by any agent of the State board in the bounds of your board to be divided as above.

Thus we will obtain full statistics and get full credit by the Southern Baptist convention.
