MINUTES.

The Mt. Zion Baptist Association met in its 87th annual session in the meeting house of the Paragould Baptist church, commencing Thursday before the 2d Lord's day in Oct. 1890.

After devotional exercises the Moderator called the Associ-

ation to order.

The letters from churches were read by Brethren J. B. Wise and M. D. Early.

Letters from 22 churches were read and names of delegates enrolled.

On motion the Association adjourned till 2:80 o'clock, to hear the introductory sermon by Bro. M. D. Early, of Memphis, Tenn. Text: 1st Tim. iv. 8.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

After devotional exercises the Moderator called the Association to order. Other letters were presented and read.

The Association went into a permanent arganization. On motion Bro. E. P. Minton was unanimously elected Moderator by acclamation. Bro. M. Ball was elected Clerk in the same way.

The Altman School House church, Holly wood church and the Maumelle Prairie church petitioned membership, and on motion the churches were received and the right hand of fullowship extended. Visitors were called for and Bro. J. S. Edmonds of Mt. Vernon Association and M. D. Early of Memphis, Tenn, responded.

Resolved 1st. That it is the sense of this body that the making and vending of intoxicating liquors is the meanest, most degrading, and soul destroying traffic that curses our fair southland.

2d. That it fosters crime, ignorauce and infilelity, makes

women more than widows, and children more than orphans.

3d. That any church member who talks for, or votes in favor of said evil traffic, if not shamefully ignorant, is unworthy the name christian; and should be promptly dealt with by his church.

The report on Sunday schools was read and adopted as follows.

We believe that it is the duty of the churches to learn and teach God's Holy Word to the Sunday School and the world. We need to sustain this special department of church work for the sake of the helpless, dependent childhood, our youth, and our churches. There is a warning voice in the many forces of evil that threaten to peril the rising generation, society and a pure gospel. These evil forces must be met. They can only

be counteracted and met by the pure word of God faithfully taught to the children and youth of our country.

The child-mind properly called out, impressed and directed, is the strongest bullwark to stay the mighty rolling tide of godless influences. The Sabbath school is one of the mediums through which we can do this work.

"Train up a child in the way he should go" is the hoarse note rolling down the years of time, giving us the assurance that when the child has grown old he will not depart the godly training of his youth.

We find from the letters to the Association that we have fifty teachers and five hundred and fifty-one pupils in seven

schools

We therefore heartily recommend that an effort be made to plant an evergreen school in all our churches.

The report of the committee on Foreign Missions was read as follows:

From the time the first faint thought of self-exaltation cast its blighting shadows across the unsullied heart of the sun of the morning, the devil has marred the fairest works of God, and by his wily and malignant deception succeeded in alienating our race from holiness and God. The essence of christianity the individual soul is likeness to Christ, union with God.

The Christian tellowship with Christ in this lite, and the life

to come was the object of the death of Christ. "The gospel is the power of God to the salvation of every one that believeth" "God is no respector of persons." "How can a man believe on Him of whom he has not beard and how can he hear without a preacher, and how can he preach except he be sent." The only legitimate deduction from these scriptural quotations is "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." "The field is the world" and no Christian has done his duty until he has as much as in him is preached the gospel to earth's remotest bounds.

The Baptists of Arkansas are called upon to raise for our Board of Foreign Missions \$3000 this convention year. Then let the cry go down the lines of the strong hearted workers of Mt. Zion Association, that every man is expected to do his duty in the sight of God to his brother in sin.

We find that the churches during this Associational year—all the year—have contributed only \$68.98. Brethren, this showing places criminal negligence on our hands for which we must account at the bar of God.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. C. B Hunton. The Association was called to order by the Moderator.

The minute of the morning session was read and approved.

A statement of the financial condition of the Crowley's Ridge Baptist was read by Bro. J. H. Kitchens, jr.

The Committee on State Missions read their report and it was adopted as follows:

There is perhaps no State within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention developing in material wealth more than Arkansas. With this development there comes increased demand upon our people for increased contributions toward the spread of the gospel within our bounds. New towns and new sections of country are being opened up from year to year.

New people are coming into our State, and if we would occupy these fields we must build houses of worship and must have men to preach the gospel to the people To do this work it takes money as well as men. The State Convention has been charged with the supervision of this work. But the Board cannot possibly do this work unless the churches co-operate with it in giving the gospel to the destitute places. Your committee would therefore recommend that every church within the bounds of this Association take a collection for the work of the State Board and forward the same to the State Secretary.

A collection was taken for State missions amounting to \$10.00.

The Executive Board, through the President, Bro. J. II. Kitchens, jr., made the following report, which was adopted:

The Executive Board of the Mt. Zion Association met and organized by re-electing J. H. Kitchens, jr., chairman, and G. W. Purvear as secretary and treasurer. At said meeting it was agreed that the Board would assist all the points that had been aided during the past year and do such additional work as its means warranted it in undertaking.

At a meeting held on the 16th day of January, 1890, Para gould church having called Eld. J. B. Wise; Big Bay, Eld. J. W. Bell, Wynne, Eld. J. M. Rains, and Bethany and Woodland Eld. E. P. Minton, the Roard entered into contract with them as follows: Eld. E. P. Minton, for one-fourth of his time at each station, the board was to pay him one hundred dollars; Eld. J. M. Rains, for one-fourth of his time, the Board was to pay him one hundred dollars; Eld. J. W. Bell, for one-fourth of his time

the board was to pay him fifty dollars; Eld J. B. Wise, for all of his time during the year 1890, Board pay \$100. All of said missionaries to retain all sums of money paid them by said nurches.

We regret to state that some of our churches have not repouded to our call for money to aid in the mission work, but hank God for the noble churches who have given us the money to do what we have done, and pray that He may put it into the hearts of others to help during the next associational year.

The Board recommends that our next Board co-operate with the State Board, and through the State Board with the Home Mission Board, as we believe the Master meant that His people should understand each other, and co-operate with each other when He prayed that all might be one. We further recommend that our next Board maintain all our present mission stations until they are able to sustain themselves.

In conclusion we ask not only the money of all Baptists in our Association, but first and most of all we ask your prayers to behalf of the mission work in our Association.

Some time was spent in delightful communion with each other and with God. "How Firm a Foundation" was sung and the parting hand given. Thus the Association closed to meet Thursday before the second Sunday in October, 1891, with the Jonesboro church.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1. The Association shall be composed of memders chosen by the different churches in our union, each of which shall be entitled to three messengers, and one for every fifty members, who on presenting their credentials shall be entitled to seats.
- 2. The members thus chosen and convened shall be known as the Mt. Zion Missionary Baptist Association, the officers of which shall be three in number, viz: Å Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at each annual meeting by the suffrages of the members present. Said Association to have the privilege to enact and carry out missionary purposes in all their meanings, yet so as that the churches and individual members are left free and the giving or with-holding shall not be a bar to fellowship.
- 3. The Association shall usurp no authority over the churches in our Union, or infringe on any of their internal rights, but shall merely be considered an advisory council in all matters relative to their external concerns; nevertheless, it

becomes necessary, in some cases, to have a uniform rule of procedure, namely: If one church commit an offense against another, it shall be the duty of the offended to labor with the offender for satisfaction. If she fails of success she shall call the aid of two more churches in our Union to assist in laboring for satisfaction; and if final satisfaction, in the opinion of the help thus called, be not obtained the aggrieved may bring the case before the Association, which shall be taken up and decided upon according to its merits.

If a serious difference should arise in an individual church which, upon due labor, cannot be reconciled she shall call the aid of two or more sister churches to assist in the work; and if a reconciliation be not affected, the help so called, or the thurch, may bring the case before the Association to be acted upon according to its merits; but the Association will take no negonizance of any case of the above kind unless a due course of procedure shall have been previously pursued according to the economy of the church discipline, found in the 18th chapter of the Gospel by Mathew and other parts of the Scripture, which define the nature of offenses, and the manner of bringing offenders to trial.

- 4. The churches in our Union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association written communications specifying the names of their delegates, their number of fellowship, baptised, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated, deceased since the last session, which shall be read and minuted accordingly.
- That churches making application for membership in this body shall be admitted by a unanimous vote.
- 6. That churches which this body may deem unworthy of membership may be dropped from the list by a majority vote of this body.
- 7. Any article of this constitution may be changed or mended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
