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#### MINUTES

of the Thirteenth Annual Session of the,

LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION,

held with Salem Church,

Columbia co., Ark, on Saturday before the 2d Sabbath in

Sept., 1858.

Saturday, Sept. 11, 1858

At an annual meeting of the Liberty Baptist Associstion, held with Salem church, in Columbia county, Ark. commencing on Saturday before the 2d Sabbath in September, A.D. 1858, after the Introductory Sermon, delivered at the stand by Bro. S. T. Cobb, according to previous appointment, from the 16th verse of the 28th chapter of Isaiah, to an attentive and orderly congregation, after one hour's recess, the delegates assembled at the house. Elder Jesse Hartwell. D. D., the former Moderator, being absent, (and removed out of the bounds of this Association), the house was called to order by the former clerk and on motion and a second, Eld. S. T. Cobb was called to the chair to act as Moderator "pro tem." After singing and prayer by the Moderator, letters from the different churches composing this body, were called for; from all of which, letters were handed in and read, and delegates' names enrolled, as appears in the table of statistics.

On motion, called for petitionary letters from sister churches, of our order, for admission into our body; whereupon, Mount Olive Church, by her delegates, H. K. Elkins and Wm. Davis, presented a petitionary lett which was read, the church received, and the right hand of fellowship extended by the Moderator in behalf of the Association.

The Association then went into the selection of Moderator and Clerk, which resulted in the election of Eld. S. T. Cobb, as Moderator, and B. R. Matthews, as Clerk.

On motion, called for correspondence, and received from our sister, the Red River Association, a corresponding messenger in the person of Eld. A. J. Smith, bearing a minute. And also Elds. John Aaron and S. Harris came forward and presented a letter from the Columbia Association, which was read and the right hand of fellowship extended to all of said brethren, by the Moderator, in behalf of this Association.

On motion and a second, Elds. Edward Haynes, of the Red Mover Association, and W. R. Traywick, of the Bartholomew Association, are both received and welcomed as corresponding massengers from each of their respective Associations, and the right hand of fellowship extended to said brethren by the Moderator, in behalf of this Association.

Eld. W. R. Traywick presents himself as agent of the Arlansas Baptist State Convention, to raise funds and solicit abscriptions for the erection of a Male College in this tate, to be under the control of the said Convention.

On motion, returned correspondence as follows:

Sunday, Sept. 12.

Prayer meeting in the early part of the morning, at the stand. The missionary Sermon delivered at 11 o'clock a.m., by Eld. John P. Everett, according to previous appointment, from the latter part of the 9th verse of the 11th chapter of Isaiah. At the close of which, after a few remarks by Eld. A. L. Hay upon the subject of Missions, which were more particularly confined to the preaching of the gospel to the Cheokee Indians in the Nation, and to the black population amous, a public and joint collection was taken up for these tw latter objects, which amount to \$86.75 cash, and \$20.00 on subscription.

At 2 o'clock, Eld. Edward Haynes preached from the 10t verse of the 11th chapter of Isaiah. On Saturday and Sundanights we had preaching at two or three places in the neighborhood.

We, your committee appointed at the last annual meet

your body, to hear suggestions, take subscriptions, &c., for establishing institutions of learning, one for males, and one for females, to be under the control of your body, and beg leave to report, that we have received, as local suscription, the sum of \$5,600.00; one-third due January, 1860; and the other third due mary, 1861, for the establishment of the male institution aldorado, Ark.; and we have the assurance of a much larsum as soon as the extablishment of the institution is made certain.

That we have received no general subscription for the male, nor local, or general for the female institution.

We would suggest the continuance of a committee to refurther subscription for the male institution, and to receive subscription and hear propositions for the fundamental institution.

We also report to your body, that no place is more suitable for the male institution than Eldorado, taking into consideration its centrality as to location, its general health, good water and pleasant soil. We, therefore, commend that said male institution be located at Eldorado county, Arkansas, and that your body appoint trustees for the building, &c., of said male institution.

#### REPORT OF COMNITTEE ON EDUCATION

The committee on Education came forward and made the following report, which is received, and on motion adopte and committee discharged. The committee on Education submit the fellowing report:

We regard this subject as one in which this Association, in common with all who desire the prevalence of tru and righteousness among men, and the permanent establishment of the Redeemer's Kingdom on earth, is most deeply if terested. Next to direct efforts for the spread of the gospel and the conversion of sinners, there is no enterpr in which christians in this land should more heartily and perseveringly engage, than that which aims at the univers diffusion of intelligence. The development of the intell ual powers, the cultivation of the minds of the masses of the people, enabling them to think and judge for themselv and the wide-spread diffusion of knowledge, are objects de to Christians in this country, and especially to Christia holding to views which we, as a denomination, entertain; and which, because we believe them to be scriptural, we as anxious to disseminate. We rejoice, therefore, in view of the growing interest manifested in parts of our land, in establishment and permanent endowment of schools, and col leges, and seminaries of learning of every grade. Such il tutions, springing up in our midst, nurtured and susmed by the prayers and liberal contributions of God's maple, furnishing ample facilities for the education of wouth and of the rising mimistry, are full of cheering mise not only of temporal prosperity, but especially of type of Christianity, both doctrinal and practical, which shall prevail in the next generation. We, your committee on Documents, submit the followin report: After an examination of all the documents, we fi many things of a pleasing nature, and some things that may us sad. Those of a pleasing nature are, that God has revived his work in some of the churches which compose this body, for which we do rejoice.

That which makes sad, is a seeming difference between the Zion Hill and Pleasant Ridge churches, which seems to have arisen in consequence of the Zion Hill church having restored three members that were excluded from a church belonging to the Red River Association, which has induced, we suppose, the following query from the Pleasant Ridge church, found in her letter, as follows: "Is it right to receive persons into the Baptist Church who have been excluded from a sister church, without first being restored into fellowship with the former church?" Both churches request this body to investigate the matter.

We find, also, the Rehoboth, Hopewell No. 1, Spring Hill, Ark., Liberty, and Camden churches, have all petitifer the next session of the Association to be held with the Eldorado church requests the employment of a domestic missionary. We also notice a request from Pleasant Grove church, that the Association assist them to compensate

their paster for his services, as they are unable to do so.

- 3. Resolved, That as soon as said sum of \$10,000 is subscribed, said building committee shall proceed to take the notes of the subscribers, payable at the time of said subscription to them as such committee.
- 4. Resolved, That said building committee be and the are hereby authorized to procure a teacher, or teachers, a seen as they can get a suitable room.

On motion, bro. Hezekiah Bussey is added to the Executive Board. The Executive Board now consists of brethren Yarbrough, T. Goodwin, J. Melton, O. Lamar, H. Bussey, J. Capers, S. Harrell, and B. R. Matthews.

The next session of this association is appointed to be held with Spring Hill Church, Ark., to commence on Saturday before the 2d Sabbath in September A.D. 1859.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association be ext ded to the brethren of this church, and the friends round about here, for their kindness in entertaining the delegal and visitors at this session.

As the public collection on Sabbath, taken up for the support of a missionary among the Cherokee Indians and for the preaching of the gespel to the black population in our own bounds, was all thrown in at the same time, and it no being certain as to what amount was put in for the black population; therefore,

### CONSTITUTION

Article 1. The Association shall be composed of members, chosen by different churches in our Union, who, on producing their credentials, shall be entitled to seats.

Article 2. The members thus chosen and convened, sh be known by the name of the "LIBERTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION." who shall usurp no authority over the Churches in our Uni nor infringe any of their internal rights, but shall mere be considered as an advisory council, in all matters rela to their internal concerns. Nevertheless, it becomes ned essary, in some cases, to have a uniform rule of procedur namely-if one Church commit an offence against another, shall be the duty of the offended, to labor with the offe for satisfaction; if she fail of success, she shall call aid of two or more churches in our Union, to assist in la oring for satisfaction; and if final satisfaction, in the opinion of the helps thus called, be not obtained, the ag grieved may bring the case before the Association, which shall be taken up and decided upon according to its merit If a serious difference should arise in an individual chu which upon due labor, cannot be reconciled, she shall call the aid of two or more sister Churches, to assist in the work, and if a reconciliation be not effected, the help s called, or the Church may bring the case before the Assoc iation, wtolbeaacted mpon according to its merits; but the Association will take cognizance of no case of the above kind, unless a due course of proceedure shall have been p viously pursued, according to the economy of the Church

discipline, found in the 18th chapter of the Gospel by St. Natthew, and other parts of the Scripture, which define the lature of offences and the manner of bringing offenders to trial.

Article 3. The Churches in our Union shall transmit to every Annual Session of the Association, a written communication, specifying the names of the delegates, their number in fellowship, baptized, received by letters, dismissed, excommunicated, restored, and deceased, since the last session, which shall be read and minuted accordingly.

Article 4. Every Church in our Union shall be entitled to representatives in the following manner, viz: Each Church thall be entitled to send three delegates, for the first fifty members or under, and one for every fifty over. Any thurch failing to represent herself as above perscribed.

shall state her reasons at the next session.

Article 5. New Churches may be admitted into our Union delegates bearing petitionary letters. If upon due exmination they be found orderly and orthodox, the Moderator mail manifest their admission by giving their delegates the right hand, in token of Christian fellowship.

Article 6. The Association, when convened, shall be verned by a regular proper decorum, which she is author-

med to form and amend, according to her own views.

Article 7. At every session of the Association a Moderator shall be appointed by and from among the delegates present, whose duty it shall be to see that the rules are strictly observed and to take the voice of the Association on all subjects legally introduced. A Clerk shall also be appointed, whose duty it shall be to take proper and correct inutes of the proceedings, and record the same in a well bound book, kept for that purpose.

Article 8. The Association shall have the power to withdraw from the Union any Church that may violate the institution, or depart from the orthodox principles of

the Gospel.

Article 9. The Association shall furnish the Churches

with the Minutes of every session.

Article 10. Every query, sent by a particular church, must be included in here letter, certifying that she endeavored to reconcile it, but failed. In such case, the Adsociation shall take it under consideration, and the voice of the majority shall be considered an advisory answer, which shall be entered on the Minutes.

Article 11. "Queries" which immediately concern the general Union of the Churches, sent by a particular Church or introduced by proper motion, shall be taken up and decided on as soon as practicable.

Article 12. Any Church in our Union having a preach whom she deems worthy of ordination, shall call a Presbyt of Ministers from sister Churches, to officiate in the wolf Presbyteries in the ordaining of Ministers or Deacons, or in the Constitution of the Church, shall be governed by the Abstract of Faith, adopted by this Association. Nevertheless, where Ministers' aid cannot be obtained, conveniently one Minister may sonstitute Churches with the assistance of a Beacon, and shall be dissolved by a like Presbytery.

Article 13. The Association shall have a fund supply by the voluntary contribution of the Churches—and all moneys thus contributed, shall be transmitted from the Churches by their delegates, and handed over to the committee on Finance. This committee shall be appointed annually, whose duty it shall be to receive in charge the Association fund, and dispose of the same agreeable to order, and make, at every session, a fair and circumstantineport of their proceedings.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a regular file of the printed Minutes

of every session of this body.

Article 15. The Association shall not adjourn any session, untils she shall have finished all the business hand, except in extraordinary cases.

Article 16. The Minutes of this Association shall be read and corrected, if necessary, and signed by the Model ator and Clerk, before the session rises.

Article 17. In all cases the Association shall be governed by a majority, only when conflicting with the Con

stitution.

Article 18. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any session of the Association, when a majority the members shall deem it necessary.

## RULES OF DECORUM.

Art. 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

Art. 2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the

suffrage of the members present.

Art. 3. The Moderator shall be considered a judge of order, and shall have a discretional right to call to or

at any time.

Art. 4. A member, not satisfied with his decision, may appeal to the Association, on the same day, but at no other time.

Art. 5. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise to his feet, and, on obtaining permission, proceed.

- Art. 6. The Moderator when addressed by a member for permission to speak, shall signify the same by naming the permion or otherwise.
- Art. 7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless de deport from the subject, or use words of personal reflection.—Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by him that made it.

Art. 8. Every case taken up by the Association shall be ocided on or withdrawn before another shall be offered.

- Art. 9. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association on the subject, and the members on the affirmatives of the question shall signify the same by rising from their seats, or otherwise, and those on the negative shall retain their seats.
- Art. 10. The Moderator shall pronounce the decision of the Association.
- Art. 11. Any member wishing to retire, shall obtain premission of the Mederator.
- Art. 12. No member shall speak more than twice on the make proposition without permission from the Association, nor more than once until every member wishing to speak shall have speken, nor shall any proposition be made to clase the mubject until the debates have been carried through.

Art. 13. The appellation of brother shall be used in the Association by members in their addresses one to another

Art. Mi. The names of the members shall be called as often as the Association may direct.

Art. 15. No member shall be tolerated in any practice with tend to interrupt public speaking.

- Art. 16. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member; provided, he appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question, unless the Association be equally livided.
- Art. 17. Any member violating these Rules shall be removed by the Moderator, at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have been made.

Art. 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost.

Art. 2. We believe that the Scriptures, composing the Old and New Testaments, are the words of God, and the only

rule of faith and practice.

Art. 3. We believe in the doctrine of election as founded in the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the spirit, unto obedience, and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

Art. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam.

Art. 6. We believe in man's incapacity, but his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

Art. 6. We believe that sinners are justified, in the sight of God, by the imputed righteousness of Christ only

Art. 7. We believe that saints shall be preserved in

Grace, and never fall finally away.

Art. 8. We believe that Baptism, and the Lord's Supposer ordinancesoof Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of baptism, and that immersion is the apostolic mode.

Art. 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and in the general judgment; and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal

Art. 10. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinance of the gospel but one who is regularly baptized, called and comes under the imposition the hands of a Presbytery.

Art..11. We believe that none but regularly baptized

members have a right to commune at the Lord's table.

Art. 12. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.
