

## MINUTES.

SATURDAY, September 24, 1892.

The Gainesville Missionary Baptist Association convened with First Baptist Church at Gainesville pursuant to adjourntern, at 11 o'clock a. m. The introductory sermon was been by Elder W. A. Clark, editor of the Arkansas Baptist, Blue Rock, Ark., his subject, "Am I a Christian ?"

The report of Committee on Ministerial Education was presented, read and adopted, and is as follows:

That in our humble opinion there is nothing of more im-The minportance than the question of ministerial education. isters are public educators to lead the minds of the people in the great fields of christian ethics, and educate them in all the varied, broad, and glittering truths. To meet educated infidelity and atheism with all their scoffs at our precious religion, he must meet the educated men on all the isms of the day, and he cannot meet these when he is not himself educated. We, therefore, recommend that this association send two brethren, whom the association may approve, to Ouachita Baptist College, at Arkadelphia, Ark., and there support and educate them. That a Ministerial Board be appointed by the association to receive funds for their support, and that a committee of one be ap-· pointed in each church to solicit and raise contributions for this purpose. FRIENDSHIP CHURCH, Committee.

On motion the Moderator appointed the following-named brethren as a Board on Ministerial Education to select two brethren whom the association may approve, to send to school at Ouachita College, and receive funds for their support, viz : L. McHaney, J. W. Galyean, Z. T. Underwood, J. T. Edwards, W. J. Bearden, Mat Thorn and J. B. Foster. They selected and the association approved Elders J. D. J. Faulkner and J. S. Haden.

The Committee on Home Missions reported as follows, which was read and adopted :

We feel that Home Miissons is one of the most important enterprises that is fostered by our people. It embraces the Southern States, Indian Territory and Cuba. The Board pays our own State Board one dollar for every two raised on the field We therefore recommend that our churches enter into hearty sympathy and cooperation, that we may help bear the burdens of the work, and glorify the name of our God.

SALEM CHURCH, Committee.

The Committee on Foreign Missions reported as follows, which was read and speeches made in behalf of foreign missions by Elders J. W. Harris, J. B. Wise and others; a collection was taken up for foreign missions amounting to \$17:50, and report adopted:

Having in view the great commission given by the Head of the Church to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, would impress the importance of the foreign mission cause, and we recommend that the association continue to press the mission interest, and that our ministers continue to present the matter fully before the churches.

NEW HOPE CHURCH, Committee.

The Committee on State and Associational Missions reported as follows, which was read and adopted:

Your committee notes with satisfaction the work of our number Board; the renewed confidence in operations and plans; he past work is seen in the self-supporting churches in the State and fields occupied by our missionaries.

(See report of Executive Board).

Other fields remain to be occupied. We cannot remain indifferent in the presence of such destitution, not only as to State work, but also with regard to our associational fields. Therehere, we would recommend the following for the approval of the body, that the Association be districted as follows:

District No. 1 shall embrace Pleasant Grove, Brown's Chapel, Rock Hill, Center Hill and Main Shore Churches; Disritet No. 2 Union Grove, Fairview, Epsaby, Gainesville and Knobel Churches; District No. 3 Friendship, Providence, Hopewell and Marmaduke Churches; District No. 4 Rector, Booming Grove, Greenway and Salem Churches; District No. 5 Piggott, Haywood's Chapel, New Light, New Hope and Post Oak Churches. That we still keep a financial missionary in the field to travel in the bounds of the association, to look after and supply the destitutions, and the Executive Board to prosecute the work. The committee on Sunday Schools reported as follows, which was read and adopted :

We find that there are eleven churches in the association that have good sunday schools with an everage attendance of 42 schollars for each school. The amount paid for literature will average eight dollars per school, making a total of eighty-eight dollars expended for literature during the year by the entire number of schools. We are proud to know that so many of the churches now take an interest in the establishing and maintainnuce of Sunday schools, and would strongly recommend and urge al' churches of the association that have not organized Sunday schools, to at once organize and henceforward with a painstaking superintendent, and an efficient corps of working teachors, maintain a Sunday school in their church, as we believe that no church is doing her duty unless fully equipped to eduonte and train the children. who must afterwards become membors and supporters of their churches, as we are commanded to teach every creature, both old and young. As to the best means of conducting Sunday schools, we must adopt ourselves to the surroundings ; but first of all let us have good, interesting Ilterature, such as published by the Kind Words Publishing House, of Nashville, Tenn.; second, be promptly on time, short. pointed prayer, song service getting if possible all the children to join in it : thirty minutes devoted to the study of the lesson ; third, take up collection and call the roll after the lesson has been recited, having as many as possible recite some passage of Scripture, or gem of poetry as their name is called ; fourth, song service and short prayer for success of children during the week; 11fth, dismission. We also believe that every Sunday school ought to observe Children's Day on the second Sunday in June ROCK HILL CHURCH, Committee. each year.

We believe intemperance is one of the greatest evils of the day and by its effects is destroying the happiness and prosperity of thousands of homes. In order, therefore, to check this sin, and save our sons from its destructive influence, and our daughters from the burdens of drunkards wives, we would recommend to the churches that they use strict discipline over their members in regard to the use of intoxicants as a beverage, and that they do not tolerate dram drinking, for it is the once moderate dram drinker that afterward makes the drunkard, and God has said that no drunkard can enter the kingdom of heaven. The Committee on Publication reported as follows, which was read and adopted :

The Bible should ever be our rule of faith and practice, and searched more diligently by us as a people. We think, however, it is not amiss to read good, sound literature, and would recommend as sound the Arkansas Baptist, edited by W. A. Clark, Little Rock, Ark., which we should cherish as our own State paper. We also recommend The Baptist, edited by Graves & Moody, and the American Baptist, by D. B. Ray, St. Louis, Mo., and for Sunday school literature the National Baptist Publishing Co., 1310 Olive street. St. Louis, Mo., and the Arkansas Baptist Book House, Little Rock, Ark.

On motion the Treasurer was instructed to pay over the amount for printing minutes to the Clerk and that the Clerk superintend the the printing and distribution of the minutes, and that he be allowed the minute fund, less the expenses for printing.

On motion that the association convene in its next session with Salem Church, near Boydsville, Clay county, Ark., on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September, 1893, Elder W. J Bearden was elected to preach the introductory sermon, and Elder J. R. Holcomb his alternate at said session.

On motion that we correspond with Mt. Zion Association. Bro. J. J. Burton was appointed as corresponding messenger.

Whereas, our work being finished in the present session of this association, be it

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the good people and brethren, and especially the sisters, of Gainesville Church and vicinity for their kind and generous hospitalities tendered uduring the present session, and may God bless them for the sake of Jesus.

Thus closed the Twenty-third Annual Session of the Gaines ville Association and, on motion, the body adjourned, to n<sup>40</sup><sub>15</sub> with Salem Church, near Boydsville, Clay county, Ark., on urday before the fourth Sunday in September, A. D. 1893, at 11 a. m.
