# MINUTES.

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*FIRST DAY*

—o—  
MORNING SESSION.

—o—  
The South Western Baptist Association met pursuant to adjournment, with Brownstown church, Sevier county, Arkansas, on Saturday, October 10, 1891, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

The body was called to order by Eld. Joe. H. Denson, (former moderator,) and after reading the 73rd. division of the Psalms, and singing "Nearer my God to Thee," was led in prayer by Eld. W. A. Ingle. The Moderator then appointed Bro. G. S. Provence and Eld. L. K. Obenchain to read letters from churches, pending the reading of which the body by motion adjourned for the purpose of hearing the annual sermon, which was preached by Eld. C. M. Powell from John v., 24. Theme, "Man Condemned; Christ the Atonement; Faith, the Means of Reaching Christ; The Security of the Believer."

## EVENING SESSION.

—0—

After enjoying refreshments the body again convened at 1:30 o'clock, with prayer by Eld. M. M. Cochran.

The Moderator renewed the call for letters from churches, after letters were read, Bro. M. F. Dennis moved that Eld. D. R. Manahan be added to the delegation from Amity church which motion was carried. Eld. C. W. Strickland then moved that the rules of this body be suspended, and that Bro. Herndon be instructed to cast one vote for Eld. Joe. H. Denson for permanent Moderator, and O. M. Powell for permanent clerk of this Association, carried.

Eld. C. W. Strickland then spoke in behalf of Brownstown church and community, giving the delegation and visitors a hearty welcome to their hearts and homes.

The Moderator then invited corresponding messengers and visiting brethren to seats with us.

The Moderator called for petitionary letters, when the following letters with messengers were presented, Unity, Lockesburg and Saratoga, and upon the delegates subscribing to the Articles of Faith and Constitution of this Association, were received and right hand extended by Moderator.

The Moderator then appointed Eld. C. W. Strickland and the delegates of this church as the committee on Divine Services. The action of the moderator was appealed from, and the vote being taken, the Moderator was sustained.

The Moderator then appointed Bros. Peter Simpson, J. W. Hill and W. A. Powell as the Committee on Finance.

By motion of Eld. P. M. Compton, Eld. T. H. Westbrook was enrolled as a delegate from Fellowship church.

While the body was waiting for the Committee on Divine Services, the congregation sung, with great enthusiasm several hymns. After which the Committee on Divine Services, reported preaching to-night, at church by Eld. R. T. Yates, at New Prospect, by Eld. Y. R. Jarbin.

By motion of Bro. H. H. Ford, Bro. J. B. Rae was added to the delegation from County Line church.

Motion to adjourn till Monday morning at 8 o'clock, carried.



The body then stood and sang the Doxology, "Praise God", and was dismissed by Eld. C. M. Powell.

Sunday services, 11 o'clock, at the church, Eld. L. K. Obenchain preached. Text, I. Thess., v., 21. Subject; "Test of Religion." In which he showed very forcibly that our faith should be tested by the Bible. After services a collection was taken for Home Missions, amounting to \$13.35.

At the Presbyterian church Eld. T. J. Bennett preached from Romans 1. 16, showing Paul's boldness in preaching the Gospel at Rome, and otherwise impressed the audience with the power of the Gospel, and the benefits and blessings derived from it, at the close of which a collection was taken for Foreign Missions, amounting to \$11.15.

At 3 o'clock Eld. Joe H. Denson, preached at the church and Eld. E. Merrel preached at the Presbyterian church.

Monday, October 12th., at 9 o'clock the body met pursuant to adjournment and was opened by Bro. P. Simpson.

By motion of Eld. C. W. Strickland, the Moderator appointed a committee on Woman's Work, viz:—C. W. Strickland, T. M. Montcrief and Geo. W. Smith.

The Moderator renewed the call for letters, Mt. Calvary responding. Letter read by Bro. G. A. Vaughan. Upon motion the Moderator appointed a committee on Prayer Meeting as follows:— L. K. Obenchain, M. F. Dennis and Harris Holt

Moderator renewed call for corresponding messengers, Elders T. J. Bennett and E. Merrel from Red River Association and Bro. E. F. Friedell of Texarkana Association reported and were received.

By motion the body went into the selection of delegates to the Southern Baptist Convention, the State Convention and corresponding messengers to sister Associations, and on motion the following were elected by acclamation, as delegates to the Southern Baptist Convention, Eld. C. W. Strickland delegate, and Eld. Joe H. Denson, alternate, and to the State Convention, Elders L. K. Obenchain, C. W. Strickland, P. M. Compton, Joe H. Denson, W. A. Ingle and Eld. D. R. Manahan alternate. As Corresponding Messengers to Red River Association: Elders C. W. Strickland, P. M. Compton, D. R. Manahan and W. A. Ingle To Ouachita Association; Bros. B. F. Ridley, E. E. Rowell, J. C. Blackburn and J. A. Jones. To Union Association; Elders C. W. Strickland, M. M. Cochran, C. M. Powell and Bro. R. S. Sybert. To Caddo Association; Elders W. A. Ingle, I. E. Skaggs Bros. John Rae and William Burrus.

The Committee on Destitution submitted their report, and by motion was recommitted.



The Committee on Ministerial Education submitted their report, and upon motion was adopted. [See Appendix A]

The Committee on Documents submitted their report, and motion made to adopt as reported, whereupon a motion was made to substitute Nashville instead of Sardis, pending discussion on the amendment, a motion was made to amend the amendment by substituting County Line church instead of Nashville, which motion was lost, the vote recurring on the first amendment was lost, the vote was then taken on the original, and was adopted as reported. [See Appendix, B.]

By motion Eld. D. R. Manahan, was added to the committee on Destitution. By motion it was agreed to have preaching services at 11 o'clock.

The Committee on Temperance submitted their report, and by motion was recommitted, and by motion C. W. Strickland, was added to the committee.

By motion the body adjourned to meet at 1:30 o'clock. Eld P. M. Compton preached at the church at 11 o'clock

The body convened as per adjournment, at 1:30 o'clock with prayer by Eld. Thos. Dulany,

The Committee on Destitution submitted a second report and on motion was adopted. [See Appendix C.]

Bro. W. P. McElroy offered a resolution to amend Art. II, of the Constitution of this Association, regulating representation, and a motion was made to adopt the resolution, pending discussion, a motion was made to lay it on the table, which motion was carried.

The Committee on Ouachita College submitted their report, and a motion was made to adopt, pending which a \$1,00 contribution was made for the financial relief of that Institution, amounting to \$20,00, after which the report was adopted. [See Appendix D.]

Eld. L. K. Obenchain offered a resolution, recom-

mending the Inter-State College, located at Texarkana, as being worthy of our support and patronage, which was adopted.

The Committee on Sabbath Schools submitted their report, and by motion was adopted. [See Appendix E.]

The Committee on Home Missions submitted their report, and a motion was made to adopt, whereupon a motion was made to make the report the special feature for 8 o'clock tomorrow, carried.

The Home Mission Board submitted their Annual Report, and a motion was made to adopt, pending action, a motion was made to table the report, subject to call, carried.

The Committee on Finance submitted their report, and on motion was recommitteed. Motion to adjourn till 8 o'clock to-morrow, carried. Prayer by Eld. M. M. Cochran.

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### THIRD DAY.

The body met pursuant to adjournment, Tuesday, Oct. 13, at 8: 30 o'clock, with prayer by Eld. P. M. Compton. By motion the special order for this hour, (report on Home Missions) was set aside.

By motion the report of the Home Mission Board was called from the table, and pending discussion, a motion to strike out that clause referring to the resignation of the Board, was carried. The vote then recurring on the report as amended was adopted. [See Appendix F.]

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was by motion taken up, and after discussion, was adopted. [See Appendix G.]

By motion the body went into the election of the Home Mission Board, resulting as follows: Bro. G. A. Vaughan, Chairman; Bros. W. P. McElroy, H. H. Ford, Peter Simpson, M. F. Dennis, F. P. Wilkerson, and J. J.

The Committee on State Missions submitted their report, and on motion was adopted. [See Appendix J.]

The Committee on Foreign Missions submitted their report, and on motion was adopted. [See Appendix K.]

The Committee on Prayer Meeting submitted their report, and on motion was adopted. [See Appendix L.]

The Committee on Obituaries submitted their report, which was by motion adopted. [See Appendix M.]

The Committee on Temperance reported, and a motion was made to adopt. whereupon Eld. C. W. Strickland offered a minority report, when a motion was made to table the majority report, which motion carried. A motion was then made to adopt the minority report, and after some discussion a motion was made to make said report the special order for 1 o'clock, carried.

By motion the body then adjourned till 1 o'clock.

By request, a motion was made to grant leave of absence to Bros. M. F. Dennis, Peter Simpson, and R. S. Sybert, carried.

Bro. W. P. McElroy in the chair, Eld Joe. H. Denison submitted his annual report, as Treasurer, which was by motion adopted. [See Appendix N.]

By motion, Districts Nos. 1, 2 and 3, were abolished,

and the entire Association will meet together in the mission meetings.

The body, by resolution, tendered thanks to this church and community for the hospitality shown this Association during this session.

The Committee on Finance submitted their report, which was by motion adopted. [See Appendix O.]

By motion, Cana church was selected as the place for holding the next mission meeting.

By motion, the Clerk was authorized to have 800 copies of the minutes printed, and allowed \$15.00 for his services.

The Committee on Program for next Association submitted their report, which was adopted. [See Program.]

The Committee on Program for Mission Meeting at Cana, submitted their report. [See Program.]

Motion that this Association meet on Friday, instead of Saturday, at 9 o'clock, carried.

By motion thanks of this body was tendered the Bros Moderator and Clerk for their faithful services.

By motion the thanks of this body was tendered the Presbyterian brethren for the use of their house of worship, on Sunday.

By motion the minutes were read and approved.

A motion was then made, which carried, to adjourn to meet with Sardis church on Friday before the 2nd Sunday in October, 1892, at 9 o'clock A. M. "God be with you," was then sung and the parting hand was given, and the closing prayer was led by Eld. M. M. Cochran.

Thus closed a very harmonious session of the South Western Baptist Association.

The facilities for obtaining such education, and preparation for efficient work in the Master's cause, are at our door. Our own Ouachita College, one of the best in the country, offers inducements to those desiring knowledge. There is a board of Ministerial Education, located at Arkadelphia, that inquires after and solicits patronage and funds for ministers attending that school.



We would recommend that the churches of this Association make regular monthly contributions for this purpose.

DESTITUTION,—Your Committee on Destitution report: In Little River co., Richmond, Rocky Comfort, Keller and Blackland school house, five miles west of Rocky Comfort; In Sevier co., Ladd's school house, Masonic Hall, near Ultima Thule, Valley school house, Rock Springs school house, and Pariclifta; In Howard co., Mt. Zion camp ground, Cross Roads church and the neighborhood of Dr. Jones, are destitute of preaching.

Your Committee would recommend that if a missionary be employed to work in Little River, and Sevier counties, that he be instructed to secure as soon as possible, suitable location for church buildings, especially along the line of the Texarkana & Ft. Smith Ry, as it progresses north.
