MINUTES.

SEPTEMBER 19th, 1874.

The Dardanelle Baptist Association met, pursuant to adjournment, with Cornith Church, Johnson county, Arkansas, Heptember 19th, 1874.

Spent one hour in prayer, and the appointee being absent, on motion, Elder S. Livermore was requested to preach the introductory sermon.

Adjourned twenty minutes.

Met pursuant to adjournment.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder S. Livermore, from Mark 16 chap. 15 16 verses, following which there was an interval of twenty minutes.

Met pursuant to adjournment.

The Moderator being in the chair, J. R. G. W. N. Adams was requested to act as clerk. The Association was called to order and the Moderator led in prayer.

Letters read-Read letters from the churches of this body.

Received petitionary letters from Russelville, New Prospect, Mountain Arbor, Pine Hill, Macedonia and Union Grove churches, and extended the hand of christian fellowship to their messengers.

Officers elected-Elected Elders Jac. Hudspeth, Moderator, and J. R. G. W. N. Adams, Clerk and Treasurer. Committee on Preaching-Epperson, E. J. Hogan; Raper, C. C. Hogan and Pursley.

Met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder Crawford. Called the roll. Read and approved the minutes. Read a letter from Zion Hill. Letters of Dismission.—On motion granted Mount Carmel and Mount Zion churches, letters of dismission.

On motion, granted Elder Crawford the privilege of addressing this body in behalf of the interests of the Southern Bapthet Publication Society.

On motion by Elder Hogan, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That no minister shall be considered in order, who reaides twelve months in a community in which there is a church and all not unite.

Recess.—On motion, took recess one hour.

Resumed business.

The Association was addressed by Elder Crawford.

On motion, by Elder Crawford,

Resolved, That we recommend our churches and brethren to perfonize the Southern Baptist Publication Society in the purchase books and Sabbath-School libraries, and especially in the purthase of hymn books.

On motion, the clerk was requested to make settlement with the former clerk.

Place of Meeting.—Agreed to hold the next session of this with Shiloh Church, Sarber county, eight miles east of Hooneville, on Saturday, before the third Sabbath in Septem-1875, at 11 o'clock, A. M.

On motion, the clerk was requested to have five hundred copies of these minutes printed, and that he be allowed \$15 00 tor his services.

On motion, the thanks of this body were tendered to the brothron and friends at Corinth, for their hospitality during the dension of this body.

REPORT ON DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

On this subject, we have had report after report, but to no effect. What can your committee now hope to effect? That the raising of funds to support our ministry, is a necessity, no one can deny. We see that our ministers are poor and have families, and cannot go except they be sent. Neither does the Master require it. Why will not the churches respond? Is it for want of will? Is it because we have no preachers that can do good? Is it for want of knowing the great need of preaching? Or is it because they are void of the missionary spirit? These questions are pertinent, for we never have supported a missionary. We have had their labor at the sacrifice of their families, until there is little probability of employing another, on mere promise of a support. We have heard it remarked: "That if a preacher wants to reduce his family to want, let him become a missionary in the Dardanelle Association." These things ought not so to be. But, alas! where is the remedy? and how shall we obtain it? To think of the destitution in our territory is distressing. Yet we have a bountiful supply of ministers and God is raising up others whose hearts yearn for souls. There is encouragement to preach the word, though 'wickedness abounds; for, when men resolve to seek God, they act from principle. Now, if we would cease to invent new schemes and submit to the old one, Zion's wheels would roll, and the blood-stained banner would waive triumphantly. Who will try it? You know the rule. Let each one lay by on the first day of the week. Let the churches try this and report the result at our next session.
