The 7th annual session of this association was held with lacks on church, Randolph county, Arkansas, on Saturday and Monday, the 25th and 27th days of September, 1875.

### PROCEEDINGS.

Saturda morning, 10 o'clock, the introductory sermon was delivered by Elder B. F. Holford, from 1. Tim. i. 11.

Seconding to the glorious gospel of the blessed God which was committed to me:

After an intermission of one hour, the association was alled to order by the Clerk, the Moderator being absent, the names of the churches called, their letters read, and the names of messengers enrolled as follows, to wit:

The messengers proceeded to the election of officers, which resulted in the choice of Elder J. W. Townsend for Moderator, M. D. Bowers for Clerk and Elder B. F. Holord for Treasurer. The Moderator remarked, "Brethren, I appreciate the honor you have confered. May it redound to the glory of God, and promote the unity of this body." The association proceeded with business as follows, viz:

1. Called for petitionary letters. Two were read; one from Calamine murch, and the other from Shiloah church. The church at Calamine was received, the hand of fellowship extended to other Robert Maxwell, and his name enrolled as her measurer. The one from Shiloah was continued until Monday morning 9

2. Called for correspondence, and received a letter from. Independence, and minutes from State Line associations.

3. Invited visiting ministers to seats with us. Elder J. R.

Pratt accepted the invitation.

4. It was moved and unanimously carried, that the proposed amendments to our Rules of Decorum, as published in our last minutes, be and the same are hereby adopted.

5. The Moderator annuounced the following committees, to wit: 1, On Preaching, the messengers from Jackson church; 2, On Finance, Judkins and Borah; 3, On the State of the Churches, Holford, Frashier and Williams; 4, On Destitution, Holford; 5, On Missions, Clemens, Dentand Bowers; 6, On Sabbath Schools, Cox, Sparks and Maxwell; 7, On Correspondence, Dent; 8, Baptist Literature, Bowers, Holford, and on motion, the Moderator: 9, On Education, Frasier and Bowers.

6. Adjourned to Monday morning, 9 o clock. Prayer by

brother Sparks.

Preaching Saturday night by brother Judkins, Sunday at 11 o'clock by brother Townsend, at 2 o'clock by brother Pratt, and at night by brother Holford.

Monday Morning 9 o'clock, the association assembled and was opened with prayer by the Moderator, and, after roll call, proceeded to business as follows, to wit:

1. The minutes of Saturday were read and approved.

2. The petitionary letter of Shiloah was taken up, the church received, the hand of fellowship extended to her messenger, Jacob Moore, and he took his seat with us.

3. Report of the committee on compleint of Pleas't Hill church against Dry Creek church was called for, received,

and committee discharged.

REPORT.—Your committee, to whom the complaint of Pleasant Hill church against Dry Creek was refered, find that, at the time the grievance was committed, Dry Creek and Pine Hill churches had connected themselves with a colored association according to previous understanding with this association. Respectfully submitted,

It was moved and carried that we drop the names of

Dry Creek and Pine Hill churches from our roll.

4. Report of the committee on Finance called for, received, and the committee discharged.

REPORT.—Your committee respectfully report \$2.40 minute funds.

It was moved and carried that brother Townsend print minutes, and distribute them among the churches.

5. Report of the committee on the State of the Churches was called for, received and the committee discharged.

REPORT.—Year committee respectfully report, that peace and unity preul in the churches throughout the association. Most of them have regular autors; a few are destitute; some, during the year, have enjoyed refreshing asons; some seem to make but little progress, if they do not actually lantant; on the whole, we have reason to feel thankful and take courage. 6. Report of the committee on Destitution called for, re-

rived and the committee discharged.

REPORT.—Your committee submit that, there is, on the east of Black over, Spring river, Eleven Points river, and along the western boundry of the association, neighborhoods destitute of Baptist preaching, some wholely, some partly so.

Resolved, That we request the churches to supply the destitute places in our bounds with preaching, so far as they are able to do so, and that they take up collections for this purpose.

7. Report of the committee on Sabbath Schools called

for, received, and the committee discharged.

REPORT.—Your committee opert, that, in their judgment, properly connected Sabbath schools are of great utility as means of imparting intellectual nd moral instruction to the youth.

Resolved, That we earnestly recommend the churches of this union to vigorously prosecute the Sunday school work, and report results to our next association.

8. Report of the committee on Correspondence called for, received and the committee discharged.

Report.—Your committee have but little out of which to make a report. Independence association held her 25th session with Rehoboth church, on the 11th of this month, and seems to have had, a pleasant meeting. Her total increase, during the associational year, is 41; baptisms, 75, in fellowship, 863. The 2nd session of the State Line association met with Pleasant Hill church, October 9th, and report 15 baptisms, and 356 in fellowship. The last session of Rocky Bayou association assembled with La Cross church, on October 12th, and report 151 baptisms, and 1216 in fellowship. No word from Cane Creek, or Bethlehem.

Arranged correspondence as follows, to wit:

9. Report of the committee on Baptist Literature called

for, received, adopted and the committee discharged.

REPORT. Your committee wieve, that a sound literature is an

indispensible necessity of the age, and therefore, recommend Kind Wards to the juvenile reader, and the Baptist, Baptist Battle-Flag, Central Baptist, and to Arkansas Baptists particularly, the Western Baptist to he general Milton D. Bowers Chairman.

19. Report of the committee on Education called for, received, adopted, and the committee discharged.

REPORT. Your committee do not believe it possible to giver estimate the magnitude of education. Ignorance, in order to be seen in all its native deformity, must be brought in juxta-position with intelligence; and liberty, one of the stars in the galaxy of blessings secured by our holy religion, be guided by the companionship of learning, or it will sink into licenthous, ness. It was in the dark ages of ignorance and its companion, superstition, that the earth was deluged with the blood of martyrs; and the causes that produced this effect then, other circumstances being equal, will produce a like effect again. Then, if we would not see the barrier of religion and freedom trail in the crimson gore of intolerance. Roscription and persecution, the courtiers of despotism, itself an outgrowth of ignorance, let us educate our children; which consists in the communication of intellectual and moral instruction, and in the development of the mind anti-heart; and this ought to begin in the cradle and continue through life. Nothers, more particularly than fathers, ought to be educated: for it is from that the first, as well as the most erasible impressions are imparted; and if they are ignorant and superstitious, their children will, in all probability, be so. As auxiliary to home instruction, let us encourage and patronize Sabba schools, Common schools, and, particularly, the Smithville Institute, where a thorough education can Wilton D. 11. The report of the Smithville Institute Trustee was received and Elder D. Wagster re-elected Trustee.

REPORT. Your Trustee respectfully reports: Total number of students matriculated 76, educated free 12. David Wagster, Trustee.

12. QUERY. Is washing feet a test of fellowship with this

association? Answer, No.

13. On ballot, next association till be held with the church at Smithville, Elder M. D. Bewers preach the introductory sermon, Elder D. Hunt Aternate, and Elder J. W. Townsend to write circular letter.

14. Resolved, That each minister in this association be requested to report his labors to our next association; and each church state, in her letter, the amount she will pay a missionary the next year.

15. Reports. Penn.—Sermons 48, exhortations 4, prayers 39, miles 455. Holford.—Sermons 95, exportations 73, baptisms 39, churches const. 1. Townsend Sermons 41, exhortations 37, prayers 28, miles traveled 1, 9, baptisms 1.

16. On motion, while singing, the brethren took the part-

ing hand, prayer by bro. Holford, and adjourned.
