L. F. McMurry and Rev. G. M. Ford was about the Moderator protem temporarily by acclamation. The nominee alternate to preach the introductory sermon were both absent and H. J. P. Horne of Red River Association was elected to preach antroductory sermon. After the sermon dinner was served on the modes. The Association was called at 1:30 p. m. Prayer was offer-Rev. W. Q. Young of Wheatley, Ark.

Letters from he churches were called for and read by Bro. J. T. Endson and Bro. E. R. Daniel. The following named churches represented by messengers as follows:

Bev. G. M. Ford was elected Moderator, W. O. Hearne Clerk and E Purdy Treasurer of the Association. All were elected unaniand without opposition.

Retitionary letters were then called for and none were received.

Corresponding Messengers were called for and none were received.

Visitors were called for and the following were recorded as present: R. A. Raney, Moderator; G. G. Richardson, J. G. Murry, Joe Daniel, L. E. Holt, all of Judson Association; H. J. P. Horne of Red River and W. Q. Young of Mt. Vernon Association.

Moderator and Clerk retired and made up the Committees. (See reports for names.) During the interim in the absence of the Moderator short addresses were made by the visiting brethren.

The Committee on Divine service were composed of the Messengers and Deacons of Prosperity church and they made a partial report at this hour.

A short Bible study was conducted by the Moderator while the entertainment committee was getting its report ready. The Committee on entertainment made is report at this time. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. G. Murry and the association adjourned until 7:30 p. m.

The Association resumed its session at 7:30. Rev. J. S. Rogers, General Secretary of the State Mission Board, Little Rock and Rev. W. F. Dorris of Monticello, Field Agent for the Orphanage were recorded as visitors. Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. L. E. Holt. Sermon by Rev. J. S. Rogers and adjourned until 9:00 a. m. Thursday.

SECOND DAY: Devotional exercises by Rev. W. Q. Young at 9:00 a. m. Report of Committee on State Missions, and discussions and adopted as read. Motion carried to hear the Orphans Home report at this hour. It was read and discussed thoroughly and adopted. A cash collection was made amounting to \$20 and a good list of pledges were also made. Adjourned until 1:30 p. m., and dinner was served on the grounds.

Met at 1:30 by singing and prayer was offered by Rev. G. G_4 Richardson.

After the usual announcements were made a motion was carried to ask Rev. R. A. Raney to preach at this hour. After the sermon the report on Publication was made and adopted. The reports of the various committees were well discussed and all were adopted as read except the committee on Associational Missions; its report was amended. (See report.)

Reports were made in the following order:

Foreign Missions, Nominations, Education, Obituaries. Partial report of Committee on Divine Service. Adjourned until tonight 7:30.

Sermon at 7:30 m. by Rev. L. E. Elliott, after which the Association adjacened until Friday at 9:20 a. m.

THIRD DAY: Association met at 9:20 a. m., devotional exertion by Rev. A. S. Scruggs. Reports again took up. Home Missions, Aged and Worn Out Ministers Relief. Associational Missions report made, also the report of the Executive Committee and Financial mort of the Treasurer was made and discussed together. Motion made to make the last two reports named a part of our Minute. Carind Adjourned and sermon at 11:00 a. m. by Rev. W. Q. Young.

Dinner.

Association met at 1:30 by singing and prayer was offered by H. J. P. Horne. Resumed discussion on Associational Mis-Reports on W. M. U., Prohibition, Sunday Schools and B. Y. Finance. Clerk made report on the printing of Minutes last Motion carried to pay the Clerk his fees and hold up the ing of this year's minutes until the matter could be carried back the churches and more funds secured. Resolution of thanks tenby Bro. Ford and adopted. By motion it was ordered that the security of the minutes, etc., was left in the hands of the Executive minitee.

On motion the Association adjourned to meet with Thornton on Wedneyday before the First Sunday in October, 1918.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES FOREIGN MISSIONS

We have made a beginning, much has been done in the dissemiof information, but the field is yet largely fallow ground, in our more loyal churches. Our Arkansas churches gave to Missions last year \$10,707.75. This amount prorated among hundred pastors would be only \$21.40 each, and leave nothing laymen and women to give. The total receipts of the For-Mission Board last year from the churches, the Sunday cacles, etc., were \$517,729.51.

the apportionment of the Southern Baptist Convention, Arkanick it to give \$12,000.00 this year, an increase of 20 per cent years offerings. Southern Baptist through their Foreign Hoard at Richmond, Va., are doing work in seven fields to-wit: Japan, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Argentina. On these 113 males and 182 female missionaries, 166 ordained native and 402 unordained native helpers, 459 churches, 95 of self-supporting and 910 out stations. Last year these 1001ved 6472 members by baptism, an aveareg of over 20 101 missionary. They received 950 persons by letter, and 101 tor. They lost 381 by death and 848 by exclusion and 101 tor. The present membership is 42,630. We have 203 101 minsionary, Schools with 24,461 scholars, and these

missions contributed a grand total of \$129,054.81, more than \$3.00 per capita for the entire membership.

Shall Arkansas Baptists allow those so lately won from heathenism to outstrip them in the giving of funds for the Lord's work?

That is about the same average per capita gift of Arkansas Baptists for all purposes combined last year. God bless the Foreign missionary in all the land wherever they may be is our prayer over and over.

Additional To Association Mission Report

1. We recommend that each church that hasn't taken an offoring for Associational Missions be requested to do so at once in their next regular service and send the amount to our Treasurer immidiately. Said amount to be applied on the present indebtedness until the debt is paid in full.

2. We recommend that the messengers present in this Assolation from each church be elected as a committee in their several durches to canvass their membership and see how many they can not to pledge \$1.00 per month to Associational Missions, said committee to report the result of their effort to the Moderator not later han Nov. 15, 1917.

8. We recommend that our Associational Board be authorized to the State Board to assit us in supporting our missionary, if in their discretion they deem it wise to do so.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD

Your Board met on the 5th Sunday in December to plan work for ummer. After a study of the destitute points in this Association deemed it wise to employ some one to meet regular appointnt during the winter and spring months to prepare the way for a ular missionary in the summer. We employed Bro. C. H. Cobb, ministerial student in Ouachita College for this purpose for half a salary of \$20.00 per month.

We had only \$7.23 to begin with and the collection made by Bro. was not sufficient to pay his Salary each month, so your board \$100.00 to finance the work to June the 1st. Bro. Cobb and \$18.01 on the field and we paid to him \$86.99 in full of all to June 1st, at which time we began work for the State Mis-Hoard.

Adding the \$7.23 old balance to the \$100.00 borrowed, makes a total of \$107.23 and deducting the \$86.99 paid to Bro. Cobb from it, leaves a balance of \$20.24 in our hands; but it also leaves us with a note for \$100.00 and \$4.67 interest due to the First National Bank of Fordyce.

We elected Bro. C. F. McDonald to take the field for full time through July, August and September but he declined and we were unable to locate another suitable man for the place.

We therefore failed on the Summer Campaign which we had planned, for the reason that we could not get a suitable man for the place.

The membership of our Board has been badly scattered making it difficult for us to meet. We therefore recommend that a new board be appointed ,composed of men who live closer together thereby making it easier for them to meet.

PUBLICATION

We your committee on publication make the following report: First. We recommend the thorough study of God's Word. (a) Because we are commanded to study the bible. (b) Because it is God talking to his children. (c) Because we have modern heresies.

Second. We recommend the study of doctrinal books, such as Grace Truman, Little Baptist, Two Old Letters and others.

Third. We recommend the reading of one or more Baptist Publications that are orthodox to the core and missionary in spirit.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by a majority of the members present by ballot or otherwise, as a body may deem wise.

3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that order is kept according to the Rules of Decorum.

4. Any person dissatisfied with the decision of the Moderator may appeal to the Association; provided it is done the same day.

5. One member only shall speak at a time. He shall address the Moderator and, on obtaining the floor shall proceed without interruption, unless he departs from the subject, or uses personal remarks which reflect on others.

6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice on any which without obtaining permission from the Association.

7. No practice shall be allowed that is calculated to interrupt a mmber while speaking.

H. Every motion made and seconded, after time is given for discussion, shall be put to the body for disposal unles previously withdown, and the Moderator shall announce the decision of the Asso-Hallon.

11. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speaking as members, provided the chair be filled during the time; and to vale in case of an equal division of votes on any matter.

12. The roll of messengers shall be called as often as the body may deem it necessary; and no member shall absent himself from the body without permission from the moderator.
