Rules of Decorum.

- 1. When the delegates of the several Churches shall assemble at the place appointed for the session of the Association, the Moderator shall open business by praise and prayer in person or by proxy. If the former Moderator of Clerk be absent, the Association shall appoint one pro tem.
- 2. Immediately after opening session, the Church letters shall be read by persons the Moderator may appoint, and the names of the delegates be enrolled by the Clerk.
- 3. When the delegates' names are enrolled and called by the Clerk, the Association shall then elect by ballot a Moderator and Clerk, the plurality of votes govering the election.
- 4. All motions and amendments to motions must be seconded before they can be entertained by the Moderator. When motions or amendments to motions are made, the last one made shall be the first in order, and so on in inverse order to the original motion, but the mover may at any time withdraw his motion.
- 5. Any person wishing to make a motion or to speak on any matter before the Association, shall rise to his feet and respectfully address the Moderator, and if he be in order the Moderator shall signify by calling the person or otherwise, and no one thus in order shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject, or for personal reflections; nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same subject without leave from the Association or to explain some of his former remarks.
- 6. Whenever sufficient time has been allowed for discussion of any subject before the Association, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association and declare the result, a plurality governing all cases except those provided for.
- 7. No member may vacate his seat without the consent of the Moderator while the body is in session.
 - 8. When one member shall speak to or of another he shall call him brother,
- 9. The Moderator shall have the names of the delegates called whenever it is necessary.
- 10. The Moderator may speak on matters of debate as other members, by calling some one else to fill his seat while speaking, but not until all others have spoken who desire to speak.
- 11. The Moderator may invite visiting ministers, in good order, to seats in the council, who may speak but not vote.
 - 12. The minutes of the Association may be read as it may think necessary.
- 13. The Moderator shall be judge of the order; the objector may appeal to the body, a majority of whom shall determine the point of order.

Proceedings.

PROVIDENCE, Oct. 9th, 1896.

The Forty-Eighth Annual session of the Red River Baptist Association met with Providence church, Nevada county, Ark insas, at 10 o'clock, a. m. October 9th, 10th and 11th, 1896.

Congregational singing, led by A. J. Price. Opening prayer, led by J. O. Browning, second by E. Merrell. In the absence of A. W. King, and his alternate, J. C. Kelley, a motion prevailed that J. J. Haynes preach the introductory sermon. He was invited to occupy the stand, and requested the congregation to join in singing, "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound." Reading the 1st chapter Hebrews, and prayer by Bro. J. J. Haynes, he announced his text, 8 verses of the chapter read, delivering a short but very instructive discourse. After singing by the congregation, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," and receiving the benediction by Bro. T. J. Bennett, the Association took recess to 1:30 o'clock for refreshments, which were served in abundance upon the church grounds.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:30 o'clock, promptly, the body was called together by singing, led by Bro. Price, and after reading a portion of the scriptures and prayer, Moderator J. P. Copeland called the Association to order, and requested the messengers to come forward at once and deposit their church letters. Bros. Corger and Hitt were appointed reading committee. The messengers names were enrolled, and at the close of the reading of the letters, the roll was called by the clerk, and absentees noted.

The Moderator then announced the first business claiming the attention of the body to be that of permanent organization, by electing a moderator and clerk, and appointed O. S. Jones and J. W. Conger to record and canvass the votes, which resulted in the choice of Larkin H. Hitt, Moderator, and J. P. Bourland reelected clerk. After the usual complimentry remarks, the newly elected entered at once upon the duties of their respective offices.

A motion prevailed to appoint a committee on Divine service. Moderator appointed W. T. Crowley, J. C. Brown, with the Messengers of Providence church.

Motion by J. P. Copeland prevailed that the Moderator appoint a special committee whose purpose it shall be to draft a memorial upon the life and work of the late Elder George W. Wells. J. P. Copeland, J. A. Ross, J. O. Browning and D. G. Wells were appointed said committee.

Committee on Divine services reported as follows:

Messengers assigned homes by J. F. Welch.

Mottion to adjourn to 9 o'clock Saturday morning, carried. Benediction prayer by O. S. Jones.

EVENING SERVICES.

At 8 o'clock the congregation reassembled. D. G. Wells reading, as an introductory to the services, 10 chapter of Paul's letter to the Corinthians.

After prayer and singing, announced his text, 13th and 14th verses of the chapter just read; delivering to his hearers a good lesson, full of thought and sound doctrine. Services concluded by G. W. Burns.

SATURDAY-MORNING SESSION.

Opened by singing praises to God, Scriptural reading and prayer by J. H. Collins.

Motion by J. O. Browning, and adopted by the Association, that the Moderator appoint a committee of five for the special duty of formulating a report on Whitsittism.

E. B. Miller, J. W. Conger, J. P. Copeland, I. F. Welch and Gooden Deaton were appointed said committee.

On motion and second, Ozan Church was granted a letter of dismission to join Howard County Association.

Motion prevail that the several committees have permission to retire for the purpose of making up their reports.

The Moderator announced recess for preaching, and, in accordance with previous appointment, J. H. Collins occupied the stand, delivering a lesson to his audience worthy the consideration of all Christians; and more especially the divinely-called and ordained men, whose duty it is to stand and speak in the name of thrist. The lesson was concluded and confirmed by H. J. P. Horne Prayer by J. O. Browning.

Association was called to order by the Moderator, and J. K. Hardy, of Howard County Association, and John Honea, of Un on, received as Corresponding Messengers and invited to seats with us.

Special committee on the life and work of Eld. Geo. W. Wells read their report as follows:

Bro. G. W. Wells was born in Clark county, Ark., February 22, 1824. Born of the Spirit in 1853 and united with Bethlehem Baptist church the same year,

and in October of that year was ordained to the ministry. He was one of the pioneers of Southwest Arkansas. His zeal and arder for the cause of Christ prompted him to make greater sacrifices and endure more hardships for the salvation of souls than almost any other Baptist preacher that God has given us. We can well say that his success as a minister of God in winning souls to Christ was unsurpassed among us. Multiplied hundreds through his earnest and pathetic appeals have been brought to accept Christ. Weak and faltering Christians through his preaching have been strengthened and developed so as to make them efficient workers in the church. The doctrines of the Lord Jesus Christ in all their fullness have been proclaimed, upheld and defended as could be done by no other than a truly devoted and consecrated servant of the Master. In his daily life he was kind, thoughtful and generous; ever ready to lend a helping hand to the needy and distressed. By his godly instructions, orphans have been encouraged to lead lives of usefulness in this world. In fact, his life was spent in winning souls to Christ and alleviating suffering humanity. We deeply regret and mourn his death, but bow in humble submission to the providence of an all-wise God, who doeth all things well. To his bereaved family we tender our heart-felt sympathy, and beg them to strive to emulate his pious and godly life. Report on General and Ministeral Education read by Chairman E, B. Miller,

It is most gratifying to your committee to be in possession of facts concerning general Christian education that should thrill the hearts of lovers of truth. Truth is mighty, and will prevail only when trained and faithful workers endow it with personal zeal. It is a fact that Baptists lead all denominations in the amount of money invested in institutions of learning. We thank God for the interest our mothers and fathers are taking in the education of their children.

Ministerial training is receiving special attention throughout our bounds.

There were twenty-four ministerial students in Ouachita College last year, and up to this date, Oct. 9, sixteen have matriculated this session. Men studying for the ministry are admitted to the college course of study at Ouachita two of charge for tuition. The Board of Ministerial Education renders aid as paying the board and lodging of worthy young ministers. We recommend collection and pledges for this purpose at this meeting. Langley, Chairman, moved the adoption of the report and spoke at length in its favor, giving facts and plausible reasons for recommending the abolition of the Associational Executive Board. On account of this feature in the report, its adoption met with great opposition. Pending this report, a motion prevailed to adjourn till seven o'clock this p. m. Prayer by Bro, E. Merrell.

NIGHT SESSION.

Association reassembled at 7 p. m., and after singing, "Come Thou Fount," and prayer by Bro. T. J. Bennett, resumed business.

The report on State and Associational Missions was recalled, and after many strong speeches in opposition to abolishing the Executive Board and urging our churches to renewed energy in the support of our mission work, a motion prevailed to recommit the report, and that J. A. Ross and I. F. Welch be added to the committee.

Your special committee appointed to report on Whitsittism, submit for your consideration as follows:

For more than 1800 years Baptists have had the Holy Scriptures and the best authenticated church history to prove beyond the question of a doubt that the Baptist church originated with Jesus Christ and his apostles with the doctrines and ordinances that have been preached and practiced by us in every age.

Resolved, therefore, That we, the Red River Baptist Association, repudiate and denounce the false assertions of Dr. W. H. Whitsitt, as published in pedobaptist periodicals, that until 1641 immersion was unknown among Baptists and not essential to church organization.

Resolved, further, That we regard his training and instruction to young ministers as being exceedingly dangerous; believing as we do that a bitter fountain can not send forth sweet water.

We therefore recommend that we withdraw our patronage from the seminary over which he presides during his presidency.

The above by motion submitted. Subject thoroughly discussed by Elds. G. W. Burns, D. G. Wells, J. O. Browning, J. B. Rountree, T. J. Bennett, J. J. Haynes, I. F. Welch, W. U. Davis and the Moderator, Larkin H. Hitt. Question called for and the report was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Motion prevailed that the Clerk be requested to furnish the Arkansas Baptist and the Western Recorder copy of the above report for publication.

Committee on Obituaries submitted their report, which was adopted, as follows:

We find no record of deaths reported by our churches through the medium of their letters. Only number of deaths without giving names. Total number of deaths reported is thirty. But we know of the death of one of our oldest and most worthy ministers in the person of Eld. D. S. Williams, who was called from this life on September 22, 1896, in his 90th year, at the home of his daughter. Mrs. J. C. Vick, Olmstead, Ky. Bro. Williams was born in Cumberland county, N. C., May 28, 1807. He was educated at Princeton College, New Jersey, for the Presbyterian ministry. Soon after returning from school he began the study of the question of baptism, and becoming convinced of the Baptist position being the New Testament teachings, he joined the Baptist church and was an active minister of the gospel for fifty-four years. He was one of the original trustees of Wake Forest College, and for a number of years, Eld. D. S. Williams was vice-president of the North Carolina Baptist Convention. Having moved to Clark county, Ark., he at once took up the work of preaching, a work that he learned to love above all other callings. He served faithfully many churches in the bounds of our association, and especially for a number of years the church at Arkadelphia. He was sound in the faith. devout in spirit, and abounding in good works. He was a great advocate of general and ministerial education; his works follow him. The remains of the faithful and aged brother were returned to Arkadelphia, and buried in Rose Hill cemetery.

We also chronicle among the illustrious dead, the name of Tillman Howell, who, since our last annual meeting, has been called by the Father: "Well done good and faithful servant, come home." Brother Howell was baptized on profession of faith into the fellowship of the Baptist church when quite a young man, and in early life was ordained by his church to the full work of the ministry. Though not an educated man, he possessed a strong intellect, and was a ful and sound minister of Jesus Christ, a tender husband and father and a kind and obliging neighbor. He leaves a large family of relatives and a host of brethren and friends who with sorrow regret their loss. But they weep not as those who have no hope. Well they know their loved one is but reaping his reward. Brother Tillman Howell was near ninety years old at his death, having devoted near sixty years of his life to the ministry, and no doubt at the

last sounding of the trumpet call, many will arise to call him blessed, as the human agent in leading them to Christ, at a very great financial sacrifice to himself. We have no history and dates appertaining to the family record, hence cannot give particulars.

After hearing the letters from the various churches read, we find our cause deficient in the Sunday-school work, and believing this to be one of our worthy and best means of propagating the gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, we therefore recommend that the duty devolves upon our pastors to indoctrinate the members of their churches along this line. We also recommend and advise our churches to use strictly Baptist literature in their respective Sunday-schools, and also that the teachers of our Sunday-schools should be members of the Baptist church.

The following report from committee on Pastoral support was read by chairman G. W. Burns and adopted:

Pastors to churches is one of Christ's ascension gifts. We ought to appreciate all of his gifts. Do we this one? If so, as God has provided for the support by ordaining that they that preach the gospel should live of the gospel, therefore we advise all of our churches to heartily support their pastors, that they may give themselves wholly to the work to which God has called them. Let us do this, even at a sacrifice, and God will bless us. Let us try Him.

Foreign Missions. Report read, discussed and adopted, as follows:

The greatest object before the Christian world today is the evangelization of the nations. The pastor and church that neglect this duty are existing in

the most flagrant disobedience. The chief command of Christ before he closed His work in the flesh was that special and great charge to make and baptize disciples. No pastor and church may expect God's blessings on any part of their work while they continue to disregard the special work Christ committed to them. The pastor and church who fail in mission work are dead while they live. Such church is only a Sunday club, and not a church of the living God, which is the pillar and ground work of the truth, and such pastor in a travesty on a gospel preacher. Either do what Christ says, or say you are not loyal to Christ. We have foreign missionaries in China, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Mexico and Japan. Our net contributions to Foreign missions last year were \$102,056.15. Of this amount Arkansas Baptists gave \$1,248.34, and \$1.45 were reported from the Red River Association.

There are fifty-one churches in our Association; of these, seven contributed to foreign missions—forty-four, if we are to judge from the reports, gave nothing. The sisterhood of our churches are taking some interest in the work. Southern Baptist women gave \$22,799.55 to this cause last year. The women in Arkansas gave \$184.60. Your committee beg that the following points be heeded by all conserned:

1st. That our pastors study the great work of Foreign Missions, and impart information, exhorting their churches to the performance of their duty to God and the lost. 2nd. That the opportunity to give may be offered at every regular meeting of the church. 3rd. That we all study the Bible and missionary literature, praying for God's blessings upon Foreign Missions.

Report on Home Missions read and adopted, as follows:

This work is equal in importance with other mission work, and the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is the organized medium through which we may do mission work for the Master in the States, Territories and Cuba. And as our State and even Red River Association have been the beneficiaries of the aid of said Board, and as the Board is greatly in need of means to prosecute their work and meet obligations, we therefore recommend that in immediate collection here and in all our churches at an early date be taken, and the proceeds be forwarded to A. G. McManaway, agent for Home Missions, post-office Arkadelphia, Ark.

Report of Associational Executive Board submitted, as follows:

DEAR BRETHREN: Through the protecting care of a kind and indulgent Providence, we are permitted to again meet you in an associated capacity, and for your careful and wise consideration submit to you our sixth annual report. At our Board meeting during last spring the careful consideration and propriety of trying to employ a suitable minister to take the field was thoroughly discussed, and also after referring to the report of our Committee on Associational Missions, as adopted at our last annual session, recommending that your Board do not employ a missionary until the entire debt for past services, as per contracts, have been fully adjusted, we declined trying for a new contract, as our obligations were yet unpaidwevere hopefulain the beginning of this associational year, that the obligations of your board for services past due would be settled at once. Because

a few of our churches so soon responded and cheerfully assisted to the amount of their part, and had all of our churches done so, the debt would have been paid, and your board free to contract for the services of a worthy minister to take the field in behalf of our Master's work. We regret the loss of time, and no work this year, very much. But delighted tonight and thankful to the many churches and messengers of this association for their liberal contributions, sufficient to pay our entire debt, as will be shown upon exhibit of our financial report as follows:

STATE AND ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Your committee, to whom the recommitted report on State and Associational Missions was referred, report that the Executive Board is in debt about \$19.60 for mission work, done by Bros. H. J. P. Horne, I. F. Welch and W. U. Davis. This after a net calculation of all contributions for our associational fund, received by Finance Committee and now in the hands of the treasurer. At our last session a resolution was passed, requesting the members and pastors of churches to make collections for the payment of this debt, but we regret to say, this resolution was not complied with by many of our churches, and the Board has thus been unable to execute the work assigned it. Your committee recommend that a collection be taken tomorrow and that pledges by the messengers be taken to meet this debt at the earliest possible moment; and until this is done, that no missionary be put in the field. When the debt is fully liquidated, we recommend that the Board be directed to proceed with the work assigned them, fully assured that this association will support and sustain them in their efforts for the spread of the Gospel.

Recognizing the importance of the work done by our State Board, we recommend that our Board co-operate with this Board in their work.

LADIE'S SOCIETY OF THE ARKADELPHIA CHURCH.

The Ladies' Society of the Arkadelphia Baptist church, with a membership of sixty-three (63), meets once a week at the church, The officers are, President, First and Second Vice-presidents, Secretary and Treasurer. The last meeting in each month is devoted to regular missionary work, at which time a leader and helpers appointed previously by the presiding officer, discuss the mission work as outlined by the Foreign Mission Journal. These meetings have proved profitable and interesting. Every meeting of the society is opened by reading some portion of God's word and prayer; at roll call the members respond with verse of scripture. Each week there is a report of the sick and strangers in town, and committees, either volunteers or selected by the President, are sent to visit and administer to the needs of these. The cordiality and warm Christian interest, so essential among the members of a church, have grown and strengthened by this method. For three years past the society, besides the regular missionary collections, has sent each year a missionary box. This year the church building is being enlarged, and to that fund the society has subscribed \$500, of which \$300 has already been paid. ARTICLE 1. This Union shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of the Red River Association.

ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of delegates from the churches in the Union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches before they take their seats.

ART. 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body, by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual Association, and continue in office until their augustors are chosen.

ART. 4. This Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent in matters of internal government, and shall act as advisory counsel, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delgated to it by the churches, or evidently implied by the nature of the compact. It, nevertheless, claims authority over its numbers, the delegates from churches, and in justice and propriety must have power to withdraw from, and disowa, all churches which depart from the aptrit of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice. It should, therefore, regard all churches united under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God, by extending the Kingdom of Grace on earth through the medium of preaching the Gospel, and the means in accordance with the Gospel to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially those united in this constitution.

ART. 5. Newly constituted churches dismissed from other associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union by sending three delegates, their number in fellowship, number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated, restored and deceased since last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which shall be read and minuted.

ART. 6. This Association shall have a fund, to be supplied by voluntary contributions of the churches. All the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committee on Finance to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association, He shall retain and manage the funds agreeably to the order of the Association, and present annually for inspection in the minutes, a clear and succinct statement of all receipts and expenditures.

ART. 7. This Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.

ART. 8. The Association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve the same and have failed; nor of any difficulty between the churches unless they have pursued the direction in the xviii. chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them; then the Association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at its discretion.

ART. 9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of each session of this body, and deliver over the same to his successor in office.

ART. 10. This constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of this Association by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members present, provided such alteration or amendment be approved by the churches composing the Association.
