## PROCEEDINGS.

Luxora, Mississippi Co., Ark., Oct. 10, 1901. FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

House called to order at ten o'clock a. m. After singing "How Firm a Foundation," Eld. W. J. Bearden led in prayer, which was followed by singing "My Faith Looks Up to Thee."

Former Clerk, J. A. Hammond, being absent, B. H. Parrish was elected temporary Clerk. Moderator appointed J. N. Hartley, H. F. Wright and Dr. W H. Borum Committee on Credentials, and F. Bozeman and T. B. Kitchens Reading Clerks. Corresponding letters from the following Churches were presented and read, viz.: Walcott. First Church Jonesboro, Vincent, Mt. Zion, New Hope, Ingram Chapel, Antioch, Cherry Valley, Monette, Paragould, Cottonwood Grove, Brookland, Clear Lake, Big Bay, Bethabara, Nettleton.

Committee on Credentials reported, as follows: We, your Committee on Credentials, find that all members present named in letters read are in good standing and entitled to seats in this body; also, the members of the Executive Board and all ministers present that are in good standing in the Churches of Mt. Zion Association.

On motion, report was adopted, as read. The body then proceeded to effect permanent organization. On motion, the rule of electing by ballot was suspended, and the temporary organization made permanent, with Dr. J. H. Kitchens, Moderator; B. H. Parrish, Clerk; H. F. Wright, Treasurer. Petionary letters were read from the following Churches, viz.: Indian Mound, Claunch, Manila, Lambethville, Frenchman's Bayou and Marion. The Committee on Credentials reported favorably on same, and they were, on motion, re-

At 11 o'clock Eld. W. J. Bearden delivered a strong, practical sermon, selecting as his text, Rev., 1: 12-13. The body then adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock p. m.

and prayer by J. W. Hiett, a petitionary letter was read from Thorn Grove Church, and, upon motion, it was received and its messengers seated. A letter from Shiloh Church, also, was read, and upon recommendation of Committee on Credentials, its messengers were seated.

We, your Committee on Home Missions submit the following as our report:

Home Missions is doing a great work. Its fields of operation are the Southern Cities, the Western States and Cuba; besides it is helping the various Southern States it their Mission work. It is helping our own beloved State \$2,300 annually, \$300 of which is paid to our corresponding secretary's salary. We therefore recommend a hearty co-operation by this Association with the Home Mission Board. We recommend that we take pledges now for Home Missions to be paid during the year.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We hail with joy the increasing measure in which our

Lord's commission is getting hold upon the hearts of Southern Baptists. More and more we are apprehending the truth that the Gospel is to be carried unto the ends of the earth. In proportion as we have recognized this as our Father's will, and have reached forth glad hands ho the work, He has blest us in the work. For two years past, the Foreign Mission Board, by the direction of the Convention, has enlarged its work 25 per cent., and since the last session of the Convention the work has been pushed as vigorously as available men and money will permit. In all cases, the culargement in results has far excelled that of expenditures.

In this great work, the record of this Association is far from satisfactory. Last year only seven Churches reported contributions, amounting to only \$143.25. This year, of the twenty-six Churches which have reported, only five report contributions, totaling \$149.95. Of this, we should be heartly ashamed—so ashamed as to resolve, with steadfast purpose, that we will do better in the future, else, for the sake of consistency, cease to call ourselves

Missionary Baptists.

We earnestly submit the following recommendations:

 More preaching by the pastors of the Association, and more prayer for missions.

2. The abundant and persistent circulation of mis-

sionary tracts and literature.

3. That pledges be now taken for this work during the ensuing year. Respectfully submitted.

## FRIDAY-SECOND DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

Association met pursuant to adjournment. Song.

Led in payer by P. C. Barton. Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved, after some minor correction. Upon motion, the reading of report on Associational Missions, was set for 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The Committee on Ministerial Education submitted its report which was discussed by T. B. Kitchens, W. H. Merideth, H. E. Hogan, W. J. Bearden, P. C. Barton and J. B. Wise. The report read as follows:

## MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

God has given us our mental endowments, as well as every other qualification we possess, and expects faithful use of the same when consecrated to His service.

The great need of the hour is consecration of talent to the service of God. This Association has long since committed itself to the question of educating for the ministry.

In the business world education is considered of first importance to success in any department. Why not be so considered when dealing in spiritual matters? It was commanded of old that study was necessary for the workman that he might show that he be ashamed of his work, that the word might be rightly divided, giving each his portion in due season.

Our Baptist denomination has its institution of learning for higher education of the ministry. We would recommend those of our young men who are preparing for the ministry to take a course preparatory to that work in Ouachita College, and if practicable, to spend a year or two

in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

That we pledge ourselves as an Association to contrib-

ute to both of these institutions.

That Brother J. N. Lawless, who has been assisted financially by this Association for the past three or four years and who will complete his course this year at Ouachita College, we give such help as we can and to that end we recommend our usual pledges.

The letters of this Association show a contribution of \$92.92 to Ministerial Education. This is not as large as it should have been. Brethren, let us not forget or pass

lightly such noble work.

Report on State Missions was submitted by the committee, and after being discussed by P. C. Barton, E. P. Minton, J. N. Hartley, J. N. Markhart and R. G. Medaris, was adopted. The report read as follows:

## STATE MISSIONS.

The work done and being done by the workers of the State Mission Board this year is an occasion of great joy and deep gratitude to God. Never in the history of our denomination in this State has God more signally blessed our State Mission work. But this work has been done under trying circumstances, together with much opposition on the part of some who, it seems to us, should have been spending their time and influence in helping the work. The following brief summary of the work will let our people know something of the present year's work for three

quarters, ending Aug. 1, 1901.

As far as the reports have been received: Sermons preached, 2839; conversions, 931; baptisms, 477; additions to the churches, 983; churches organized 8; Sunday schools organized, 21; number of church houses built or being built about 10; money raised for church buildings and other missionary purposes \$6621.92. Our cause has been established in many places that were destitute of Baptist preaching at the beginning of the year, and churches that have been assisted by the board will not only be self-sustaining, but will be liberal in their contributions to all of our denominational enterprises after this year. When we meet in Convention at Paragould there will be reported more than 1000 conversions, 1000 additions and 600 baptisms, the other parts of the reports will be encouraging. The work this year under the present plan will exceed in

magnitude that done the three years, 1897-98-99, when our plans were different from what they are now. But there is much work yet to be done. Many county seats, and many other important towns in which we have a small, struggling Church, or none at all, and in most of these places there is no Baptist house of worship; then, there are many rural districts crying for help. Surely, our motto should be, "Go Forward!" In view of these things, your committee most heartily recommend that this Association, by adopting this report, endorses this work as earried on this year.

We further recommend that pledges be now taken to be paid before the Convention.

Met at 2:00 p. m. After singing, led in prayer by H. F. Wright. Letters from Clark's Chapel, Hydrick and Luxora were read, and messengers seated. Petitionary letter read from Frenchman's Bayou, and, upon motion, messengers seated. The Moderator gave the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

The Associational Executive Board submitted its report, and, upon motion, it was referred to the Committee on Associational Missions. J. N. Markhart, Treasurer of

Mt. Zion Association, also, read his report, which was, likewise, referred to Committee on Associational Missions. The report on Associational Missions was read by J. N. Robertson, and discussed by J. B. Wise, R. C. Medaris, J. N. Hartley, H. E. Hogan and P. C. Barton. Pledges were recorded, and the report was then adopted.

### ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Associational Missions, beg leave to submit the following report:

- 2. Christ has, first of all, commanded us to be witnesses of Him in Jerusalem. (At home.)
- 3. The destitution is long and wide, and the "Macedonian Cry" is heard in every direction.
  - 4. It remains for us to go up and possess the land.
  - 1. All Baptists should go in prayer and spirit.

2. Go with our money and our presence.

Bro. Wise has done good work at Manila, Evadale, Frenchman's Bayou, Marion, Nettleton, and many other points. He has preached, and God has wonderfully blessed his work, as he will so report, himself. [See report of

Secretary of Board.

Our territory runs from about thirty miles south of Memphis, on the west side of the river, north, to Missouri line, and from Cache River, on the west, to the Mississippi River, on the east—hundreds of square miles where Baptist preaching is not heard. We, therefore, recommend that the same plan of mission work be prosecuted next year as has been this year, with an addition of earnestness and zeal. We further recommend that each Church pledge at least fifty per cent. more this year than last for this great work of Mt Zion Association.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD, OCT. 13, 1900, TO OCT. 11, 1001.

To the Mt. Zion Association, in her Forty-Eighth Session Assembled:

Dear Brethren:—We, your Executive Board, in the beginning of our report, wish to return our thanks unto you for your confidence and esteem, and for the liberal way in which you have stood by our Missionary, and for the noble financial support you have given; and unto our Lord for His blessings upon our work.

On October 14, 1900, your Board held her first meeting at the North Jonesboro Baptist Church, and all of the members were present. It was muanimously agreed to employ a General Missionary for all his time, and to aid such destitute Churches as we could, in securing pastors, by

supplementing their salaries.

At our meeting on October 25, 1900, we unanimously agreed to employ Eld. J. W. Hiett as our Missionary for the year, at a salary of \$600.00 and expenses. Bro. Hiett asked for time to consider the matter, and during the month of November, notified us that he could not accept the work. We then got into correspondence with Eld. J. B. Wise, of Mariana, and invited him to be present at a called meeting to be held at the residence of Dr. J. H. Kitchens. On December 5th, all members of the Board were present at this meeting, except Bro. W. A. Edwards. By motion and second and a unanimous vote, we employed

Eld. J. B. Wise as our General Missionary, at a salary of fifty (\$50) dollars per month and all necessary expenses; and the following is the work done by him, beginning December 12, 1900. [See report on Associational Missions.]

## SECOND DAY-NIGHT SESSION.

At the close of the sermon, the Committee on Orphans' Home submitted its report, which was discussed by R. C. Medaris, P. G. Barton, Dr. J. H. Kitchens, jr., and J. N. Markhart. A cash collection was taken, amounting to \$14.25, after which the report was adopted. Adjourned.

## ORPHAN'S HOME.

Every Baptist in our state should thank God that we have such an institution as the Arkansas Baptist Orphan's Home, located at Monticello. This institution was started in the year 1894, and has grown to be one of the best Orphan's Homes in the South. The large, magnificent build-

ing which has been in course of construction for some time, is nearing completion. The Board of Trustees has paid eash for all work done, and no debt is upon the house; but they need a few more hundred dollars with which to complete this building. There are now about 40 childrenin the Home, and others are seeking admittance. Something like 75 or more children can be accommodated in the buildings when they are completed. The running expenses of the Home are large, and our Churches should be regular contributors to this part of the work; and, that all may have an opportunity to help in this work, your Committee recommend that a collection be taken for this purpose some time during this meeting.

Resolved—That we believe the Trustees of the Orphan's Home should place some of the children, from time to time, in good homes. Therefore, we would suggest this course to our State Convention, soon to assemble in Para-

gould.

### SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The importance of Sunday Schools, and the obligation to maintain them, is no longer questioned by an intelligent public. The indifference to the work is widespread and appalling. It becomes necessary, therefore, to give line upon line, and precept upon precept, so that we may arouse the sleeping energies and awake to action the dormant hosts of our Zion in teaching our children the word of our God.

There are only eleven schools reported to this Association, with an enrollment of 542 pupils—with more than half of these in two schools. This is, indeed, an indifferent showing for the Churches of our great Association. Brethren, let our efforts and motto be, a live Sunday School in every Church within-our territory

We recommend to the State Convention the discontinuance of the present plan of the Sunday School and Colportage work, and the management and support of the work by our Convention.

The Foreign Mission Journal, published at Ricmond, Va., by Foreign Mission Board, should be in every home; also, the Home Field, published by the Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

We recommend, that we co-operate with the Anti-Sa-

toon League of Arkansas in its efforts to rid our fair land

of the blight and curse of the giant intemperance.

We would further recommend that our Churches be affectionately urged—firmly, but lovingly—to discipline any and all members who may be connected with, or, in any way, responsible for the liquor traffic; whether it be to drink, to vote for it, or to rent property for its sale.

And, as we believe that our Lord would have us temperate in all things, and as the use of tobacco and other narcotics is now a greater curse than the liquor traffic was fifty years ago, we urge our people to abstain from the use of tobacco, and that our preachers, especially, are admonshed to abstain from the use of tobacco, as example is the strongest preaching they can do.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the Word of God, and the ply rule of faith and practice.

3 We believe that, by one man, sin entered into the world, and death by sin, and so death passed upon all men, for that all

have sinned.

4 We believe that Josus Christ, by the Grace of God, tasted death for every man; through His meritorious death the way of Salvation is made possible for God to have morey on all that come anto Him upon Gospel terms.

5. We believe that, being justified by faith, we have peace

with God, through our Lord, Jesus Christ.

6. T at such only are true believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from supreficial professors; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and they are kept by the power of God, through faith, unto salvation.

7. We believe there will be a resurrection of the dead and a general and universal judgment, and that the happiness of the

righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

8. We believe that the visible Church of Carist is a congregation of faithful men and women who have obtained with each other and given themselves to the Lord, and each other, having agreed to keep up the Godly discipline, according to the rules of the Gospel.

9. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great heat of the

Church, and the government thereof is with the body.

10. W believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Ordinances of the Gospel, and to be continued until His second coming.

11. We believe that true believers are the only fit subjects of

baptism, and that immersion is the only mode.

12. We believe that none but regular baptized members have

a right to commune at the Lord's table.

13. We believe that the Lord's day ought to be observed and set apart for the worship of God, and that no work or worldly business ought to b; transacted thereon, works of piety, mercy and necessity excepted.

14. We do not design to impose these Articles of Faith on any Church, as a rule, but have given them as our views of our Scrip-

ture doctrine.
