PROCEEDINGS.

HILLSBORO, ARK., September 11, 1896.

The Fifty-first Annual Session of the Liberty Baptist Association convened with Hillsboro Baptist Church, Hillsboro, Ark., beginning on Friday before the second Sunday in September, 1896.

At 11 a. m., after the singing of that grand old bymn, "Blessed be the Tie that Binds," and prayer by Elder W. F. Dorris, devotional exercises were conducted by Elder J. M. Hart, his text being I. Timothy i. 12: "And I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry," his theme being Christian Ministry. The subject was handled with a masterly hand. Practical truths were presented with a power and pathos as only our venerable and beloved brother can present them He emphasized the necessity of education and of willingness to work with patience in the master's cause.

It was announced by the pastor, Elder J. N. Hartley, that dinner for all would be served at the Church, and that the Association would convent at 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2 o'clock the Association was called to order by the Moderator, H. G. F. Williams, who read the fifth chapter of I. John, and after prayer by Elder W. B. Peeples, of Conway, Ark., the Association was declared ready to proceed with the transaction of business.

The Association assembled at 9 o'clock as per adjournment, Modorator H. G. P. Williams presiding. After scripture reading by the Moderator and prayer by Elder J. V. B. Waldrop the Association was declared ready for business.

Visiting brethren invited to seats and to participate in the deliberations of the Association. Prof. J. W. Conger, of the Ouachita College, responded, and was by the Moderator welcomed.

TEMPERANCE.

We come before this Association much encouraged, and feel that God is blessing the labors of His people; and we pray you to continue this grand work. We pray that every Christian will be so enthused with the cause of temperance that drunkenness and the wickedness that follows will be things of the past. We believe it to be the duty of Christians to use their influence in getting Christian men to fill the various offices and places of trust in our State. We believe by so doing you will advance the cause of Christ. We believe it to be the duty of parents to discourage the use of tobacco in any form to their children. We believe that coffee is an unnecessary stimulant to children, and should be discouraged.

EDUCATION.

We realize the impossibility of doing justice to this subject in the brief paragraph usually allowed for reports in the minutes. We therefore desire only to reaffirm and emphasize all former declarations of this Association in favor of an educated ministry. And by this we do not mean that every preacher is required to be a graduate of some college, but that the man who assumes the solemn responsibility of a minister of the gospel should use all possible means and facilities within his reach to prepare and qualify himself for this most sacred office. And to this end we call attention to the special facilities for young ministers furnished by our great institution at Arkadelphia, under the able and effcient management of President J. W. Conger. The Ouachita Baptist College stands to the Baptist denomination of this State like the great statue of Liberty in New York harbor, holding aloft the torch to light up the student's pathway to knowledge and truth. We also take occasion to recommend to the fostering care and patronage of our brethren the noble institution for the education of females, called Central College, located at Conway, Ark., and under the able and efficient management of Professor J. G. Lile.

Christian education is that education which has for its basal principal the great truth, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." Realizing that all true education must be, aside from giving acuteness of intellect, such as teaches a reverence for God; and feeling that Christian education is the surest medium through which to obtain this much coveted result, the Baptists of Arkansas have established colleges which are unsurpassed in our Southland for intellectual culture, and are without a parallel in the great work of leading souls to Christ. Ouachita, the oldest of these colleges, and established for the education of both boys and girls, has flourished for ten years under the same management and has brighter prospects for a largeattendance for the coming year, notwithstanding the stringent times, than it has had for several years. Almost a hundred graduates have gone out from this college and are filling positions of importance in nearly every vocation. At Ouachita more than twenty young ministers annually receive free tunion as a help to them in better preparing to search out the deep things of God's word, and to proclaim them in simplicity to the people. Central College, at Conway, for young ladies, has closed a very prosperous year, and has bright prospects for the future. Mountain Home College, at Mountain Home, is coeducational, and is doing a good work in North Arkansas. schools, With the advantages afforded by these there is no reason why any ambitious and aspiring young gentlelady should enter successfully man or voung not the brightest chambers of knowledge, nor is there a well-founded excuse for any one to go beyond the confines of our state to get the very best collegiate education. In conclusion, your committee would urge upon all the duty of assisting young ministers in their undertakings to honor God by getting the best possible education. Also let us encourage boys and girls to attend these schools, and make prominent the

thought, "The Baptist schools of Arkansas are the best for the Baptist boys and girls of Arkansas."

By motion discussions on all subjects are limited to five minutes.

The Committee on Nominations by their chairman, W. F. Miears, report that they are unable to agree as to locating the place of the next meeting of this Association, and refer same to the consideration of this body.

Whereupon J. D. Crawford moves that Shiloh be selected as the next place of meeting. Said motion is amended by E. J. A. McKinney by inserting Junction instead of Shiloh. A vote being taken results in the selection of Junction as the next place of meeting of this body.

NOMINATIONS.

We, your Committee on Nominations, beg leave to report as follows: We recommend that the next session of this Association be held with the Baptist Church at Junction, commencing on Friday before the second Sunday in September, 1897, at 11 a. m. We further recommend that Elder W. F. Dorris preach the introductory sermon with Elder J. N. Hartley as alternate. We would also recommend Elder J. M. Hart as Delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention with Elder E. J. A. McKinney as alternate. We would recommend as Delegates to the Baptist State Convention from this Association Elders J. M. Hart, J. N. Hartley, E. J. A. McKinney, W. F. Dorris and Brother W. C. McCain. We would further recommend Elder J. M. Hart as the member from this Association of the State Executive Board.

STATE AND ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Our Lord said before ascending to the Father, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea and in Samaria and into the uttermost part of the earth." This language applies to us as forcibly as it did to his first disciples. Liberty association is our Jerusalem, Arkansas is our Judea, Cuba, the negroes of the South and the Indians, our Samaria, and Africa, China, Italy, Japan, Mexico and the Isles of the Sea our uttermost part of the earth.

OUR ASSOCIATIONAL WORK.

Our Association has more churches and pastors than ever before in its history since its division, yet there is much destitution among us. New fields are being opened up by the milling enterprises constantly springing up. These people need the gospel. Their needs call to us for help. We would recommend that a missionary be put in the field at once, and that every Church and every member of every Church of this Association contribute to his support.

OUR STATE WORK.

What is true of us as an Association is very largely true of our whole state. There is much destitution over the whole state which cries to us for help. Our State Board has a number of missionaries who are trying to plant the banner of the cross amid trying afflictions. The Board cannot pay unless we help. Let us not relinquish our efforts in this line because of our efforts in Associational work. Our contributions have fallen far short of what we ought to make for missions to the various Boards. We have contributed for Associational Missions \$83.53; State, \$15.91; Home, \$44.15, and Foreign, \$74.75. This represents the amounts as reported in the letters to the Association. We would urge increased contributions to our state work.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Our Sunday school work is not in a flourishing condition. Twenty-two churches report no Sunday School. There seems to be but little enthusiasm among our churches along the line of Sunday school work. This is a deplorable condition. Your committee recognizes the fact that the success of our denomination and maintenance of sound doctrine depends largely upon the religious training of our young people. We would, therefore, earnestly urge each church to organize and support a Sunday school. This may seem impracticable to some, but we believe it is necessary, and nothing is impracticable that is neces-

sary. The Lord Jesus commands us to teach—teach the young as well as the old. How are we to obey this command? Can we not best do it through the Sunday school? Your committee believes that the Baptist denomination holds and teaches the pure gospel of the Son of God, and we would, therefore, recommend that all of our Sunday schools use only Baptist literature. We would further recommend that our Sunday schools patronize and support our own convention series.

While we believe that the press has proven a great factor in doing good, yet we believe it is doing much evil. There is a vast amount of erroneous and poisonous literature strewn promiscuously over our land and country which has a tendency to lead the young and rising generation from the truth. Yet we have much good sound literature that will tend to lead them to something better and more noble, leading them step by step until they reach the higher planes of Christianity and civilization. Then we would urge that we, as Baptists, place within reach and in the hands of the rising generation the very best literature. By so doing we will lead many to the pure river of life. Much has been done by our denomination to give all men and women the Bible, yet we have not done enough. Let us then put forth every effort and use all honorable means to do more on this line. We have many good denominational papers within our reach, though we recommend our state paper, the Baptist, to our brotherhood. Take it, read it, and keep posted along the line of Baptist work. We also recommend that our churches use Southern Baptist literature in their Sunday schools. We also recommend the Home Mission Journal and the Foreign Mission Journal to their patronage.

Our Orphans' Home is located at Monticello, and has been received by the Baptist State Convention. It is truly a Baptist's orphan home. Sister Hannah Hyatt, of Monticello, Ark., donated 160 acres of land to the institution, and our denomination has built a house. The Home is now open and has already received two homeless children. Our Home is in need of funds to furnish house and farm, and it is wholly dependent upon the denomination for support. We would recommend all of our churches and Sunday schools to take at least one collection for the support of this Home during the next associational year. We would further recommend that a collection be taken for this work Sunday at 11 o'clock service.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

It can no longer be said that the doors of the nations are closed against the Gospel. God in His providence has opened one after another, until now all nations are occupiable to the labors of the missionary. The responsibility rests heavily upon us to enter the fields that are now white to the harvest. Our people have great reason to be encouraged because of the successes that have attended our efforts during the past year. Many precious souls have been brought to Christ, while many thousands are listening attentively to the voice of God calling them to salvation through the efforts of our brethren. The Baptists of the South now have missionaries in China, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Mexico and Japan. The number of workers now in the different fields are very few compared with the many thousands of souls who are perishing for the want of the Word of Life. Our board, who are in charge of our foreign mission work are managing economically and yet during the past year the receipts have not been sufficient to meet the expenses of the consecrated ones who are now upon the field. We urge an increase of contributions to our foreign work. We also recommend that the Foreign Mission Journal be taken by our people. It is the official organ of our board, and through its columns we may learn of the success of our missionaries. We further recommend that the pastors keep the work before the churches and take regular collections for the work.

We cannot refrain from expressing our regrets that he could not see his way clear to continue in the work that he had so successfully been prosecuting during the first year. From his report we glean the following summary of work for the one month of this associational year:

Miles traveled, one month, 232; sermions preached, one month, 17; other services attended, one month, 8; baptized, 1.

From funds received we fully settled with Brother McKinney for his services last year and also for the month of this year. There are some pledges that were made a year ago that have not been paid. We recieved from the Ladies' Aid Society of Salem Church, for State Missions, the sum of \$3, which was forwarded to State Board. Many amounts have been reported to us by Churches which were forwarded to other boards, but as these amounts have been elsewhere reported we do not give an itemized statement of them in this report.
