AUGUSTA, ARK., OCT. 6, 1911.

The fifty-sixth session of Caroline Baptist Associatlon met with the Augusta Baptist Church at 3 p. m., Friday, October 6, and was called to order by Moderator W. P. Fletcher.

"Come Thou Fount," was sung, and Eld. J. B. Mourcy led in prayer. "Pass Me Not" was then sung. Prayer by Eld. S. H. Campbell.

FRIDAY, 7:30 P. M.

The Association reassembled at 7:30 p.m. Devotional exercises were led by Eld Ben Cox.

Announcements were made by Pastor J. T. Fowlkes. Addresses of welcome were delivered by Pastor J. T. Fowlkes on behalf of the Baptists of Augusta; by Rev. A. T. Galloway, pastor of the Methodist Church, South, on behalf of the Methodists; by Rev. M. D. Williams, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, on behalf of the Presbyterians, and by Hon Ed Roddy on behalf of the citizens.

Eld. S. H. Campbell responded to these addresses on behalf of the Association, by request of the Moderator. The report of the Associational Mission Board was read by Chairman G. L. Boles, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CAROLINE ASSOCIATION.

We come again, by the grace of God, to report to you the things that we, as your servants, have done and have attempted to do in the past year, and also to recommend some things that our experience in the work has taught us it would be well to do. The Board has felt the great responsibility that has rested on us as the representatives of the largest Association in the State, and have sought the best that we could to discharge our duty, and we can say that, while everything has not turned out as well as we could have wished, yet we feel that we have had the approval of the Lord and that, on the whole, we have made progress.

The main work of the Board is co-operation with the Missionary, and we have tried to carefully look after that work. He has been in the field all of the time except during the month's vacation that you granted him. He has been regularly at work sowing the gospel seed and looking after the other work of his office. We can without hesitation say that he has been very dilligent, going over as much of our large territory as it was possible for him to cover and reaching as many people as he could. The Board has kept in close touch with his work, and we consider this a reasonably good year's work. For fuller information on this subject we refer you to the report of Brother Bain, which will be read in your hearing.

Throughout the year the Board has earnestly sought to awaken the churches to the necessity of giving regularly to the support of the Missionary. His necessities require that his salary be paid, in a measure at least, as it comes due. The Board has felt the weight of this obligation and has sought to discharge We have several times, written to the churches, hoping by such reminders to induce them to come to our help. We must report that we have had very little response from them. we asked our Missionary to make a special point of laying this matter on the churches as he went among them in his work. It seems from his report that his efforts have met with more success, though not as much as we expected. So it will be seen that we have been earnestly trying to do this part of your work. But, notwithstanding these efforts, we have been compelled to borrow six hundred dollars to pay current expenses. This, besides the one hundred dollars carried over from last year, making a total indebtedness of seven hundred dollars. We felt that this was not the best policy to pursue, as there is a distinct loss of money in the interest we have to pay, but there was no other course open to us. We feel that we should lay this matter before you, so that you may know exactly what we have done.

We feel sure that the churches will meet these obligations at this session. Caroline Association sees the necessity for this great work and has always fulfilled her obligations. This is too great a work and is too far-reaching in its consequences to be carelessly neglected. We are, in the bounds of the Association, obeying the commission, and our souls ought to thrill within us

having a part in such a great work. The fact that we have the promise of the co-operation of the Lord ought to inspire us attempt greater things. But we must ever bear in mind that is a work in which all of us are alike interested, and neither loard nor the Missionary can accomplish anything without your help. In fact, it is your work, and the Board and the still on ary are, under God, your servants, chosen by you to do not be work.

We repeat the recommendation made in the report of the Hoard last year that all churches adopt some plan that seemeth mood to them whereby they can make contributions to the work all along through the year. Let us give our Missionary our hearty support and our prayers. Above all things, let us plan for greater things than we have ever done. What we have done in the past is but an earnest of what we may accomplish when we not ourselves resolutely to the task.

We submit herewith our financial statement.

Missionary R. P. Bain read his report, as follows:

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY FOR THE YEAR ENDING-OCTOBER 8, 1911.

To the Caroline Baptist Association, when Convened with the Augusta Baptist Church in Her Fifty-Sixth Annual Session, October 6, 1911.

Dear Brethren—I trust it is with due appreciation and suitable thankfulness toward God that we are permitted to share the amazing wonders of His grace, that has blessed us with the happy coming together in this fifty-sixth annual meeting.

To begin the report of my sixth year, permit me to say that I have preached the gospel in all sincerity and good conscience, filling the days as they have come and gone with vigilance and using my best judgment for the promotion of our Lord's cause, so much loved by us all.

Bayou Meto.

This church was brought to your attention in my last report (page 9 of the Minutes). Their need, as you will see by reference to my last report, was a house of worship. It is with pleasure that I announce to you that they have a beautiful little house, equal to their needs. It is not finished, but in such condition that they can use it. May the good Lord continue to bless them.

Cotton Plant.

I have followed the instructions of the Association at the last meeting in the work at this place, giving them a regular

monthly appointment. I was compelled to miss two or three anminiments for the reason that I was engaged in meetings elsewhere that forbade my going to them, but they have kept faith with their promise, paying their full pledge of \$50.00, and with the same relation between them and the Association, they will pay \$100.00 for the ensuing year. We had Brother L. Tomme with us in a meeting there, beginning on the second Sunday in limitember. They have had a small ingathering of the helpful and there is about \$350.00 in money ready to go to work with on a building, and possibly as much more in prospect. will take not less than \$1,000.00 to build a house that will meet their needs. We really ought to have a house worth \$2,500,00 to put us in the right relation to the town and community. can build a house at Cotton Plant by just going there and camping with them until it is done, and to my mind that is the only way it can be done. I believe it would pay, if needs be, to exnend all of our energies for a whole year to put this place on a aubstantial, self-sustaining basis. Brother Tomme can tell you something of this field and its promise.

Kensett.

This is a flourishing little town on the Iron Mountain Railroad at the crossing of the Missouri and North Arkansas Railroad, four miles from Searcy. We have a struggling little band of faithful ones there, who for some years have been grappling with the proposition of a new church building, for their old one had served as long as they could use it, and Brother C. C. Pearnon, their faithful pastor, told me that he was compelled to have some help if he ever succeeded, so I went to him and we undertook the work, and as a result they have one of the tastiest little church houses on the Iron Mountain Railroad between Newport and Little Rock. It didn't cost as much, to be sure, but it in every way a modern beauty. Brother Pearson will speak of it.

Some of Our Burning Needs.

Brethren, if only we could be brought to realize our duty and could be aroused to our possibility, we would turn our eyes, our hearts and our hands to Jacksonville, Austin Station and probably Old Austin, Ward, Garner, Higginson and probably Mc-Almont. All of these places are on the Iron Mountain Railroad. north from Little Rock, and all of them have church organizations except Ward and Jacksonville, and all of them have church houses except Ward and Jacksonville, but they are all of them pastorless for a good part of the time and some of them all of the time. Besides, they are surrounded by every is not true. Bort of doctine that With the co-operation of these churches we ought to conservative but fearless preacher, qualified to defend the truth and an organizer and leader of forces, to give his entire time to this territory. These churches are not able to employ men of the ability they need to meet the situation that surrounds them.

Brethren, if it was my last admonition, allow me to beseech you in Christ's name to take the work of blessed old Caroline Association more seriously on your hearts and give her a place in your bosoms and your pockets before the last two weeks of the closing year. It is bad business policy to borrow money and pay interest through all the year. Besides, it keeps your Board under a burden of debt and anxiety through the whole year, and once in a great while the Missionary wonders, in spite of his confidence and better judgment, if the plan is to starve him out and by as much hinder him in doing his best for want of apparent appreciation. No, brethern, you intend to pay the last farthing, but if you will keep it up through the year you will be a great blessing to the work.

May the God of peace himself give you peace always, by all means. Amen.

The progressiveness of the age in which we live calls anew for the emphasis that Baptists have always placed upon education. We point with pride to the past and rejoice greatly in the undisputed fact that we as a people, through all our eventful and stirring history, have ever marched in the vanguard of those

who were seeking to broaden the intellectual horizon of the human race and to enlist the sympathies, enlighten the minds and enlarge the conceptions of every rising generation, that they might work out for themselves and for all mankind a more glorious destiny. We have laid great stress upon soul liberty, that largest inheritance that God has bequeathed to a redeemed humanity, but at the same time we have not neglected to point out that he who is enslaved by the shackles of a dwarfed and of roumscribed intellectual horizon has purchased unto himself the most galling bondage to which man has ever been subjected. And we are here today to appeal to the Baptist brotherhood of this Association and State that we disgrace not the name we bear and stain not the past, made glorious through the achievements of our forefathers, by taking a backward step along educational lines, but that we add luster to the past by the part we shall play in broadening the educational idea and supporting the educational institutions of this, our day.

All over our State and nation there are public schools and colleges, manned by trained and competent teachers, and it is a sin against humanity and against one's own offspring not to place every child of school age in these schools, where they can receive the training of mind that will prepare them to fill to better advantage their respective places in the social, commercial, professional, political and religious world.

But this Association has to do with education in a higher monse—higher because it means the cultivation of the spiritual as well as the intellectual man. Education can never be what we, as Baptists, desire to make it until there is implanted within the human breast that thirst of heart which calls for the quickening and cultivation of all our faculties under the divine call of service, the enlargement of our intellectual horizon under the illumination of a noble purpose and the glad leaping of the heart under the call of God to the service of Christ. The safety, permanency and power of our denomination depends upon what we do for Christian education, and that Christian education which is disfinctively Baptist. Out from our Baptist schools, such as Ouach-Ita College at Arkadelphia and Central College at Conway are to come the God-fearing men and women who are to stand at the front and fight to the death for the principles for which we stand as Baptists, and which God has made it obligatory upon us to give to the world. Where are we to get a trained ministry if we allow Ouachita College to be crippled through lack of sup-Can we expect Baptist preachers to come from State institutions or from institutions owned and run in the interests of those who have departed from the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints? Or shall we be so penurious in spirit that we will want other States to educate the men who are to preach the gospel in its purity to the 110,000 Baptists and the many hundreds of thousands of lost souls in this great State? drop of Baptist blood which goes to make up this Association answers all these questions with an emphatic No. And by the answer you mean that you are ready to stand by Quachita and Central Colleges with your prayers, patronage and financial support until no colleges in the land will surpass them in equipment and efficiency.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We would call the attention of the people to the fact that the commission of our Lord comes to all his followers, that, while each one may not be called upon to go in person to the foreign field, yet he may go by his means; that, while the work at home may appeal to us more strongly because, as it is nearer to us, we know more about it, yet while discharging our duties in these other fields of work we must not forget our duty abroad. Baptists are people who accept and strive to keep all the commands of God, and as true Baptists we dare not neglect the call to all the nations.

The statistics of the Foreign Board of the Southern Baptist. Convention are as follows: We are unable to get the statistics from the other agencies, and would be glad to give these other figures if we had them. Thirty new missionaries were sent out during the year. There are now 273 missionaries, 531 native helpers, 804 in all. Among these are fifteen medical missionaries and five trained nurses. We have seven hospitals, twelve dispensaries and last year 40,716 patients. We have 297 churches and 605 out stations, with 21,373 members. We have 233 houses. of worship, 372 Sunday Schools, 13,226 scholars. There are 175 day schools, with 4.068 pupils, eleven boys' boarding schools. with 634 students; eighteen girls' schools, with 958 students, and two colleges, with 118 students. There are also seven women's training schools, with 140 students, and nine theo-logical training schools, with 212 students. We have four mission printing presses, sending out Bibles and millions of pages of religious literature. Our missions are in China, Japan, Mexico, Italy, Brazil and Argentina. The reports from these fields are encouraging. The gifts to the Foreign Board last year amounted to \$510,008.97. A debt of \$89,600 rests now on the work. To lift this debt, and maintain the work will require this year \$600,000.

We recommend that all the people get literature from the Board, such as the Foreign Mission Journal, and leaflets, and keep posted on the progress of this work; that our people and churches seek more fully this year to discharge their responsibility in sending the gospel to the heathen; that where practicable the churches organize mission study classes and go more fully into the study of missions; and that we adopt a systematic plan in making our contributions to the Foreign Board, giving throughout the year, so that we will avoid the final confusion that comes to the Board by all the churches giving their gifts just before the convention, and thus enabling the Board to systematize its work and avoid the payment of interest on borrowed money to carry on the work while waiting for the contributions of the churches.

There are fifty or more ministerial students there this year, strenuously struggling to get an education, that they may preach the unsearchable riches of Jesus Christ. These ministerial students pay no tuition, and hence the need for increased contributions to ministerial education and for an endowment fund to support the Bible chair in Ouachita College.

Our schools for many years have been burdened with debt and they are still groaning under the burden. The Baptists of this State ought to lift this burden at once by paying off the indebtedness and raising a large endowment for Ouachita College.

The future is bright with promise for our schools, and with such men as Bowers and Conger to man them and to shape their destiny we feel sure that greater emphasis is going to be placed upon the lordship of Jesus, the study of the Bible and the beauty and worth of Christian character. There is already some talk about requiring several hours' Bible study each week from those who graduate from Ouachita, and we hope the day will soon dawn when this requirement will be made.

Let our slogan be "Love, Loyalty and Labor" for our great colleges until every vestige of debt is removed and sufficient endowment raised to keep them at the highest point of efficiency.

We, your committee, report as follows:

We notice with great satisfaction the splendid schools some of our churches report. At the same time it is with deep regret that we find in some cases the school attendance is as low as 33 1-3 per cent of the church membership, but with deeper regret do we find six churches of this Association without a school. This should not be the case, and to this end we recommend that this Association do now take steps to organize a county Sunday School Convention in each county represented in Caroline Association. We also recommend that the teachers of our Sunday Schools better prepare themselves for their work by

taking our teachers' training course, which includes the school from organization to recitation.

We recommend the more extensive use of Bibles, which is may everyone bring his Bible. We therefore offer the following as a motto: "Every scholar present every Sunday, on time, with librar in hand and a studied lesson, a liberal offering and a mind loarn." We further recommend the organization of more adult librar librar sand see that there is a live teacher for same. In the connection we want to say we very deeply regret the fact wo lose many of our boys and girls about the ages of 15 mars to 18 years. We believe this can be largely avoided by our members preparing for their work and specializing on study at particular age. We further recommend, where possible, to make your schools. By so doing we believe more effective work may be done. We further recommend that we have a school in very rural school district, where possible, and that our Misdonnies give special attention to the Sunday School work.

The report on Woman's Work was read by Miss Sadie Espy, as follows:

We, your Committee on Woman's Work, beg leave to submit the following report:

The Lord has graciously granted to woman a large place in the redemption of the human race. The first message of the resdown the ages His clarion call to woman has been sounding, and in some measure she has been responding; she who was largely instrumental in bringing sin into the world has gone with the "glad tidings" of a crucified and risen Savior to many a singured soul, and not only in our own land, but in the "regions becond," has she carried the news of salvation, bringing liberty to those bound by Satan's fetters—to those who "sit in the land of darkness and the shadow of death."

We are glad to know that at home in the missionary aid society work of the churches the Lord is leading out along definite lines of service, and we realize that this is necessary to her well-rounded spiritual development.

One of the most important of these is Bible study. Many societies have adopted text books recommended by the State Contral Committee and are really studying the Word of Life. Nothing is more calculated to give spiritual life and develop Christian character, and to the societies in Caroline Association who are not doing so we heartily recommend this line of work.

Women are also training the children in Bible study, largely by use of the sword drill, which has proven an excellent way of giving them skill in finding references and stories in their minds and hearts "the inexhaustible riches of God's treasure house." David said, "Thy Word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against Thee." How important, then, that the young be fortified in this manner against the encroachments of the enemy. Jesus met every temptation of the evil one with a stroke from the "sword of the spirit," and we often fail in hours of desperate need because we are so grossly ignorant of God's precious Word.

Another feature of a well-organized society is the observing of a missionary program once a month, with the use of all the available help. This brings the members in close touch with the missionaries and their fields and enables them to pray more intelligently for the crying needs in the fields.

Some of the societies are taking up definite mission study, using text books prescribed by Dr. T. B. Ray, our Southern educational secretary. These books are fascinating studies of the fields, and who knows what will be the result of this concerted movement on the part of our women and young people? It will surely mean in the future more volunteers for the whitened harvest fields, where the laborers are so pitiably few.

That women are doing much practical work need scarcely be mentioned, for we feel sure the pastors of this Association appreciate their labors along these lines. It is to them that the orphans at Monticello are looking for clothing and other help, and our sisters are reaching out in their own communities and obeying the scriptural command, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." Pastors, there are women in this Association who are longing for your encouragement and co-operation in their work, and we trust that you will no longer withhold them.

There is one line of service upon which women are becoming awakened, and that is the need of the colored women in our midst—the Africa at our door. The lending of a helping hand to these benighted sisters is, we believe, pleasing to Him who is no respecter of persons. May rapid progress be made in this direction, for nowhere is the need greater.

The Young Woman's Auxiliary, under the auspices of the W. M. U., is another important feature of our work. It is from the ranks of the young women that our future workers will be drawn, and their efficiency, then, will be in proportion to their present training.

We regret that the fifth Sunday meetings were not observed during the past year, for we feel that they were especially beneficial to the work of the women and children as well as along general lines.

We have twenty-two organized societies in our Association, but only about fourteen of them reported. These reports show a total of \$6.880.53 raised for all purposes during the year. Two Sunbeam Bands reported, and one Y. W. A.

We, your committee, submit the following:

It is with genuine pride that we look on the orphanage work of Arkansas and note the increased interest manifested among our churches.

We have two orphan homes in Arkansas, Monticello home, consisting of a beautiful farm, home buildings and others. We have in this home 130 children, and among them they are cultivating this farm, which is bringing splendid results.

The boys the past year raised about 1,000 bushels of corn, besides other things raised on the farm in proportion.

About \$2,500 of improvements have already been made, but more is yet needed.

Since our last convention we have had thirty-three conversions, and these have joined the church and been buried with Christ in baptism. In fact, every child who has reached the age of accountability is a member of the Baptist Church. A good mission point is this.

We need funds to carry on this good work.

The Texarkana home is located in Texarkana, Ark., where we have a nice home and grounds, with about twenty-five children. They also are needing funds to carry on this work.

We very earnestly request and recommend that our pastors see to it that they give this work a prominent place on their calendar and that they contribute liberally to this work.

All money intended for the Monticello Home should be sent to J. N. Williams, Monticello, Ark., and that intended for the Texarkana Home should be sent to J. W. Sims, Marvell, Ark.

CONSTITUTION

- Article 1. This Association shall be called the "Caroline input Association," and shall be composed of Baptist churches the input themselves by accredited Messengers. Its objects in the provide missions, education and Sunday Schools.
- Art. 2. Every church belonging to the Association shall be untitled to three Messengers, and every church having over one undred members shall be entitled to an additional Messenger for and additional fifty members over one hundred.
- Art. 8. The session of this Association shall be annual, at such time and place as shall be appointed by the body.
- Art. 4. Any Baptist church of the same faith and practice may be admitted as a member of this Association upon expressing admire, through Messengers and letters, to work in fellowship with us.
- Art. 5. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, thank and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot at each annual moniton, and continue in office until their successors are elected. A majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to elect.
- Art. 6. The Association has no power to control or to in any way interfere with the independence or rights of the churches, but may advise, when asked by a church through its letter to the Association, and it may withdraw its fellowship from any church known to walk disorderly.
- Art. 7. This Association may correspond by letter and Mesunger with other representative bodies of our denomination.
- Art. 8. In the absence of any officer of this Association his place shall be filled pro tempore, by viva voce election.
- Art. 9. The Association may from time to time adopt such rules and by-laws for its government as may be expedient, not innonsistent with this Constitution.
- Art. 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular session by the vote of two-thirds of the Messengers present in favor of the proposed amendment.

Amendment No. 1. This Association may provide means to ald in the support of their aged, infirm, needy and superannuated ministers who have devoted their lives to the ministry and have been engaged in their last ministerial work for at least one year within the bounds of the Association. The Association may appoint a board and adopt such by-laws and regulations as will be necessary for carrying out the provisions of this Amendment.

BY-LAWS

For the Direction of the Board on Aid to Superannuated Ministers.

Section 1. The Association shall appoint a board on Aid to Superannuated Ministers, consisting of three members, which board shall be located in or near the same locality. Said board shall hold office from the time of appointment until the annual session of the Association. Shall a vacancy occur on said board the majority may select a member of any Missionary Baptist Church, a member of this Association in good standing to fill such vacancy. The board shall organize once a year by electing a president, secretary and treasurer. Said board shall provide such stationery as will be necessary for their use as a board and any other necessary expenses that may be incurred in carrying on the work intrusted to them, and shall be paid out of the funds in their hands, and, shall be required to make a report to the Association each year of all moneys received and disbursed.

Sec. 2. The board provided for in Section 1 of these By-Laws may raise means through the churches of this Association, or raise contributions from other sources and in such manner as They may purchase lands, make improvements direction of this Association. The title to such lands shall be made to the Moderator and his successors in office.

- The Association shall, at its annual meeting, decide whall be placed upon the list of superannuated ministers and what amount of aid shall be furnished by the board, and will whether or not such beneficiary can labor in the ministry, and if no, to what extent. Provided, that if some ministers, within bounds of Caroline Association, may, from continued sickness the mount of the community in which he may at that medice, the board may render such aid to such ministers as direumstances may require or their ability will admit of the community in their aid to such ministers and report the action to Association at its next session.
- Mee. 4. The board provided for in Section 1 of these Byman shall, in all cases where it is possible work in harmony with Mission Board of this Association in supplying and giving work much infirm or superannuated ministers as they find such minman are capable of performing. And in no case will this board in permitted to make pledges beyond their financial ability as such man, nor shall they involve the Association in debt.
- Sec. 5. The Board of Ministerial Education shall aid such ministers as are adopted by the Association for education to the extent of the funds in their hands. Loans may be made to ministers and their individual notes taken to the president of the liourd of Education and his successors in office, with interest at 6 per cent from due until paid. The board shall not loan more than sufficient funds to meet the actual needs of such beneficiaries, and not more than will be necessary for five months at any one time. They shall divide the funds in their hands in equal proportions as the demands of the beneficiaries may require. And the board shall provide such stationery and printed matter as will be required to earry out the requirements of the Association.

- 13. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water, by a properly qualified administrator, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Matt. 28:18; Mark 16.16; Rom. 6:3-4.
- 14. We believe that only such as have been properly baptized and received into the fellowship of a regularly organized Baptist church should partake of the Lord's Supper. Matt. 26:26-27; 1 Cor. 11:20-23.
- 15. We believe that the Lord's Day or Christian Sabbath should be devoutly observed and sacredly devoted to religious services. Mark 16:9; Acts 20:7; 1 Cor. 16:1-2; Heb. 10:25.
- 16. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, and that the governors of states and nation should be obeyed when the laws they seek to enforce do not conflict with the Gospel.
- 17. We believe in the future resurrection of the dead. Dan. 12:12; Thes. 4:16.
- 18. We believe in the final judgment, and that in that day the righteous and the wicked will be separated forever. Acts 17:31; Matt. 25:32-33.
- 19. We believe that the righteous will be happy forever in heaven and the wicked miserable forever in hell. Matt. 25:34-46.

CHURCH COVENANT.

Thanking God for the light we have received, and for the station of Jesus which we now enjoy, and hoping that God, for the state make, has pardoned our sins, and having been baptized on profession of our faith in Jesus Christ into the name of the state, Son and Holy Ghost, we do this day, before God and the state, Son and with deep joy and great solemnity, enter into this coverage with one another, as one body in Christ.

We therefore covenant and agree that, by the aid of the Holy will we will walk together in love and Christian fellowship.

Promise to labor for the advancement and final triumph of the ministry to sustain her worship by attending the house of God and appropriate the ministry; to guard her ordinances, enforce her disappling and defend her doctrine.

We also pledge ourselves to walk circumspectly in the world; to be honest, just and faithful in our business relations, and as that may give us help, we promise to live righteous and holy lives.

We further promise to watch over each other in brotherly love; to visit the sick; to pray for each other in the world; to sid the poor and needy, and to perform such other kind offices as may be well pleasing in the sight of God.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1 The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.
- 2. All exceptions to the decision of the Moderator shall be by appeal to the body, whose decision, as expressed by a majority of the vote, viva voce given, shall be final.
- 8. In case of a tie vote the Moderator shall give the casting vote, and shall not be allowed to vote in any other case.
- 4. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speaking as other members, but when rising to speak shall call some other member to the chair.
- 5. No member shall speak but once on the same subject, and not more than twenty minutes at a time, except by leave of the Association, provided the mover shall have the privilege of opening and closing the debate on his motion or resolution.
- 6. But one member shall speak at a time, and if more than one rises to speak at the same time the Moderator shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 7. Any member desiring to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, and in speaking shall confine himself to the subject under discussion, and no one shall use any disrespectful or discourteous language calculated to wound the feelings of any mem-

bers, or to disturb the harmony of the body, and the appellation of "brother" shall be used in every reference to a member of the Association.

- 8. No member of the Association shall absent himself with out leave of the chair, and the chair shall grant no such leave except for reasonable cause.
- 9. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make and present faithful records of the proceedings of the Association, and to procure and supervise the printing and distribution of the same among the churches.
- 10. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys accruing to the Association, to pay out of the same upon order of the Clerk, or if Home Mission Fund, upon the order of the Secretary of the Home Missions, and to report his receipts and disbursements. But the Clerk shall draw no order upon the Treasurer except for appropriations made by the Association.
- 11. Committees shall be appointed by the chair, unless otherwise ordered by the Association.
