## ARTICLES OF FAITH.

#### WITH THE SCRIPTURAL REFERENCES.

ARTICLE 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Word and Holy Ghost. I John 5: 7; John 1: 1,2,3; I Tim. 3: 16.

ART. 2. We believe that the Scriptures comprising the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and the only rule of our faithful practice. II Tim. 2: 15,16; I Peter, 1: 2.

ART. 3. We believe in the doctrine of election according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sactification of the Spirit unto obedience, and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ. I Peter 1: 2.

ART. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam. Gen. 3: 6,7; Psalms 57: 6; Rom 5: 12-14.

ART. 5. We believe in man's incapacity, by his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature. Isaiah 1: 5-7; John 6: 44; Eph. 2: 1.

ART. 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Christ only. Jer. 23: 6; Rom. 4: 22-24: I Cor. 1: 30.

ART. 7. We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace and never fall finally away. Psalms 89: 31-35; Heb. 8: 10,11; John 10: 28.

ART. 8 We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects for baptism; and that immersion is the Apostolic mode. Mark 16: 15,16; I Cor. 11: 22-26; Acts 8: 38,39; Rom. 6: 3,4; Acts 2: 42.

ART. 9. We believe in the ressurrection of the dead, and in general judgment; and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal. John 3: 28, 29; I Cor. 15: 22,23; Rev. 20: 12-15.

ART. 10. We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances of the gospel but one who is regularly baptized, called, and comes under the imposition of the hand of a presbytery. Matt. 28: 19,20; I Tim. 3: 14; Titus 5: 10.

ART. 11. We believe that none but regularly baptized members have a right to commune at the Lord's table. Act 2: 41;

I Cor. 11: 23,24; Acts 18: 8-11.

ART. 12. We believe that the Lord's Day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion. Ex. 20: 8; Acts 20: 7; Rev. 1: 10.

## PROCEEDINGS.

NEW HOME CHURCH, Garland County, Ark, September 8, 1894.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elds. J. J. Hughes and E. Wright from Matt. 16: 18. Opening prayer by Eld. J. J. Hughes, and closing prayer by Eld. H. L. Wasson.

The congregation was then dismissed until 2 o'clock P. M.,

at which time the body came together by singing.

The Association being called to order, the Moderator read John 1: 1-29. Hymn No. 42 of the Evergreen, was sung, after which the Moderator offered prayer, and the Association was declared in order and ready for business.

Letters from the various churches composing this Assolation were called for by the Moderator.

Bros. J. C. Thomas, A. R. Chitwood and the delegates of New Home Church were appointed a Preaching Committee.

Edmund Chitwood, S. D. Taylor and B. V. York were appointed to read the letters of the churches, twenty-five churches eing represented.

Called for petitionary letters. Received three, as follows:

Union Grove, Elnora, Hurricane Grove.

The Association went into the election of officers, which retulted as follows: Eld. H. T. Howell, Moderator; Eld. E. Wright, Clerk; W. F. Willis, Treasurer.

Visiting brethren were invited to seats. Correspondents were called for, and the following responded: J. K. Wilcox and A. A. Bates, from Big Fork Association. Also a certificate from Buckville Association, with the following names of messengers: E. P. Chitwood, H. H. Williamson, J. A. Chitwood, M. C. Melton and S. D. Taylor, several of whom were present. Eld. J. M. Dean was present from Red River Association.

The appointment of committees was postponed until morning, and left to the Moderator and Clerk.

Sang "There's a beautiful land." Prayer by the Model ator. Adjourned until Monday, at 8 A. M.

#### MONDAY.

#### MORNING SESSION.

The Association was called together by singing. The Moderator read Psalms 33. Prayer was offered by Eld. J. J. Hughes.

Correspondents were called for, when W. D Etheridge from Saline Association, came forward.

By action of the body, speeches were limited to five minutes.

The minutes of the first day's meeting were read and approved; the roll was then called and absentees marked.

Reports of committees were called for, and received and adopted, as follows:

Duties of Pastors to Churches.—The pastor should stiend all the churches under his care at the stated meetings. He should preach the whole counsel of God, in the fear of God and not man. He should encourage Sunday schools and prayer meetings.

Sunday School Convention.—The Caddo River Missionary Buptist Sunday School Convention met with Antioch church in Montgomery county, on Friday before the second Sunday in August, 1891 at 11 A. M. The convention ser on was preached by Eld. H. T. Howell, followed by Eld. J. J. Hughes. Text, Psalms, 126: 5.6 It then adjourned until 3 P. M.

Pursuant to adjournment the Convention was opened y the President, W. F. Will s, reading James 1, and follow d by prayer

Next heard the reading of the constitution and the minutes of last session, then called for letters from the various churches and schools. The letters were read by J. H. Collins and W. W. McLain, and the names of messengers enrolled.

The Convention went into the election of officers, with the following result: W. F. Willis, President; J. M. Smith, Vice President, W. W Smith, Secretary, and C. G. Ham, Treasurer.

A Preaching Committee was appointed as follows: C. G. Ham, O. Y. Smith and S. Z. Moran. A Music Class was also appointed as follows: S. Z. Moran, Isaiah Moran, S. A. McLain and Annie Branson. The Preaching Committee reported for Eld. J. H. Collins to preach at the church at night, and Eld. J. J. Hughes to preach at Field's school house. After prayer by Eld. J. H. Collins, adjourned to meet Saturday at 8 A. M.

On Friday night there was preaching by Eld J H. Collins, followed by Eld. H. T. Howell. Text, 1 Kings 13: 9.

On the second day at 3 P. M., the Convention was opened by the Vice President, J. M. Smith, who read Ecclesiastes 12, followed with prayer. Rain hindered in the morning. Minutes of the first day were read. Appointed a Program Committee, as follows: H.T. Howell, O. T. Smith, G. W. Welch.

The program on essays was taken up, when the following essays

On the third day, at 9 A. M., the Convention opened by the President reading John 4: 9-20, and comments and prayer. Called all and marked names of absentees. Continued the essay program, when the following were delivered: Duty of Parents in Sunday phools, R. C. Fields; What Influence has Sunday Schools upon the Blaing Generation? Eld. W. W. Carson. Reports were heard from phoday school superintendents and churches. All at peace. On the next session of this Convention will be held with Salem furch, in Pike County, commencing on Friday before the first Sanday in August, 1895, at 11 A. M. The following resolutions were read and adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention adopt the Southern Baptist literature and recommend each Sunday school to use the same.

Resolved, That the superintendent of each Sunday school comlosing this Convention appoint one person to prepare and read an assay at each annual session of this body on a subject chosen by the superintendent.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be tendered to the church and vicinity of Antioch for their hospitality in enter laining this convention.

The Committee on Program for the next session reported as follows: Convention sermon, Eld. J. P. Welch, with Eld. J. H. Collins, alternate. Essays by Sisters S. A. McLain, Docia Hollings head and Marja Carson, on subjects of their own choice; Eld. J. Hughes, on Family Religion; Sister Mattie Smith, subject of her choice; W. F. Willis, Best Methods of Conducting Sunday Schools; Eld. J. H. Collins, Why Use Literature in Sunday Schools? Eld. J. M. Smith, Temperance; C. G. Ham, Are Sunday Schools Scriptural? S. Z. Moran, Duties of Pastors in Sunday School Work.

Also, that the Clerk have \$10 for his fee, and that he also have the privilege to draw from the treasury the necessary funds to pay the mostage on the minutes.


