Third; Believing that our strength lies in our co-operative work and that the Arkansas Baptist is the chain that will unite us as so many links and give us that sympathy and knowledge of each others work and necessities and of the destitute parts of our field as will stimulate us to the greatest efforts, we deem it eminently worthy of our confidence and patronage. # CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the North Concord Associa-

tion of Western Arkansas.

Art. 2. It shall be composed of messengers from Baptist Churhes known to he in good standing. Each church with lifty members or less shall be entitled to three messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to me additional messenger.

Art. 3. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be bosen by ballot at each annual session and shall continue in office till their

Accessors are chosen.

Art. 4. Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the

lody according to parliamentary usage.

Sec. 2. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication of, and distribution of the minutes. Keep a regular file of the printed minutes of the body, and deliver the same to his successor in office.

Sec. 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of be Association, holding them subject to order from the Association or its executive committee, ren-

der an account of the same to the annual session of this body.

Art. 5. The object of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the churches: to secure unanimity of faith: to encourage concert in opportion and especially to cultivate the piety of the churches and to aid in this last object several days of each session shall be spent in devotional reises.

Art. 6 Sec. 1. This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal mulations of the churches, but will act as an advisory council whenever it

Art. 10. It shall be the privilege of the associaton, in addition to its power already granted, to conduct missionary operations within its limits, and for this purpose to choose a missionary or missionaries as means may allow and death nate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through their treasurer, out of any funds to be sent up along with the tunds for publishing the minutes to even

ry annual meeting.

Art. 11. The annual meeting of the association shall embrace the Lord's day and shall begin at 10 o'clock a. m. on Saturday before the second Lord's day in October at which time the introductory sermon shall be preached. On each surceeding day the association shall adjourn at 11 o'clock, a. m., for preaching.

Art. 12. This constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Art. 6, set 1, at any regular meeting of the association, by the two-thirds vote of the mem-

bers who are in attendance.

Amendment 1, Art. 13. No person shall serve as moderator of this body note than two terms in succession. Amended 1882.

Amendment 2. The constitution shall be published annually in the minute

of this association. Amended 1893.

Amendment 3. Missionary sermon is placed in hands of Divine service committee.

# ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe there is one, and only one true and living God, Jehova, and that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons—the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and the New Testaments are the Word of God, constituting the only and all-sufficient standard of faith, doctri

and dicipline or practice.

3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of that Eternal Love by which God hath, according to his infinite wisdom, chosen his people in Christoffice the world was, and has predestinated them unto the adoption of children through santification of the Spirit and belief of the truth, and doth keep them by his power through faith unto salvation.

4. We believe that man was created holy, but by wilful violation of the law of his maker he fell into a state of sinfulness and brought death upon his race who being by natural descent in the unholy image of Adam and children wrath hy nature and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or

attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace, through faith in Jesus Christ

and no other way.

6. We believe that, in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, oborn again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth, and the proper evidences thereof are repentence faith and obedience unto God.

\*7. We believe that such early are believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life and they are kept by the power of God through faith noto salvation.

8. We believe the scripture teaches that repentence and faith are sacred dutles, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating

apirit of God.

9. A Christian church is a congregation of immersed believers who meet statedly, and have covenanted together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges in the New Testament appertaining to the church of Jesus Christ.

10. The only proper officers of Christian churches are bishops or pastors

and deacons.

11. Christian Baptism is the unmersion of a believer in the name of the father, Son and Holy Spirit by a regularly ordained Baptist minister in good order.

12. The Lords Supper is a positive commemoration ordinance of Jesus Christ to be observed in the church as such, in remembrance of Christ, and to show

forth his death till he comes.

13. The first day of the week is the Lord's-day and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor and all worldly business and devoted to religious duties.
