The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Let our prayers be to our heavenly Father for more laborers; and our laborers can not do the work of the Master without means of support. It is our duty to give our money and use every effort in our power to spread the Gospel. This department of our denominational work is unfer the control of the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Its operations are in the Southern States,

Territories and Cuba. Our State has been missionary ground for more than twenty years. In Arkansas its work is being done through our State Board; in view of this fact, it is the opinion of your Committee that its work and contributions should be through our State Convention. # REPORT "D"-COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We, your Committee on Surday Schools, would respectfully re port that we find that in the twenty-seven churches represented in our association there are only twenty Sabbath Schools, about four-teen of which are kept up twelve months in the year. We also find that our Sunday School statistics, in many respects, are very incom-

plete, for the twenty Schools represented report only 833 scholars and 106 officers and teachers; total, 939. We are satisfied that we have about double the number attending our schools. We would recommend that our churches make complete Sunday School reports in the future. We note with some degree of regret the Committee on Divine Service has departed from our usual custom of giving to the Sunday Schools represented the regular hour for Sunday School Mass Meeting, thereby depriving the association of the benefit of the same. We would also recommend that we return to our former custom During the discussion the report was amended so as to incorporate the plan for co-operative associational work of the State Board. It is with feelings of regret, mingled with sadness, that we are forced to report that we have no State Missionary in the It is plainly our duty to occupy till our Lord returns. we be faithful to the trust reposed in us, or will we desert the ranks. Our blessed Master's voice comes to us in tones of tenderness and love, saying, go preach my everlasting Gospel. Brethren, will we go? The evangelization of our State is largely dependent upon our State Convention, which should have our hearty support, sympathy and prayers. We need a State Missionary in the field to work in destitute communities, and it is the duty of this Association to help send him. It is evidently our duty to send the Gospel to heathen lands, but if we would first eradicate the beam from our own eyes, then we could see more clearly how to remove the mote from our brother's eye. We do, therefore, earnestly recommend that this hody extend a helping hand to our State Convention in every effort It may put forth tending to the dissemination of Gospel truths; and also that we pray earnestly and often to the Lord of the harvest to mend more reapers into the field. We, your Committee on Associational Missions, would report as follows: There has been a Missionary employed from March 15, 1893, up to September 15, 1893; and that the Lord has blessed his labor by the conversion of many souls, that much good is being done by this work. We, therefore, think that the Association should appropriate funds to retain a Missionary in the field; as what has been done in the six months past, would be lost in a great measure if the work is discontinued at this time. To keep up this fund, we suggest that each Church in this Association, contribute as much as she is able for that work. We find, from the Missionary report, that there is a large territory unoccupied, and it is impossible for one man to cover the ground; but we feel that the Association is not able to keep more than one Missionary in the field. We therefore, suggest that the Association employ one man in this work for his entire time, for the ensuing year.
