PROCEEDINGS.

JUNCTION CITY, ARK., SEP. 10, 1897.

The Fifty-second Annual Session of the Liberty Baptist Assotiation convened with Junction Baptist Church, Junction, City, Ark., Friday before the second Lord's day in September, 1897. The Baptist church house having been destroyed by storm, the association convened in the Presbyterian house of worship.

At 10,30 a. m., the congregation united in singing the grand old hymn, "Come thou fount of every blessing." The pastor of Junction church, J. N. Hartley, made a few well timed remarks on the necessity of praying for the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit. The congregation was then led by that veteran of the Cross, Elder H. T. Britt, in a pathetic and devout prayer for the presence of the Master, to the end that His name be glorified and His cause strengthened.

As per previous appointment, Elder W. F. Dorris, pastor of Camden church, proceeded to deliver the associational, or introductory sermon from I Corinthians, 16; 13; "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong." Theme, christian integrity. The familiarity and ability displayed by the young brother in the analysis and delivery of the sermon, would have done credit to men of riper years. The sermon was well received and was followed by prayer by brother J. M. Hart,

Brother J. N. Hartley offered a few remarks in extending a hearty welcome to delegates and visitors, and while the congregation joined in singing "There is a fountain filled with blood," the

brethren, upon the suggestion of brother Hartley; engaged mannost fraternal and affectionate hand-shaking. Benediction was pronounced by Elder J. V. B. Waldrop, and the congregation dispersed to meet at 2 o'clock p. m..

AFTERNOON SESSION

At 2 sclock p. m., the house was called to order by the Moderator, H. G. P. Williams, and the old familiar hymn, "How firm a foundation," was sung by the congregation. The Moderator then read the 4th chapter of John's first epistle. Bro. Hart led in prayer. After making a few very tender and lowing remarks relative to the character of the former clerk, brother W. C. McGain, who had deceased and gone to his reward since the last session, the Moderator asked the body to elect a temporary clerk.

Upon motion, the association proceeded to elect a temporary, clerk; which election resulted in the choice of Bro. F. E. Morgan.

Pending the counting of the vote for temporary clerk, brother I. M. Hart made a brief speech in behalf of the Foreign Mission Iournal.

The Chair declared the body ready to proceed with business of the session, and called for letters from the various characters composing this association. Elder W. F. Dorris and brothren H. T. On motion of Elder H. T. Britt the former Moderator, H. G. P. Williams, and temporary Clerk, F. E. Morgan were elected by acclamation as permanent officers.

On motion of Elder J. N. Hartley the following order of business was adopted:

On motion of J. M. Hart a committee on Baptist Young People's Union was added to order of business.

On motion of Elder J. N. Hartley a committee on Obituaries

was added to order of business.

The Moderator invited visiting brethren to seats in the body, and Elders J. U. H. Wharton, of Araddia, La., W. W. Gardener, of Montrello; F. D. Backs, of Ouachita College, Arkadelphia; D. E. Gambrell, of Star City, responded and asked to be recognized. They were welcomed by the Chair.

The Moderator called Bro. H. T. Hawkins to the Chair and

retired to make up the committees.

The Chair called for correspondence, and Elders J. V. B. Waldrop and O. M. Lucas, from Everett association; Elder W. W. Gardener, from Bartholomew association and Elder A. Richards, (col.) from Ouschita association (col.) were enrolled and welcomed as correspondents.

FRIDAY NIGHT SERVICES.

Preaching at the Presbyterian church by Prof. F. D. Baars, of Arkadelphia. Text:-"For Jesus' Sake."—Sec. Cor. 4: 5.

SATURDAY MORNING.

The Moderator called the body to order at 9 o'clock a.m. After singing "Come thou fount of every blessing," the Moderator read the 25th Psalm, and the congregation was led in prayer by Elder W. W. Gardener.

The Chair announced the body ready for business.

It was announced that Eider O. M. Lucas would preach at the M. E. church at 11 a. m.

The Clerk read minutes of the previous day's session, and on motion, adopted.

Reports of committees called for, which were read, and after discussion, adopted as follows:

EDUCATION.

Your committee beg to report; that it is with pleasure we note the growing demand on the part of our denomination for High Schools and Colleges. Our people are becoming aroused on the subject of christian education, and we believe the day not far distant when a large majority of the sons and daughters of Baptists shall be thoroughly trained in our denominational schools.

We do not believe that it is possible to put too much stress on the subject of christian education. Your committee believe it to be the duty of Baphasts to patronize Baptist schools and colleges. It is with joy and pleasure we note the progress made by our High Schools and Colleges. Ouachita Baptist College, under the leadership of Prof. J. W. Conger, assisted by his worthy Faculty, has proven to be a blessing, not only to Arkansas Baptists but to Baptists of sister states. As a co-educational institution, Ouachita Baptist College has but few equals in the south.

Your committee would recommend to the Baptist brotherhood, Ouachita Baptist College as a safe, sound and in every way reliable institution.

Central Baptist Female College has passed through her trying ordeals to which all colleges are subjected, and now ranks with the best female schools of the state.

President Lyle, by his untiring zeal and earnest efforts, has built for the Baptists of Arkansas, one of the best female schools of our land. We heartily recommend Central College to the Baptists of our state as a school worthy of their patronage, sympathy and financial aid.

Mountain Home College, located at Mountain Home, Ark., is doing a good work in the northern part of the state.

Our Colleges are doing much to arouse and enlighten our people along the line of christian education. We bid them God speed and promise them our hearty co-operation.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Ouachita College enrolled the names of twenty-seven young men who were preparing for the ministry. It is impossible to estimate the amount of good done each year by Ouachita College in the work of training our young brethren for the ministry. As a denomination, we believe in an educated ministry. So let us rally to the support of Ouachita College, which is doing so much to thoroughly equip our young brethren for the work of the Lord. Much depends upon our efforts along this line.

Let us encourage our young preachers to enter college without delay, that they may be fully prepared for the great work be fore them. We recommend that each church in Liberty association take at least one collection for Ministerial education during associational year.—Respectfully submitted.

Our Saviour was a Foreign Missionary, for he came to this incursed world and "gave Himself a ransom for all." When He gave the church her marching orders, He said:—"Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." This command has not been obeyed, for there are millions yet who have not heard the gospel. It is therefore as binding upon us as

much as it was upon the first disciples. There are many consecrated men and women saying: "Send us, we will give our lives to the work." Our Foreign Board already in debt, says; "We can't send you unless our churches send us the means." The harvest truly is plenteous but the laborers are few. Your committee would recommend that the pastors inform themselves on missions, preach to their churches on the subject, and take collections regularly for this purpose.—Respectfully submitted,

We, your committee on Publications, beg leave to submit the following report; We would, first of all, recommend and urge the reading of the Bible; 2nd., Study all the Bible helps obtainable, that we may the better understand the Bible and God's will concerning us; 3rd., As the Baptist State Convention has endorsed and recommended the "Arkansas Baptist" as the State Organ. and as we feel it our duty to take, pay for, read and digest said paper, we would most heartily recommend the "Arkansas Baptist." We should, by all means, stand by Bro. Clark and our State paper, and help him on to even greater usefulness in the ·Baptist cause in our own beloved state. And then, any other SOUND Baptist paper that we may feel able to take, but stand by our State paper first, last and all the time. 4th. We would ur gently recommend S. B. C. S. S. Literature, published at Nash. ville, Tenn. We would also call the attention of the churches to the fact that 20 per. cent. of all orders given for said literature, and ordered through Bro. W. A. Clark, of Little Rock, goes into the Baptist state treasury as state mission fund, and said publishing house hopes to soon be able to give even a larger per cent. than this to state missions. Therefore we would urge the churches to order S. B. C. literature through Bro. Clark.

ORPHANS' HOME.

Your committee would make the following report:

We are glad to report that the Home is in excellent condition. The Home has been occupied just one year. Miss Hannah Heyatt, (now Gardener) opened up the Home last September, with two children. Since then, thirteen more have been sheltered therein, from the storms of the world, making fifteen at present, and others are knocking at our doors for admission. Our financial condition is excellent, all our liabilities have been cancelled up to date and can report \$100,00 on hand, for which, we thank the Lord. The moral and spiritual condition of the Home is all its most ardent admirers could wish. The children are required to attend our church services and Sunday school every Sabbath. As a result, three of them have been buried with Christ in baptism, and we trust as they grow to years of maturity, they will all give their hearts to the Lord.

As to the future of the Home: Our present capacity will soon be filled. At the next meeting of our convention, plans will have to be adopted to enlarge the building. An additional building costing not less than \$5,000.00 will have to be erected so that the Board can accommodate all that may need our care and shelter, for we believe this to be the greatest enterprise now to be fostered by the Baptists of this great state. There is no heart so hard that will not listen to the cry of the orphan.

The first association to respond to our appeals three years ago, was the grand and noble body of brethren, known all over this state, as the "Liberty Association." May your liberality far excel your former and maiden effort for the Home.—Submitted,

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We, your committee, on Sunday Schools, beg leave to make the following report:

Our Sunday School work is not in a flourishing condition. Nine churches report Sunday Schools. There seems to be but little enthusiasm amongst our churches along the line of Sunday School work. Your committee recognize the fact that the success of our denomination and maintainance of sound doctrine, depend largely upon the religious training of our young people.

We would earnestly urge each church to organize and support a Sunday School. We therefore recommend that all our Sunday Schools use only Baptist literature; and further, that they patronize and support our own convention series.—Submitted,

EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Your Board beg to submit the following report:—Owing to the exceeding scarcity of money, we did not deem it prudent to employ a missionary to give his time wholly to missionary work in our bounds. Upon our recommendation to the State Board, the salary of Bro. E. J. A. McKinney, as pastor at Junction City, was supplemented \$12,50 per month, which enabled said young church to retain his services for the year. We are glad to report that his labors have been so blessed that this church is now self sustaining. Early in the year, we also supplemented the salary of Bro. W. J. Newsome as missionary at Norphlet, with \$25,00 for the year. We are glad to report that his labors have been blessed of God to the strengthening of the church.

We have not encouraged the churches throughout our bounds to report to us the amounts' collected for various purposes and forwarded to other boards, for experience has demonstrated that nothing like a satisfactory report can possibly be had from the churches. Therefore we only take notice of such funds as come directly into our hands. In order to secure accurate information, we recommend that the churches be requested to give such information in their letters to the association, and the Clerk be requested to tabulate and publish same in the minutes. We would exhort our brethren and sisters, not only to teach temperance in their homes, but as God may give them opportunity, to work to have the monster evil, intemperance, ban-
