#### CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Concord Association.

Art. I. It shall be composed of messengers from Baptist Churches known to in good standing. Each church with fifty member or less shall be entitled three messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to me additional messenger.

Art. 3. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be bosen by ballot at each annual session and shall continue in office until their

cessors are chosen.

Art. 4. Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body

rding to parliamentary usage.

Sec. 2. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the minutes. Keep a regular file of the minuted minutes of the body and deliver the same to his successar in office.

Mc. 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, holdthem subject to order from the Association or its executive committee, ren-

for an account of the same to the annual session of this body.

Art. 5. The object of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the churches; to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation and especially to cultivate the piety of the churches and to aid in this last object several days of each session shall be spent in devotional exercises.

Art. 6. Sec. 1. This Association shall in no case interfere with the intermeregulations of the churches, but will act as an advisory council whenever

shall be necessary.

Sec. 2. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the messen from the churches, and will withdraw from and disown all churches that deput from the principles of this compact, by becoming heterodox in faith or derly in practice.

Art. 7. Newly organized churches or churches dismissed from other Assume tions may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and messen at our annual meeting, and subscribing by their messengers to the abstract

of principles herewith published.

Art. 8. Churches may be dismissed from this Association, upon application annual meeting for the purpose of joining a new Association but any church parting from us without being regularly dismissed shall be regarded as disord

Art. 9. Sec. 1. There shall be an executive committee consisting of the offfice of this body with 5 members chosen by the Association at each annual meeting

The duty of this committee shall be to superintend the missionary operation of the Association and represent it in all matters requiring their attention when

the Association is not in session.

The committe shall report annually at each meeting of this Association. Three members of said committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Upon appointment said committee shall come together and range their meetings and take such other steps as may be to the interest to the cause of Christ.

Sec. 2. The regular committees of this Association shall be a committee associational missions, foreign missions, documents, religious literature, minimularial support, Sunday Schools, ministerial education, nominations, territorial

ance, obituaries, queries and finance.

Art. 10. It shall be the privilege of the association, in addition to its power already granted, to conduct missionary operations within its limits, and this purpose to choose a missionary or missonaries as means may allow a designate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through their treasure out of any funds to be sent up along with the funds for publishing the minute of every annual meeting.

Art. 11. The annual meeting of the association shall embrace the Lord's day and shall begin at 10 o'clock a.m. on Saturday Letore the fourth Lord's day september at which time the introductory sermon shall be preached. On succeeding day the Association shall adjourn at 11 o'clock, a.m. for preach

Art. 12. This constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Art. Section 1, at any regular meeting of the Association, by the two-thirds vote the members who are in attendance.

Amendment 1, Art. 13. No person shall serve as moderator of this body more

#### RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. An introductory and missionary sermon shall be preached by minister chosen by ballot at the preceding Association. In case of absence or failure the sermon on either to be preached by an alternate chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother shall also be chosen to deliver a temperature address.

3. A committee of arrangements consisting of five members, besides the Mod erator and Clerk, who shall be members ex-officio, shall be appointed by the

Moderator to arrange and report the order of business.

4. Visiting brethren who are in good standing may be invited to seats but no to vote.

5. A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may make all appeal to the Association on the same day but at no other time.

6. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, address the Model

tor and upon obtaining leave shall proceed.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the

subject or use words of personal reflection, and then by the Moderator.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by him who made it. Every case taken shall be decided or withdrawn before another is introduced.

9. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the Modern

tor shall take the voice of the Association by yeas and nays or otherwise.

10. A member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator. 11. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without pure

mission of the Association.

12. The appellation of "brother" shall be used in the Association by the mem bers in their addresses one to another. Letters that are unknown to the scrip tures, such as "Rev.," "Parson" and like shall not be employed or appear upon the minutes.

13. The names of members shall be called as often as the Association may

14. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question unless the . ssociation be equally divided.

15. Any member violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator at

discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have been made.

16. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this Am sociation by a majority vote of the members present.
