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Minutes

According to previous arrangement the Spring River Baptist Association assembled in its Forty-Second annual mession with Imboden Baptist Church, Saturday, September 24, 1910.

The Association was called to order at 11 a. m. by the Moderator, Eld. M. D. Bowers, and after singing "Glory to His Name," Eld. R. B. Bellamy read John 17 and preached the introductory sermon from II Corinthians 5:17.

At the conclusion of the introductory sermon the Association took recess until 2 p. m.

At 2 p. m. the Association reconvened for the transaction of business.

The next order of business being the election of officers, the rules by motion were suspended and Eld. M. D. Bowers was elected Moderator by acclamation.

Again the rules were suspended and J. J. Bellamy was elected Clerk by acclamation.

The next item of business being the reception of correponding messengers. The following were enrolled:

On motion of Bro. W. G. Pickett, the rules were suspended for the purpose of selecting a place to hold the next tession of the Association, some one to preach the introductory sermon and some one to write the circular letter, which resulted as follows:

New Hope was selected for the place for the next session; lilder M. D. Bowers was selected to preach the introductory permon, and J. J. Bellamy to write the circular letter.

The Moderator appointed on Divine Services, L. W. Ruswell, G. B. Borah, H. T. Kirkpatrick, and J. J. Estes. On Sunday Schools, F. C. Neeley, L. W. Russell, and R. V. Goss. On Finance, H. T. Kirkpatrick, G. H. Ballard and A. C. Dent. On motion the meeting adjourned until 7:30.

At 7:30 a beautiful and forceful sermon was preached on the "Resurrection of the Dead," by Rev. W. W. Gardner. A collection was taken for the help of the Orphans' Home, resulting in \$11.17, at Monticello, and \$10.20 for the Orphans' Home at Texarkana, Ark.

Committee on Divine Service reported that Eld. E. J. A. McKinney would preach at the Baptist church and W. M. Webb at the Methodist church, the following day, Sunday, at II a. m.

By motion the meeting was adjourned until 10 a, m. Sunday morning.

At 10 a. m. Sunday the meeting reconvened in Sunday School mass meeting.

Report of Committee on Sunday Schools was submitted, and after some discussion, was adopted.

At 11 a. m. Eld. E. J. A McKinney preached a forceful sermon from Nehemiah 4:6.

At the same hour Eld. W. M. Webb preached an excellent sermon at the Methodist church, from Rom. 4:4.

At 3:30 Rev. W. M. Webb preached on the "Complete Salvation or the Security of the Believer." This was a very strong sermon.

At 7:30 Eld. E. J. A. McKinney preached at the Methodist church and Eld. J. S. Rogers preached at the Baptist church, on the subject of "Why I Am a Baptist."

The preaching during the Association was strong and forceful and doubtless left good impression on those who heard it.

At the afternoon service the Moderator announced the appointment of the various committees.

[The names of these committeemen will be found after their respective reports, or as many as signed these reports, all of which will be found in the Appendix.] A collection was also taken at the afternoon services to aid in the building of a Baptist church house at Swifton, resulting in the raising of \$21.55 by cash and pledges.

Monday, September 26.

The Association came together at 9 a. m. Monday morning, and after singing "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and prayer by Eld. Holdford, the Association proceeded to business.

A messenger letter was read from Mount Zion Church. On motion of Bro. W. G. Pickett, the rules were suspended and the circular letter was read by J. J. Bellamy, and

on motion was adopted.

Report of Committee on State of Churches was read, discussed and adopted.

Report of Committee on Destitution was read and discussed by Chas. B. Lee and R. V. Goss and adopted.

Report of Committee on State Missions was read, discussed by E. J. A. McKinney, B. H. Holdford, E. T. Lincoln, J. S. Rogers and W. G. Pickett, and adopted.

Report of Committee on Education was read and adopted. Report of Committee on Baptist Literature was read and adopted.

Two reports were submitted on Foreign Missions, a majority report and a minority report. After considerable discussion and some amendments the majority report was adopted.

Report of Committee on Prohibition was read and adopted.

Report of Committee on Correspondence was read, amended and adopted.

At 12 m. recess was taken for dinner.

At 1:15 p. m. session reconvened.

Report of Committee on Orphans' Homes was read and adopted.

Rules were suspended and the report of the Home Mission Board appointed at the Forty-first session of the Assoclation was read and after some discussion was adopted. A resolution endorsing the Annieville camp meeting to be held next summer was read and adopted.

A resolution of recommendation to Rev. C. T. Arnett was read and adopted.

Report of Committee on Memorials of the Dead was read and adopted.

Report of Clerk was read and adopted.

Report of Finance Committee was read and adopted.

Bro. W. G. Pickett spoke to a question of personal privilege relative to a point of order raised in Saturday's session.

A resolution of thanks to the Moderator and Clerk was read and adopted.

A resolution of thanks to the people of Imboden was read and adopted.

A resolution requiring the Clerk to have the Constitution printed in Minutes was read and adopted.

A resolution authorizing the Clerk to have 600 copies of Minutes printed and that he be allowed \$10.00 for his services was read and adopted.

At 2:40 the Association adjourned to meet at New Hope Church, Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September, 1911.

This was a great meeting. Peace and harmony prevailed through the deliberations; all seemed to realize that they were bound together by the strong ties of Christian brotherhood, cemented together for the great work of advancing the Baptist cause that God may be honored and glorified in these ends of the earth.

The brethren were very much encouraged that the Baptists are taking the lead in Arkansas and in the South, in membership, in education and in carrying out the great commission, "Go ye and teach all nations."

CIRCULAR LETTER

THE DIVINITY OF CHRIST

We, as Baptists, believe that God, the maker and builder of all, established the plan of salvation through the sacrifice of His Son, Iesus Christ effecting a perfect redemption for imperfect man, and having fulfilled the prophesy and satisfied the law, the sacrifice for sin was made on the cross, where Christ became the sin-bearer for all. He arose from the grave, having conquered the last and greatest enemy, which is death, and finally ascended to the Father, completing the plan of salvation which is offered all who will accept Him as their Spiritual King and confide in Him as a personal redeemer. By the quickening power of regeneration and the new birth, we are begotten by a new Father and born into a new life: and as the Father is eternal and we are to be like Him, so is the new life eternal. You say mysterious! Yes, so is the natural birth, who can explain it? Watch the egg as it bursts into life. Can you explain the unseen power that generated life within the shell and caused it to burst forth a liv-Ing creature? Does anybody know just how the little watermelon seed bursts into life and sends out its yards of vine? Who put the vellow flowers along this vine, and who wrapped the fruit with an outer coat of green and an inner coat of white, and where did it get its sweet, mellow meat within and the thousand seed like the one that was planted? Can

anybody tell just how and why? No, these things are as mysterious as the life which Christ offers the world today. Man has learned much but not all. He deives down into the recesses of hidden wonders and reveals some hidden mysteries, but at the threshold of life he stops and admires and wonders. Mysterious! Yes, but who doubts life because he doesn't understand it? Does any one doubt that he lives because the process is mysterious? And yet we have a large per cent of mankind in Christendom today who doubt the divinity of Christ because His works. His miracles, His plan of salvation is to them mysterious. Man does not understand this Christ. Yet a thought is moulded in the man's mind, transmitted by his voice to a telephone, carried 520 miles in an instant and through the ear is conveyed to the mind of a friend and he has the same thought, all of which is as nivsterious as the miracles of Christ. Take the thought alone. Can any man explain the mechanism of a thought? Yet no one questions his power to think simply because he don't understand how he thinks.

And so it is at every turn in life we see the mysterious in things both small and great.

"The very power that molds a tear
And bids it trickle from its source
That power preserves the earth a sphere
And guides the planets in their course."

The works of an infinite God are beyond the comprehension of finite man. Then why should man in his weakness challenge the wisdom and power of God? Why doubt the Christ when for ages God had promised a savior, through the prophesy of the Scriptures? Why doubt the divinity of Christ after God proclaimed "This is My beloved Son," as Christ stood in the waters of the Jordan? Why doubt the divinity of Christ when His life and His miracles establish the truth of His divinity? Why doubt the divinity of Christ after His crucifixion on the cross, His resurrection from the grave and His final ascension to the Father? We believe that this Christ is divine, that His plan is complete, that His

grace is sufficient. We believe that He who has built worlds and suns; who controls the universe through His infinite wisdom is abundantly able to establish a plan for the redemption of His creatures. We believe that this plan was established by the sacrifice of Christ, and by repentance toward God and implicit faith in Jesus Christ we are made the beneficiaries of this eternal plan, and become heirs of God and joint heirs with Jesus Christ, being born into a new life which is as eternal as God Himself. Wonderful, yes; but it's God's plan; it's God's way.

CONSTITUTION

We, the messengers of the Baptist Church of Christ, in convention assembled, in order to perpetuate Union, foster Education, and aid in the Gospel, do ordain this Constitution for this Union to be called Spring River Baptist Association.

- I. This Association shall be composed of Messengers chosen by the churches of the Union and accredited by letter, and each church shall be entitled to three Messengers.
- II. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator and Clerk, whose duties shall be defined in the rules of decorum.
- III. The letters of the churches shall express the number in fellowship received in baptism, by letters, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and dead, during the Association year, the name of the pastor, postoffice and the amount contributed and the object of the donation, and in no case shall the Association appropriate money for any purpose but that designed by the donor.
- IV. The Association shall have no ecclesiastical authority over the churches, but may give counsel and answer queries when requested.
- V. Churches may be admitted to the Union on petitionary letters, if Scriptural in constitutional, faith and practice.
- VI. This Association may withdraw from any church in this union for unchristian conduct.
- VII. Every question shall be decided by a majority vote except on the reception of members into this Union, which must be unanimous.
- VIII. A minute of the proceedings of the Association shall be recorded; and, if the churches furnish the means, printed.
- IX. The Association shall hold a session annually with one of the churches of the Union, on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September of each year.
- X. This Constitution may be amended by proposal made in writing and entered of record at one session; and if a majority vote for such amendment it shall become part of this Constitution.

RULES OF DECORUM

- A Moderator and Clerk shall be elected by the Association, who shall continue in office one year, or until their successors are elected.
- 2. The Moderator shall take the chair at the hour to which the Association is adjourned, and after prayer proceed to business. He shall keep order and may speak provided he calls a chairman. He shall have no voice except in case of a tie, in which case he may give the casting vote.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator. He shall not depart from the subject under consideration, nor indulge in personal reflections.
- 4. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave from the Association.
- 5. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave.
- 6. No member shall address another by any appellation other than "Brother."
- 7. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member while speaking unless he violates these Rules of Decorum.
- 8. Any member may appeal from the decision of the Moderator to the Association.
- 9. The Clerk shall keep a minute of the proceedings of the Association and perform such other duties as may be required of him.
 - 10. Any member violating the rules may be reported.
- 11. The session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 12. RESOLVED, That the order of business be changed to read as follows:
 - 1. Call to order by Moderator.
 - 2. Introductory sermon.
 - 3. Appointing Reading Clerks.
 - 4. Calling roll of churches.

- 5. Election of officers.
- 6. Reception of corresponding Messengers.
- 7. Invitation to visiting brethren.
- 8. Reception of churches.
- Appointment of committees, to-wit: Divine Service, State of the Churches, Destitution, Sunday Schools, Missions, Education, Baptist Literature, Prohibition, Correspondence, Finance, Ministerial, Directory, Orphans' Homes and Memorial of Dead.
