MINUTES

The forty-fourth session of the Spring River Baptist Association met in annual session with Jeruselem church Saturday September 21, 1912.

The meeting convened with singing and prayer after which Eld. R. B. Bellamy preached the introductory sermon on the subject of the "Resurection" and at the close an intermission until two o'clock was taken.

A collection was taken by Eld. J. L. Brown for Texar-

kana Orphans, Home, \$11.00 was contributed.

A beautiful song service, led by Eld. V. C. Erwin, was rendered on convening at 7:30 p. m., after which Eld. J. L. Brown preached on the subject of "the Word and the Spirit". Meeting adjourned to meet at 8 a. m., Monday.
