At 11 o'clock a. m. on Monday, our good old Bro. Thomas Dulaney preached us a sermon that we all were indeed proud of, for it filled our very soul full of God's love and presence among us.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

To Investigate the Arkinda Trouble—We submit the following: After carefully investigating we recommend that this body receive the Associational letter from the original Baptist Church and seat the delegates named in the letter

2nd. We recommend and advise the Church to call in delegates from three or four of her Sister Churches to aid her in settling this trouble and report at the next Association in regard to it.

Temperance—We are well pleased with the present cutlook in our State. If we are correctly informed, three-fourths of the counties of the State have voted the sale of spirituous liquors out of them.

Our churches are taking a decided stand against the sale and the use of liquor, and are also disciplining members who use the same.

Therefore, be it Resolved: That we use every lawful means for the suppression of same.

Adultery—This crime and sin was so beinous in the sight of God, when He gave the Ten Commandments to Israel, He commanded them to put to death those who were found guilty. Lev. 2, 10.

The Saviour said: "That whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart." Matt. 5, 28.

For the sin of adultery He says a man may put away his wife. Matt. 5, 32. But the Saviour did not

say that the man could marry again.

Man, sinful man, has done this.

This sin has become so prevalent in the United States that is has called for special legislation.

Paul the Apostle says that "They that commit adul-

tery shall not inherit the Kingdom of God."

He commanded the Church at Corinth to put away that wicked person. If the virtuous cannot keep company with them; if we will not tolerate it in our homes, we ask the question, Can we tolerate it in the Church of the living God? I. Cor. 6, 15.

Know ye not that your bodies are members of Christ? Shall I then take the members of Christ and make them the members of an Harlot? God forbid. What, know ye not that he which is joined to an harlot is one body? For two, saith He, shall be one flesh.

Therefore we, the committee, recommend that all churches in the bounds of this Association enforce the law as laid down in the Scriptures against adultery.

Dirorce—The statistics of the United States show that there are over twelve thousand divorces granted in the United States every year. When we stop in our mad rush of money-getting of this age to enquire what is the cause of so much crime and destitution, and so many homeless children, we can partly answer the question.

The divorce courts are responsible for granting dissatisfied parties the privilege of separating and remarrying again at their own will.

Think! Thirty thousand children every year that

are deprived of a father's or mother's care by granting divorces to persons in order to give them the privilege of committing the same act over again and again if the wife does not please the husband, or the husband the wife.

How often we have met children whose parents were divorced, the mother, in some cases, retaining the children, or the father. Ask the question, Where is your father or your mother? and they will answer, I don't know where father is, for mother and he are divorced.

Is it any wonder when such a state exists that marriage is counted as nothing more than a contract of convenience for the parties to suit their own convenience, until such times when they please to call on the divorce court to grant a decree of separation, because they are tired of one another? By so doing they give God's Word the tie where He says, "Marriage is honorable in all the bed undefiled." Heb. 13, 4. They make marriage dishonorable by divorce and defile the bed; make void the command of God.

Christ, Mark 10:7, 8, 9, says: A man shall leave his father and mother and cleave unto his wife and they twain shall be one flesh. So then they are no more twain but one flesh. What therefore God hath joined together let no man put asunder.

Here men disregard the law of God and put asunder whom they please, for the money as a need that there is in it. Therefore we, as a people that regard God's word above all things else, should cry out against this as one of the most awful crimes against the human family. That brings desolation in so many families in this land of ours. It is the Upas-tree that is sending death and destruction to the American family and making us a stench in the nostrils (so to speak) of the Abmighty. From every Baptist pulpit it should be condemned. From the pew it should be condemned. On the highways it should be condemned.

Every Baptist preacher and laymen should condemu it, and petition our legislators to enact laws against this horrible sin in the sight of God.

And this Association, as a body, condemn this awful evil that is among us save for the one cause of adultery. And that this Association, composed of Baptist Churches, condemn it publicly and privately. Let there be no divorces granted save for the one cause that our Lord specified—adultery.
