

SUNDAY SERVICES.

9:30 a. m.—Sunday-school mass-meeting, conducted by A. O. Edwards. Addressed by H. R. Lucas, H. G. Thomasson and A. O. Edwards. 11 a. m., the hour for the missionary sermon, Eld. C. F. J. Tate preached in the grove an eloquent, persuasive sermon, text, John 12: 21, after which a collection was taken for associational missions, amounting to \$18. Dismissed for dinner, which was soon served in abundance.

At 2:30 p. m. Eld. B. F. Milam preached, in the house, an excellent sermon; text, Matt. 28: 20. At the same hour Eld. D. E. Gambrell preached a fine sermon in the grove; text, Rom. 8: 14. 7:30 p. m., Eld. A. C. Miller, associational missionary, preached a good sermon from Acts 16: 30. Thus ended a delightful sabbath, spent in the service of the Lord.

Then a collection for ministerial education was taken amounting to \$7.65 cash, and \$14 in pledges.

Report on Associational Missions was read. discussed by A. A. Collins, W. H. Cash, A. C. Miller, D, E. Gambrell, pending the discussion our missionary (A. C. Miller) read his report as follows:

Mission-work done by A. C. Miller, missionary, Friendship Baptist Association, for the year ending Sept. 18, 1897. (Half time.)

Days labored, 166; miles traveled, 1620; families visited, 379; sermons preached, 103; addresses 6; members received, 19; baptisms administered, 13; (2 approved for baptism); regenerations confessed, 24; prayer meetings, 40; points reached monthly. 3; meetings held, 3; Sunday-schools organized. 1; books sold and donated, 17; tracks sold and donated (pages) 425.

Report on Nominations was read and adopted. See report K.

On motion the report on Nominations was reconsidered and Bro. E. V.Hellums was substituted on the Board for Bro. J. L. Hunter, and the same was adopted.

REPORT E.

We, your Committee on Education, report as follows: The great ques-

tion of the day is that of education. All reforms of whatever nature are produced through it. . It is the great safe-guard of liberty, civil or religious. We speak of education in its triform sense-physical, intellectual and moral. Physical, that we may have the necessary powers to execute the desires of mind and heart; intellectual, that we may be enabled to form intelligent ideas concerning the question of life; moral, that we may properly direct the powers attained by physical and intellectual training. We therefore recommend that Baptists of Friendship Association patronize our State institutions -Ouachita, Central and Mountain Home Colleges. Realizing the power that Ouachita College has already proved herself to be in securing for us an educated ministry, of which we are so greatly in need, we earnestly recommend it to all young men who intend studying for the ministry. Again, we recommend that a collection of cash and pledges be taken to help defray the expenses of the struggling young ministers, and that a secretary of ministerial education be elected, whose duty it shall be to take collections in all the churches of the association; and that he be allowed to defray necessary expenses, five per cent. of all moneys collected.

REPORT F.

Your Committee on Associational Missions would report as follows: There is great destitution in the bounds of our territory; there are centers of influence utterly destitute of Baptist preaching; there are sparsely settled communities asking for preaching; and then there are "organized churches that have either been neglected, or have neglected themselves, and therefore need encouragement and help. Brethren, to the Baptists was committed the preaching of a whole gospel; by the Baptists must be preached a whole gospel. Will we deny ourselves, take the our cross and follow Jesus, or will we refrain? Your committee would recommend that the association continue a missionary on the field for, at least, half time, and as much more as it can sustain. Seed have already been sown that should be reaped. REPORT G.

It can no longer be said that the doors of the nations are closed against the Gospel. God, in his providence, has opened one door after another, until now all nations are open to receive the missionary. The responsibility rests upon us to enter the fields that are white to the harvest. We have great reason to be encouraged because of the successes that have attended our efforts. Many souls have been led to Christ, while thousands are listening attentively to the voice of God calling them through the efforts of our foreign missionaries. The Baptists of the South now have missionaries in China, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Mexico and Japan. The number of workers in the different foreign fields are very few compared with the many thousand souls who are perishing for the bread of life. Our board, who have the work in hand, report that the receipts have not been sufficient to meet the demands. Men and women are ready to go, but the board is not able to send them We recommend that the pastors preach at least two sermons a year on foreign missions, and take collections for the same; and that the Foreign Mission Journal be taken and read by us. REPORT I.

We, your Committee on Sunday-schools, would respectfully submit the following report: We find that within the bounds of our association we have seventeen Sunday-schools, with a total of 107 officers and teachers, and with a total of 1,028 scholars; that two churches have two schools each, namely, Pine Bluff and Pleasant Ridge; that the cost of literature alone amounts to \$150.27; that twelve churches have no Sunday-schools, viz: Spring Hill Nos. 1 and 2, Pleasant Springs, Pleasant Home, Friendship, New Hope, Salem, Macedonia, Center, Holly Springs, Florence and Bethel No. 2. We find that läst year we had fourteen Sunday-schools reported; this year we have seventeen, a gain of three schools. We believe that there should be a Sunday-school in each church, and recommend that the brethren of each church make an effort to organize and sustain one; and that if we put forth the same effort in the work that we do in our own personal affairs, that when this body meets one year from today we would be able to report a Sunday-school in every church.

Gonstitution.

1. This confederation of churches shall be known and called by the name of "Friendship Regular Baptist Association."

2. The object of this association shall be to promote the glory of God on earth, by the preaching of the gospel of his Son Jesus Christ our Savior; the universal spread of the Bible, the word of the true and living God, and by other appropriate means.

3. The association shall consist of messengers from the churches now forming this union, and such other Baptist churches as may hereafter be received as constituent members thereof.

4. Every church shall be entitled to three representatives without regard to the numbers of their members respectively; and to an additional one for every fifty members exceeding fifty, provided that no church shall ever be entitled to more than five. A certificate of appointment or letter from their respective churches shall be evidence that they have been so delegated.

5. The officers of this body shall be a moderator and clerk, who shall be ex-officio treasurer, who shall be elected annually by ballot by a majority of the members present, immediately after the names of the delegates are enrolled; which officers shall perform all the duties, usually devolving on such officers, and continue to exercise their respective functions until they shall be superceded by a subsequent election.

6. The clerk shall preserve a regular record of the association and have it present at the meeting of the body; and when he vacates the office, deliver the same, with all other books and papers relative to said office, to his successor.

7. The association shall regard the churches as independent bodies, in all their internal affairs, and exercise no ecclesiastical jurisdiction or claim any legislative or judicial prerogative over them. Nevertheless, the association may exercise authority over its own members, the representatives of the churches and have power to withdraw from, and disown all churches which may depart from the gospel as understood and held by this body, by becoming either hetrodox in faith, or disorderly in practice; and should, therefore, regard all the churches united in the association with a vigilent eye for good; and may give, at its own discretion and in its own way, advice or information when sought, to any church connected with it.

8. The association shall hold annual session to convene on Saturday before the third Sunday in September in each year, and not adjourn until all of the business shall have been regularly finished, except circumstances imperiously demand. The place of meeting shall be determined at each previous session and published in the minutes.

9. Baptist churches not before united in the association, or those dismissed from other associations, may be admitted as members into this union on application by a written petition or letter, presented by one or more messengers duly appointed by such church or cnurches. Provided, that they give satisfactory evidence that they are orthordox in faith and correct in the practice.

10. Every minister of the gospel (either ordained or licentiate) whose membership is in, or who may be a pastor of, any church belonging to this body, shall be ex-officio a member of the association with the privilege of offering resolutions and speaking, but not voting unless especially delegated by some church.

11. When in session, the association shall be governed by such rules of decorum as it may adopt for itself.

12. It shall be the duty of the churches, respectively, annually to report to the association their general condition, the number of members in fellowship, the number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, ex-communicated, restored, dead, amount paid pastor in cash value during the year, and the names and postoffice address of all ministers, whether ordained or licensed, designating each, and also the name and address of their clerks. They shall also report on any special matters required, and send up such contributions as they may willingly contribute to aid the body, to disseminate more widely the truth as contained in the Holy Scriptures, and the establishment of the Redeemer's kingdom on the earth.

13. The neglect or failure of a church to be represented by a messenger or messengers in the association for three consecutive years, shall be cause to withdraw from such churches at the discretion of the association.

14. This association may correspond by letter and messengers with any other religious body of the same faith and order.

15. A board consisting of five members, any three of whom to constitute a quorum, shall be elected at each annual meeting, whose duty it shall be to devise means to carry forward the benevolent objects of the association, and the officers of this board shall be ex-officio officers of the association.

16. The minutes of the association shall be publicly read and corrected if necessary, and then signed by the moderator and clerk before the association adjourns.

17. Any amendment may be made to this constitution at any meeting of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present; provided the same shall have been published in the minutes of the preceding year.
