PROCEEDINGS.

Thursday Evening, October 17, 1910.

The thirty-sixth annual session of the Grand Prairie Baptist Association met this day with the Pleasant Ridge church and was called to order at 7:30 p. m., with Moderator, R. H. Parker, presiding. Song, "Nearer My God to Thee." Prayer by Rev. T. V. Shoemaker. Song, "Redeemed." Prayer by Rev. A. T. Coleman. Rev. W. J. Johnson selected to preach the Introductory Sermon, and Rev. J. H. Bracewell who was selected as alternate, being absent, Rev. H. Y. Morris of Beebe was chosen by Association to preach the Introductory sermon, who, after reading 2nd chapter 1st Corinthians, preached a very strong sermon from text: "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation.?" Prayer by Rev. L. H. Dodson.

Moved and carried that on petition from Macedonia Baptist church the same be received into full membership of the Association with Bro. Gus Holt enrolled as messenger and welcomed into the Association by the Moderator.

Moved that where no specifications are made by churches in their letters as to division of amount sent up for minutes and Clerk's fee, that one-third amount be used as Clerk's hire and two-thirds for printing minutes, and that if one-third amount is not sufficient for clerk's hire that warrant be drawn on Treasurer to make the amount \$10.00. Collection taken up for debt due Bro. H. Y. Morris as Missionary, amounting to \$19.60 and paid to him.

Shoemaker read a selection of scripture and preached an inspiring sermon from 7th verse, 2nd chapter of Luke, after which prayer was offered by Rev. J. E. Bogard.

Sunday Schools

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools submit the following report:

Of the thirty-three churches in this Association only eleven report a Sunday School; while last year there were seventeen Sunday Schools reported. However of the churches not represented at this Association there are six which last year reported a Sunday School, and if they still have Sunday Schools there are now seventeen out of our thirty-three churches which are enlisted in this work. These Sunday Schools report 627 members, 45 teachers and 25 conversions. This means that less than 33½ per cent of our members are in the Sunday School, and yet more than one-half of this year's baptisms come from the Sunday School. We recommend that those churches having no Sunday Schools organize one at once and that every member of the church not only soin the Sunday School, but do what they can to advance its interests.

Report on Temperance.

The temperance question with us is understood to be the question of our attitude toward the liquor traffic. The saloon is evil, only evil and that continually. Therefore we cannot show any spirit of friendliness or compromise or even indifference toward it and be blameless. Recognizing the liquor traffic as an instrument of God's greatest enemy and man's most deadly foe, we hereby pledge ourselves to an uncompromizing effort against it in all of its forms.—
To this end we recommend that it is our duty first, to educate public sentiment on the subject as a necessary means to this end. Second, that we advocate and support all legislation that looks to the complete suppression of the liquor traffic in our state and nation.

Report of Orphans' Home.

Your committee to report on Orphan's Home find some work done and renorted and add a word of exhortation.

At last year's Association meeting fourteen churches made pledges to one or both of the Orphans' Homes, amounting in all to \$35. Only three of these churches have reported collections for this cause; but these three and three others together have paid \$167.16, more than four times the total amount pledged.

It is with pleasure and great commendation that we note the above reports. But we regret that eleven of those which pledged have reported nothing done. We would remind the brethren of the combined duty and privilege we have toward these homes. In God's word we are commanded "to show mercy and help the needy." We all appreciate this, but we should rejoice with thanksgiving that our demonination has taken hold of this work of mercy and that it is providing, not only for the physical needs of the fatherless and motherless, but is seeking to make for them an ideal christain home, where God's word is taught and where minds and hearts and hands are trained for the service of God and humanity. It is a joyous privilege to have a part in so noble a work, and we trust that each delinquent pledge shall be made good in the near future and that each church will lay itself out for a more noble part in it by making a generous offering to one or both of the homes.

CONSTITUTION.

- Article 1. This body shall be known by the name of the Grand Prairie Baptist Association, and composed of members chosen by the different churches in the union, who, on producing letters, shall be entitled to seats; also the ordained ministers in good standing, retiring moderator and all committees appointed at one session to report the next.
- Art. 2. The motto of this Association shall be: "The truth in its purity, preached in every section of our bounds."
- Art. 3. The letters from the churches must state the number of members baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded, the name and postoffice of pastor and clerk.
- Art. 4. The members thus chosen and convened, shall have no power to infringe on any of the rights of the churches, but may act as an advisory counted for the common good of all the churches and advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom, and have power to exclude any church from her fellowship which may depart from the gospel of Christ, either in faith or practice.
- Art. 5. Every church composing this Association shall be entitled to three delegates.
- Art. 6. Should any church fail to represent herself for two consecutive years, she may be dropped from the list of churches, should a satisfactory reamon not be given.
- Art. 7. New church may be admitted into this body who petition by letter and delegates, if found to be sound in faith and in good order, the reception to be manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messengers.
- Art. 8. This Association shall annually elect a moderator from among themselves whose duty it shall be to see that the Rules of Decorum are observ-

ed, and take the voice of the Association on all questions properly brought before it; also, a vice Moderator, and a Clerk, whose duty it shall be to keep a correct record of all the business of the Association; also, a treasurer, to receive and disburse the funds sent up to the Association, as directed by the body, or churches sending the same

- Art. 9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to retain on the Minutes the names of all churches admitted to membership, until such are dropped by action of the Association; and in cases of non representation, it shall be his duty to write: "Not represented" in the proper place opposite their names in the statistical table.
- Art. 10. This Association shall in all cases be governed by a majority of the members present, except in the reception and dismission of a church, which shall be unanimous.
- Art. 11. This Association may correspond with other Associations and Conventions as may be agreed upon while in session.
- Art. 12. It shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a minister to preach an Introductory sermon, with an alternate; also one, with an alternate to preach a Missionary sermon at each succeeding session; and to fix the time and place for the next meeting of the body.
- Art. 13. The Moderator shall appoint, at each annual session, an Executive board, consisting of at least one member from each church whose duty it shall be to elect and employ a Missionary or Missionaries, in our bounds; to solicit and collect money, or issue orders on the Treasurer of the Association to pay the same, which orders the Treasurer is hereby authorized to pay out of any money that he may have for this purpose; also to change, during vacation, the time or place, or both, for next meeting of the Association, whenever in the providence of God, it may be necessary. The officers of the Association shall be considered members of the board.
- Art. 14. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time, by a two-third vote of the members present, except that clause in the fourth article which prohibits interference with the internal rights of the churches; which shall forever remain in tact.
 - Art. 15. The Minutes shall be signed by the Moderator and clerk.

RULES OF DECORUM.

- Art. 1. The Association shall be opened by singing and prayer.
- Art. 2. The Moderator, vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall be elected by ballot by the members present.
 - Art. 3. The Moderator shall be considered the judge of order, but any

member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the body.

- Art. 4. The moderator shall be entitled to the privilege of speaking as other members, but not to vote, unless it is a tie.
- Art. 5. All questions shall be introduced by motion, and if seconded, shall be open for discussion, unless withdrawn by the mover or his second. When a subject has been discussed a reasonable time, the Moderator shall, when the question is called for, proceed to take it by calling for the yeas and nays, and if a call for a division is made, he shall call for a standing vote.
- Art. 6. Any member wishing to speak, shall rise and address the Moderator. Only one shall speak at the same time, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject or make personal reflections.
- Art. 7. No person shall speak more than once upon any subject, until all who wish to speak have had an opportunity, nor more than twice without permission.
- Art. 8. Every subject introduced for discussion shall be decided before another is offered, unless it be laid over by motion, with the consent of the mover and the Association.
- Art. 9. The names of Messengers shall be called whenever the Association shall direct, and absentees marked. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.
- Art. 10. The appellation of 'brother' shall be used in addressing each other.
- Art. 11. Any member violating the rules, shall be subject to reproof by
- Art. 12. Amendments or alterations may be made to these rules when a majority may deem it necessary.
- Art. 13. Any case coming before the Association not provided for in these rules shall be governed by general parliamentary rules.
