PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONCORD ASSOCIATION, 1904.

FIRST DAY.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 24.—The Association met with Branch Church at 10 o'clock a.m. Moderator, Elder J. F. O'Neal called the body to order. After reading 23rd Psalm, by the Moderator, and prayer by Elder A. L. Brown, J. W. Nobles, who had been previously appointed to preach the Introductory Sermon, being absent, Elder L. Quinn was elected to, and preached the Introductory Sermon, from Acts 2—42. At close of sermon, prayer by Elder H. L. Been.

Elders J. K. Whelchel, H. L. Been and Nathan Keller

were appointed as Reading Clerks.

Adjourned to meet at 1:30 p.m. 1:30 p.m., met persuant to adjournment and was called to order by Moderator. Prayer by Elder P. C. Mays. Roll was called.

Treasurer.

Your committee on Sunday Schools would respectfully

submit the following:

We believe the Sabbath School is the church teaching faithfully the word of God. The Bible says more of teaching the word of God than it does of preaching. Jesus taught, in the Synagogue, as well as preached. No church can comply with the commission and be without a Sunday School. God commands his people to search the scriptures and the Sunday School is the only service of the church adapted to this purpose. The usefulness of the Sunday School is attested by the fact that a large proportion of those who join the church come through the Sunday Schools. Therefore the obligation of every church to maintain a Sunday School is apparent, as well as the duty of every man to give his support to the Sunday School

his personal presence, if possible, at least his moral and financial support. Therefore, we recommend that each church in this Association organize and maintain a Baptist Sunday School, and that every member of every Baptist Church lend his support to it. We also recommend that our Baptist brethren organize a Sunday School in every destitute place that they may find possible and practicable.

In addition to the above, we find that the Sunday School Board is doing a great work in the state, through the work of Bro. Beauchamp and other noble brethren, who are placing in the hands of our people good and wholesome literature, as well as organizing Sunday Schools everywhere they go. We ask for them the prayers and finan-

cial support of every Baptist.

building of the home.

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. This Association shall be known as Concord Associa-

Art. II. It shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less, shall be entitled to three Messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional Messenger.

Art. III. The officers shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session, and shall con-

tinue in office until their successors are chosen.

Art. IV. Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body according to parliamentary usage.

Sec. 2. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the Minutes, keep a regular file of the printed Minutes of the body and deliver the same to his successor in office.

Sec. 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, or its Executive Committee, and render an account of the

same to the annual session of this body.

Art. V. The objects of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the Churches, to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation, and especially to cultivate the piety of the Churches, and to aid in this last object, several minutes of each session shall be spent in devotional exercises.

Art. VI. Sec. 1. This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations of the Churches, but will act as advisory

council whenever it shall be necessary.

Sec. 2. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the Messengers from the Churches, and will withdraw from and disown all Churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

Art. VII. Newly organized Churches, or Churches dismissed from other Associations, may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and Messenger at our annual meeting, and subscribing by their Messenger to the abstract of principles herewith published.

Art. VIII. Churches may be dismissed from the Association upon application at the annual meeting for the purpose of joining a new Association, but any Church departing from us without being regu-

larly dismissed, shall be regarded as disorderly.

Art. IX. Sec. 1. There shall be an Executive Committee, consisting of the officers of the body with five members chosen by the Association at each annual meeting. The duty of this committee shall be to superintend the Missionary operations of the Association, represent it in all matters requiring their attention when the Association is not in session, and take such other steps as may be to the interest of the cause of Christ. The committee shall report annually at each meeting of the Association. Three members of said committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The regular meeting of said committee shall be on Saturday before each fifth Sunday.

Sec. 2. The regular committees of this Association shall be as follows: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Associational Missions, Sunday Schools, Education, Ministerial Support, Prohibition, Religious Literature, Digest of Letters, Nominations, Queries, Finance, Order

of Business, Woman's Work, Orphan's Home.

Art. X. It shall the privilege of the Association through its Executive Committee, in addition to the power already granted, to conduct Missionary operations within its limits, and for this purpose to choose a Missionary or Missionaries as means may allow, and delegate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through its Treasurer out of any funds in its hands. except the money sent for publishing Minutes of every annual meeting.

Art. XI. The annual meeting of the Association shall embrace the Lord's Day and shall begin at 10 o'clock a. m., on Saturday before the fourth Lord's Day in Sertember, at which time the Introductory Sermon shall be preached. On each succeeding day the Association

shall adjourn at 11 o'clock for preaching.

Art. XII. This Constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Article VI. Section 3, at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the members who are in attendance.

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION.

Art. XIII. 1st. No person shall serve as Moderator of this body more than two terms in succession. Adopted in 1882.

2nd. The Constitution shall be published annually in the Min-

utes of this Association. Adopted in 1893.

3rd. The man to preach the Missionary Sermon shall be elected

by the body the preceding year. Adopted in 1904.

4th. Each Church is expected to send to each annual meeting of the Association, by the hands of its Messenger, a sum of money to be used for printing Minutes. Adopted in 1895.

5th. All moneys collected by the Association during its several

sessions shall be under the control of this Association.

6th. Strike out Committee on State Missions. Adopted in 1903.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe there is one and only one, true and living God Jehovak, and that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

2 We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Words of God, constituting the only all-sufficient standard of

Faith, Doctrine, Discipline and Pratice.

- 3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of the eternal love by which God hath, according to His infinite wisdom, chosen His people in Christ before the world was, and has predestinated them unto the adoption of children, through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth, and doth keep them by His power through Faith unto Salvation.
- 4. We believe that man was created holy, but by willful violation of the law of his maker, he fell into a state of sinfulness, and brought death upon his race, who being by natural desent in the unholy image of Adam, are children of wrath by nature, and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace through faith in

Jesus Christ, and no other way.

6. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth and the condition thereof are repentence and faith, the evidence thereof love to the brethren.

7. We believe that such only are believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life, and they are kept by the power of God through

Faith unto Salvation.

8. We believe the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God.

9. A Christian Church is a congregation of immersed believers who meet statedly and have covenanted together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges of the New Testament appertaining to the Church of Jesus Christ.

10. The only proper officers of Christian Churches are Bishops,

or Pastors and Deacons

11. Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit by a regularly ordained Baptist minister in good order.

12. The Lord's Supper is a positive and commemorative ordinance of Jesus Christ, to be observed in the Church as such in remem-

brance of Christ, and to show forth His death till He comes.

I3. The first day of the week is the Lord's Day and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor and all worldly business, and devoted to religious duties.

14 We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of

the wicked will be eternal

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. An introductory sermon shall be preached by a minister chosen by ballot at the preceding Association. In case of absence or failure the sermon to be preached by an alternate chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother shall also be chosen to deliver a temperance address.

3. A committee of arrangements, consisting of five members, besides the Moderator and Clerk, who shall be members ex-officio, shall be appointed by the Moderator to arrange and report the "Order of

Business."

4. Visiting brethren who are in good standing may be invited to

seats but not to vote.

5. A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may make an appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

6. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, address

the Moderator, and upon obtaining leave, shall proceed.

- 7 No member shall be interrupted while speaking unless he depart from the subject or use words of personal reflection and then by the Moderator.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association by year and nays or otherwise.

9. A member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the

Moderator.

10. No member shall speak more than twice on one subject with-

out leave from the Moderator.

11. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in the Association by the members in their addresses one to the other. Titles that are unknown to the Scriptures, such as "Rev.", "Parson" and the like, shall not be employed nor appear upon the Minutes.

12. The names of members shall be called as often as the Associa-

tion may direct.

13. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speaking as any other member, provided he appoints another to his seat during the time, but shall not yote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.

14. Any person violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have

been made.

15. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this Association by a majority vote of the members present.
