

### MINUTES.

THE SPRING RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION met in its Forty-Eighth Annual Meeting with Smithville Church, Saturday, September 23, 1916. Bro. W. A. Watkins read the 21st chapter of Revelations. Prayer by Bro. J. L. Brown.

Bro. W. A. Watkins preached the introductory sermon; Sublect, "The Church the Lord's Wife".

Adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock, P. M.

2 P. M.—After reading and prayer by Bro. S. Stratton, the moderator being absent, the clerk called the body in session and organized by electing Bro. J. A. Justus temporary moderator. Bros. G. G. Dent and John Abee were appointed reading clerks, and the following churches were represented by letter or messinger:

Motion and second carried to go into the selection of a place to hold the next meeting, to elect some one to preach the introductory sermon, and some one to write the circuler letter. Lebanon was selected as the place to hold the meeting, Bro. George Helm to preach the sermon and Bro. John Abee to write the circular letter. Bros. R. B. Penn, S. H. Clements and H. McLeod were appointed committee on Sunday Schools, and Bros. J. H. Justus, I. N. Sparks and O. F. Rider were appointed on finance committee.

The committee on divine service reported that Bro. J. A. Smith preach at 7:30, and Dr. N. R. Townsend preach at 11 A. M., Sunday.

Adjourned to 7:30 P. M.

7:30 P. M.—Bro. J. A. Smith preached a fine sermon from the 20th verse of the 12th chapter of Matthew. A collection was taken for the Texarkana Orphan's Home which amounted to \$7.60.

Adjourned to meet at 10 A. M., Sunday.

Sunday, 10 A. M.—Prayer by Bro. Wm Raney. The committee on Sunday School made its report which, after being dlacussed, was adopted. (See appendix I.)

Dr. N. R. Townsend did not arrive in time to preach at 11 o'clock, and Bro. W. R. McEwin preached at the Baptist Church. Bro. McEwin read the 2nd chapter of Daniel, and preached a good sermon from the 14th verse of the 5th chapter of Matt.— Subject: "Baptist Opportunities". Bro. J. L. Brown preached at the Methodist Church at the same hour, to a large and attentive congregation, and is said to have preached a splendid Bermon. In the afternoon Dr. N. R. Townsend preached a very feeling, and highly appreciated sermon from Bro. A. D. Taylor's porch to a yard full of attentive hearers.

7:30 P. M.—Dr. N. R. Townsend preached to a large congregation on the subject of "Jonah and the Whale". The report of the committee on prohibition was read and adopted, (See appendix II.) A collection was taken for state missions, which amounted to \$12.71.

Adjourned to meet at 8 A. M., Monday.

8 A..M. Monday—The body was called to order by the modtrator and after singing and prayer, proceeded to the transmisloe of businsss. The fo'lowing committees made their reports which were adopted: State of Churches, (see appendix IH.), Destitution, (see appendix IV.), Associational Missions, (see appendix V.), State Missions, (see appendix VI.), Foreign Mistons, (see appendix VII.), Education. (see appendix VIII.), Haptist Literature, (see appendix IX.) and Orphans' Home, (see appendix X.)

The following messengers were appointed to attend the following Associations: Rocky Bayou—Bro. Geo. Helm, Current River—Bro. J. A. Justus, State Line—Bro. J. D. Butler, Little Red River—Bro. J. E. Moore, Jonesboro—Bro. J. J. Bellamy, Independence—Bro. J. T. Helm, Big Creek—Bro. John Abee, Macedonia—Bros. S. Stratton, J. D. Butler and Sister Dorn White. The finance committee made its report, which was adopted, (see appendix XI.) Committee on ministerial directory made its report, (see appendix XII.) The committee on the dead reported, (see appendix XII.)

### RESOLUTIONS.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That we tender our heartfelt thanks to the people of Smithville and surrounding community for their kindness and hospitality, and that we tender our thanks to the moderator and clerk for their kindness and patience during the session and that the clerk have 400 copies of the minutes printed.

After singing "God be with you till we meet again", adjourned to meet with Labanon church on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in September, 1917. Thus ended one of the most harmonious sessions we have had in several years.

### APPENDIX.

### (I.)

We, your committee on Sunday-schools, beg leave to submit the following report: We believe that it is our duty to teach the word of God, and in order to do this we recommend that each church organize and maintain a Sunday-school. We recommend that they use the Bible for their guide, and use any sound Baptist literature, such as Landmark Literature.

### (II.)

We, your committee on temperance, beg leave to submit the following report: We believe the liquor traffic to be the most nefarious and injurious business that the American people have to deal with; and we note with great satisfaction the growing sentiment in favor of, not local option, but, state and nationwide prohibition.

Statistics show that the results of the State Prohibition Law, as enacted by our last legislature, has proven entirely satlafactory to all the people of the state except the liquorites who are now seeking the repeal of, not only the state-wide prohibition law, but all the laws passed against this evil within the last forty years, by what is known as the Ben Griffin Act No. 2.

We wish to call your attention to the fact that every voter in the state will be called upon to vote for or against this act in the coming November election, and we urge that the Baptist of the state, and indeed every one who is opposed to this traffic, note and work against Act No. 2.

### (V.)

We, your committee on associational missions, beg leave to submit the following thoughts for your consideration:

We understand from the reading of the holy scriptures that Jesus Christ our Lord, when he organized the church, commisioned it to preach the gospel to all the world. We also recommend that each and every church composing Spring River A sociation adopt the instructions of our Lord Jesus Christ in lay ing by yourselves in store on the first day of the week.

We recommend that an associational mission committee of five be elected to take up the associational mission work with the churches and do such mission work as in their wisdom seems best.

### (VI.)

We, your committee on state missions, submit the following State missions to us means missions in Arkansas.
