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ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. Thirty minutes to devotional exercises.

2. After a recess of about fifteen minutes, introductory sermon.

3. After the usual intermission, call the body to order.

4. After singing and prayer, call for letters from churches.

5. After reading the letters and enrolling the messengers, go into the election of officers and form a permanent organization.

6. Call for petitionary letters.

7. Invite visiting brethren to seats in the body.

- 8. Appoint Committee on Divine Services.
- 9. Elect Mission Board.

10. Appoint the usual committees, and others at the discretion of the body.

11. Grant letters of dismission, if any are called for.

12. Call for correspondence.

13. Appoint messengers to other bodies.

14. Reports of usual committees, at will.

15. Miscellaneous business.

16. Appoint time and place of holding the next session.

17. Adjourn to time and place of holding next session of the body. D. D. SWINDALL.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Dardanelle Baptist Association.

Art. 2. It shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less, shall be entitled to three messengers; and churches with more than one hundred members shall be entitled to one messenger for each succeeding hundred.

Art. 3. The officers shall be: A Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ball of unless ordered by a two-thirds vote, at each annual session, and shall continue in office till their successors are chosen.

Art. 4. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body according to parliamentary usage. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of printed minutes of every session of this body, and deliver over the same to his successor in office. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the association, holding them subject to the order of the body.

Art. 5. The objects of the association shall be: 1. To promote

fellowship among the churches, secure unanimity of faith, and cultivate the piety of its members. 2. To labor for domestic and foreign missions and encourage the circulation and reading of Baptist literature. 3. An especial object shall be to encourage and provide assistance for the rising ministry, and for this purpose to establish an institution of learning in our midst as soon as practicable.

Art. 6. This body shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations of the churches, but will act as an advisory council whenever it may be necessary. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the messengers from the churches, and will withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

Art. 7. Newly organized churches, or churches dismissed from other associations, may be admitted into this body upon petitioning by letter and messengers at our annual meeting, and by their messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published.

Art. 8. Churches may be dismissed from this association upon application at an annual meeting, for the purpose of forming a new association; but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed shall be regarded as disorderly.

Art. 9. A quorum to do business in this association shall consist of at least two-thirds of the messengers who may assemble at its session.

Art. 10. This association shall adjourn each day during its session for divine services.

Art. 11. This constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of this association by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members who are in attendance.

CORLEY, LOGAN COUNTY, ARK., Sept. 18, 1896.

Dardanelle Baptist Association met with Antioch church in its forty-second annual session, on Saturday, Sept. 18, 1896, at 10 a. m. The Moderator read the 116th division of the Psalms, and led in the usual devotional exercises, after which the body was called to order.

Elders J. F. Brewer, appointee to preach the introductory sermon and T. P. Manning, alternate, were absent. On motion Elder A. H. Autry was appointed to preach, which he did, taking Exodus XIV:15 for a text. Prayer by M. P. Blair. The body adjourned until 2:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2:30 p.m. the association reassembled, and was led in prayer by the Moderator. Called for letters from churches. Brethren M. P. Blair, F. P. Turner and Prof. Jas. Cowger read them, and the names of their messengers were enrolled.

The pastor and deacons of the Antioch church, together with Brethren J. C. Shepherd and J. G., Kirkpatrick, were appointed a Committee on Divine Services.

The body went into permanent organization.

A motion to make nominations was made by F. P. Turner and carried.

Motion was made and carried that the persons receiving the highest number of votes be declared elected.

Eld. J. S. Gray was elected Moderator and Bro. R. E. Warren Clerk and Treasurer.

The following resolution offered by A. H. Autry was passed:

Resolved, That we meet at 8:30 a. m., adjourn at 12; meet at 2 p. m., adjourn at 5 p. m.; meet at 7:30 p. m., adjourn at will.

The following resolution, offered by A. H. Autry, was passed unanimously:

Resolved, That we dissent from the views of church history as taught by Prof. Whitsitt, of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, wherein he teaches that the first Baptist church was organized in 1610, and that Baptists first adopted immersion in 1641, A. D.

And we heartily recommend that the trustees of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary ask for his resignation as president.

The committee of Divine Services announced that Eld. F. P. Turner would preach at 7:30 p. 'm.

EVENING SUSSION.

Association met at 7:30 p.m.

After prayer by Eld. John Young, Eld. F. P. Turner preached from Matthew, XVIII, 28, "Pay me that thou owest."

After services the regular order of business was taken up.

Letter from church at Paris read and Messenger seated.

Petitionary letters were called for, and the following churches presented letters which were read. Chalybeate Springs, Macedonia No. 2, Bethlehem No. 2, and Little Star. Upon motion the letters were received and the messengers seated. A petitionary letter was presented by Zion Light church, which was read. It appearing that S. D. Ferrin, one of the Messengers and an ordained minister of the gospel, had voted, worked and used his influence for whiskey license in the late county election, the letter, upon motion, was referred to the following committee appointed by the Moderator: Elds. J. W. Richardson, M. P. Blair and W. N. Womack. Committee was ordered to investigate and report on Monday.

The Messengers from the churche's which were received now

came forward and the hand of fellowship was extended by the Moderator.

Eld. Nathan Marshall was seated as a visiting brother from the church at Ft. Smith, Concord Association.

Adjourned until Monday, 8:30 a. m.

SUNDAY.

Elder W. E. Logan conducted prayer-meeting by reading the 17th chapter of Matthew, followed by Elder A. H. Autry, who commented on said chapter.

During the intermission, the Committee of Divine Services announced that Elder A. H. Autry would preach at the school-house near by at 11 a. m.

Temperance.-We your committee offer the following report which was adopted by the last Baptist State Convention:

RESOLVED, First. That we will give our influence in our private circles and in our churches against the use of all alcoholic beverages

Second. We believe that it is the duty of all Christians to heartily co-operate in and with the civil authorities in enacting laws to prevent the sale and use of all intoxicating drinks.

Third. That we hold the Bible to be a book that teaches that God's children should not indulge in the use or sale of intoxicating drinks, nor should they sign petitions for the sale of the same.

Fourth. That it is the duty of all ministers of Christ, not only to abstain from the use of alcoholic beverages but to lift up their voices against it in the pulpit and elsewhere, and that we urge our churches throughout Dardanelle Association, to continue in membership no person who publicly advocates the license of drinking saloons, or invests money in the saloon business, or who suffers his property to be used for it in any way.

Fifth. That this Association will not seat any church in this body that is knowingly guilty of retaining a pastor that gives his influence or votes for the sale of liquors. Respectfully submitted.
