MINUTES.

622

HE SPRING RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION met in its fiftieth annual session with Pleasant Grove Church, Annieville, Lawrence County, Ark., September 21, 1918. The moderator read a part of the 14th chapter of Revelations and after prayer preached a good sermon from the 125th Psalms, Theme, "The Lost Bible".

At 2 P. M. the moderator called the body to order and after prayer by Bro. Butler, appointed Bros. J. J. Bellamy and G. G. Dent reading clerks, and called for letters from the Churches, and the following answered by letter or messenger.

The Association next proceeded to elect officers for the ensuing year which resulted in the election of Eld. S. Stratton moderator and A. V. Bellamy clerk.

On call for visiting members Bro. J. H. Box and Sister Box, of Pleasant Hill Church, and Sisters Lucy Stoner and Ella Reed, from Centerville Church responded.

Committee on Divine Service was appointed, and reported that Bro. Berry Wilson would preach at 7:30 P. M.

Motion and second that Bro. R. E. Penn read the circular

letter written by him. The letter was read and adopted.

On motion the rules were suspended and the Association selected Pleasant Hill as the next meeting place; also, selected Eld. W. A. Watkins to preach the introductory sermon and Bro. J. E. Moore to write the circular letter, after which the moderator appointed the following committees:

On motion a recess was taken 'til 7:30 P. M.

(NIGHT SESSION.)

Meeting was called together by singing, and after prayer by Bro. Weaver, Bro. Berry Wilson preached a fine sermon from John xv.14. (Subject, Love One Another), after which the meeting adjourned 'tîl 9:30 A. M., Sunday.

SUNDAY.

The Association convened at 9:30 Å. M. Sunday, and after song service and prayer the Committee on Sunday School made its report, which after being discussed by Bros. J. W. Weaver, S. Clements, G. W. Helm and W. R. McEwin, was adopted, (see appendix) after which the committees names were announced, the names of which will be found at the close of their respect-report. (see appendix).

At 11 o'clock Bro. Christenberry preached a good sermon from Rev. xxII. 13—"I Am Alpha and Omega, The Beginning and the End", after which a collection was taken for the Orohans' Home which amounted to \$15.35. Intermission was taken 'tll 2 P. M.

The Association convened at 2:30, by singing "Amazing Grace" and prayer by Bro. Stratton, after which Bro. McFwin preached a good sermon from 1st Peter iv. 10. (subject. Good Stewardship). The Camp Pastor Resolution was then read and adopted. Adjourned 'til 7:30 P. M.

At 7:30 Bro. Butler preached a fine sermon from Mark x.29-30, on the subject of giving.

MONDAY.

At 9:00 A. M. Monday, the Association was called together by singing and prayer, after which reports from the following committees were adopted: (See appendix.)

Committee on Prohibition.

Committee on Orphans home—report was discussed by Bros. J. T. Helms, R. E. Penn, S. M. Prince, J. J. Bellamy and R. B. Penn, and was adopted as amended.

Committee on Ministerial Directory.

Committee on State Missions—report discussed and adopted as amended.

Committee on State of Churches.

Committee on Destitution-report discussed and adopted.

Committee on Associational Missions—report discussed and amended to show amount collected this year.

Committee on Education.

Motion and second carried to Continue the committee selected last year as Associational Committee. Bro. Stratton resigned, and after being complimented for his faithful work and urged to remain on the committee, his resignation was accepted and Bro. R. E. Penn was selected in his place.

Committee on Finance made their report which was adopted.

The Associotion adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we, the Delegates of Spring River Baptist Association extend our heartfelt thanks to Pleasant Grove Church and the people of the community for their hospitality and kind treatment during our stay with them, and

Be it Resolved. That we thank the moderater and clerk for their faithful work during our meeting, and

That the clerk have 300 copies of the minutes printed, and that he have \$10 for his service.

After parting song, parting handshake, and prayer by Bro. Butler, the Association adjourned to meet with Pleasant-Hill Church, Saturday before the 4th Sunday in September, 1919.

Thus the fiftieth session of the Spring River Association passed into history. The preaching was good, the membership of Pleasant Grove Church was more than kind, and we feel that the cause of Christ was upheld and God was glorified.

Perhaps the most serious failing in this association has been lack of information and co-operation. Brethren, can we not resolve to improve along this line before our next meeting?

CIRCULAR LETTER.

To the Messengers of the Spring River Baptist Association:

In compliance with the wish of this association when convened one year ago I submit the following:-

My suject is "Christ's Imputed Righteousness to us". In discussing this subject I want to bring out a few thoughts in reference to the difference between our righteousness and the righteousness of Christ.

First, in Mat. v.20, Christ tells the people in his sermon on the Mount that except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharasees ye shall in no case enter into the Kingdom of Heaven. We find from the teaching of the bible that the Pharasees trusted in their works for salvation. Take the young man refered to in Mat. xix.20. This young man had almost reached perfection, he only lacked one thing, and the book tells us that this young man went away sorrowful. So if we depend on our own works for salvation we will fall far short of this young man, as we lack in many things Isaih tells us in Lxiv.6, "But we are all an unclean thing and all our righteousnes is as filthy rags". In Pauls letter to Titus III.6, "Not by works of righteousness which we have done but accord to his mercy He saved us, by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost". Now since the Pharasees were great believers in salvation by their works of righteousnes, and we can not exceed them in works; the question is, how can we exceed them in righteousness? Paul tells us in Rom. 1v.4-6, "Now, to him that worketh is reward not reckoned of grace but of debt to him that worketh not but believeth in Him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness; even as David also describeth blessedness of the man unto whom God imputed righteoutness without works." Who is the man that God imputed righteousness without works? Rom. 1v.5. "For what saith the scriptures, Abraham believed God and It was counted unto him for righteousness." That being true with Abraham so it is true with us to-day, that when we believe in or accept Christ as our savior then it is that Christ's righteousness is imputed or counted to us. In Rom. 1v.8. Paul says, blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sin. Sa

we see that the man that has the imputed righteousness of Christ the Lord will not count sin-against.

But, further, as to how we obtain His righteousness, in Rom. 1x.30 Paul says that the Gentiles which followed not after righteousness have attained to righteousness, even the righteousness which is of faith. And Paul goes on in the 31 and 32, verses of the same chapter and says "But Isreal which followed after the law of righteousness hath not attained to the law of righteousness wherefore because they sought it not by faith but as it were by the works of the law, for they stumbled at that stumblingstone". There are folks even now that are stumbling over the same stumblingstone that Isreal did, trying to attain to Christ's righteousness by works.

So we see how we can exceed the righteousness of the Pharasees since they only had their righteousness on good works, and the believer in Christ has Christ's righteousness imputed or counted to him. That being true, just as sure as Christ's righteousness never fails just that sure the man that has the imputed righteousness of Christ shall never fail. Because Paul says the Lord will not impute or count sin against the man that has His imputed righteousness.

With this assurance we should be inspired to greater activity along the line of good works because in Eph. 11.10 Paul says "For we are His workmanship created unto good works which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them".
