CHOONVENED IN ITS 22d ANNUAL SESSION WITH

Jenny Dind Church, Sebastian

COUNTY, ARK., SEPT. 24, 1892.

At 11 o'clock, a. m., Bro. P. C. Mays proceeded, according to previous appointment, to preach the introductory sermon, in which he showed the inconsistency of free or open communion. At close of the discourse Bro. G. T. Mathews offered prayer, and in the absence of the Moderator the Clerk convened the body and on motion Bro. P. C. Mays was elected Moderator pro tem; after which adjourned. Benediction by Father A. A. Spiller.

Evening Session.

Promptly at 2 o'clock the Association was convened by singing. Prayer by Bro. J. T. Watson. The Moderator then called the body to order and called for letters and appointed Brethren C. M. Howe, F. P. Turner and A. H. Autry reading clerks. Letters were read from the following churches, and Messengers' names enrolled: [See tabulated list of Churches.]

Ou motion Messengers having no letters were allowed to vote.

The Association then went into an election of officers, which resulted as follows: P. C. Mays, Moderator, C. C. Stalcup, Clerk; John H. Holland, Treasurer. The Moderator then appointed the Pastor and Deacons of Jeany Lind church with Brethren D. C. Yeargin and J. A. Finny Committee on Divine Service.

A call for petitionary letters. Corinth, Pilgrim's Rest, Fort Smith and Spring Hill churches responded. All admitted into fellowship, and the Moderator, on behalf of the Association, extended the hand of Associational fel-

low hip to the Messengers from said churches.

Committee on Divine Service report Bros. Bob Little and A. F. Roan to preach at Mt. Zion, A. J. Henson at Nebo, G. T. Mathews at Enterprise, and A. H. Autry at this place, J. W. Nobles and T. A. Rippy at Judson. Bro. W. H. Izzellywas, on motion, seated as Messenger from Mt. Zion church. On a call for Messengers from corresponding Associations Bro. A. F. Roan of Short Mountain Association of the Choctaw Nation accepted the invitation.

On motion Brethren G. H. Council, A. A. Spiller and G. T. Mathews' from Buckner Association and Prof. J. B. Williamson of Buckner College.

were admitted to seats.

On motion rules were suspended and Bro. Williamson was given opportunity to speak in behalf of Buckner College.

On motion the Association adjourned until 8 b'clock Monday morning.

Sunday.

At 11 o'clock, after Sunday School mass meeting the congregation assembled in the grove and W. P. Throgmorton by request, in lieu of Bro. A. J. Kinkaid who was absent, preached an able and interesting discourse on the subject of missions; showing the importance and progress of the work, after which a collection for Associational Missions was taken; amounting to \$15. Adjourned for dinner.

At 3:30 o'whole the dongregation was again called together and the temper-

ance service was opened by Bro. Quinn reading a Scriptural lesson and practiby Bro. A. F. Rean. Interesting speeches were then made by Brethren Quinn, Rowe and Funcy.

Committee on Divine Service report preaching tonight at Jenny Lind by Bro. Quinn; Mt. Nebo by Bro. Roan, at Enterprise by Bro. Henson, at

Mt. Zion by Bro. A. L. Brown. Adjourned.

Monday Morning, 8 O'olock.

The body was convened by the Moderator reading 108d Psalm. Prayer

by A. L. Brown.

On motion the Association agreed to correspond with the following bodies: Buckner, Clear Creek, Dardanelle and Short Mountain associations, and with the State and Southern Baptist conventions, and appointed messengers as follows: Buckner, D. L. Moore and F. M. Blaylock; Clear Creek, Jas. Meek and S. Renfroe: Dardanelle, F. P. Turner and J. F. Oneal; Short Mountain, R. T. Little and C. C. Stalcup; state convention, W. B. Herndon, D. C. Yeargin, Juo. L. Henderson, C. C. Stalcup and F. P. Turner; Southern Baptist convention, A. H. Autry; H. L. Been, alternate.

On motion P. C. Mays and A. C. Renfroe were seated as messengers for

Oak Bower church.

Minutes were then read and adopted.

On motion the question of change in the name of the association was referred to committee on constitution and by-laws.

On motion Articles of Faith were ordered printed in the minutes.

Pending further report of committees M. S. Buckley addressed the body upon the subject of taking steps to raise a permanent fund for assisting weak churches in building church houses. On motion resolution referred to committee on constitution and by-laws.

Committee on Sunday schools report. Adopted. [Appendix D.]

Committee on Temperance report. Report discussed by Brethern Bean, Herndon, Roan, Moore and others, and on motion was recommitted and Juo. L. Henderson added to committee.

Woman's Work. Adopted. [Appendix F.]

Committee on Divine Service report Bro. Throgmorton to preach at 11 o'clock.

On motion time for speeches limited to five minutes duration.

Committee or Constitution report. Motion to ammend by appointing two executive boards, one in the east end of the association and one in the west end. Lost. The hour for preaching having arrived, further discussion postponed until after preaching and a short recess taken.

At 11 o'clock Bro. Throgmorton gave us quite an edifying discourse on church building, showing the importance of the converted person identifying

himself with the church, Benediction by Bro. Herndon.

Promptly at 2 o'clock the Moderator again called the body to, order and

the discussion of committee on constitution resumed.

Motion to adopt report was on motion to amend by striking out that part of report referring to Art. 2 and Art. 9 of constitution. [Appendix G.]

On motion the report of executive board was again called; up.

On motion that part of report referring to the appointment of two exec-

utive boards and the division of the Association into two districts was stricken out and the report adopted. [Appendix D.]

Motion to smend by striking out Greenwood and substituting Union Grove. Motion carried and amended report adopted. [Appendix K.]

Home Missions. Adopted. [Appendix L.]

On motion rules were suspended and collection taken for missionary.

Motion that constitution be changed and time of meeting of this body be changed from Sunday to Wednesday. Motion lost.

On motion reading of minutes omitted and clerk allowed to correct

them.

On motion the clerk was allowed \$15 for services out of minute fund and remainder to be expended for minutes to be distributed pro rata among the churches.

Bro. John L. Henderson then offered the following resolution which was

adopted:

Resolved that this association heartily tender to the friends of other denominations as well as the Jenny Lind Baptist church, our sincere thanks for the generous hospitality extended us during our meeting, and also to the members of the M. E. Church for the use of their house.

Finance committee then reported. Motion that where not otherwise specified, home missions shall be understood as associational missions carried.

Motion that we, as a body, return our thanks to the moderator for his courtesy and kindness in presiding and treatment of the members during the session. Carried.

Appendix A.

Executive Board

To the moderators and messengers composing Concord Association:

We, your executive board, would report as follows: At the close of the last session of this body your board met and continued the service of Eld. W. B. Herndon as missionary for the associational year and agreed to pay him \$25 per month, he reserving one Saturday and Sunday of each month to preach for Sulphur Springs church. Bro. Herndon has labored as follows:

Days of actual service, 238; miles traveled in discharge of duty, 1857; number of sermons preached, 221; Sunday schools and other religious addresses, 75; religious visits made, 369; prayer meetings conducted, 32, witnessed conversions, 34; received into churches by baptism, 19; received into churches by letter, 13; by relation and restoration, 9; total additions, 41; Sunday schools organized, 5; church houses built in connection with his work, 1; cost when finished, about \$300; received for his services from all sources, \$108.

The three churches that have been under the fostering care of your board, Jenny Lind, Mazzard and Enterprise, we are glad to report, are sufficiently strong to maintain regular services without further aid from the board. The policy of your board has been to concentrate rather than to ceatter its

work, knowing that it was impossible, with the small amount of meant at our disposal, to supply all the destitutions in our bounds. We feel encouraged with the work done and only regret that we have not been able to do

more, for "The field is, white, already to the harvest."

The great Head of the church said, "Preach the Gospel to every creature," "Occupy till I come;" And, whereas, the destitution in our land is so great that it is impossible for one missionary to supply it how ever active he may be, we would therefore recommend that the board take steps at once to supply the destitution in our bounds. And we also recommend that the churches adopt a more uniform system of contributing to our associational missions by taking collections monthly or quarterly and forwarding the same to the board; and further that the board keep up a correspondence with the churches and keep them informed as to the progress of the work and its needs.

Articles of Faith.

We believe there is one, and only one, true and living God, Jehova, and that in the unity of the Godhead there are three personsthe Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

3. We believe that man was created holy, but by wilful violation of the law of his Maker he fell into a state of sinfulness and brought death upon his race, who being by natural decent in the unholy image, of Adam and children of wrath by nature and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace, through faith in

Jesus Christ and in no other way.

6. We believe, in order to be saved, sinners must be regeneral.

or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the help spirit in connection with divine truth, and the proper evidences there are repentance, faith and obedience unto God.

7. We believe that such only are believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life and they are kept by the power of, Ged through

faith unto salvation.

8. We believe the Scripture teaches that repentance and faith are entered duties, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the

regenerating spirit of God.

9 A Christian church is a congregation of immersed believely who meet statedly, and covenanted together to maintain the ordinant of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges in the New Testament appertaining to the church of Jesus Christ.

10 The only proper officers of a Christian church are bishops or

pastors, and deacons.

11 Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit by a regularly ordained Baptist minister in good order.

12. The Lord's Support is a positive commemoration ordinance of Jesus Christ to be observed in the church as such, in remembrance of Christ, and to show forth his death till he comes.

13. The first day of the week is the Lord's day and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor, and all worldly business and be devoted to religious duties.

14. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment and that the felicity of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
