MINUTES.

State Line Association met pursuant to adjournment with Concord Church, in Randolph Co., Ark, commencing on Tuesday, September 4th, 1888.

Annual sermon delivered by M. M. Jackson from Matthew 28 chapter and 19 verse, after which, the Moderator and Clerk being absent, the Association proceeded to appoint D. A. Presley Moderator pro. tem., and A. R. Kirkpatrick Clerk pro. tem. Then the names of the churches were called and names of messengers enrolled in the following order:

whose duty it shall be to employ and pay ministers to labor in destitute places, or where in their judgment good might be accomplished.

We, your Committee on Obituaries, submit the following report:

We find that the messenger death has visited our body during the Associational year and removed our beloved sister Sarah C. Couch, age 42 years, of New Salem Church; also Jane Busby, of Many Springs, age unknown; also Bro. Thomas Taylor, age 60 years, of Mill Creek, and J. P. Higginbotham, age 35; also Bro. J. J. Curlin, age unknown, and sister Mariah Higginbotham, of Witt's Chapel Church; also Mary Witt, wife of Eld. I. H. Witt; also Elder Emanuel Richardson, who was born in South Carolina Sept. 6, 1818. His parents were poor, so he was an apprentice and hence failed to obtain even a common school education. He professed faith in Christ in 1838, and was baptised by Eld. Jesse Elye into the fellowship of the Missionary Baptist Church—he was licensed to

preach the gospel in 1870, by the church at Pleasantgrove, and was regularly ordained to the full work of the ministry, by Elders H. Sharp, John Readwine and Deacon Cochrane, by order of the church at Pleasantgrove, Ark. on the 6th day of Nov. 1870. During his ministry, was pastor of Pleasantgrove, Lebanon, Oak Grove, Mount Pleasant and Mud Creek churches, also, Pleasant Hill and Antioch. He was Moderator of the State Line Association in 1881: was a man noted for his great courage and self-sacrificing devotion to his Master's work—spending much of his time in preaching to the destitute without compensation; and was successful in winning many souls to Christ. He baptized many persons and was zealous in good works to his last hour; which occurred at his home near Maynard, Randolph Co; Arkansas, on the 17th day of June, 1888.

At the time of his death he was a member of Witt's Chapel Baptist Church. His whole life was a living example to others. During his last moments (which were long and painful,)he manifested great patience and resignation and met

Death calmly, passing, we trust, direct to the arms of his Savior.

He was married three times and left a devoted wife and seven children to mourn his departure. In his death he glorified God, and his life will not soon be forgotten. "Blessed are the Dead that die in the Lord; yea, saith the Spirit—ther rest from their labors and their works do follow them."

RESOLVED, That this Association be held with Witt's Chapel Church, commencing on Friday before the 2nd Sunday in September, 1889.

Eld. D. A. Presley was elected to preach the next introductory sermon and Jesse B. Roach alternate.

Whereas, The brethren living in Missouri believe that it would be to the good of the cause of God to have a new Association in Missouri, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That our sister churches have permission from this Association and they are hereby dismissed from this body for that purpose.

RESOLVED, That the committee on investigation turn over the amount of means that may be received from the former clerk to the present clerk, and that the same go to the benefit of the new Association to be organized in Missouri on Friday before the second Sunday in October, 1888.

RESOLVED, That we co-operate with the general Association of Arkansas Delegate, E. T. Lincoln. Also that we correspond with the Southern Baptis Convention; Delegate, Jesse B. Roach.

RESOLVED, That every member of this Association be received as a corresponding delegate to the organization of the new Association of Missouri at Many Springs, Mo., on Friday before the second Sunday in October, 1888.

RESOLVED, That the thanks of this Association be extended to the church and surrounding country for their kindness towards us during our stay with them.

The Association then adjourned to meet at time and place above stated.

DECORUM.

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- 2. Every motion made by a member of the Association, and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the member making it.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at the same time, and he shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator before proceeding with his remarks.
- 4. The person speaking shall not be interrupted by any one, except the Moderator, until he has finished his remarks.
- 5. The person speaking shall confine himself strictly to the subject under consideration, and shall in no wise either reflect on or make any unfriendly remarks of any who may have preceded him, but shall fairly discuss the subject, conveying his ideas as concisely as possible.
- 6. No member of the Association shall absent himself in time of business without permission of the Association.
- 7. No member shall speak more than twice on any one subject without permission from the Association.
- 8. No member of the Association shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member while speaking, unless he violates the rules of the Association.
- 10. Any member who shall knowingly violate any rule of the Association, shall be reproved by the Association in such a manner as a majority of the members present may direct.
- 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled, and the roll called as often as the Association may think proper.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

- 1. We believe in one true and living God—the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; and these three are one.
- 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and the only true rule of Faith and Practice.
- 3. We believe that Man was made upright, but by a voluntary transgression violated God's law and became a sinner.

- 4. We believe that by voluntary transgression of one man, Sin entered into the world, and Death by sin; thereby death passed upon all men, for all have sinned.
- 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the righteousness of Christ imputed unto them.
- 6. We believe that good works are the fruits of faith and follow after justification.
 - 7. We believe that saints will persevere in grace and not one of them be lost.
- 8. We believe that Baptism and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the Church, and that they shall be continued until the second coming of Christ.
- 9. We believe that baptism by Immersion is the only gospel mode and that true believers are the only fit subjects for it.
- 10. We believe that none but legally baptised members have a right to commune at the Lord's table, and that no person has a right to administer that ordinance of the Church unless he is legally called and qualified.
- 11. We believe in revealed religion by the operation of the spirit, agreeable to the Word of God: that Jesus Christ is the great head of the Church, and the government thereof is with the body.
- 12. We believe there will be a resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust, and of a general judgment, and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
- 13. We believe that the Lord's day should be set apart for the worship of God, and no work of a worldly nature transacted thereon—that of necessity excepted.
