PROCEEDINGS.

Mt. Tabor Church, Centreville, Ark., Sept. 16, 1899. The Dardanelle Baptist Association met at 10 a.m.

Devotional exercises thirty minutes, led by Elder W. E.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:30 the body reconvened and was led in prayer by

Read the letters from the churches and enrolled the mesmagers. Elders W. W. Gardner and J. A. Myers were apmonted tellers to hold an election for permanant officers. While the tellers were engaged in counting the ballot the modtor appointed the deacons of Mt. Tabor church together with Brothers J. C. Shepherd and G. T. Hunter, a committee Divine Service. The tellers reported Eld. J. W. Richardand elected moderator and I. A. Huckaby clerk and treasurer.

A letter was received from Mt. Olive church asking for membership in the body. The church was received and her membersher seated.

Eld. W. W. Gardner was enrolled as a visitor, representthe Baptist Orphans' Home at Monticello; Eld. W. L. annett as a visitor from Webster Association, in Missouri; Id. J. F. Brice, member of New Hope church; Eld E. D. Inders, from Russellville Association; Eld. J. A. Myers, from United Association; W. E. Atkinson, representative of State Mission Board; R. R. Blair, from Arkadelphia.

On motion Bro. W. E. Atkinson was requested to occupy the hour of 10 a. m. Sunday and present the subject of State missions.

On motion the moderator was instructed to appoint a committee on Orphans' Home, and said committee was instructed to report at 10 a. m. on Monday.

On motion the order of business was suspended and the winth and tenth items of business were passed for the present. Appointed corresponding messengers to other bodies as follows:

On motion it was agreed to open correspondence with United Association. Appointed Brethren R. E. Cole, J. R. G. W. N. Adams and I. A. Huckaby, messengers to that body.

Took a recess to 7:30 p. m., at which time Eld. T. P. Manning preached from Jude, 3rd verse.

Adjourned to 8:30 a. m. Sunday. Eld. E. D. Landers preached Saturday night at Centerville.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 17-MORNING SESSION.

At 9 a. m., Sunday-school mass-meeting addressed by Brethren J. T. Bray, R. E. Cole, J. W. Richardson and Y. K. Light, Jr. At 10 o'clock, Bro. W. E. Atkinson addressed the association on the subject of missions. Collection taken for State missions. Cash, \$12.45; pledges, \$29.

The body then took a recess until 2 o'clock, when Eld. H. H. Street preached the annual missionary sermon from Matt. 28: 19. Collection for associational missions \$6.36. Autourned to 9 a. m. Monday.

At 7:30 p. m. Eld. W. L. Carnett preached from James At the same time Eld. W. E. Kimbrough preached at autorville and Eld. M. P. Blair at Zion's Hill church.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 18-MORNING SESSION.

Minutes of Saturday and Sunday read, corrected and oved. Called the roll and marked the absentees. Enended Eld. O. H. Reed as corresponding messenger from ellville Association and Eld. L. Quinn from Concord Acceptation.

The question of the election of a Mission Board being alled up a motion was carried to select the board from one bually so as to be convenient to each other.

The hour having arrived for the report of the Committee (rphans' Home the report was read by the chairman, Eld. 1) Manning, as follows:

Your committee respectfully submits: The duty devolved walted civilization and pure Christianity upon us to care the indigent orphans in our State is at once obvious and mative.

In 1894 the State Convention established the Orphans' now in operation at Monticello, Drew County, about miles from the Mississippi River and about sixty miles in the Louisiana line. Mrs. H. H. By a vote of 44 to 9 it was agreed to dispense with the neul custom of adjourning at 11 a. m. for preaching, and present with the business of the association.

Report of Committee on State Missions read by Eld.

The State Mission Board is a committee of brethren apminted by the Baptist State Convention to have charge of mission work in the State of Arkansas as our Associa-

tional Board is appointed by the association and has charge of the mission work in our own bounds. The State Board is made up of thirteen brethren appointed by the State Convention and one member from each association in the State appointed by his association. Therefore we are committed to this work by principle and authority. The object of the State work is to give the Gospel, as Baptists understand it, to every creature in Arkansas. This year they are sending the Gospel into many needy fields. About six preachers have been out among the destitute, and many souls are reported saved under their preaching. One of these brethren has done faithful work in our own association. Souls have been saved and churches received as a result of his work. We cannot yet report results, as the workers are now in the midst of the field. But, from almost every field, come reports of gracious revivals. The board finds itself unable to meet many calls made upon it, for lack of means. Thus many needy must be refused the gospel. In our own association this board would have done more if the association had more earnestly co-operated. We are grateful to God for his blessings through this work, and are thankful to the board and the brethren for their interest in us and work among us. And we ask every Christian to pray for the State work, and every church to contribute to its support and our preachers to urge this upon their churches.

As all cannot engage in preaching the Gospel, let us loose the hands of those whose hearts are filled with holy desire to parry the news of salvation, through Jesus, to the lost and benighted, and let our souls be so filled with love to our baviour and for the salvation of the lost that we shall willingly and liberally give of our means to the support of those who can go. God is opening the way, and shall we prove recreant to our duty? Let us accompany our means with our prayers for the success of the Gospel in heathen lands.

Bro. Adams spoke of the report after which it was idopted.

Bros. W. E. Kimbrough, B. Priddy, W. E. Logan, T. P. Manning and M. P. Henry were appointed as a Mission Board for the next year.

I. A. Huckaby read the report of the Mission Board, which follows:

Your Mission Board met October 22, 1898, at Belleville, and organized by electing Eld. T. P. Manning president and I. A. Huckaby secretary.

After careful and prayerful consideration of the work before us it was determined to establish mission stations at troupe's Chapel in McLean's Bottom, Elizabeth Hall, Neelly and Ola. Our secretary was instructed to offer the work at Stroupe's Chapel to Eld. W. N. Womack, at Elizabeth Hall to Eld. C. C. Hogan and at Neelly and Ola to Eld. W. N. Dodd. These brethren were offered \$25 and what they received on the field to preach two sermons a month at each station, beginning in January and continuing until the meeting of the association, and hold a protracted meeting in the summer.

The board also proposed to render some assistance to the church at Belleville if it would call a pastor. The board also requested pastors of churches to do such voluntary mission work as they could at destitute places within their reach and report the same to the board.

At a meeting held at Springdale church, December 3, the board proposed to help the churches at Zion and New llightower if they would call pastors and endeavor to help themselves.

At a meeting held at Mt. Zion No. 2, on May 20 an offort was made to secure some assistance for our missionaries in holding their protracted meetings This effort, however, proved futile except in the case of Bro Womack at Stroupe's Chapel. Bro. Blair assisted him two days, for which we paid him \$3.00.

We also agreed at this meeting to offer the work at Elizabeth Hall to Eld. J. S. Gray, as Bro. Hogan had not accepted the proposition of the board to work at that place.

We submit herewith a report of the work done by Bro. Dodd. as follows:

I began work for the board in January last, occupying Neelly and Ola as mission points, with instructions from the board to hold monthly services at each place.

I found at Neelly one member of Concord church, which church had fallen to pieces without formally disbanding, and, using him as a nucleus, have reorganized said church and it now has ten members. They are now going to take up the work and proceed with it without asking the association for further help.

At Ola I found two members of Siloam church which existed there many years ago and was never formally dis-banded. Bro J. J. Sandlin was clerk of that church and had the old record. In August, with the assistance of Bro. Frank White, we reorganized this church and changed the name to the First Baptist church at Ola. There are only four members in full fellowship but there are several others who will become members in the near future

The work at both places was seriously hindered by sickness and death. The prospects for advancement at both points is good.

I respectfully recommend and urge the board and the association to continue the work at Ola, as I regard that as a very important point, and the little church there is too weak to do the work that is needed.

Sunday-schools have been organized at both stations, literature for the same being furnished by Eld. J. G. Doyle, State Sunday-school Missionary. Number of sermons preached during the year, 45.

W. N. DODD, Missionary.

We have paid Bro. Dodd \$44.50 for his work.

Bro. Womack reports his work at Stroupe's Chapel as follows:

Report of work done for the Mission Board of the Dardanelle Baptist Association, in McLean's Bottom at Stroupe's Chapel, beginning March and ending September, 1899.

Held a few days' meeting, assisted by Eld. M. P. Blair, and closed the meeting on account of smallpox. Sermons preached, 18; days out, 14; miles traveled, 150; families visited, 8. Received \$6 from the board.

Fraternally yours, W. N. WOMACK, Missionary.

We have paid Bro. Womack \$19.50 for his work.

Bro. Gray reports his work at Elizabeth Hall, as follows: I made three trips to Elizabeth Hall. Held a protracted meeting in August of four days and was forced to close it on account of sickness. Number of sermons preached, 10.

J. S. GRAY, Missionary.

We have paid Bro. Gray \$9.

The board recommends that the work at Ola, Elizabeth Ilall and Stroupe's Chapel be continued.

Bro. J. P. Burk reported a meeting held voluntarily under the auspices of the board during which he preached live sermons, which resulted in three conversions.

Your committee to which was referred this subject would respectfully submit: That the fundamental scriptural principle of missions is admitted by all classes of religionists; that this principle is so abundantly enforced by the Master and his apostles as to leave no room for quibbling or hesitation.

The whole question remaining open for solution relates to methods and means.

The duty to occupy every foot of the territory within the bounds of the Dardanelle Association is confessedly, primal and imperative. The method of conducting this work looking to the accomplishment of this sacred trust has been adopted.

The means-the man and the money-the questions with which we are confronted are of such importance we can scarcely approach them with sufficient deliberation and zeal. The destitution is great. The Lord commands. Will we obev?

Your committee feels deeply impressed with the thought that the efforts heretofore put forth were perhaps in some degree experimental. Having sown we seem to have laid limit to the time and measure of harvest. We shall reap if we faint not. Let us fully trust him in the dedication of our persons and substance and push forward this work as we have never done before.

Further reporting would refer for details and circumstances, setting forth results heretofore accomplished, to the report of your mission board.

Constitution.

ART. 1. This body shall be known as the Dardanelle Missionary Baptist Association.

ART. 2. It shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches, known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less shall be entitled to three messengers; and churches with more than one hundred members shall be entitled to one messenger for each succeeding hundred.

ART. 3. The officers shall be, a moderator, elerk and treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot, unless otherwise ordered by two-thirds vote, at each annual session and shall continue in office till their successors are chosen.

AET. 4. It shall be the duty of the moderator to preside over the body according to parliamentary usage. The clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of printed minutes of every session of this body and deliver over the same to his successor in office. The treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the association, holding them subject to an order from the body.

ART. 5. The objects of the association shall be: First, to promote fellowship among the churches, secure unanimity of faith and cultivate the piety of its members. Second, to labor for Domestic and Foreign Missions, and encourage the circulation and reading of Baptist literature. Third, an especial object shall be to encourage and provide assistance for the education of the rising ministry, and for this purpose to establish an institution of learning in our midst as soon as practicable ART. 6. This body shall, in no case, interfere with the internal regulations of the churches but will act as an advisory council whenever it may be necessary. It, however, claims authority over its members, the messengers from the churches, and will withdraw from and disown, all churches that depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ART. 7. Newly organized churches dismissed from other associations may be admitted into this body upon their petitioning by letter and messengers at our annual meetings, and by their messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published.

ART. 8. Churches may be dismissed from this association upon application at its annual meeting, for the purpose of joining any body which we recognize or for the purpose of forming a new association; but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed shall be regarded as disorderly.

ART. 9. A quorum to do business in this association shall consist of at least two-thirds of the messengers who shall assemble at its session.

ART. 10. This association shall adjourn each day during its session for divine services.

ART. 11. This constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of this association, by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members who are in attendance.

Articles of Faith.

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are a revelation from God, and that the New Testament is our only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of election as founded in the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the spirit into obedience, and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

4. We believe in original sin by the fal! of Adam.

5. We believe in man's-incapacity by his own free will and ability, to rescue himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of the by the imputed righteousness of Christ only.

7. We believe that the saints will be preserved in grace, and never fall finally away.

8. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that believers are the only proper subjects of baptism; and that immersion is the apostolic mode.

9. We believe in the resurrection from the dead, and a general judgment; and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

10. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel, but one who has been regularly immersed and that is called and comes under the imposition of the hands of a Scriptural presbytery.

11. We believe that none but regularly immersed believers have a right to come to the Lord's Supper.

12. We believe that the Lord's Day should be kept as a day of rest and devotional exercise.

2. After recess of about fifteen minutes, introductory sermon.

3. After the usual intermission, call the body to order.

4. After singing and praying, call for letters from the churches.

5. After reading the letters and enrolling the messengers, go into the election of officers and form a permanent organization.

6. Call for petitionary letters.

7. Invite visiting brethren to seats in the body.

8. Appoint Committee on Divine Services.

9. Elect Mission Board.

10. Appoint the usual committees and others at the direction of the body.

11. Grant letters of dismission if any are called for.

12. Call for correspondence.

13. Appoint messengers to other bodies.

14. Reports of usual committees at will.

15. Miscellaneous business.

16. Appoint time and place of holding the next session.

17. Adjourn to the time and place of holding the next session of the body. D. D. SWINDALL.
