HOME MISSIONS.

By the term "Home Missions" we mean that department of our general missionary work by which we, of the Southern Baptist Convention, seek to supply the demands of our home field where the local forces are not strong enough to do so. We manage this work by the Home Mission Board located at Atlanta, Ga., I. T. Tichenor, corresponding secretary.

This board last year had 411 missionaries employed; of these, eighteen labored in the bounds of our state convention, and sixty in Western Arkansas and the Indian Territory. These 411 missionaries added to the various churches 5,617 by Baptism alone, and 13,295 altogether. They did this at a total cost of 75,927, of which Arkansas gave \$1,656, and Concord association \$125.72, Ft. Smith

First Baptist church \$123.22.

There are most potent reasons why we should contribute to the support of this work. The whole work of missions is one—including every department of our missionary enterprise, whether the local church work, associational, state home or foreign missions! But we shall never do our duty in this matter until we get earnestly and systematically to work.

We would suggest that our churches arrange a regular time for contributing to each department of work, and

that our pastors see that the membership is fully informed as to the condition, progress and needs of the several features of work. If information is desired at any time, write to Bro. A. J. McManaway of Arkadelphia, who is vice-president for the state.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We belive in the education of the ministry. The age is past when men without training can hope to meet the demands of leadership, and the ministry are the leaders of the people in their thought and in their practice. The scriptures place them in that position. Men are born without knowledge, and whatever they know they have learned by the means appointed of God for the increase of knowledge. The more a man knows the more he can teach; the trained mind can understand the teachings of the Bible easier and better than the untrained. The opposers of the truth as well as those who refuse to obey the truth are better trained than heretofore. Every body is now being educated; hence the greater importance of educating the ministry. There are good schools of easy access, and we would recommend that all our young men who expect to enter the ministry take as full a course of training as possible And when they need assistance, we belive our churches should not be slow to render it; and the church where the young man's membership is should be foremost to supply the needed help, and when our churches have no representation in school we should take a collection once a

year for Ministerial Education. These funds should be sent to the help of those Boards of Ministerial Education that have assumed the support of our needy young men.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

On the 5th Sunday in March last, the Board in regular session employed Elds. A. J. Henson and J. W. Constitution.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as the Concord Association.

ART. 2. It shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty inembers or less shall be entitled to three Messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional Messenger:

ART. 3. The officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session, and shall con-

tinue in office until their successors are chosen.

ART. 4. Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside

over the body according to parliamentary usage.

SEC. 2. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of the printed minutes of the body and deliver the same to his successor in office.

SEC. 8. The Treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, or its Executive Committee, and render an account of the

same to the annual session of this body.

ART. 5. The object of this Association shall be to promote fellowship among the churches; to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation; and especially to cultivate the piety of the churches, and to aid in this last object several minutes of each session shall be spent in devotional exercises

ART. 6, Sec. 1. This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations of the churches, but will act as advisory

council whenever it shall be necessary.

SEC. 2. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the Messengers from the churches, and will withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming herterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ART. 7. Newly organized churches or churches dismissed from other Associations may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and Messengers at our annual meeting, and subscribing by their Messengers to the abstract of principles herewith published.

ART. 8. Churches may be dismised from the Association upon application at the annual meeting for the purpose of joining a new Association, but any church departing from us without being regularly dismissed shall be regarded as disorderly.

ART. 9, Sec. 1. There shall be an Executive Committee consist-

ing of the officers of this body with 5 members chosen by the Association at each annual meeting. The duty of this committee shall be to superintend the Missionary operations of the Association, and represent it in all matters requiring their attention when the Association is not in session. The committee shall report annually at each meeting of the Association. Three members of said committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Upon appointment said committee shall come together and arrange their meetings and take such other steps as may be to the interest of the cause of Christ.

SEC. 2. The regular committee of this Association shall be a committee on Foreign Missions, Documents, Religious Literature, Ministerial Support, Sunday Schools, Ministerial Education, Nomins.

tions, Temperance, Obituaries, Queries and Finance.

ART. 10. It shall be the privilege of the Association, through its Executive Committee, in addition to the power already granted, to conduct missionary operations within its limits, and for this purpose to choose a Missionary or Missionaries as means may allow and designate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through his Treasurer, out of any funds in his hands, except the money sent for publishing the minutes of every annual meeting

ART. 11. The annual meeting of the Association shall embrace the Lord's day, and shall begin at 10 o'clock a.m., on Saturday before the 4th Lord's day in September, at which time the introductory sermon shall be preached. On each succeeding day the Association

shall adjourn at 11 o'clock a m, for preaching.

ART. 12. This Constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Article 6, Section 1, at any regular meeting of the Associatoin by a two-thirds vote of the members who are in attendance.

AMENDMENT 1, ART, 13. No person shall serve as Moderator of

this body more than two terms in succession. Amended 1882.

AMENDMENT 2 The Constitution shall be published annually in the minutes of this Association. Amended 1893.

AMENDMENT 3. Missionary Sermon is placed in the bands of

Divine service committee. Adopted in 1894.

'AMENDMENT 4. Each church is expected to send to each annual meeting of the Association by the hands of its Messengers, a sum of money to be used for printing minutes. Adopted in 1895.

Articles of Faith.

1. We believe there is one and only one, true and living God, Jehovah, and that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, constituting the only and all sufficient standard

of faith, doctrine and discipline and practice.

3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of the Eternal Love by which God hath, according to His infinite wisdom, chosen His people in Christ before the world was, and has predestinated them unto the adoption of children through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth, and doth keep them by His power throuth faith unto salvation.

4. We belive that man was created holy; but by wilful violation of the law of his Maker, he fell into a state of sinfulness and brought death upon his race, who being by natural descent in the unboly image of Adam and children of wrath by nature and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace, through faith in

Jesus Christ, and no other way.

6. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the floly Spirit in connection with the Divine truth and the proper evidences thereof are faith, repentance and obedience to God.

7. We believe that such only are believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life and they are kept by the power of God through

faith unto salvation.

8. We believe the scripture teaches that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by

the regenerating spirit of God.

9. A Christian church is a congregation of immersed believers who meet statedly and have covenanted together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges of the New Testament appertaining to the church of Jesus Christ.

10. The only proper officers of Christian churches are Bishops

or Pastors and Deacons.

11. Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, by a regularly ordained Baptist Minister in good order:

12. The Lord's Supper is a positively commemoration ordinance

of Jesus Christ to be observed in the church as such, in remembrance of Christ and to show forth His death till He comes.

18. The first day of the week is the Lord's day, and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor and all worldly business and devoted to religious duties.

14 We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

Rules of Decorum.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. An introductory and missionary sermon shall be preached by ministers chosen by ballot at the preceding Association. In case of absence or failure, the sermon on either to be preached by an alter-

nate chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother

shall also be chosen to deliver a temperance address.

3. A committee of arrangements consisting of five members besides the Moderato and Clerk, who shall be members ex-officio, shall be appointed by the Moderator to arrange and report the order of business.

4. Visiting brethren who are in good standing may be invited

to seats but not to vote.

5. A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may make an appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

6. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, address

the Moderator, and upon obtaining leave shall proceed.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject or use words of personal reflection, and then

by the Moderator.

- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by him who made it. Every case taken up shall be decided or withdrawn before another is introduced.
- 9. When a question is taken up; after allowing time for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association by yeas and nays, or otherwise.

10. A member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from

the Moderator.

11 No member shall speak more than twice on one subject

without permission from the Moderator.

12. The appellation of "brother" shall be used in the Association by the members in their addresses one to another. Letters that are unknown to the scriptures, such as "Rev.," "Parson" and like shall not be employed or appear on the minutes.

13 The names of members shall be called as often as Associa-

tion may direct.

14. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided be appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.

15. Any person violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have

been made.

16. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this Association by a majority vote of the members present.
