Held With Providence Church, Montgomery County, Arkansas, September 7, 8, 9, 1906.

Articles of Faith.

- 1. We believe in a true and living God.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures, composing the Old and New Testaments, are the words of God and the only rules of our faith and practice.
- 3. We believe in the doctrine of election according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam.
- 5. We believe in man's inability of his own free will and ability to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.
- 6. We believe that the sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imparted righteousness of Christ only.
- 7. We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace and never fall finally away.
- 8. We believe that baptism and the Lord's supper are the ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of baptism, and that immersion is the apostolic mode.
- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and in the general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
- 10. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the gospel but one who has been regularly baptised, called and comes under the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery.
- 11. We believe that none but regularly baptised members have a right to commune at the Lord's supper.

We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of rest and religious devotion.

Proceedings.

The Forty-Ninth Annual Session of the Caddo River Missionary Baptist Association assembled with Providence Church, Montgomery County, Arkansas, at 11 o'clock a.m., Friday, September 7th, 1906, in harmony with its adjournments with Mountain Home Church, Montgomery County.

The appointees, T. J. Wright and J. R. Edwards, preached the introductory sermon at 11 a. m., from Corinthians 2:8-11,

11, after which the body was dismissed to meet at 3 p. m.

FRIDAY-EVENING SESSION.

At 3 p. m. the body met, and after prayer, by the Moderator, was declared ready for business.

4th. Election of officers. J. O. Butler, J. B. Lumley, and J. N. Wasson were appointed tellers, and the election resulted follows: Moderator, T. J. Wright; Clerk, J. T. Reece; Treasurer, W. T. West.

5th. Invitation for visiting ministers. Revs. J. B. Lumley, J. A. Shackelford, and W. C. Palmer were seated as visiting ministers.

On motion carried, the Moderator and Clerk were given until Saturday morning to announce the appointees on the various pommittees.

6th. A motion prevailed for a committee on Home Mismons, Foreign Missions, and Religious Literature. Carried. By motion of the house, Bro. Tedford was seated in council with the body.

7th. Call for report of preaching committee. It reported

Motion for adjournment till Saturday morning at 8 a.m. was carried.

D-COMMITTEE ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

We find within the bounds of the Association great destitution and a general cry for the 'bread of life.' Therefore, we recommend that the Association take some steps toward supplying the destitute settlements with the preaching of the gospel, which is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth.'' 'If ye love me, ye will keep my commandments,''—(John 14,15.) We recommend that the Association now appoint one Associational Board, consisting of five (5) members, with one additional member from each church, whose duty it shall be to supervise Mission Work within the bounds of our Association.

E-COMMITTEE ON ORPHANS' HOME.

We find that clothing and educating helpless orphan children under Baptist influence is a work that appeals to the sympathies of all. None of us know how soon our own children may be left helpless orphans. This work is being done by the Baptist Orphans' Home at Monticello, under the management of H. H. Gardner, the building capacity being limited to seventy-five children. There are now sixty-three or more in the Home. We recommend that all of our churches take collections regularly for the maintenance of this grand work.

F-COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS.

We find that the State Board has seventy-four, (74) missionaries giving more of less of their time to Mission Work, and that the Lord has abundantly blessed their labor in three quarters of the convention year, 1905-6, as they have reported 1,827 conversions and 1,047 baptisms. We find that some of this work has been done in our own Association. We recommend that our churches be liberal with their means in this work.

G-COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

Your committee finds, from the reading of letters from the various churches of the Association that ten churches report Sunday-schools. We believe it the duty of Baptists to provide ways and means for the retenance of Sunday-schools for the young. A vital part of the Great Commission is the commission to teach. The Lord placed teachin the church when he organized it (1 Cor. 12-28) and it is necessary we obey this command at once; therefore we recommend that every Baptist church within the bounds of the Association organize a Baptist Sunday-school, and further recommend that they use Baptist Literature. No better literature has ever been published, yet within Baptist homes can be found papers and literature of other denominations.

Constitution.

- ARTICLE 1. This union shall be known and distinguished by the name of the Caddo River Baptist Association.
- ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of delegates from the churches of the Union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by the several churches before they take their seats.
- ART. 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual association, and continue in office until their successors are chosen.
- ART. 4. This Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent in matters of internal government, and shall act as advisory counsel, assuming no authority except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied by the nature of the compact. It, nevertheless, claims authority over its members, the delegates from churches, and in justness and propriety must have power to withdraw from, and disown, all churches which depart from the spirit of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practices. It should, therefore, regard all churches united under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God, by extending the kingdom of grace on earth through the medium of preaching the gospel, and the means in accordance with the gospel to cultivate fellowship and union with all the churches of Christ, especially those united in this constitution.
- ART. 5. Newly constituted churches and churches dismissed from other associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union by sending three delegates, their number in fellowship, baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated, restored and deceased since last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important which shall be read and minuted.

- ART. 6. This Association shall have a fund to be supplied by matary contributions of the churches. All the money thus partituded shall be transmitted from the churches and paid through the Committee on Finance to the Treasurer, who hall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure the Association. He shall retain and manage the funds make the order of the Association and present annually inspection in the minutes, a clear and distinct statement of supplies and expenditures.
- ART. 7. This Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.
- ART. 8. The Association shall take cognizance of no query up from the churches unless they have endeavored to solve same and have failed; nor of any difficulties between the churches unless they have perused the 18th chapter of Matthew and have not been able to settle them; then the Association chall take such matters into consideration and act upon them its own discretion.
- ART. 9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of each session of this body, and deliver over the same to his successor in office.
- ART. 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of this Association by the concurring voice of two-thirds of the members present, provided such alteration or mendment be approved by the churches comprising the Association.

Rules of Decorum.

- 1. When the delegates of the several churches shall assemble at the place appointed for the session of the Association, the Moderator shall open business with praise and prayer in person or by proxy. If the former Moderator or Clerk be absent, the Association shall appoint one pro tem.
- 2. Immediately after opening the session, the church letters shall be read by persons the Moderator may appoint and the names of the delegates be enrolled by the Clerk.
 - 3. When the delegates' names have been enrolled and call-

ed by the Clerk, the Association shall elect by a ballot a Moderator and Clerk, the plurality of votes governing the election.

- 4. All motions and amendments to motions must be seconded before they can be entertained by the Moderator. Who motions or amendments to motions are made, the last one makes the first in order, and so on in inverse order to original motion, but mover may at any time withdraw his motion.
- 5. Any person wishing to make a motion or speak on an matter before the Association shall rise to his feet and respectfully address the Moderator, and if he be in order, the Moderator shall signify it by calling the name of the person; and one thus in order shall be interrupted while speaking, unless depart from the subject, or for personal reflections; nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same subject without leave from the Association, or to explain a former remarkance.
- 6. Whenever sufficient time has been allowed for discision of any subject before the Association, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association and declare the result, a parality governing all cases except those provided for.
- 7. No member may vacate his seat without the consent the Moderator, while the body is in session.
- 8. When one member shall speak to or of another, he shall call him "brother."
- 9. The Moderator shall have the names of the delegater called whenever it is necessary.
- 10. The Moderator may speak on matters of debate as other members, by calling some one else to fill his seat while he speaking; but not until all others have spoken who desire speak.
- 11. The Moderator may invite visiting ministers, in good order, to seats in the council, who may speak but not vote.
- 12. The minutes of the Association may be read as may be necessary.
- 13. The Moderator shall be judge of the order; the objects may appeal to the body, a majority of whom shall determine the point of order.
