Proceedings.

CEDAR CREEK CHURCH, SOUTHERN HOME, ARK., September 14, 1901.

The Dardanelle Baptist Association convened at 10 o'clock a. m. and engaged in devotional exercise led by Eld. J. F. Brice. At 11 a. m Eld. R. R. Elmore preached the Introductory sermon from Eph. 6:10 11.

After the usual intermission for dinner the body was called to order and the moderator read Ps. 51.

Elder J. A. Myers led in prayer.

The letters from the churches were read and the messengers enrolled.

The deacons, messengers and pastor of Cedar Creek church were appointed a committee on Divine service.

Report of Committee on Orphans' Home read as follows: .

The Baptists of Arkansas owe it to their people and to our God to care for the orphans of our state. God laid it on the heart of a pioneer Baptist preacher's daughter to give her heritage and her life to the founding and maintenance of a Baptist orphanage at Monticello. We have now forty-three children in the home-thirty-two girls and eleven boys. In May, 1900, we began the erection of a building of twelve rooms and a chapel. This building has been finished and fur-nished, except four rooms, and all paid for so far. We are glad to report we are not in debt.

The Home is a combination of the family, the school, the Bible class, the domestic nursery and the industrial school.

We lay this great work on the hearts of our people, and pledge our prayers, our gifts and our influence for its support.

We, your Committee on Education, beg leave to submit the following:

To obtain an education should be the aspiration of every youth, every child, every young man and lady in our broad land. But many meet with obstacles which seem to them insurmountable, yet by pluck, energy, ambition and a desire to excel and to reach the top, they can succeed. We have made such rapid progress along all educational lines that now a liberal education is within the reach of nearly every one who desires it. We have three institutions in our state controlled by Baptists, that cannot be excelled or surpassed in their work, influence and dignity, to-wit: Ouachita Baptist and Central Colleges, and Ouachita Magazine Academy. The faculties of these colleges are of the highest order, the best that can be obtained. We beg you, brethren, in the name of Christ, give your undivided support to these schools by sending your sons and daughters there instead of going outside of the state to institutions no better and perhaps not as good as these. But let us not neglect the true foundation of all college work, that is, our public schools, high schools and academies. Many go beyond these. No doubt some of our messengers are directors and teachers. Make our public schools better. Scrutinize the work of your high schools and academies and reject that which does not meet your approbation, but support and cultivate that which is good and which is done in the name of Christ. Let a Christian spirit permeate all your work along this line and greater strides than ever before will be made in all our educational work and glorification of God.

On motion of Bro. W. N. Dodd the association rescinded the act of appointing messengers to the State Baptist Convention which had been done in the forenoon.

Bro Dodd then moved that this association withdraw cor respondence from the State Convention.

Bro. Gray moved as a substitute that the correspondence be withdrawn only until the affairs of the State Convention be better understood. The substitute was adopted and the motion prevailed.

On motion a committee was authorized and appointed for the purpose of thoroughly investigating the work of the State Mission Board, and furnishing all the facts to the churches.

E. H. Gray, W. R. Blair and J. W. L. Corley were appointed as such committee.

W. D. Kimbrough read the report of the Committee on State Missions.

Within the few years past a general interest has been aroused among Arkansas Baptists, in state mission work. By the convention and through our board, plans have, from time to time, been adopted for the purpose of securing the united sympathy, and co-operation of all our people in giving the gospel to all the spiritually needy within our borders. And recognizing the value of time and the destitution on every hand, the board has sought, from year to year, to enlarge the work by the appointment of more men and the appropriation of money. The good results of the enlargement are now realized in intributions and baptisms. The report of last year's work far exl our most generous expectations, the contributions amounting 1,703.38, over \$900 in excess of the total for the work of 1899. There also an increase in the baptisms, of 191.

For the present year our board outlined the work on a basis of 1000. I. A. Huckaby read the report of the Associational Mission Board as follows:

The Mission Board of this association organized after the associational meeting last year by electing Eld. Richardson, president and G. T. Hunter, secretary. It was the opinion of the rapid growth of the towns of Ola, Danville and Belleville, the Baptists could not afford to neglect those who were locating there and therefore desired to secure a church organization at each of these places. There were, indeed, feeble churches at all these points, but without assistance from the board they were in danger of being overrun and their influence completely obscured. It was therefore considered advisable to have a man devote his whole time to these three points and the board contracted with Bro. Richardson to devote half his time to our work at Ola and half at Danville and Bellville from January 1, to the meeting of the association, for which we agreed to pay him \$360.00. The board also corresponded with the State Mission Board and secured from it a promise of \$160.00 to assist in paying for said work, which amount was to be paid directly to Bro. Richardson.

On account of Bro. Richardson having accepted the mission work the board was re-organized by making G. T. Hunter president and I. A. Huckaby secretary.

Following is Bro. Richardson's report of his work:

I began work Jan. 1, 1901. Miles traveled, 900; sermons preached, 120; addresses, 15; funerals attended, 14; families visited, 275; conversions witnessed, 35; baptisms, 18; received by letter, 21.

This report shows the amount collected by Bro. Richardson from the churches on their pledges and on the field, of \$28.77. The secretary of our board, who is also treasurer of the association, has paid him, under the instruction of this board, \$74.42. This leaves a balance due him, of the amount promised by this board, of \$96.81. The collection taken on Sabbath for associational missions, and the amounts reported as sent up by the churches, will nearly cover this amount and we will be able to pay nearly, if not quite all, the amount promised him, provided the state board redeems its promise, which we confidently expect.

We think the association ought to continue work that has been begun at Danville and Belleville.

The report was discussed by Eld. Richardson, and after correction, was adopted. The report of the Committee on Sunday-Schools was read as follows:

Your Committee on Sunday-Schools beg leave to report:

The era for discussing the duty of every church of Christ to maintain and operate a Sunday-school is past. The only question now remaining open is the question of method and means.

As to method, much has already been said, and much remains to be said—all alike varied and variable by the local conditions in the main. One fact, however, should always stand out prominently and Invariably, to-wit: That no Sunday-school can claim any recognition which is not organized and operated by a local church. It is peculiarly the church at work.

The second branch of this open question is not exclusively financial; though largely so. The money follows the faith and zeal of the superintendent and teachers. They who operate directly on those who attend, must, therefore, themselves be earnest, discreet, zealous Christlans, full of faith. But these places are sometimes shouldered off on some brother not possessing qualifications to bring out the best work and the best results. The church should realize that her best gifts are, In this particular department, in highest demand.

A misfit in the choice of a superintendent is sure to be ended with disappointment, if not failure. The selection of teachers is very important, indeed but little short

The selection of teachers is very important, indeed but little short in importance of that of superintendent. An unwise selection of teachers, we think, would be disastrous.

The church should select the best educator within her jurisdiction for superintendent, and the corps of teachers should be selected with great care and prudence. But under no circumstances should the church waive her authority nor her responsibility in this work.

We decline to suggest any series of literature, except in so far that it should be pure gospel.
