of the SEVENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION of the

Saline Baptist Association

Held with Ouachita Church, near Donaldson in Hot Springs County, Oct. 1, 2, 3 and 4, 1915.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 1, 1915.

Met at 7:30 p. m., and after a few minutes spent in devotional service, Elder L. E. Holt preached the introductory sermon. Text: Col. 1: 18, Theme, "The Pre-eminence of Christ."

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 2, 1915. Forenoon Session

At 9 a. m. the Moderator, Elder O. C. Robinson, called for the reading of letters from the churches, and they were read by Orlando C. Williams, D. D. Glover and H. E. Kirkpatrick. (See table of Statistics.) On motion the Clerk read the constitution of the Association. The Moderator appointed the Deacons of Ouachita church as a committee on Divine Service. At 11 a. m, Elder H. E. Kirkpatrick preached a good sermon. Theme, "The Ability of Christ."

SATURDAY, Afternoon Session.

Re-assembled at 1:30 p. m.

The body organized by re electing Elder O. C. Robinson Moderator and A. B. Shockley Clerk and Treasurer. A petitionary letter was presented from Mount Zion church, but as there was no messenger present from the church the letter could not be received.

Visiting brethren were recognized as follows: Dr. W. A. Clark, of Hot Springs, Route 2. Dr. Clark is one of the pioneer Baptists of Arkansas.

Ou motion Mrs. J. G. Jackson was granted a few minutes to talk on woman's work, and she made a splendid argument in favor of encouraging the sisters in church work Several of the brethren made good talks on this subject.

SATURDAY NIGHT SERVICES.

Met at 7 p. m., and after several songs and prayers Elder O C Robinson preached a splendid sermon. Text: 1 Tim. 2: 5. The Moderator announced that he had concluded the appointment of committees and the list was read by the clerk. A motion carried that the report on Sunday Schools be read and discussed at 9 a. m., Sunday.

SUNDAY FORENOON SERVICES

Assembled at 9 a m. The Moderator read the 39th Psalm and led in devotional service, after which the committee on Sunday Schools submitted the following report.

In carrying out the great commission we don't believe that there is any agency capable of more effective work than the Sunday Schools. The command was to carry the gospel to "Every Creature." The Sunday School has no restrictions of age, class or condition.

Why do we say that it is of such importance? One reason is that 93 per cent of all conversions come from the Sunday School. Think of it! Ninety-three out of every hundred who are saved came from the Sunday Schools, and still we often think of the Sunday School as of secondary importance in the church work. Is it not reasonable to estimate that if all of the churches had had healthy Sunday Schools the number of conversions in the Associations this year would have been much larger? God expects us to use our talents and the church that has no Sunday School is keeping its talent hid in the earth instead of using it for God's glory.

We recommend therefore: 1. That the Bible be made the Book of the Sunday School.

- 2. That strictly Baptist literature be used in our Sunday Schools
- 3. We urge and beg that the parents read Deut. 31: 9-14 also Matt. 28: 18-20 and go with their boys and girls to Sunday School.

4th and last. That the messengers go back to their churches and revive their Sunday Schools and carry into effect these things that we recommend.

Resp. submitted.

L. E. Holt A. T. Moody The foregoing report was enthusiastically discussed by a number of the brethren, and was adopted.

Motion carried that the report on Associational Missions be taken up at 1:30 p. m.

It now being 11 o'clock, Dr. W. A. Clark read the second chapter of Joshua and preached a very interesting sermon; at this hour, Elder J. T. Kelley preached to a good sized audience in the grove near the church, as the house would not hold the people.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON SERVICES

Met at 1:30 p. m. The report on Associational Missions was read, discussed and adopted as follows: We presume that all will admit that it is the duty of God's people to carry the gospel of Christ to lost men and women We believe that if our people do their duty in support of Associational Missions it will be easy to take care of other missions. We recommend that two efficient men be employed as missionaries instead of one during the revival meeting season. We recommend that this body take steps toward the support of said missionaries. We also recommend that an annual missionary sermon be preached on Sunday at 11 a. m., at each session of Saline Association.

We praise God for what has been done during the last associational year, and feel encouraged to press on to greater things.

Our clerk was instructed to write to the churches and request them to send in pledges to the support of the missionary. Ouly a few churches responded; some sent in the amount they had pledged to the support of this work which is given in the Treasure's report.

We believe that a great and good work has been done, and are thankful to God for the advancement of His Cause in our association. Let us renew our efforts, and attempt greater things in working for our Lord and Master during the next associational year and God will greatly bless the labor and save souls throughout the bounds of this field, where there is great destitution

A motion now carried limiting all speeches on reports to five minutes.

STATE MISSIONS

Report adopted as follows: Much has been reported from time to time concerning the great need of the gospel in the distitute parts of Arkansas. We believe the task of evangelizing the state rests with the Baptists since the commission to preach and teach was given to Baptists.

Therefore we recommend that the Churches working wit's general Association contribute freely to the support of State Missions.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Report read, discussed and adopted Our Lord came into this world on a mission, and that to seek and to save the lost, according to the Divine plan. We recommend that every pastor preach at least one sermon during the coming year on the subject of Forigu Missions, and take a collection for this work and have it sent through what ever channel or source is acceptable to the Church

ORPHAN'S HOME

Report read, discussed and adopted. We believe that when the love of God has been shed abroad in the hearts of men and women they are constrained to comply with the scripture found in James 1st, chapter and 27th verse, which reads, "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world" We feel that we can prove our faith in Jesus Christ in no better way than to follow the above injunction.

The Orphan's Home at Texarkana is in great need, and we suggest that we take a collection at this meeting for the home. We understand there is debt on the building and they are behind with the remaining expenses. There are 29 children in the home and applications have been made for others, but for lack of means they can not be taken in. May the spirit of the Lord lead us and help us to get a vision of the field and cause us to contribute more liberally to the support of the Orphan's Home.

A public collection of \$10.40 was taken for the Orphan's Home and turned over to Bro. J. A. Verser.

The minutes were now read and adopted and the roll was called and the names of the messengers who had returned home were ordered marked from the roll except those who had asked leave and been excused.

TEMPERANCE

Report read, discussed by several of the messengers and adopted as follows: Brethren, this great question is too exhaustive to be delt with for publication in our minutes except in a general or brief way. To present this question in any considerable number of its important applications would require more space than our whole minutes could embrace. We are not merely for temperence in all things, but we must stand for prohibition as applied to the liquor traffic in the fullest sense, which the term implies. And when we say we favor prohibition, that means that we shall use the ballot to enforce our belief. The word of God teaches us to live soberly and rightiously in this present world; that "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise," and "That no drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of God." We have no right to lend our moral,

religious, legal or financial aid or support to a traffic which is not only a traffic in liquor, but a traffic in the souls of men. May the Lord help the members of the churches of Salue Association to line up in one solid phalanx to stamp out forever the demon rum.

This was one of the most fraternal, harmonious and business like sessions of old Saline Association held for many years. Your Clerk would be glad to give the proceedings in ful., give a synopsis of the good sermons preached and the splendid talks made on the reports but we were quite severly criticised for doing this in the past and we have tried to be very brief this time.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members present.
- The Moderator shall be considered a judge of order, and shall have a right to call to order at any time.
- A member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.
- But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise on his feet, and, obtaining permission, proceed.
- The Moderator, when addressed by a member for permission to speak, shall signify the same by naming the person, or otherwise.
- 7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject or uses words of personal reflection. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of this Association unless withdrawn by him that made it.
- 8. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided or withdrawn before another be offered.
- 9. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association on the subject, and the members on the affirmative of the question shall signify the same by rising from their seats, and those in the negative retain theirs.
- 10. The Moderator shall pronounce the decision before the standers resume their seats.
- 11. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.
- 12. No person shall speak more than twice on the same proposition without permission of the Association, nor more than once till every member wishing to speak shall have done so; nor shall any proposition be made to close the subject till the debates have been carried through.
- 13. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in the Association by members in their address to one another.
- No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to interrupt public speaking.
- 15. The names of members shall be called as often as the Association may direct.
- 16. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.
- 17. Any member violating the rules may be reproved by the Moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall be made.

ABSTRACT OF FAITH

Article 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Word and the Holy Ghost. 1st, John, 5th chapter and 7th verse. John 1st, 1st chapter, 2nd and 3rd verses. 1st Timothy, 3rd chapter and 10th verse.

Article 2. We believe that the Scriptures comprising the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice. 2nd Timothy, 3rd chapter, 15th aud 16th verses. 2nd Peter, 1st chapter and 2nd verse. Rom., 5th chapter and 4th verse.

Article 3. We believe in the doctrine of election according as God has chosen us in Christ before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love, in whom ye also trusted, often that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation; in whom also after ye believed ye were sealed with that holy spirit of promise. Eph., 1st chapter, 4th and 13th verses. 1st Peter, 1st chapter and 2nd verse. 1st Thess., 2nd chapter, 13th and 14th verses.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin by the fall of Adam, Gen., 3rd chapter, 6th and 2nd verses. Psalms, 5th and 6th verses. Rom., 5th chapter, 12th and 14th verses.

Article 5. We believe in man's incapacity by his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state which he is in by nature. Isaiah, 1st chapfer, 5th and 6th verses. John, 6th chapter 44th verse. Eph., 2nd chapter and 1st verse.

Article 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ only. Jer., 23rd chapter and 6th verse. Rom., 4th chapter and 22nd verse. 1st Cor., 1st chapter and 3rd verse.

Article 7. We believe that the saints shall be preserved in grace, and never finally fall away. Psalm 89th, 23rd and 31st verses. Heb., 8th chapter, 10th and 12th verses. John, 10th chapter and 28th verse.

Article 8. We believe that baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that the true believers are the only subjects of baptism, and that by immersion is the Apostolic mode. Mark, 61st chapter, 15th and 16th verses. Acts, 2nd chapter, 41st and 42nd verses. Rom., 6th chapter, 3rd, 4th, 6th and 7th verses. Mat., 28th chapter, 19th and 20th verses. 1st Cor., 11th chapter, 23rd and 26th verses.

Article 9: We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal. John, 5th chapter, 28th and 29th verses. 1st Cor., 15th chapter, 22nd and 25th verses. Rev., 20th chapter, 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th verses.

Article 10. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the gospel but to one who is regularly baptised, called, and comes under the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery Mat., 28th "chapter, 19th and 20th verses. 1st Tim., 4th chapter and 14th verse. Titus, 5th chapter and 10th verse.

Article 11. We believe that none but regularly baptised members have a right to commune at the Lord's table. Acts, 2nd chapter, 41st and 47th verses, chapter 18, 8th and 11th verses. 1st Cor., 11th chapter, 23rd and 24th verses.

Article 12. We believe that the Lord's day should be served as a day of rest and religious devotion. Es., 20th chapter and 8th verse. Acts, 20th chapter and 7th verse. Rev. 1st chapter and 10th verse.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of the "Saline Baptists Association."

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers from churches in union. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches before they take their seats.

Article 3. The messengers, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberate body by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual Association, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

Article 4. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and shall act only as an advisory council, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied by the very nature of the compact. It nevertheless claims authority over its members---the messengers from the churches---and in propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches which depart from the principles of this compact by becoming hetrodox in faith or disorderly in practice. It should therefore, regard all churches united under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the kingdom of grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the Gospel, and the means in accordance with the Gospel, and to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially with those united in this constitution.

Article 5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order may be admitted into this union on their sending three messengers to the annual meeting of the Association, with a petition for admission, and by their messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published.

Article 6. The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association a written communication, specifying the names of their messengers, their number in fellowship, number baptised, received by letter, dismissed, ex-communicated, restored or deceased since the last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which may be read and minuted accordingly.

Article 7. This Association may have a fund supplied by the voluntary contribution of the churches, and all the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committee on Finance to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association. He shall retain and manage the funds agreeably to the order of the Association, and shall present annually, for insertion in the minutes, a clear and sufficient statement of all the receipts and expenditures.

Article 8. This Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.

Article 9. This Association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve the same and have failed, nor of any difficulty between churches, unless they have pursued the direction in the eighteenth chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them. Then the Association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at its discretion.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of every session of this body, and to deliver over the same to his successor in office.

Article 11. The Constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of the Association by the concurring vote of two-thirds of the members then present; provided, such alteration or amendment be approved of by the churches comprising this Association.
