PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONCORD ASSOCIATION, 1902

FIRST DAY

Saturday, September 27.—The Association met with Mount Hope Church at 10 o'clock a.m. The Moderator, P. C. Mays, and the Clerk, Nathan Keller, present.

The introductory sermon was preached by Eld. L.

Quinn. Subject, "The Mountains of the Lord."

The Association was called to order by the Mod-

erator.

By motion, fifteen minutes were spent in devotional exercises conducted by Eld. A. H. Autry.

Adjourned to meet at 1:30 p. m.

1:30 P. M.—Met pursuant to adjournment. The Association called to order by the Moderator. Prayer by Eld. W. W. Gardner.

Letters from churches were called for and read

and delegates enrolled.

The Moderator then asked the Association to join with him in a short prayer for guidance in his work

as Moderator.

Mount Hope Church refused to fellowship Pilot Grove Church, therefore the Moderator appointed a committee consisting of J. A. Finney, R. C. Cumbie and L. Quinn to investigate the cause.

Petitionary letters from Mount Harmony, Van Buren, Pine Mountain and Lone Star were read and received and delegates seated after receiving the right hand of fellowship from the Moderator.

A committee on Divine Services was appointed consisting of the pastor and clerk of Mount Hope church and Bros. J. E. Tatum and T. N. Sloat.

Bros. A. H. Autry and — Wammick were

seated as messengers from Dardanelle Association.

The following visiting brethren were seated: W. W. Gardner, representing Orphans' Home; H. H. Street, representing conportage of the state; H. Beecham, general missionary of State Board; A. R. Poge, Harmony; Ben Townley, Leroy Been, Oak Grove; N. Marshall, Henry Karr and J. H. Milburn.

Eld. W. W. Gardner made a short address on the Orphans' Home and took a collection for the home

amounting to \$10.46.

and \$15 cash.

On motion that the Executive Committe employ a

man to collect the money due Buckner College.

On motion that the Clerk be allowed \$10 for his services and that the remainder of the minute funds be expended for printing minutes.

STATE MISSIONS—MINORITY REPORT

Your Committee on State Missions beg leave to report as follows: In the year 1848 our Baptist fathers in Arkansas organized the Arkansas Baptist State Convention and for fifty-four years our work of State Missions has been carried on through the Executive Board of this Convention. During these years many of the most important points in the state have been aided. Some of these are now giving to our work more in one year than they received all told. The plans and methods by which the work has been carried on for the past twenty years, are the same as those used in every state in the Union. Since 1845 the various states as well as the Southern Baptist Convention have tried and experimented with many plans and today every state has this very plan. A financial secretary or agent is absolutely necessary to the success of any enterprise to be supported by the people. The contributions to State Missions have increased \$1,000 per year, during the past five years, and the number of Missionaries and the results of their labors have been proportionally increased. During the present year the board has the largest number of Missionaries of its history and the blessings of God are attending their labors. In the light of the foregoing facts we believe violent changes, to say nothing of separation and division shall tend to serious evil; that there may be corrections and improvements for the better it is useless to deny, but the destruction is not the way to

correct them and the attempt is very unwise and should be resented by every Baptist in the State;

Therefore.

Resolved; That we urge our full representation to attend the convention at Conway, November 14th, and our members of the State board to attend its meetings and that they use their best efforts to correct anything that may appear to the mwrong.

WOMAN'S WORK

We submit the following: The women of America enjoy greater privileges and have a higher social position and greater literary attainments than any other women of the earth. These grand and glorious privileges and great blessings are the direct results of the gospel of Christ. Having received so much from

the teachings of Christianity aside from the precious promise of Eternal life we owe it as a duty to do all we can to advance our Master's cause. We cannot preach, but like Aaron and Herr, we can hold up the hands of God's ministers who do proclaim the gospel. We can raise money to send missionaries into foreign lands, but to do this it requires organization and system. We have a Ladies' Aid Society in the Greenwood church and while it is but a small church this society has raised many hundred dollars, it annually contributes to pastors' salary and the various missions and now has in its treasury the sum of \$105, to be appropriated to the Lord's cause. The Ladies' Aid Society of Booneville since January, 1902, has raised something over \$100. This society sets aside the proceeds of the first meeting in each month for state missions. The Ladies' Aid Society of the First/Baptist Church of Fort Smith raised the magnificent sum of \$1500.

We therefore recommend; That the ladies of each church of this association organize aid societies and that they meet not less than twice in a month and each one pay a fixed amount each meeting. You will be astonished at the large sum you can raise in this

way and never miss it.

DIGEST OF LETTERS

We report as follows: Churches represented this year thirty-five. Churches represented last year thirty. Increase over last year five.

Messengers present at first Roll Call this year seventy-five. Number present last year seventy-one.

Increase over last year four.

Membership increased by Baptism, 168; increase by letter, 152; increase by restoration, ten; total, 330, by thirty-five churches. Total increase over last

year, four.

The most Baptism by First church of Fort Smith, twenty-six; greatest increase by Harmony church, thirty-seven; decrease by death, twenty-three; decrease by letter, 117; decrease by exclusion, fifty-six; total, 196; net gain this year, 134; greatest decrease by Boonville; Pirst church of Fort Smith and Van Buren, thirty each; total membership, 2,111; Sunday schools, eighteen; number of officers and teachers, 164; number of pupils, 1,186; two schools used Union literature.

We recommend that the churches be more explicit in writing their associational letters, especially with reference to Sunday schools, the number of officers, teachers and pupils. Much trouble could be avoided by the use of blank letters which can be secured from the clerk of the Association.

CONSTITUTION

ART. I. This Association shall be known as the Concord Assoiation.

ART. II. It shall be composed of Messenger from Babtist Churches known to be in good standing. Each church with fifty members or less, shall be entitled to three Messengers. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the church to one additional messenger.

ART. III. The officers shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual session, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

ART. IV. SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body according to parliamentary usage.

SECTION 2. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings, attend to the publication and distribution of the Minutes, keep a regular file of the printed Minutes of the body and deliver the same to his successor in office.

SECTION 3. The treasurer shall take charge of the funds of the Association, or its Executive Committee, and render an account of

the same to the annual session of this body.

ART. V. The objects of this Association shall be to promote Fellowship among the Churches, to secure unanimity of faith; to encourage concert in operation, and especially to cultivate the piety of the Churches; and to aid in this last object, several minutes of each session shall be spent in devotional exercises.

ART. VI. SECTION 1. This Association shall in no case interfere with the internal regulations of the Churches, but will act as advisory

council whenever it shall be necessary.

SECTION 2. It, however, claims authority over its own members, the Messengers from the Churches, and will withdraw from and dis own all Churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

A.T. VII. Newly organized Churches, or Churches dismissed from other Associations, may be admitted into this body upon application by letter and Messenger at our annual meeting, and subscribing by their Messenger to the abstract of principles herewith published.

ART. VIII. Churches may be dismissed from the Association upon application at the annual meeting for the purpose of joining a new Association, but any Church departing from us without being regularly dismissed, shall be regarded as disorderly.

ART. IX. SECTION 1. There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the officers of the body with five members chosen by the Association at each annual meeting. The duty of this Committee shall be to superintend the Missionary operations of the Association, and represent it in all matters requiring their attention when the Association is not in session. The committee shall report annually at each meeting of the Association. Three members of said committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Upon appointment, said committee shall come together and arrange their meetings and take such other steps as may be to the interest of the cause of Christ.

SECTION 2. The regular committees of this Association shall be as follows: Foreign'Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Associational Missions, Sunday School Missions, Education, Ministerial Support, Prohibition, Religious Literature, Digest of Letters, Nominations Queries, Finance, Order of Business, Woman's Work, Orphan's Home.

ART. X. It shall be the privilege of the Association, through its Executive Committee, in addition to the power already granted, to conduct Missionary operations within its limits, and for this purpose to choose a Missionary or Missionaries as means may allow, and defignate the fields of labor and pay them quarterly through its treasurer out of any funds in i.s hands except the money sent for publishing Minutes of every annual meeting.

ART. XI. The annual meeting of the Association shall embrace the Lord's Day and shall begin at 10 o'clock a.m., on Saturday before the fourth Lord's Day in September, at which time the introductory sermon shall be preached. On each succeeding day the Association shall adjourn at 11 o'clock for preaching.

ART. XII. This Constitution may be altered or amended, except as to Article VI, Section 1, at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-third vote of the members who are in attendance.

AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION.

ART. XIII. 1st. No person shall serve as Moderator of this body more than two terms in succession. Adopted in 1882.

2nd. The Constitution shall be published annually in the Minutes of this Association. Adopted in 1893.

3rd. Missionary Sermon is placed in the hands of Divine Service Committee. Adopted in 1894.

4th. Each Church is expected to send to each annual meeting of the Association, by the hands of its Messenger, a sum of money to be used for printing Minutes. Adopted in 1895.

5th. All moneys collected by the Association during its several sessions shall be under the control of this Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe there is one and only one, true and living Go?, Jehovah, and that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons

the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Words of God, constituting the only all-sufficient standard of Faith, Doctrine, Discipline and Practice.
- 3. We believe that election is the sovereign exercise of the eternal love by which God hath, according to His infinite wisdom, chosen His people in Christ before the world was, and has predestinated them unto the adoption of children, through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth, and doth keep them by His power through Faith unto Salvation.
- 4 We believe that man was created holy, but by wilful violation of the law of his maker, he fell into a state of sinfulness, who brought death upon his race, who being by natural desent in the unitaly image of Adam, are children of wrath by nature, and without natural or spiritual power to live a holy life or attain to a happy state.

5. We believe that sinners are saved by grace througe faith in

Jesus Christ, and no other way.

- 6. We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated or born again; that regeneration is effected by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth and the condition thereof are repentance and faith; the evidence thereof love to the brethren.
- 7. We believe that such only are believers as endure unto the end in holiness of life, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.
- 8. We believe the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God.
- 9. A Christian Church is a congregation of immersed believers who meet statedly and have convenanted together to maintain the ordinances of Christ, discharge the duties and enjoy the privileges of the New Testament appertaining to the Church of Jesus Christ.
- 10. The only proper officers of Christian Churches are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons.
- 11. Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit by a regularly ordained Baptist minister in good order.
- 12. The Lord's Supper is a positive and commemorative ordinance of Jesus Christ, to be observed in the Church as such in rememberance of Christ, and to show forth His death till He comes.
- 13. The first day of the week is the Lord's Day and should be observed as a day of rest from common labor and all worldly business, and devoted to religious duties.
- 14. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. An introductory sermon shall be preached by a minister chosen by ballot at the preceding Association. In case of absence or failure the sermon to be preached by an alternate chosen at the same time and in the same way. Some brother shall also be chosen to deliver a temperance address.

3. A committee of arrangements, consisting of five members, besides the Moderator and Clerk, who shall be members ex-officio, shall be appointed by the Moderator to arrange and report the "Order of business."

4. Visiting brethren who are in good standing may be invited to

seats, but not to a vote.

5. A member not satisfied with any decision of the Moderator may make an appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

6. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise, address

the Moderator, and upon obtaining leave shall proceed.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking unless he depart from the subject or use words of personal reflection, and then by the Moderator.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the con-

sideration of the Association by year and navs or otherwise.

9. A member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the

10. No member shall speak more than twice on one subject with-

out permission from the Mederator.

11. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in the Association

by the members in their addresses one to the other. Titles that are unknown to the Scriptures, such as "Rev.," "Parson" and the like, shall not be employed nor appear upon the Minutes.

2. The names of members shall be called as often as the Associa-

tion may direct.

13. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speaking as any other member, provided he appoints another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.

14. Any person violating these rules may be reproved by the Moderator at discretion, but only on the day the breach shall have

been made.

15. These rules may be amended or altered at any regular meeting of this Association by a majority vote of the Members present.
