yet it is a fact, often painful and humiliating, that the church expect men to give their time, their talents, their means education and give up prospects of a good living in some other work in order to serve them, and in return do not give them enough to supply the necessities of life. By reference to the minutes of our association, it will be seen that the average salary of the pastors of the Red River Association for the year 1902-3 was \$81.85. This fact ought to bring a blush as shame to our cheeks. We would not ask a negro farm laborate to work for it, but we are willing to ask a man to feed our immortal souls and lead our children to Christ for it. No comment is necessary.

In view of the above fact, we recommend that the churche go on their knees before God and repent of this shortcoming and then pray for the grace oi liberality. Following this will come an inevitable quickening of our consciences and

opening of our purses.
