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#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE

### SALINE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION---1920

The Association met with Big Creek Church, in Hot Spring County, ten miles South East of Malvern, Ark., on this day, October 2nd, 1920. The moderator being absent the clerk called the body to order at 10:00 a.m.

Permanent organization was effected by electing Eld. S. F. Funk moderator and A. B. Shockley elerk.

At 11:30 a. m. Eld. J. C. Hughes preached a good sermon, after which the body adjourned to 1:30 p. m.

#### SATURDAY AFTERNOON SERVICE

Re-assembled at 1:30 p. m. and petitionary letters were read from Pleasant Grove, Donaldson and Muldrow Chapel, the churches enrolled and their messengers welcomed and seated.

Eld. J. A. Smith of Little Rock, Ark. was welcomed as a visitor representing state mission work and "The Baptist and Commoner." D. H. Sandford was welcomed as a corresponding messenger from Pine Bluff Association.

#### SATURDAY NIGHT SERVICE

Met at 7:30 p. m. and after the usual committees were announced, Eld. J. A. Smith preached a splendid sermon.

#### SUNDAY FORENOON SERVICE

Met at 10:00 a. m. The report on Sunday Schools was discussed and adopted as follows:

"Your Committee recommends that every church should have a lively and interesting Sunday School, and we recommend that the literature published at Texarkana, Ark., by the Sunday School Committee be used. We should have a Sunday School every Sunday at every church and teach and tearn the true principles and doctrines of the Bible. Respectfully submitted, W. H. Deer, W. T. Goza, J. M. Orr, Louis Davis, Committee."

At 11:00 a. m. Eld. J. A. Smith preached at the church and Eld. S. F. Funk at the School House near by, after which the Report on Orphans' Home was taken up and adopted as follows:

#### TEXARKANA ORPHANS' HOME

Our Home for Orphan Children at Texarkana. Arkansas, is in need of funds and the churches of the State Association must be depended upon to support this home. We have thirty-six children in the home that must be fed, clothed and cared for. We have assumed the responsibility of looking after and protecting them and we must not come short in our duty in this worthy cause. Our churches should take collections from time to time and send the funds to Elder J. W. Sims, Marvel, Ark., as he

is the Treasurer for the Home. These children have neither fathers nor mothers to care for them, therefore they are real objects of charity. They are our children and we cannot afford to neglect to support and care for them. Everyone should sympathize with orphan children and contribute to their support in the way of funds, food or clothing. Respectfully submitted, R. P. Goodman, J. L. Fowler and W. B Hardage." On the adoption of the foregoing report a public collection for the Orphans' Home was taken, amounting to \$52.32.

#### SUNDAY AFTERNOON SERVICE

Met at 3:00 p. m., and the report on Obituaries was read and adopted as follows:

#### STATE MISSIONS

"We, your Committee, submit the following report: The State Association of Baptist Churches of Arkansas have had nine missionaries in the field

this year, some of them for full time, others for part time. Those missionaries have done, and are doing, a good work. We need funds to carry on this great work and we recommend that the Churches of this Association take collections between now and the meeting of the State Association, which is to be at Waldo, Ark., Nov. 9, 1920.

On the adoption of the foregoing report Eld. J. A. Smith took a collection of \$8.15 cash and \$75.00 in pledges to be paid by Nov. 1, 1920.

#### SUNDAY NIGHT SERVICE

Met at 6:30. Eld. N. D. Jones preached a splendid sermon, followed by a good talk by Eld. G. L. Richardson, who was visiting from Sheridan, Ark.

#### MONDAY FORENOON SESSION

Met at 8:30. Reports as follows were read and adopted:

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

"Beleiving it our duty to send the Gospel to all the world, we wish to emphasize our Lord's Commission, 'Go teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." Beside the missionaries already in the foreign field there has been ten added recently, therefore we recommend that the churches composing Saline Association contribute more liberally to the support of this work.—Frank Thurston, T. O. Phillips, W. W. Mills, W. A. Hammond, Committee."

#### HOME MISSIONS

"The commission to preach the Gospel was given by Christ to the Churches and they only have the right and authority to do so. We therefore urge that the Churches be active in sending the gospel to every nook and corner of this great country of ours. There are now seven missionaries in the Home Field, and there should be seven hundred. May our Churches get a greater vision of the fields that are white unto harvest. —Orlando C. Williams, W. Carl Brown, Committee."

#### ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

"Whereas, there is much destitution within the bounds of Saline Association, we recommend that the Churches co-operate together in supporting at least one missionary from July 1st to October 1st. 1921, provided that some church recommends the missionary as taught in the 13th Chapter of Acts. If some Church be led by the spirit to send out a missionary, the Church is to fix his salary and notify the Clerk of the Association of her action and the Clerk is to inform the other Churches requesting their co-operation in supporting the missionary. We further recommend that every Church that is able. to do so release her pastor and pay him to hold at least one week's meeting at some destitute point during the year and report this work to the next session of the Association. #### MISSIONARY COMMITTEE REPORT

"We, your Committee appointed at the last Session of this Association, report the following: We were appointed to fill any vacancy caused by the resignation or death of the missionary elected by the Association. The Association elected Eld. J. C. Hughes as Missionary. He declined to serve. Eld. O. C. Robinson was selected and he declined the work. The Committee then selected Eld. J. A. Hammond. About the 10th day of December, 1919, he accepted the work to labor Saturdays and Sundays until March the first, 1920, and then begin full time on the field until October 1st, 1920. We are not informed as to the amount of work done by the missionary but he is to make his report to this body.

On motion the clerk was allowed \$25.00 for his services and he was requested to have as many copies of the minutes printed as the funds on han't would pay for and as the amount sent up by the Churches was not sufficient to have the usual number printed, a cash collection of \$8.55 was taken, and more promised by a number of the messengers to be sent in from the Churches later on in order to

make the necessary amount. Eld.Wm.Dougan, a we'-come visitor from Prattsville, Ark., contributed \$1 to the minute fund, and after paying the missionary a balance of \$2.15 was left on hand and this amount was added to the minute fund.

The business of this session having closed, a motion carried to adjourn. During the last song the parting hand was taken and all rejoiced that they had attended this, one of the best and most harmonious sessions of this grand old Association. organized 84 years ago. The several sermons, the singing, the devotional services were soul uplifting and the entertainment by the good people of the Church and community could not have been better. Dinner was served on the grounds each day and the great crowds feasted to their hearts' content. Everything was good and everybody was happy. May God's blessings continue with us in order that we may have another great meeting at old Ten Mile Church next October. We trust every Church will send messengers who will stay until the last benediction is pronounced.

#### CONSTITUTION

Article 1.—This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the name and title of the "Saline Baptist Association."

Article 2.—This Association in all co-operative work agrees that it will co-operate only along lines in harmony with Acts, 13th chapter, as exemplified by the Missionary Baptist.

Article 3.—This Association shall be composed of messengers from churches in union. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their several churches before they take their seats.

Article 4.—The messengers, when convened, shall

organize themselves into a deliberate body by appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at each annual Association, and shall continue in office until their successors are chosen.

Article 5.—The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed. It shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and shall act only as an advisory council, assuming no authority, except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or evidently implied by the very nature of the compact. It nevertheless claims authority over its members—the messengers from the churches and in propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches which depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice. It should therefore regard all churches united under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Its principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending the kingdom of grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the Gospel, and the means in accordance with the Gospel, and to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially with those united in this constitution.

Article 6.—Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union on their sending three messengers to the annual meeting of the Association, with a petition for admission, and by their messengers agreeing to the abstract of principles herewith published.

Article 7.—The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association a written communication, specifying the names of their messengers, their number in fellowship, number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated, restored or occeased since the last session, and all other information which the churches

may deem important, which shall be read and minutes made accordingly.

Article 8.—This Association may have a fund supplied by the voluntary contribution of the churches, and all the money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the Committee on Finance to the Treasurer who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association. He shall retain and manage the funds agreeably to the order of the Association, and shall present annually, for insertion in the minutes, a clear and sufficient statement of the receipts and expenditures.

Article 9.—This Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.

Article 10.—This Association shall take cognizance of no query sent up from the churches, unless they have endeavored to solve the same and have failed, nor any difficulty between churches, unless they have pursued the direction in the eighteenth chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them. Then this Association shall take matters into consideration and act upon them at its discretion.

Article 11.—It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to keep a regular file of the printed minutes of every session of this body, and to deliver over the same to his successor in office.

Article 12.—The Constitution may be altered or amended at regular meetings of the Association by the concurring vote of two-thirds of the members then present; provided, such alteration or amendment be approved of by the churches comprising this Association.



Born May 24, 1844, Clinton County, Indiana. A minister forty-eight years, State Evangelist about three years and did a great work. And during this time he preached 876 sermons and baptized 582 converts. A successful pastor of churches. A number of years Editor of The Arkansas Baptist (now the Baptist and Commoner.) Moderator of the Saline Association eight times. A real missionary who stood four square for church independence and supremacy. A patriot in Israel fallen-called to his reward June 30, 1920. #### ELDER SIDNEY F. FUNK

Elder Funk is probably the oldest living member and preacher of the Saline Association. He went as a messenger from Brush Creek Church to the Association which met with Smith Creek Church in 1869-51 years ago. He has been an ordained minister 50 years and all this time has been an active pastor of churches, except the past four or five years, when old age and feeble health prevented him from accepting any pastoral work. He is now past 80 years of age and often preaches with the vigor of vouth. He has served four sessions of the Association as Moderator, and now holds this honorable nosition, having been elected at the last session. Few men have been as faithful in advancing the cause of Christ. May his last days be the happiest of a wellspent life. A. B. S.
