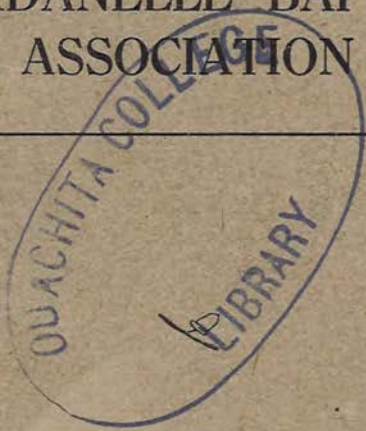

PROCEEDINGS

The Dardanelle Baptist Association convened in its fifty-eighth annual session with the First Baptist Church, Dardanelle, Ark., Saturday, Sept. 14, 1912, at 10 a. m.

After devotional services conducted by Gen. W. E. Atkinson, the body was called to order by the Moderator.

At 11 a. m. Eld. E. H. Gray delivered the introductory sermon from Luke 24:48 and Acts 1:8. Subject, "Witnessing for Jesus."

Adjourned until 2 p. m.

After song service and prayer by Bro. J. C. Shepherd, the Moderator appointed Dr. J. W. Conger, J. I. Cowger and Coy Muckle reading clerks. Sister Veazey read the report on Woman's Work as follows:

Your committee on Woman's Work submits the following report. Our Heavenly Father has seen fit, in his kindness and mercy, to honor woman's work down through the ages, both of Old and New Testament times. It was the women who lingered at the cross and who went to the tomb to do service for the Lord. To her was given from the Master's own lips the commission: "Go tell my disciples and Peter."

O, what an inspiration should these words be to every woman who loves her Lord—just to feel that God still calls you to carry the good tidings of a risen Savior. And will you, dear sister, bear the message in great haste as did these first women who were told to carry the message?

The need is great in our own Dardanelle Association; need for more preaching; need for more and better Sunday Schools; need for the women to be organized into missionary societies in more of our churches. If a woman's missionary society is a good work for one church then wouldn't it be good for all our churches? In Dardanelle Association we have over forty churches. Five of these have missionary societies. Four of these last year reported \$462.95. At this rate if each church had a society at work this might have been \$4,629.50.

Pastors, there are women in your churches longing for your encouragement and co-operation in their work, and will you say nay to them any longer?

Education

J. I. Cowger read the report on Education as follows:

The question of educating our boys and girls is one of the most serious which we as parents have to consider. Especially to those of us who have to send our children away from home, as our boys and girls must be taken from father and mother at an age at which they are so easily led astray. The selection of a suitable place to send them cannot be too seriously or prayerfully considered. How much we need not only the development of our children mentally and physically, but the education of the heart as well. In fact, an education is not complete which does not include all. We need so much the help of educated Christian boys and girls. The harvest is so great and the laborers are few.

We recommend, therefore, that each pastor spend at least one service in the old time way of praying the Lord of the harvest that he might lay His hands on some of our boys to carry his message to a dying world. The need is so great we must have them. And that the pastor also take a collection for the support of the same.

Whereas; We find great need of missionary work within the bounds of this Association, we recommend that at least one missionary be put in the field for full time and shall receive for faithful service not less than sixty (\$60) dollars per month for the time he is actually engaged in this work. And that the Association Board

co-operate with him, and that it supply, so far as possible, any vacancies that may occur.

We further recommend Bro. J. W. Comer as our missionary and that he be authorized to take collections at any time and place, the collections to apply on his salary. We further recommend that the missionary report once a month to "The Baptist" and the "Baptist Advance."

Sunday Schools

Bro. H. G. Thomasson read the report on Sunday Schools as follows:

The letters to the Association are so incomplete as to S. S. statistics, that it is impossible to gather accurate information. Many of the letters only state that they have a Sunday School. We do find, however, that the number of schools has increased from 13 to 20, and that one church conducts two schools.

This is a splendid increase, but brethren we should do better. It is impossible to conceive a live Baptist church without a teaching service. Let us strive for as great an increase this year as in the year just past. Let us all be willing to be used to that end.

For the instruction and edification of God's "young masterpieces" nothing short of the best literature is permissible. Hence we recommend the daily use of the Bible and purely Baptist literature.

State Missions

Eld. E. H. Gray read the following report on State Missions:

Arkansas is a great mission field. Within her borders are thousands of lost souls, many of whom are without the gospel, not only in country places, but also in cities and towns, there exists alarming destitution.

There rests upon Baptists a special obligation to preach the gospel throughout the state because the people need the truth as we hold it, and because our Lord's commission was given to His churches. Baptists will fail in their appointed task should they leave it to others in any degree the work of evangelism in our state.

We are pleased to note the increased interest in State Missions, but we urge that the work be given a far greater place in our preaching and practice. We especially recommend that our pastors preach regularly on this subject and that collections be taken quarterly in all our churches for this great cause.

Orphans' Homes

J. W. Richardson read the report on Orphanage as follows:

This glorious work is fundamental to the religious life and activity of our churches. "Pure religion, and undefiled before God and the Father is this: To visit the fatherless and widows in their afflictions; and to keep himself unspotted from the world," and the church or individual who fails to support the homeless orphans, or the helpless widow, fails to exhibit the true spirit of Christianity.

The Baptists of Arkansas have two orphans' homes which claim your sympathy, prayers and money for their support. One located at Texarkana with 36 children; the other at Monticello with 148 children.

The Texarkana Home has a three-story brick building and about 8 or 10 acres of ground. That Home is in sore need of funds to meet a \$600 debt on current expenses and for its present maintenance, and also funds to meet the payments on their property, which will soon be due. This property is valued at \$10,000.

The Monticello Home has one brick building and 8 other buildings of frame construction, together with 320 acres of land. Also about 75 head of cattle, 100 head of Poland China hogs, four teams and 3 young colts. This property is valued at \$43,000. They need and must have three new buildings to meet our growing and imperative demands. A laundry, a hospital and a boys' dormitory to cost approximately \$3,000. They are badly in need of funds to pay past debts, something like \$7,000, and to meet current expenses which now aggregate about \$1,000 per month.

We recommend:

1. That every Sunday School in our bounds contribute one Sunday's collection a month to these Homes.
2. That every Ladies' Aid Society and Woman's Auxiliary take at least one child to clothe.
3. That every church organize an Orphan's Home Cir-

cle, whose business it is to see every member and solicit funds for these homes monthly, so as to put this work on a systematic basis, and thus keep the stream of money flowing into the treasury constantly so as to relieve our embarrassment brought about by our unsystematic way of supporting these institutions.
