#### PROCEEDINGS.

- 1. The Mt. Zion Association of Missionary Baptists convened with Harrisburg Baptist Church on Tuesday morning, Oct. 7, 1913, being called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Moderator P. C. Barton.
- After singing "Showers of Blessings" and the reading of the Twenty-third Psalm, the Association was led in prayer by J. W. Seay.
- 3. Upon motion the hour of 2:00 p. m. was set for permanent organization.
  - 4. A short song and praise service was led by P. C. Barton.
- State Secretary of Missions of the Baptist State Convention,
   Dr. J. T. Christian, preached, using as a text Acts 22:17.
- After announcements were made, the Association adjourned to meet at 2:00 p. m. Benediction by Dr. J. T. Christian.

### TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

- 7. A devotional exercise was conducted by G. R. Tyler.
- 8. Moderator appointed J. W. Williams and W. C. Hamil reading clerks, and R. C. Medaris, R. T. Stuart and J. M. Tyner Committee on Credentials.
- Letters were read from churches named in tabulated sheet at close of this minute, and they were recommended to seats by the Committee on Credentials.
- 10. The election of officers was then held, resulting as follows:

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING.

- 19. Association was called to order and J. W. Seay led a devotional exercise.
  - 20. The journal of the preceding day was read and approved.
- 21. The report on Christian Education was presented by W. C. Wood. Dr. J. W. Conger, President of Central College, Conway, Ark., being present, he was called upon to speak to this report which he did in an able manner. P. C. Barton and R. C. Medaris also spoke to the report.

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Christian Education is scriptural. It is one of the three phases of all denominational work. The three phases of denominational work are Christian Missions, Christian Education and Christian Benevolence. These interests cover the work of our churches aside from all local matters. No New Testament church ought to fail to contribute annually to each of these three interests in all they mean.

At the Baptist State Convention in Hot Springs last November an Education Board was created. This Board consists of twenty-four members, and is put exactly on the same level with the State Mission and the Orphan's Home Boards. The Education Board has authority to raise and disburse money for the running expenses and improvements of the schools fostered by the Convention, and to raise money for endowment. This Board through its Secretary asks and urges that every Baptist church in the state make an offering annually to Christian Education.

A campaign was waged during January and February for Christian Education. The amount raised was \$7076.30. Much more than this was needed and ought to have been contributed. Some of our largest churches did not give one cent. Aside from this, the campaign was very encouraging. Dr. E. Y. Mullins and Dr. S. Y. Jameson say that Arkansas Baptists went beyond any other southern state in this matter, considering that it was our first campaign of the sort. More than two hundred churches represented in the campaign, each contributing from one dollar up to five hundred dollars. We must never let up on this line. It is the hope of our Baptist schools, and they are necessary to a vigorous, aggressive denomination. It is as inevitable as death that if Arkansas Baptists neglect their colleges, we will suffer untold loss in leadership for both pulpit and pew, and in missionary and aggressive denominational spirit generally.

#### REPORT OF MINISTERIAL BOARD.

We, your committee, recognize that the Baptist interests as well as Baptist advancement depends largely on an educated ministry. We rejoice greatly that we have about 50 young ministers in Ouachita College. This fact should appeal to every Baptist Church throughout the state.

Our churches should not only give to Ministerial Education, but should pray the Lord of the Harvest to send forth more laborers into His vineyard.

37. W. C. Hamill read the report on Literature. It was spoken to by W. C. Hamill, E. J. A. McKinney, P. C. Barton, and adopted as follows:

#### LITERATURE.

A certain great man in his dying hour said, "Give me the Book." An attendant said, "What Book." He replied, "There is but One Book, The Bible." Let all other literature sink into insignificance beside the Holy Bible.

There is much literature to help us to understand the Bible. We practice the art of acute and ready discrimination. There are too few people doing the thinking of the world. As plain Baptists, let us do our own plain thinking about the plain Book.

Solomon said, "Of the making of many books there is no end." We cannot begin to even read all the good books there are, much less such stuff as is manufactured by the Russellites, the Eddyites, and birds of their feather. We should not allow such literature in our

homes to poison the minds of our children—it should be peremptorily burned.

We recommend that pastors ascertain the kind of literature their people have in their homes, and assist them in getting the best. Our own Baptist Book Houses can furnish anything needed. Our Association Missionary, our State Missionary Secretary, our Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, will all very gladly assist.

We urge the constant reading of the Foreign Mission Journal, The Home Field, and the Baptist Advance. Each one of these is exceeding-

ly essential to any well-regulated Baptist home.

We most earnestly recommend that every pastor make constant and most persistent effort to put the Advance into every home in his church, even if he has to raise a special fund for that purpose among the wealthier members. It will be Home Missions of the most farreaching sort.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Associational Missions submit the following report:

# Our Territory and People.

The territory embraces all of Craighead, Mississippi, Crittenders and Poinsett counties, and parts of Cross and Greene counties. We have in this territory a white population of tens of thousands, and because of the vast resources and the marvelous development, the population of our section is increasing at a rapid rate.

#### The Work to be Done.

- 1. To teach our people to observe all things that Christ taught ns; especially do our people need to be taught concerning Christian stewardship.
- 2. Not a few of our weaker churches are ready to die, and there must be assisted in conducting evangelistic and missionary meetings, and in securing and supporting efficient pastors.
- 3. Several of our weaker churches have no house of worship of their own, and these must be assisted in building church buildings.
- 4. There are many waste places in our midst where we have no regular Baptist preaching, Sunday School, or Church, and into those

places there must go the missionary; and where the population and conditions will justify organizing, we must organize Sunday Schools and churches.

#### The Things That Hinder.

- The alarming fewness of faithful, efficient preachers and leaders.
  - 2. The luke-warmness and indifference of so many of our people.
- The withering influence of mammonism and worldliness upon many of our church members.
- 4. The deadly, God-destroying and soul-destroying doctrines of Anti-Christ—Russellism, Christian Science and Roman Catholicism.
- The lack of knowledge of our people concerning the Bible and our denominational work.

#### Recommendations.

In view of these things your committee feels constrained to make the following recommendations:

- That we should not only hold Fifth Sunday meetings, but should hold Bible and Misisonary Institutes in many places the coming year.
- That we increase our contribution to Associational Missions so as to supplement the salary of our missionary pastors.
- 3. That we ask the co-operation of the State Mission Board in securing and supporting our missionary pastors.
- 4. That we enlarge our contributions to Associational Missions that will enable us to keep not only one but two missionaries on the fields the ensuing year.
- 5. That a church building committee of five members be appointed whose duty it shall be to aid our homeless churches in building churches.
- 6. That the best possible arrangeemnts be made for the distribution of religious literature.

#### A Final Word.

Brethren, as your committee sees it, never in the history of our Association have we been confronted with such mighty organized Satanic forces, that day by day and night by night, oppose the onward march of Christ and His Kingdom and in many places these forces of the wicked ones predominate and the Lord's cause seems to be almost lost. But our Lord still lives and many open doors are before us and never did we have such opportunities to show our faith in God's eternal promises and we urge that all take charge and go forward with an unflinching faith in God. Let us lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes and undertake great things for God and expect great things of Him.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

To the Mt. Zion Association:

We beg to submit the following report of work done the past year!
We employed Brethren Dillard M. Carter and W. F. Warren, two
of our ministerial students in Ouachita College, to do Mission work
during the summer vacation.

We also employed Eld. R. C. Medaris for full time work, beginning April 1st, at a salary of \$100.00 per month and traveling expenses. He labored one hundred and eighty-three days, traveled seventeen hundred and thirty-six miles, preached one hundred and forty sermon made fifty-seven addresses, had twenty professions, fifteen baptions (by others), twenty-three additions by letter, distributed seven thousand three hundred sixty pages of tracts, gave away fifteen Bibles and Testaments, sold two hundred eighty books, Bibles and Testaments and received for same \$86.35, collected on the field for Associational Missions \$322.13, ract fund \$14.50, Foreign Missions \$15.00, Home Missions \$14.80, Minute funds \$8.50. Held three meetings and assisted two others, and made twenty-four visits to churches with a great number of visits in homes. His traveling expenses were \$44.98, and making a total of \$644.98, leaving a balance of \$322.76 paid by the Board.

The following is a summary of work done by Bro. Carter:

Labored ninety-two days, traveled nine hundred ninety-one miles preached seventy-four sermons, made twenty-three addresses, this four professions of conversion, thirteen baptisms (by others), all additions by letter, organized one church, collected on the field expenses \$42.03, leaving a balance of \$74.55 paid by the Board also made a large number of visits in homes and done personal we cannot enumerate.

The following is the summary of the work done by Bro. W. Warren:

Labored ninety-four days, traveled one thousand ninety-moving miles, sermons fifty-nine, addresses thirty-six, conversions sevent thirteen baptisms, received by letter and restoration ten, religious vices in homes twenty-five; salary \$125.33, traveling expenses making a total of \$150.79. He collected on the field \$64.68, low in a balance of \$86.11, paid by the Board.

We assisted the following churches by supplementing the pastore salaries as follows:

Bono—W. G. Mathis, \$90.00; Truman—W. G. Mathis, \$10.00 | Mathis, \$10.00 |

Bro. W. G. Mathis, reports show that there were nine convertional five baptisms and ten additions by letter, to his churches, most which is covered in Bro. Medaris' report. We are glad to note that Bro. Mathis succeeded in building a very good house of worship at Truman, notwithstanding his churches fell behind with him on malest \$83.57.

Bro. McClain was forced to resign the work at Lake City on and

count of his wife's health, taking effect July 1st, therefore his reports show only the regular services for seven months with no conversions per additions.

iro. Lincoln failed to make any formal reports, but he was on the field regularly throughout the year.

We are sorry to note that none of these missionary pastors report having any money for any of our denominational interests.

We regret to again report that a great many of our churches are pastorless, and are not doing the efficient work that would be done under competent leaders. (A large majority of these churches want pastors, if one could be had, but we are unable to do anything like supply their needs.

While the year's work has not been anything like what the committee had expected, we feel that much and lasting good has been accomplished.

Let us all pray earnestly, that the Lord may call more men into the gospel ministry, that this great and growing field may be taken for Christ and Baptists.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

It is highly important that every Baptist should have a good understanding both of the faith and the work of the denomination. He cannot be a very valuable member of a Baptist church if he is ignorant of either our faith or our work. These Associational meetings ought to enlighten our people on Baptist faith and Baptist work, and the messengers present ought to carry that enlightenment back to their respective churches.

Of all the work the denomination is doing, none is more important and immediately imperative than that department we call Home Missions. How many of the messengers understand fully what is meant by Home Missions, and can go home and explain this work to those members of their churches who do not understand what it is?

Home Missions, in a word, signifies the work done by the Southern Baptist Convention to save the lost in the homeland, to organize churches, Sunday Schools, etc., and in other ways to develop and strengthen those who are saved, so that they may be effective agents in saving others.

The agency through which Southern Baptists do this work is the Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Georgia, B. D. Gray, D. D. Corresponding Secretary. For the convenience of the hrotherhood west of the Mississippi river, and for greater efficiency in the work an office is maintained in Dallas, Texas, J. F. Love, Secretary.

The work of the Board is manifold, including missionary, evanulistic, educational and church building departments, and work amout the immigrants, foreigners, negroes, etc. As it would make this report too long to explain and emphasize this work so that all could understand it as they ought, your committee makes the following recommendations:

- That every pastor in the Association get at least one good book on Home Missions, and prepare himself to enlighten his people on the subject.
- 2. That pastors, churches and missionary societies make full use of the leaflet literature of the Board, which can be had for the asking of J. F. Love, No. 717 Slaughter Building, Dallas, Texas.
- 3. That an agent be appointed in each church in the Association, to select subscribers for the Home Field, the monthly magnitude published by the Board.

These three recommendations are essential to an understanding of this great work.

We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, submit the following as our report:

We are gratified to note the slight increase of interest and enthusiasm along the lines of Missions as indicated by the reports from the churches in our Association. Yet the advance is so slight—so nearly a standstill—that we have little room for congratulations.

We are thankful to God that the Spirit that made us a great denomination still abides—the passion of Carey and Judson still lingers in the camp of our Israel.

Our churches are not alive on this question as they should be. We do not realize its importance as we should. When we abandon the mission of the word SAVIOR, we part company with Christ and are doomed to decay and darkness.

We would urge that the preachers preach more on the Great Commission. Let not the Baptist spirit, that broke the silence of the Wilderness and made the waste places populous with anxious hearers, die out. The ice of selfishness can only be melted into the generous streams, by fires of a great world-love.

We must not be betrayed into the error of stressing the home, and home field, at the expense of our work abroad. REMEMBER, that those who feel no obligations to fields abroad will not long feel obligated to work at home. The sun that shines about our home shines over all the homes of the world. It is thus with salvation—if we have it here, we must have it everywhere.

The report on Woodland College was made by P. C. Barton. The report was spoken to by P. C. Barton, E. P. Minton, B. H. Parrish, W. C. Wood, J. H. Kitchens and T. B. Kitchens, then adopted as given below. Upon motion a special committee of five was appointed to report at the evening session of the association as to what disposition shall be made of the college. W. C. Wood, E. P. Minton, R. C. Medaris, Dr. R. L. Thompson, Dr. W. H. Borun constituted the committee.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WOODLAND COLLEGE.

We, your Board of Trustees, beg to report that after the special committee failed to sell the property and after a thorough consideration of all the conditions and at the suggestion of some of our State men, we decided that it would be wise to affiliate the school with the colleges under our State Board, therefore we formulated a statement conforming to the requirements of our State Convention tendering our Woodland College property through our Educational Board to the State Convention, which was adopted by said Board and every member pleased his support of the measure to the State Convention, except one, woodld not oppose it but wanted further time to consider it.

The conditions of affiliating would necessarily require the opening and operating of the college in addition to it free of encumbrance, therefore, your Board proceeded to secure a faculty in the persons of W. M. Harrell, A. B. of Baylor University, as President, with Rev. W. C. Hamil and wife as teacher and manager of the dormitory respectively; Miss Della Roberson, English and Expression; Miss Katherine Coleman, of Berlin University, Berlin, Germany, Instructor in Piana; Miss Vera Broadaway, Teacher of Voice, and Miss Willie Broadaway, of Vulin, making what we consider a strong and most excellent faculty.

President Harrell proceeded to get out catalogue and make a campaign for students, fixing the opening of the school on September 22nd, and we are sorry to say that only 20 matriculated for the first two weeks and that only five of these were paying students in the Literary Department. Therefore, the local members of the Board met in a call meeting at the office of the Secretary, W. B. Langford, on the 6th instand resolved to close the school, Prof. W. C. Hamil having already ton dered his resignation and Pres. Harrell being willing and ready to the der his, on account of the great discouragement in the lack of co-operation and encouragement by our brethren in giving the necessary patronage to support this effort.

The school was closed on the morning of the 7th, except the Plano Department, which it may be wise and necessary to continue first, because our teacter. Miss Coleman, is not willing to cancel the contract second, because the present enrollment in her department makes it al

most self-supporting, and third, for the reason that with proper effort it can be made to pay the etntire expense of running it and be an asset in advertising the college, if nothing more, if said effort is put forth.

H. W. Graham, one of the Trustees, whose time expired in 1914, resigned at a meeting in July last and the same was accepted and Dr. E. E. Dudley elected by the Board to fill the vacancy, therefore we ask that the Asso iation approve of the Board's action in this matter.

The terms of T. B. Kitchens, J. H. Kitchens and T. W. Altman expire as Trustees at this time and we recommend that they be re-elected to succeed themselves.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We, your committee, have examined carefully the reports of all the churches, and find reports from 43 churches. Of these 33 nave Sunday Schools with a membership of 2,975 and an increase of 476 over last year. We find 10 churches without Sunday Schools. have found that there has never been a time in our history when our our portunities were so good as now. There has been a general advance in the educational qualifications of our chuch membership. The caurches have a large number who possess well-laid foundations for preparing Sunday school classes. There are comparatively few who have given Bible teaching any real attention. This can be improved by cooperation with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the use of their talented, well-trained, consecrated Secretaries. This Board offers the very best of literature and it is an easy matter to obtain up-to-date equipment at a low cost. We recommend the holding of Sunday School Institutes; regular weekly meetings for the teachers of the Sunday Schools for study and preparation of the lesson, that the churches conduct; Sunday School Teachers' Training Classes that shall coutain as many as possible of members of the church. In order that we carry out these recommendations, brethren. we urge that this Association appoint a committee of three whose duty shall be to organize a Mt. Zion Baptist Sunday School Convention, the purpose of which shall be to co-operate with the State Secretary of the Sunday School Board and other Baptist agencies looking to the organization, development and the general efficiency of our Baptist Sunday Schools.
