Proceedings of the Sixty-Second Annual Session of the
Red River Baptist Association

**Held With the Bethlehem Baptist Church, Clark County, Ark.,
October 8-9-10, 1910.**

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Red River Baptist Association met in its Sixty-Second annual session with Bethlehem Church, Clark County, Arkansas, and was called to order by Brother J. H. Smart, former Moderator.

Bro. H. L. Winburn read 24th Chapt. of Matt. and Bro. H. J. P. Horne led in prayer.

The Moderator called attention to the absence of Bro. Bledsoe, the former Clerk, whereupon Bro. J. M. Gullick was elected temporary Clerk. The letters from the churches, were then placed on the table and Bretheren H. L. Winburn, Jno. B. Langley and H. C. Stroud were appointed Reading Clerks. After concluding the reading of the letters, in the absence of the appointee, on motion, Bro. Horne preached the introductory sermon, taking for his text: 1 Timothy, 4: 10, "The living God, who is the Savior of all men, especially of those that believe," delivering a very forceful discourse. On motion adjourned until 1:30 for refreshments.

Promptly at the appointed hour the Association convened for business, Bro. W. A. Forbes read John 17th chapt. and Bro. G. A. Franklin led in prayer.

Letters from Missionary Grove and Mt. Olive churches were presented and Messengers names enrolled. The roll of Messengers was then called and absentees noted, at the conclusion of which the body proceeded to elect a Moderator and Clerk. The tellers, Bros. W. A. F. Wells and Dr. Cox announced that Bro. J. H. Smart had been re-elected Moderator and Bro. Gullick, Clerk.

Other belated church letters were presented and Messengers enrolled.

Petitionary letters were then called for but none responded.

Corresponding Messengers from sister Associations were next called for, none present.

Elder D. W. Barham, from Union Association; Elder W. A. Cummings, from Blue Mountain Association, and Elder R. K. Pope, from Big Creek Association, were welcomed as visitors.

The Messengers from this church with Bro. T. J. Dillard were appointed a committee on divine service.

Motion prevailed that a committee on digest of letters be appointed and that they report during the session of this body. The Moderator appointed on this committee, Bros. W. A. Forbes, H. L. Winburn and A. E. Lawley.

Bros. H. J. P. Horne and W. A. Forbes were authorized to represent us at Judson and Hope Associations respectively.

The committee on divine service then reported, that Dr. N. R. Townsend preach at the church house tonight and that Bro. Winburn preach at some place Sunday 11 a. m. Sunday at 9:30 Sunday School mass meeting led by Bro. W. U. Davis.

The Moderator announced committee on Sunday Schools, H. J. P. Horne, J. W. Wingfield and Seth Thomas.

Committee on Finance, R. S. Brown, Ambrose Bledsoe and Wiley May.

On motion all Sunday afternoon was set apart to Educational work.

Committee on Ministerial Education, Dr. N. R. Townsend, Dr. E. Cox, L. A. Moseley; Schools and Colleges, W. A. Forbes, W. A. Measles and E. H. Acuff; Young People's Work, H. L. Winburn, Harmon Bishop and C. L. Dunlap.

On motion adjourned to 9:30 tomorrow. Closing prayer by Dr. Townsend.

At 7:30 p. m. the people began to assemble for preaching, during which time, was held a delightful prayer and praise service, led by Dr. N. R. Townsend, at the close of which he entered the stand and delivered an able discourse, taking for his subject: "The Birth of Christ." After the close of sermon two persons stood for prayer.

SUNDAY, 9:30 A. M.

The Moderator read 23rd Psalm. Prayer by Bro. Lawley.

Report on Sunday Schools was presented and read by Bro. Horne, and moved its adoption. A motion was made to strike out the word three in the report and insert five. The motion to amend carried, and the original report as amended was adopted, after being discussed by Brethren Horne, Milburn, Burns, Webb and Winburn.

The committee recommended in the report is as follows: H. J. P. Horne, H. L. Winburn, Jno. M. Milburn, W. U. Davis, W. S. Roe.

For Report see Appendix, A.

Adjourned until 2:30.

Immediately the congregation assembled in the grove near by, to hear preaching by Bro. Winburn, who taken for his text: "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son, clenseth us from sin," 1 John 1:7. Bro. Winburn seemed at his best, and all present seemed eager to catch every word.

Dismissed for refreshments to 2:30 p. m.

After enjoying a bountiful spread of good things prepared by the people of the community, the Association re-assembled, and was called to order by the Moderator. Bro. D. W. Barham, of Union Association, led the prayer.

Committee on divine service, reported that Bro. Barham would preach tonight at the Cross Road school house and that Bro. Forbes would preach at the church the same hour.

Bro. Forbes read the reports on Schools and Colleges and moved its adoption.

In connection with the above report, Dr. Townsend presented and read the report on Ministerial Education. The two reports were discussed together by Brethren Forbes, Milburn, Townsend, Cummins, Barham and Burns, and was adopted by amending the report on Ministerial Education recommending that Dr. Townsend take a collection for Ministerial Education tonight at close of sermon. For reports see Appendix B and C. Bro. Winburn presented and read the report on Young People's Work, and moved its adoption. Discussed by Winburn and Milburn and adopted. For report see Appendix D.

On motion adjourned until after services tonight.

At the appointed hour Bro. Forbes read lesson and taken for his subject: "Why I am a Baptist," delivering a strong discourse on the principles as believed, taught and practiced by Baptists. At close of religious services, in the absence of the Moderator, on motion Bro. Forbes was elected temporary Moderator. Dr. Townsend then presented the claims of Ministerial Education, raising in cash, \$6.16 and pledges as follows:

MONDAY, 8:30 A. M.

The Moderator called the body to order, and Bro. Cummins led in prayer. Letter from Rosboro church had been handed to the Clerk and was read.

Bro. Forbes presented and read the report of the Committee on Digest of Letters and being discussed by Forbes and Milburn was on motion, recommitted for correction. At a subsequent hour, the report was again presented, pending the discussion of which, an amendment was carried, authorizing the Clerk to have a sufficient number of copies of the report printed, to be distributed to every member of every church of the Association. The messen-

gers freely gave \$5.70 to cover the cost of this extra printing. The original report was then adopted. For report see Appendix E.

Bro. E. Cates presented and read the report of the Committee on Orphan's Home and moved its adoption. Pending the discussion of the report, a motion was carried, instructing the Clerk to secure other data relative to the Homes and append to the report as a footnote. The Moderator requested Bro. Horne to take collection for orphanage and after starting, Bro. F. P. Turner, Field Secretary for the Monticello Home stepped in the house, whereupon Bro. Horne asked permission of the Moderator to allow Bro. Turner to conclude the collection, which was granted. A cash collection to the amount of \$6.65 was taken for the Monticello Home and \$8.20 to the Texarkana Home. Pledges were tentatively taken allowing each church to forward to Home of their choice as follows:

The report was then adopted. For report see Appendix F.

Bro. Winburn presented and read the report on Foreign Missions and moved its adoption. Discussed by Winburn, Turner, Milburn and Horne and adopted. For report see Appendix G.

Report on Literature was read by Bro. Terrell who moved its adoption. After being discussed by Brethren Horne and Terrell pro and con, Bro. Forbes moved that the report be tabled, which prevailed.

Report of Executive Board was read by Dr. Townsend. W. A. Forbes, W. A. Cummins and G. W. Burns read their reports as Missionaries of the Association.

Report on Association Missions was read by Dr. N. R. Townsend. Bro. Forbes offered his report as Treasurer of the Association.

Pending the discussion of these reports Bro. Winburn

offered an amendment to the report on Association Missions which was unanimously carried. Then all the reports were adopted. For reports see Appendix H.

Dr. Townsend read the report of the Committee on Women's Work. During the discussion of this report a motion prevailed to appoint a committee to complete data to be embodied in the report. Dr. Townsend was appointed. Then the report was adopted. For report see Appendix I.

Bro. Warren Langley presented and read the report of the Committee on Temperance and on motion was adopted. See Appendix J.

Adjourned until 1:30 p. m.

At the appointed hour the Moderator called the house to order. Bro. Webb led in prayer.

Bro. W. L. Jones read report of Committee on Obituaries, and on motion was adopted. For report see Appendix K. (For names of deceased, see Memorial Page—, Clerk.)

Report of Committee on Finance was presented and read, and on motion adopted. See Appendix L.

Report on Home Missions was presented and read by Dr. N. R. Townsend, and on motion was adopted. For report see Appendix M.

Bro. T. T. Ingle presented and read report of Committee on Pastoral Support, and was on motion adopted. For report see Appendix N.

Bro. G. W. Burns read report of Committee on State Missions, and on motion the report was adopted. For report see Appendix O.

Brother Burris presented and read report of the Committee on Nominations and moved its adoption. Motion to amend by striking out Saturday in the report, and insert Friday, and striking out Boughton and insert Gum Springs. The amendments prevailed. Then the report was adopted as amended. For report see Appendix P.

On motion the Moderator was empowered to appoint the chairman of the various committees for the next meeting of this body.

The Clerk was instructed to have as many copies of the minutes of this session of the Association printed, as the minute fund sent up by the churches would pay for, and distribute them to the various churches, which have contributed to the minute fund, according to amount sent, and he be allowed \$15.00 for his services.

Bro. B. E. Brewer offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this body hereby offer its thanks and express its real appreciation to Bethlehem church and this community for their kindness and lavish hospitality, to the Association while in their midst.

Bro. R. S. Brown offered the following:

Resolved, That this body hereby express our appreciation of the faithful and efficient services of our worthy Mederator and Clerk during the present session of this body.

The Association sang, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," while giving the parting hand amid tears of joy, Bro. Horne led in fervent prayer, at close of which the Moderator declared the Association adjourned to meet with Gum Springs Church, Clark County, Arkansas, at 10 a. m. on Friday before the second Sunday in October, 1911.

APPENDIX.

REPORT A.

We your Committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to make the following report:

We believe that in supporting a properly organized Sunday School, that the churches are obeying the command of the Master under whose commission we work and by whose leadership and power we succeed. Therefore, we believe that no church can succeed well without a Sunday School.

We believe more of the churches have reported Sunday Schools than before, but in many respects the reports are short. Our Sunday Schools are not all that they ought to be and we believe the great lack in our churches is trained workers. Therefore, we recommend that a committee of five be appointed whose duty it shall be to arrange for a Training School in the bounds of the Association that our Sunday School workers may be better equipped for the work.

REPORT B.

We have two colleges, Ouachita, located at Arkadelphia, and Central at Conway, and four other schools. In Ouachita this year has been enrolled three hundred students, thirty of these are students for the ministry

Ouachita is a co-educational college.

Central is for females only.

These schools and colleges have cost the denomination some two hundred thousand dollars; and as results, have put trained men and women into hundreds of positions in the State and elsewhere. Many of these students are now filling the pulpits and as teachers and business positions. The object then for the existence and perpetuity of these schools has been and is still being accomplished. Ignorance of men and things in the past, present, and future is the bane of all people. To permit sin, and crime, and blind prejudice, among us, and to enlarge, and secure, power and useful-

ness of the present and future generations, these schools demand our support and patronage.

We recommend an earnest patronage of our denominational schools. If Baptist schools do as good work as any other schools, and they do, then give them the preference.

REPORT C.

Report of Committee on Ministerial Education: Your Committee feels that there is little need to argue to Baptists the scripturalness and wisdom of religious education, or the needs and advantages of having a trained ministry. From the time the ancient Elkanah and his godly wife, Hannah, consecrated the child Samuel, to God's service, and placed him in the hands and under the tutelage of the aged man of God, Elie, to train and equip for God's service (I Sam. 1:28, 2:11, 3:1, 8:10) until now, the wisdom of training and thoroughly equipping those who are to assume the great responsibility of teachers of God's law and will and God's approval of such preparation, has been generally accepted among His people.

When Elisha was called from following his oxen, by the prophet Elijah, to become Elijah's pupil and disciple, (I Kings 19: and II Kings, 2:3) there were established among God's people at least these "Schools of the Prophets" —at Bethel, Jericho and Gilgal respectively, (II Kings, 2:3,5), and 4:38) of which Elijah was the acknowledged head, and after whose death Elisha seems to have become the head (II Kings, 2:15 and 9:1.) From that time until the coming of Jesus, religious education was the only kind, seemingly, among God's people and the training of God's teachers and leaders by those fitted for that work, an established custom. John and his "disciples" and Jesus with his little school of twelve "disciples," training and teaching them constantly for three years, illustrate the custom of the day, of a noted Rabbi or teacher gathering around him a group of learners, to be trained for a life work of teaching and preaching. (Matt.10:24, 9:14) and Paul sitting at the feet as student under the tutelage of the noted religious teacher, Gamaliel, is another illustration of the same fact.

In the first centuries of the Christian Era, religious

schools and the training of religious teachers was common among the early christians—as for example the Schools of the Catechumens.

Since that time religious education and the training of the ministry has been an accepted custom among Baptists.

If during all these ages when the masses were uneducated it was important to have, and God stamped His approval upon a trained ministry, surely in these later days of enlightenment, it is doubly important.

While we, as Baptists, have one hundred and seventy-five denominational schools, many of them devoted exclusively to the training of the ministry, yet there is a crying need of better equipped ministry. The pew is getting ahead of the pulpit today.

Therefore, your Committee would recommend to the Messengers present, and to the churches they represent, first that they obey the Master's injunction to pray the Lord of the harvest to "send forth laborers into his harvest."

2nd. That our Ministry, and especially our young Ministers, make an earnest effort to obtain as thorough an education as possible, and thus follow Paul's injunction to "study to show thyself approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed," and get ready to be able to "rightly divide the word of truth."

3rd. We would recommend our own Ouachita College as the best place to get a literary training and primary teaching in Bible and kindred studies.

4th. If possible to take a more extended course of study, we would recommend a course of training in a school specially fitted for the training of the Ministry, like the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary or the South Western Baptist Theological Seminary at Ft. Worth, Tex.

REPORT D.

We your Committee on Baptist Young People's Union work, report as follows: The B. Y. P. U. is our Baptist organization for training the younger members of our churches for more effective service.

The need of such a work is seen from the great number of church members who are inactive. The purpose of this work is to train and instruct by teaching the Bible,

our doctrine, history, polity and work; and to enlist Baptist young people in the activities of church life and promote their usefulness and spirituality by exercise in the same.

The Arkansas B. Y. P. U. was reorganized in 1904, and has had a gratifying growth. There are now about 150 Unions in the State. These cooperate in maintaining the Summer Assembly, which is a great summer drill camp for our workers, and which meets at Arkadelphia each year in July.

In view of the wide-spread need for trained workers, we recommend that the churches organize Unions and pursue this training work; and, further, that they send their choicest young people to the Assembly, yearly, for training, fellowship and instruction.

The Home at Monticello has 120 children in it and the Texarkana Home 21. There were more than 25 conversions and baptisms in the Monticello Home and 7 in the Texarkana Home last year. About 80 of the children at Monticello and all old enough at Texarkana were in school last year. Nine of the children in the Monticello Home became of age; five were adopted out, and five died last year. Prof. J. N. Williams and wife have charge of the Home at Monticello. Elder F. P. Turner of Little Rock, Ark., is Field Secretary.

Elder T. H. Carter and wife are in charge of the Home at Texarkana.—Clerk.

REPORT G. Foreign Missions.

We your Committee on Foreign Missions report as follows: Foreign Missions is that division of Mission work having to do with foreign lands. All missions are one in principle, obligation and authority. The authority comes from the words of our Lord in Great Commission. (Mat. 28:19-20). In obedience to this command the Baptists have the honor of being pioneers in the revival in mission interest in modern times.

Our fathers have wisely planted mission work in China, Japan, Africa, Italy, South America and Mexico. The blessings of God have poured out richly upon this work last year. In Brazil alone there were more baptisms last year than in all our fields ten years ago. The reports from the fields show most encouraging prospects. Everywhere our chapels are crowded and our Missionaries are overwhelmed with work.

In China, Japan and Africa we are doing both healing and teaching in connection with the preaching of the gospel, and often our healing ministries are the surest approach to the hearts and consciences of the heathen for the saving gospel. Last year Southern Baptists gave an average of about thirty cents per capita to this great work, or the two million of us gave \$488,000. Red River

Association, with 3,287 members gave \$587.53, or an average of eighteen cents per capita. That this average is misleading, however, is seen from the fact that sixteen churches out of thirty-two, report nothing at all for Foreign Missions. In view of the greatness of this work, the unavoidable duty involved, and the smallness of our effort to obey our Lord's command, we recommend:

1st. That it be, and is hereby, made the duty of our Mission Board to stir up the churches by letter and otherwise to do more for this great interest.

2nd. That every church ought by all means to make a worthy offering to Foreign Missions this year.

3rd. That prayer be made for the Missionaries and the committees who bear the load in this work.

4th. That we hereby offer prayerful sympathy to the widowed wife of our own beloved brother, T. E. Ward, who died recently during his work as our Missionary to Africa.

REPORT H. Associational Mission Board.

Your Board has had several meetings during the year, and have tried to arrange for work, but on the account of lack of funds and inability to get co-operation and services of brethren selected by the Board to occupy certain fields, our work has been rather meager. At an early meeting the Board agreed to help Mt. Olive church in the support of her pastor agreeing to pay the same amount paid by the church, up to \$2.50 each, by the church and Board, per month. A similar arrangement with Bro. L. E. Burns to preach at Redland. At a later meeting the Board employed Brethren W. A. Forbes and G. W. Burns to do work in destitute fields, at the rate of \$2.50 per day for actual time employed. These brethren have done some work as follows: W. A. Forbes ten days at Gum Springs. G. W. Burns at Rome and Burtzel 25 days. L. E. Burns and W. A. Cummins as per their report published in these Minutes. (If Bro. L. E. Burns offered his report the Clerk failed to get copy.)

We also tried to arrange with other brethren to occupy other points, but were unable to make the arrangement. We would urge upon the Association a more aggressive

policy and that the churches raise funds to that end, liberally and as early in the year as they are able.

We would suggest that you select some one to obtain and furnish these facts to the Clerk, and thus have them published with the Minutes.

Epitome of the Work of the "Ladies' Aids" and "Missionary Unions," Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention for the Year Ending, May, 1910:

1 OUR FIELD: "The World."

2 OUR PURPOSE: To aid in all the work fostered by the three Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention—Home, Foreign, and Sunday School. And, in addition, to maintain the Margaret Home for the children of Missionaries. This is located at Greenville, S. C., and now contains twelve children; and to maintain the Training School at Louisville, Ky., where during the past year there were 39 Women Missionaries in training for Mission Work at home and in foreign lands.

3 OUR ORGANIZATION: We now have in all, about 10,000 Unions and Societies, of which about 1,500 were organized during the past year, to wit: (a) Woman's societies, 703; (b) Young Women's Unions, 261; (c) Sunbeams, 462; Royal Ambassadors, (boys "the men of affairs of tomorrow") 121.

4 OUR SPECIAL WORK: While trying to help in all departments of work—"the Union knows no limits of sympathy and interest." We have given special attention to certain features of the work, as follows: The Ladies Aids, or Missionary Unions, have fostered all the Foreign Fields—Religious Schools: in the home land, the Mountain Schools; in the work of the Sunday School Board, printing and distributing bibles.

The Young Women's Unions have given special attention to Missions in Japan, in the foreign work, and to the Immigrant work, (incoming foreigners) at home.

The Sunbeams, and Royal Ambassadors have contributed to Foreign Missions, in Africa, and to Home Missions among the Indians,

5 OUR OFFERINGS: To Margaret Home, \$1,555.58; To Foreign Missions, \$123,216.16, to Home Missions, \$77,881.23; to the Training School Endowments, \$6,077.43. Total cash gifts, \$215,959.54. Total cash and Boxes to Missionaries, \$237,459.54. N. B. These figures do not include the offerings of the Women to State and District Missions, Church Finances, Orphan's Homes, etc.

As the total amounts given to Home Missions by the Southern Baptists was \$329,475.79, and to Foreign Missions was, \$483,195.28, or a total of \$813,671.07, it will be noted that the women gave more than one fourth of that amount, through their Unions, besides the part of it given by them through other church channels. They feel a pardonable pride in this showing.

REPORT M. Home Missions.

Your Committee beg permission to submit as our report as follows: By "Home Missions" is meant that feature of our demoninational Mission Work, to destitute fields in our own home land. The work undertaken by the Southern Baptist Convention and called "Home Missions" is conducted by the direction of the Home Board with headquarters at Atlanta, Ga. The Convention has instructed them to prosecute that work under the following Subdivisions:

1st. The Evangelizing of the foreigners, who come to this country at the rate of over one million a year. This feature of work is largely limited to Mission Work in large cities, where our local Baptist forces are too weak to grapple, unaided, with the stupendous task of Evangelizing this vast army of incoming foreigners.

2nd. The Evangelizing of the Indians, of whom there are about 150,000 in the United States.

3rd. The carrying of the pure gospel to the illiterate negroes in our Southland.

4th. A department of "Evangelism" in which a corps of excellent evangelists make united and concentrated efforts to win to Christ the strongholds of sin.

In addition to this work of Missions the denomination has also committed to these brethren the duty and task of supervising the work of religious education in the destitute mountain sections of several of our Southern States.

The Home Mission Work of the Southern Baptist Convention is done in conjunction with the State Board, and is known as "Co-operative Mission Work." That is, the two interests unite and co-operate in occupying the destitute fields of labor. Under this co-operative work last year, there were reported 22,477 baptisms, and 43,336 additions. A further work done through this channel, is the Church Extension and Church Building Work, by which 352 houses of worship, and 324 churches were built and constructed last year in destitute fields.

The work suggested above covers the Southern States, Cuba, the Isle of Pines, and the Panama Canal Zone.

The General Association is doing Home Mission Work in several of the States and have selected Bro. J. A. Scarborough of Magnolia, Ark., as their Treasurer, through whom to send their funds. They have had a number of Missionaries at work during the last year, but your committee has not the data at hand, to enable us to give statistics of work done, but from general information we understand that they are having good results and doing a good work.

We would especially urge upon the churches that in their Mission offerings they not forget the importance of the Home Mission Work.

REPORT O. State Missions.

We your Committee on State Missions report as follows: It is conceded by all Missionary Baptists that State Missions is exceedingly important. The six hundred thousand souls in our State that are unsaved calls for heroic effort of God's host to evangelize this multitude. We ought all as individuals, churches and Association to take part in this work. (The State-wide forces are endeavoring in an organized way to occupy the field and do the work. The State Convention has had employed, a Missionaries, one hundred and eleven; forty-three for all time, sixty-eight for part of their time, the first three quarters of the year. They report 3,018 conversions and 1,833 baptisms; additions, 3,112; organized fifteen churches and sixty-one Sunday Schools.

We have not been able to get data as to what the State Association is doing, but have information in a general way that they are endeavoring to occupy and do work to meet the demand that is resting heavily upon our hearts.)

We ought all to feel that this is our work; it has to be paid for; there is a large debt to be met at once.

We recommend that our people take this matter on their hearts prayerfully before the Lord of the harvest and take collections immediately to pay for the work done and insist for enlargement.
