. Committee on State Missions reported as follows:

Your committee would submit the following: The State Board of Missions has had during the year in its employ different missionaries, some in the towns, some in the country. From all of these fields have come up good reports. It has cost the Board about \$500 per quarter, and the Home Board at Manta. Ga., has paid them \$250 per quarter. The work is moving on well and we have, many resons to thank God and take courage. The Board is anxions to enlarge the work another year. Our state is growing rapidly Many towns and villages are springing up and many important fields in the country are needing the Gospel.

The State Board is doing all in its power to supply these fields with the Word of Life. Many of the Associations are doing much to build up in the country.

The State Board does not, in any way, want to interfere with the work being done by the various Associations.

The Board therefore very greatly desires to co-operate with the Boards of all our Associations, and where they are unable to do their work it wants to help them.

Where they are able to occupy their own fields the State Convention is auxious to have all their missionaries commissioned by the State Board.

This is important since we cannot get representation in the Southern Baptist Convention, except upon the monies reported to its Board. We, as your committee, urge that this Association take such action as will put us into co-operation with the State Board.

·Committee on Home Missions reported:

. The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention,

during the years past, has done a great work among our people in the south.

First. The Board has assisted in building many churches and helped in the support of many missionary pastors in the various states.

Second. Its work among the Indians'has been blessed in the salviction of many of this people.

Third. One of the greatest works now being done by this Board is the work in Cuba. Less than three years ago we entered this field of the Roman cross; and during this short time more than eleven handred Cabans have been baptized, and eight thousand more have applied for baotism it the hands of our missionary. Diaz.

Fourth. This Board has, during the past ten years, given Arkansas (on thoosand dollars with which to help procente the work in our state. The Board has asked our state this year for one thousand dollars to help in spreading the Gospel of the Son of God throughout the Home field.

Your committee would therefore recommend that this association help raise this amount. One postage stamp from each Baptist in Arkansas would more than raise the amount asked.

Fifth. The Board is also doing a good work among the colored people of the south, and proposes to help us among this people in our state.

Committee on education reported:

We are glad to note the facilities our state affords for obtaining a liberal education for our sons and daughters, and more especially the efforts being put forth by our denomination in that direction. There are good facilities at Searcy and Judsonia: and at Arkadelphia we have a flourishing school supported by the denomination, which for cheapness and thoroughness are surpassed by few if any, all of which mefit and are entitled to the support of our denomination, and while we would not underrate or disparage the claims of any of these schools, we feel that our college at Arkadelphia pre-eminently demands our patronage. It has already met with unprecedented success, and if our denomination will rally to its support, it will soon be second to no school in the south. We are sorry to know that many of our people are sending to schools in other states, to the detriment of our own schools. Such a course is suicidal and should be arrested at once if we would keep pace with other states in their educational We would especially note the facilities this school offers to those desiring a ministerial education, and we hope ere long to see this department patronized. The Committee on Foreign Missions reported.

Benediction by W. H. Paslay.

We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, would submit the following: Foreign Missions differ little from Home Missions, as it is just a

little further portion of the one common field, since the world is the tield. The Master has said: "Go ve into all the world and preach the

Gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, and he that believeth not shall be damned." Mark, 16:15, 16.

Notwithstanding this command has been submitted to every generation of people since it was first uttered by the Master, it remains yet to be accomplished by the present Christian generation of the world in the much favored day of even the nineteenth century.

Your committee is of the opinion that there are surplusment and means now on hand in Christian lands to accomplish this good work of carrying out the great commission of preaching the glorious Gospel of Christ to all the world in twenty-five years, if they could be applied to that end.

The spirit of foreign missions must have prompted the couch even in the Apostolic age of the world.

It was the spirit of foreign missions that prompted the modern missionaries, such as Carv. Judson. Rice and others, who gave up all home ph asures and went into foreign Lunds to bear the Gospel to the heathest world—Sig., that times much has been done, and much remains to be done.

Dr. Tupper speaks very encouragingly of the progress of foreign missions.

It is gaining ground every year, while the Board is trying to extend the work as men and means afford.

We are encouraged not only by what the men are doing but also by what the women are doing in extending a helping hand in the good work.

They paid to the Fereign Mission cause last year \$18,000. He further speaks of the grand work of the twenty thousand Christian women missionary societies of all Christian lands, who paid in last year to the foreign cause \$2,221,649,57. So you see that if every ope of the friends of foreign missions would give only a little the work would soon be done and the world would hear the Gospel of Christ.

The Boarlis anxious to extend the work by using more men and building needful houses in foreign lands.

We, your committee, hope that Mt, Vernon Association will not be behind other Associations of our State in helping in this good work.

Report of Executive Board:

We, your Board, acting upon the authority vested in us, procured the services of Brethren A. C. Ball and W. H. Thompson to work two months each, and are glad to state that their labors were greatly blessed. Committee on Sunday schools reported:

We, your committee on Sumlay schools, beg leave to report the following:

From the letters of the different churches we find there is a greater interest than there has been for many years, yet there is not the interest manifested by many of our churches that should be. We find quite a immige of our churches have no Sabbath schools. Out of thirty-seven churches we have only twenty-two that report schools, with an average attendance of 625. There seems to be a disposition to think that the Sunday school is for children only. Therefore many of the older brethren manifest little interest in the work.

We regard the Sunday school work as one of the greatest and grandest of men. We most earnestly suggest to the churches that large no schools to bestir themselves in this direction and organize schools in their churches, and push the grand work on and up to where its importance demands. Again, we recommend that Baptist literature be used by all the schools of this Association, and when possible Baptists should be chosen as teachers. We further recommend that each church make a full report of their Sunday school work to our next Association in their church letters.

SUNDAY NIGHT, 7 O'CLOCK.

After preaching by W. H. Paslay the Association convened for business.

Committee on queries reported (J. L. Wilson in the chair):

Query No. 1. Is it lawful or expedient, right or proper, for a minority or a fractional part thereof, of the members of a Baptist church to meet in special conference in the absence of the pastor, at a time and place separate and apart from the usual time and place of the church meeting, and receive members into the church to which they may belong, or transact other business pertaining to the interest of the church?

Answer. We deem it inexpedient and unlawful for a minority or fractional part thereof, of the members of a Baptist church to act as supposed in the query, and that such course of action is calculated to subvert all order and discipline among our churches, and thus work great injury to the cause of Christ.

On motion, after speeches by W. H. Paslay, Geo. O. Dickson, R. G. Hewlett, A. C. Ball, Wm. Thompson and W. A. Bobbitt, adopted,

Query No. 2. Is not the term "missionary" a misnomer when applied to an individual or church that does nothing nor gives anything to propogate the Christian religion?

Answer. Yes.

Query No. 3. Is there in existence such a body as "the Baptist Church of Arkansas," or of "the United States?"

Answer. No.

Query No. 4. Can an unordained minister become the pastor of a church?

Answer. If a church of Jesus Christ is meant, no, not according to the Scriptures.

Query No. 5. What ought to be done with a church member who is able to pay for the support of the Gospel at home, and also

send it to the nations of the earth, who, after he has been taught his duty, will absolutely refuse to do his duty in this grace?

Answer. He should be excluded from the Church for refusing to obey the teachings of the Word of God.

Query No. 6. Should any person be allowed to teach in a Baptist Sunday school who is not a member of a Baptist church?

Answer. If it be the object of a Baptist Sunday school to teach fully the Gospel of Jesus Carist, we deem it highly essential that the teachers therein be orderly members of a Baptist church.

RULES OF DECORUM.

+>+<+

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened by singing and prayer.

Aur. 2. The Moderator Clerk and Treasurer shall be elected by ballot by the members present.

A407.3. The Moderator shall be considered the judge of order, but any member not satisfied with his decision may appeal.

ART, 4. The Moderator shall be entitled to the privilege of speakings other members, but not to vote unless a tie.

ART. All questions shall be introduced by motion, and if seconded shall be opened for discussion, unless withdrawn by the mover or his second. When a subject has been discussed a reasonable time the Moderator shall, when the question is called for, proceed to take it by calling for the yeas and mays, and if a call for a division is made, he shall call for a standing vote.

Arr, 6. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Only one shall speak at the same time, and shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he depart from the subject to make personal reflections.

A ter. 7. No person shall speak more than once upon any subject, until all who wish to speak have had an opportuity, nor more than twice without permission. ρ

ART, 8. Every subject introduced forgdiscussion shall be decided before another is offered, unless it be laid over by motion with the consent of the mover and the Association.

Aut. 9. The names of the messengers shall be called whenever the Association shall direct, and absentees marked. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

ART, 10. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in addressing each other.

ART. 11. Any member violating the rules shall be subject to reproof by the Moderator.

ART, 12. Amendments or alterations may be made to these rules when a majority may deem it necessary.

ART, 13. Any case coming before the Association not provided for in these rules shall be governed by general parliamentary rules.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1. This confederation of churches shall be called by the name of "Mount Vernon Baptist Association."
- 2. The object of this Association shall be to promote the glory of God on earth by the preaching of the gospel of His Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior; the universal spread of the Bible, the word of the true and living God, and by other appropriate means.
- This Association shall consist of messengers from the churches now forming this Union, and such other Baptist churches as may hereafter be received as constituent members thereof.
- 4: Every church shall be entitled to three representatives without regard to the number of their members, respectively, and to an additional one for every fifty members exceeding fifty; Provided, That *no church shall ever be entitled to more than five. A certificate of appointment or letter from their respective churches shall be evidence that they have been so delegated.
- 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk or Clerks, a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by hallot, by a majority of the members present immediately after the names of the delegates enrolled, which officers shall perform all duties, respectively, usually devolved on such officers, and continue to exercise their respective functions until they shall be superseded by a subsequent election.
- ~-6. The Clerk shall preserve a regular record of the Association and have it present at the meeting of the body, and when they vacate their offices deliver the same, with all other books and papers relative to said office, to thier successors.
- 7. The Association shall regard the churches as independent bedies in all their internal affairs and exercis no ecclesiastical jurisdiction, or claim any legislative or judicial prerogative over them; nevertheless, the Association may exercise authority over its own members, the representatives of the churches, and power to withdraw from all churches which may depart from the Gospel as understood and held by this body by becoming either heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice, and should therefore regard the churches united in the association with a vigilant eye for good and may give

at its own discretion, and in its own way, advice or information when sought to any church connected with it.

- 8. It shall be the duty of the Association to ascertain the general condition of its constituent's churches; devise means to promote their harmony and increase their spirituality and efficiency to promote the cause of truth and righteousness.
- 9. The Association shall hold annual sessions to convene on Thursday before the first Lord's day in October, in each year, and not adjourn until all the business shall have been regularly finished except circumstances imperiously demand. The place of meeting shall be determined at each previous session and published in the minutes.
- 10. Baptist churches not before united in the Association, or those dismissed from other Associations, may be admitted as members into this Union on application by a written petition or letter, presented by one or more messengers duly appointed by such church or churches, provided, they give satisfactory evidence that they are orthodox in faith and correct in the practice of the gospel ordinances.
- 11. Every minister of the Gospel, (either ordained or licentiate) whose membership is in or who may be a pastor of any church belonging to this body shall be ex-officio a member of the Association, with the privilege of offering resolutions and speaking, but not of voting, unless specially delegated by some church.
- When in session, the Association will be governed by such rules of decorum as it may adopt for itself.
- 13. It sha'd be the duty of the churches, respectively, annually to report to the Association their general condition; the number of members in fellowship; the number baptised, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, restored, and dead during the year, and the names and post office address of all ministers, whether ordained or licensed, designating each and also the name and address of their clerks. They shall also report on any special matter required, and send up such contributions as they may willingly contribute to aid the body to disseminate more widely the truth as contained in Holy Scriptures and the establishment of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth.
- 14. The neglect or failure of a church to be represented by a messenger, or messengers, in the Association for three consecutive years shall be cause to withdraw from such churches at the discretion of the Association.

- 15. This Association may correspond by letter or messenger with any other religious body of the same faith or order.
- 16. A board consisting of five members, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum, shall be elected at each annual meeting, whose duty it shall be to devise means to carry forward the benevolent objects of the Association, and the officers of this Association shall be ex-officio members of the board.
- 17. The minutes of the Association shall be publicly read and corrected, if necessary, and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association adjourns.
- 18. Any amendment may be made to this constitution at any meeting of the Association by a vote of two thirds of the members present, provided, the same shall have been published in the minutes of the preceeding year.
