To the Friendship Association, convening September, 19th, 1885.— Dear Brethren:

Your Executive Board would respectfully submit the following report: Our first meeting was held with Enon church on the fifth Sabbath in March, at which time application for help was made by the church at Pine Bluff. In said application the Pine Bluff brethren expressed determination to do all they could to secure the services

of such a pastor as the nature of the circumstances and surroundings demanded. But with their utmost efforts they found it necessary to appeal to us for a contribution one more year. After duly considering the matter your Board agreed to supplement the pastor's salary at said place with one hundred dollars, with the understanding that Elder A. J. Fawcett, the former pastor, should be retained. We are now in receipt of a most cheering report from Brother Fawcett, as follows: "Baptisms, 15; received by letter, 7; restored, 1. Thus making the total number of accessions during the past year twentyfour. A parsonage has been built worth \$1,500. The congregations are large, and the Sunday school is in a flourishing condition. Prospects in general are truly encouraging and the church is now regarded as self-sustaining." Your Board has suffered the embarassment of having but little funds with which to support our missionary, but we confidently expect the churches to bring in ample contributions for that purpose. Your Board has paid to Brother Fawcett \$27.50 leaving a balance of \$72.50 still due him, the payment of which demands immediate attention. Finally, brethren, in view of the fact that the work of the Lord has prospered in our hands during the past year, we ask you to join with us in tendering unto the Lord the gratitude of our hearts for his having crowned our humble efforts with such satisfactory results.
