PROCEEDINGS:

The Ouachita Baptist Association met with Corinth Church, Saturday, September 24, 1898. The body was called to order by the moderator, J. J. Holland, after devotional excreises. The following churches were represented and the letters read by Brothers W. L. Compere and W. A. Brumbly: County Line, Yocana, Concord, Mt. Gilead, New Hope, Shady Grove, Mena, Corinth, Mt. Pleasant, Pine Grove, Mt. Olive, Buffalo. Received by petition: New Home, Mill Creek.

The moderator extended the hand of fellowship to the delegates of the new churches.

The pastor and deacons of Corinth church, together with Bros. J. F. Jeffrey and W. W. Roberts were appointed on the preaching committee.

On motion Bro. A. J. Robins was enrolled a messenger from Pine Grove church. On motion, Bros. J. F. Shands and J. J. Mershon were enrolled messengers from Mena church. Bro. J. Buchanan was enrolled a messenger from Mt. Pleasant church. The vote was then taken and resulted in the election of the following officers: Moderator, J. J. Holland; treasurer, A. J. Robins; clerk, J. J. Mershon.

Correspondents were invited to seats in the body.

A motion was made and carried, to have committee of three appointed to report on the change of co-operation of Ouachita Association from the General Association to that of the State Convention. The moderator appointed H. C. Ridling, who appointed Bro. J. F. Jones, who appointed Bro. W. L. Compere. The preaching committee reported Elder J. Buchanan to preach at Corinth church at night; Elder M. L. Ridling at Union Grove. Bro. Ridling was appointed to conduct a prayer meeting at 9 a. m., Sabbath. After the messengers had been assigned homes the body adjourned until 8 o'clock, a. m., Monday.

At 11 o'clock, Sabbath morning, the missionary sermon was preached Elder E. S. James, the appointee, and collections taken afterwards as ollows: For Foreign Missions, \$3.25; Associational, \$4.65. Elder J. J. Holland preached at Corinth Sabbath night, and Elder E. S. James preached Union Grove.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 1898.

The body met a little after 8 a. m. After devotional exercises in which the 12th chapter of Romans was read, the roll of messengers was called and orected. On motion the clerk's record was read up to this point, and approved. The following committee reports were received and adopted, towit:

ON NOMINATIONS.

We recommend that the Association select the next place to hold its ses-

sion. We appoint Elder M. L. Ridling to preach introductory sermon Saturday, at 11 o'clock, a m.; Elder E. B. Williams, alternate. Elder J. J. Holland to preach the missionary sermon at 11, a. m., Sabbath; Elder S. A. Neighbors, alternate.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

We desire to report as follows: We recommend a sound Baptist paper, The Arkansas Baptist, published at Little Rock, Arkansas; also, we recommend the literature of the Southern Baptist Convention, for use in our Sabbath Schools, published at Nashville, Tennessee, and urge upon our churches to provide the same for use in their Sabbath Schools. We feel that it is high time for Baptists to be awake to their interests, from the fact that we see the great need of this being observed among our churches.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Do our churches believe in Foreign Missions? Let us see. We know a tree by its fruits; eleven churches report nothing. Grand total by 489 members, 14 churches, respectfully, is \$8.81. Can it be that this pitiful sum expresses the desire of 489 Baptists for the salvation of a thousand million heathen? Will the Master accept this as obedience to His command "Go ye into all the world, preach the Gospel to every creature." If not, somebody is failing to do his duty. Let each one who reads this report say earnestly, "Lord, is it I?" and resolve to do better another year.

Report on Co-operation of Ouachita Association with State Convention instead of with the General Association was received, and, by motion, was substituted by the minority report as follows:

A little investigation will show that conditions are materially different now from what they were years ago when we began to co-operate with the General Association of West Arkansas and Indian Territory. Railroads have made us close to the Convention, while the constantly increasing work of the General Association in the Territory has removed it far away from us. The State Convention desires to have all the associations in the state co-operate with it, while our connection with the General Association is a positive hinderance to its work. The General Association has just expressed its feelings on this question by voting unanimously to drop "West Arkansas" from its name, and it is now styled "The General Association of Indian Territory." We, therefore, believe it will be to the best interest, not only of our Association, but also of the General Association and the State Convention, for us

to co-operate hereafter with the State Convention, and we recommend that delegates be appointed to that body.

OBITUARIES.

McLeod, whom we have known intimately for twenty years. He was a minister of the Gospel, and advocated the cause of the Master faithfully for many years; he was born in Darlington county, South Carolina, August 30, 1830; united with the church when twenty-one years of age, began to exercise in public immediately and was ordained when 27 years old; died November 19, 1897, aged 67 years, two months and nineteen days.

time she died.

A motion was carried to turn over the minute fund to the clerk, and to make the best possible arrangements for printing the minutes and the balance to be retained for his services.

On motion the moderator was instructed to appoint a board for the work of the association. The appointments were as follows: W. L. Com-

pere, chairman, Mena; J. J. Mershon, Mena; J. F. Hurley, Grannis, W. A. Hrumbly, Dallas; W. P. Freeman, Mena.

The minute fund was increased by contribution to \$15 12.

Correspondents were appointed to the following places; Buckner Assolation, Belva, Scott county, third Sabbath in October, Bros. J. J. Holland, W. I. Compere, J. J. Mershon, J. A. McCraray; Buckville Association next fall, Bros. J. J. Holland and J. F. Shands, Howard County Association, october 22, 98, Bros. B. F. Cannon and S. E. Chote; Southwestern Assolation, October 8, 1898, at Wilton, Bros. J. Buchanan and J. F. Hurley; tate Convention, third Sabbath and Friday before, in Novembe. Bros. W. Compere, J. F. Shands, J. A. McCraray, J. J. Holland and E. S. James.

A resolution of thanks was adopted as follows: We hereby tender our thanks to Corinth church and committee, for their generous hospitality in intertaining this association.

Concord church was the place designated for the first 5th Sabbath meeting in October, 1898. Bro. J. J. Holland to preach introductory sermon, S. A. Neighbors the missionary sermon.

Mill Creek church the place for the second 5th Sabbath meeting; Corinth the place for the third, and Mena the place for the fourth.

On motion the body adjourned to meet with Mt. Pleasant church next ptember, Saturday before the 4th Sunday.

After the body adjourned they sang and took the parting hand; closing prayer by Bro. H. C. Ridling who also preached at night.

Constitution.

ARTICLE I. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the

This Association shall be composed of churches in union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory reduce of their appointment by the several churches before taking their seats.

Il. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberate leady by appointment of moderator and clerk, who shall be chosen by ballot at main annual session and to continue in office until their successors are chosen.

This Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which it is composed, and shall only act as an advisory council, assuming no authority except what is expressly delegated to it by the churches, or is evidently implied by the compact. It, nevertheless, claims authority over its own members and delegates from the churches, and in justice and propriety must have the power to withdraw from, and disown, all churches which depart from the principles of this compact, by becoming hetrodox in faith, or disorderly in practice; it should, therefore, regard all churches under this constitution with a viglant eye for good. Its principle business shall be to promote the declarative clory of God by extending the kingdom of grace on earth through the medium of preaching the Gospel, and the means in accordance with the Gospel; to union

and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, especially those united under this constitution.

5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union through representation of three delegates at the annual session of this association with a petition for admission, and upon their agreeing to the abstract of principles herein published.

6. The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association, written statistics, giving names of delegates, number in fellowship, baptized, received by letter, dismissed, expelled, restored or died, since the last session, and all information that the churches deem important, which shall be

read and minuted.

7. This Association may have a fund supplied by a voluntary contribution of the churches, and all money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over through the committee on Finance to the treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot, and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association, and present annually, for insertion in the minutes, a clear and succinct statement of all the receipts and expenditures.

8. The Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every

session.

9. This Association shall take no cognizance of any query sent up from the churches unless they have endeavored to solve the same and have failed, nor any difficulty between churches unless they have pursued the direction in the 18th chapter of Matthew, and have failed to settle it; then this Association shall take such matters into consideration and act on them at its discretion.

10. The clerk of this Association shall keep a file of the Minutes of this body

and deliver the same to his successor in office.

11. This constitution may be altered, or amended, at regular meetings of the Association, by the concurring voices of two thirds of its members present; provided such alterations or amendments be approved by the churches composing this Association.

12. At each annual meeting there shall be an introductory and a missionary

sermon, and the body shall adjourn each day, at 11 a. m., for preaching.

Rules of Decorum.

1. This Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. A moderator and clerk shall be chosen by suffrages of members present.

3. The moderator shall be deemed a judge of order, and shall have power to call to order at any time.

4. Any member dissatisfied with his decision may appeal to the Association on the same day, but not thereafter.

5. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise to his feet, and, obtaining permission, proceed.

- 6. The moderator, when addressed by a member for permission to speak,

shall signify the same by naming the person or otherwise.

7. No member shall be interrupted while speaking unless he departs from the subject, or is guilty of personal reflection. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by him who made it

8. Every case taken up by this Association shall be decided, or withdrawn,

before another is offered.

9. When a question is taken up, after allowing time for debate, the moderator shall take the voice of the Association, and the members in the affirmative shall signify their position by rising from their seats, and those in the negative shall retain theirs. The moderator shall announce the decision before the affirmative resume their seats.

10. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the moderator.

11. No member shall speak more than twice, on the same subject, without responsion of the Association, nor more than once until every member wishing in speak shall have spoken, nor shall any proposition be made to close the delinto until the subject has been fairly discussed.

Members shall address each other under appellation of brother.

The roll may be called as often as the Association may direct.

11. No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to interrupt

untille speaking.

15. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time, but shall not vote on any subject unless the Association be equally divided.

Any member violating these rules may be reproved by the moderator at

We believe that the visible church of Christ is a congregation of faithful implied persons, who are in christian fellowship, and are agreed to keep up a thidly discipline agreeable to the rules of the Gospel.

We believe that Jesus Christ is the great head of the Church, and the law-giver, and the disciple is with the body, and should be faithfully kept

up for the glory of God and the prosperity of his people.

11. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the though, and none but true believers have a right thereto, and should be adminby regular ordained ministers, and that immersion is the only apostolic mula of baptism.
