Eld. W. D. Jennings made his report as follows: Served as pastor for two churches, preached 59 sermons, baptized 53, traveled 358 miles, received for labor performed \$38.90.

We your committee on Sunday Schools, would submit the following report: We are gratified to see that we are progressing in this department of church work. Last year at the organization of our Convention, there were three reported; this year seven were reported: Whereas we are in possession of a petition from our Sunday School Convention of this Association, which we herewith append as a part of our report.

WHEREAS, We recognize the importance of Sunday school work in its relation to church work and the general interest of the Mas-

ter's Kingdom on earth; and

WHEREAS, There is manifestly a great neglect of this branch of christian activity on the part of some of our churches, as well as on the part of many heads of families within our bounds, and,

WHEREAS the Sunday school is recognized as a heaven ordained instrumentality in the conversion and regeneration of multitudes of our children throughout these United States and other parts of the world. Therefore be it

Resolved, As the Sunday School Convention of the White River Association, we do earnestly request the said Association to take under advisement at its next session the appointment of a Sunday Ichool Missionary to circulate Baptist Sunday School literature among them, and to visit the churches and destitute places within our bounds, to encourage the Sunday Schools already organized and to assist brethen in organizing other Baptist Sunday Schools where they are needed and can be established.

Resolved, That Bro. P. A. Cox be appointed by this body to bear these resolutions to the Association and to bring the subject sug-

Wm. Denton, Chairman.

Committee on Deceased Ministers. Report read and adopted:

We your committee on Deceased Ministers, submit the following report: We have made inquiry and find that none of our ministers of this Association have died during the last year, and we feel it our duty to sincerely thank and praise our Heavenly Master for the preservation of the lives of our ministers, and pray the continuation of His goodness toward us.

Eld. Wm. A. Collis, our Missionary, made his report which was read and adopted:

I, Wm. A. Collis, your Missionary, employed by your central board to travel as missionary for the white River Baptist Association, beginner to submit the following report: I began work the first of April, preached monthly until the 1st of July when I began to laboratery day. I traveled 500 miles, preached 90 sermons, delivered 600 exhortation, prayed 125 public prayers, witnessed 16 conversions, beptised two, assisted in the ordination of two ministers and three deacons, organized three churches, visited Confidence church in company with Eld. H. Sasser setting her in working order, appointing messengers to the Association, labored 63 days, received \$63 from your central board for my labors.

Collis, Clerk, made his report which was read and adopted, which is as follows: Received from the Treasurer \$31, paid out: for printing Minutes and Clerk fees \$22.00, postage \$1.50, leaving \$7.65 of this year's money and \$4.45 of last year's, leaving a total balance in my hands, \$12.10.

The Central Board made their report which was read and adopted: We your Central Board submit the following report: On the 29: of January, 1887, we employed Eld. Wm. A. Collis, at \$1.00 per day, to travel as missionary, to begin the 1st of April, and also Eld. H. II. Hilton to travel with Eld. Wm A. Collis all his health would admit, giving him \$1.00 per day; and also Eld. Q. C. Pennington to labor 17 days at \$1.00; and also T. W. Wright to labor 6 days at \$1.00 per day. Paid Eld. Wm. A. Collis \$63.00, Eld. Q. C. Pennington 17.00, Eld. T. W. Wright \$6.00, total amount paid out \$86.00 leaving on hands as Home Mission funds \$14.55.

On motion the Clerk was requested to superintend the printing of the minutes, and to have as many copies printed as the minute fund would pay for, after deducting \$10.00 out of same for his services.

On motion the Association tendered its thanks to Rocky Mount church and citizens of the vicinity for their hospitalities and kindness shown us during our stay among them, praying the blessings of God on them.

Elds. Wm. Denton and T. W. Wright, who had been appointed by the last Association, to supply Yellville with Baptist preaching made their report, which was read and adopted.

We make the following report: We went and preached at Yellville every Sunday appointed save two, which bad weather prevented. Received of the State Board \$25.00.

On motion, the Association agreed to hold its next session with Pilgrim's Rest church, Baxter county, Ark. By ballot Eld. H. Sasser was elected to preach the introductory sermon at the next meeting of the Association with Eld. W. D. White as his alternate. By ballot, Eld. T. W. Wright was elected to preach the missionary sermon Sunday at 11 o'clock with Eld. W. D. White as his alternate.

The Committee appointed to investigate the trouble in Big Spring church made their report which was read and adopted:

We your committee beg leave to report, that after a thorough and impartial investigation we have reached the following conclusion: The trouble in Big Spring church originated from various causes. none of which or all combined constituted a scriptural ground for breach of church fellowship, since both parties at the time of seperation had no charge to prefer, the one against the other; also we believe, that in regard to the cause which originated the trouble both parties were somewhat in error, also in the matter of seperation both parties were in error, the one for asking to have their names erased through courtesy, the other, the church, for granting their request; also, we believe that said church is somewhat in disorder in taking its action and afterward excluding the withdrawing brethren for declaring nonfellowship with the church. We recommend that the Association advise the Big Spring church to reconsider her irregular and disorderly action, since the motion to erase the names of members without preferring charges and citing them to trial, and the after exclusion without a full hearing before

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the church was unscriptural; we also recommend that the church labor

patience and brotherly love to effect a reunion, and that in order to effect this it is our advice that both parties make mutual macessions for the sake of Christ and His cause. Also that a committee of three be appointed to bear this decision of the Association to the Big Spring church, and to labor with both parties to fine a union, if possible, and in case after reconciliation, if any of the both ren wish letters we advise that they be granted them.

That while we believe the Big Spring church to be in disorder, we do not advise that the Association withdraw its fellowship from not at present, but that we labor with the church through the above made committee; said committee to make a report of their labors to the pext Association.

Eld. I Davis of Crooked Creek Association, was invited to take next with us.

On motion, Resolution No. 2 was offered by Bro. P. A. Cox as collows: Whereas, the people of Gassville, Baxter county, Ark., have established a graded school, "The Gassville Classical Institute," presided over by our Bro. J. T. Prior. A. M., graduate of Mercar University, Ga., to meet the educational demands of North Ark., Therefore, Resolved, That as an Association we cheerfully recommend the said school to the favorable consideration of all who

desire to educate their sons and daughters in a school of high grade.

On motion Resolution No. 3 was offered by B. F. Thompson which was read and adopted as follows: Resolved, That we instruct and authorize the Central Board of this body to raise funds and employ a missionary or missionaries to preach to the destitute of this Association.

Divine services were held under the supervision of the committee as follows: Thursday night by Eld. A. R. Stevenson, followed by Eld. W. D. Jennings. Friday 11 A. M. by Eld. J. T. Prior, followed by Eld. W. R. Rackley. Friday 3 P. M. Eld H. H. Hilton, followed by Eld. J. T. Hand. Friday night by Eld. W. A. Collis, followed by Eld. H. Sasser. Saturday 3 P. M. by Eld. W. R. Rackley, followed by Eld J. H. Parmer. Saturday night by Eld. T. W. Wright, followed by Eld. H. Sasser. Sunday 11 A. M. by Elds. Wm. Denton and H. H. Hilton. Sunday 3 P. M. by Eld. C. H. Mayfield.

On motion the body adjourned to meet with Pilgrims' Rest church Baxter county Ark., Friday. 10:30 A. M., before the 1st Sabbath in September 1888.

Constitution,

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called and known by the name of the "White River Baptist Association."

ARTICLE II

The members composing the annual meetings of the Association hall consist of the Messengers sent by the Churches.

ARTICLE III

The Messengers sent by the Churches to the annual meetings, shall

not exceed four from each Church.

ARTICLE IV.

The Association shall meet annually, at such time and place as shall have been previously appointed.

ARTICLE V.

The officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by a majority of the Messengers, annually, at the annual meetings of the body.

ARTICLE VI.

This Association shall have no power to control or regulate the internal affairs or dicipline of any Church, but it may adopt and recommend all such measures as shall be considered best calculated to produce the harmony and prosperity of the Churches, and to advance the Redeemer's Kingdom, and advise and consult upon such matters as the Churches may at any time present for their consideration and advice. And it may receive Churches into this Association, or dismiss Churches from the body, inquire into the State of Religion in its bounds, and suggest measures for its advancement, and be a common bond of Union among the Churches, but shall not exercise any legislative power over the Churches.

ARTICLE VII.

This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting by a vote of two thirds of the members present, provided notice has been given at a previous meeting.

RULES OF DECORUM.

I. The Association shall commence with Religious Exercises, and a sermon from some preacher who shall have been previously appointed, unless the Association shall otherwise direct.

2. The Moderator of the session shall preside, and the former (Merk shall act (provided they attend) until the letters from the Churches connected with the body shall have been read and a Moderator and Clerk appointed.

4. The Clerk shall keep a correct copy of the proceedings of the meeting, read the letters and documents, and may call any member to assist him at the close of the meeting. He shall take charge of the papers and documents, unless otherwise directed.

(except an appeal is made to the meeting by two members). shall have a right to speak on all subjects, calling a member to

- 5. The Churches shall designate their Messengers, and report their condition by letter.
- 6. Preachers in good standing in other Baptist Churches or Associations with whom we are in fellowship, when attending our annual meeting, shall be invited to a seat as correspondents, and these meetings shall always be opened with prayer and closed in a similar manner.
- 7. Every member may speak twice on any one subject in debate before the meeting, but not more without leave; and when speaking shall stand and address the Moderator, and use decorous and Christian language; and no member shall absent himself from the Association during the session, without leave; and any person who shall violate these Rules or the Constitution shall be reproved as the Association shall think proper.
- 8. These Rules may be amended by a majority of the members present at any regular meeting.
- 9. The Churches shall contribute funds for the ordinary expenses of the body, such as printing the minutes and paying the traveling expenses of such members as the Association may send to other bodies.
- 10. A public collection shall be taken up at each session, and applied to such benevolent purposes as the Association may direct.

We believe that there is one, and only one, living and true an infinite intelligent Spirit, whose name is Jehova, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in boliness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the son and the Holy Spirit; equal in every divine perfection; and exemtling distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

We believe that man was created in holiness, under the law of Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that hely and improve the property of which, all mankind are now sinners; by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that liness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil, and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin; without defines or excuse.

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, brough the mediatorial offices of the Son of God, who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature yet without sin—honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by him death, made a full atonement for our sins—that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in Heaven, and uniting in His wonderful person the tenderest sympateies with divine perfections

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He is every way qualified to be an all-sufficient Savior.

- 5. We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification—that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith, His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.
- 6. We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to allby the gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial, penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own determined depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel, which rejection in volves him in an aggrayated condemnation.
- 7. We believe that in order to be saved sinners must be regenerated, or born again—that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it affected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with the divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel, and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, faith and newness of life.
- 8. We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties and inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession and supplication for mercy, at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Savior.
- 9. We believe that e ection is the eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners, that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end, that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being perfectly free, wise, holy and unchangable: that it utterly excludes boasting and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God and active imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means

Manual 15 Colonians of the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all

In the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian unurance and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost dilligence.

- 10. We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that the carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Scaler and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially the Word of God, self-examination, malf-denial, watchfulness and prayer.
- 11. We believe that such only are true believers as endure to the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors—that a special Providence watches over their welfare, and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.
- 12. We believe that the law of God is the eternal and unchangable rule of His moral government—that it is holy, just and good, and that the inability which Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to suffill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin—to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a mediator to unsupplied obedience to the holy law, is one great end of the gospel and the means of grace connected with the establishment of the visible whereh,—
- 18. We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of haptised believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowable of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by the laws; and exercising the gifts and privileges invested in them by the word—that its only scriptural officers are bishops or pastors and deacons, whose qualifications and claims and duties are defined in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus.
- 14. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer into the name of the Father and Son and Holy Spirit, to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the rucified, buried and risen Savior with its effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life—that it is a pre-requisite to the privaleges of a church relation, and to the Lord's supper—in which the members of the church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to immemerate together the dying love of Christ—preceeded always solemn self-examination.

- 15. We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreation, by the devout observance of all the means of grace, both of private and public, and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.
- 16. We believe that the Civil Government is of divine appointment, for the interest and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored and obeyed; except in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience and the Prince of the kings of the earth.
- 17. We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the spirit of our God, are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue is impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after defeat.
