

The report on Ministerial Education was taken up and adopted, as follows:

#### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

Ministerial Education primarily means a knowledge of God's Word. The ministry is a calling that derives its power and efficiency largely from a knowledge of the Holy Scriptures. In order to attain this knowledge our young ministers usust have literary training. The writers of the Bible were mostly men of literature. Paul, a man possessed with wonderful reasoning powers and ability as a servant of his Master, was for several years a student under the great teacher. Gemaliel.

The many evils of the present day and the demands upon the ministers of Jesus Christ are a mighty call for trained and efficient

preachers of the Word.

We recommend that our churches support our young preachers who are struggling for an education, that they may be better litted for service.

#### STATE MISSIONS

The field of State Missions is all of Arkansas. There is no more important part of our work than the Evangelization of our own State. We rejoice at the great harvest of souls as a result of our labors during the past year. But the need is still great and the fields are white for harvesting.

We recommend that our pastors urge this work upon the churches and that we give more liberally in the future to this important cause.

## ORPHANS HOME,

The report on Orphans Home was then read and adopted as follows:

We are glad to report that the past year has been one of the most prosperous in the history of our Orphans Home. There are now 32 children in the Home, dependent upon the Baptists of Arkansas for support.

Therefore, we recommend that the pastors of our Association devote at least one service during the year to this blessed work and that the churches respond with liberal contributions for its support.

The report on Education was read by J. G. Harris and adopted as follows:

#### EDUCATION

Education means more in the commercial world to-day than ever before. Conditions have changed and education is a necessity. But to think of an education from a commercial standpoint only is narrow. God has given us the power of mental development; the power to reason and think—the greatest distinction in the animal kingdom. If this power is not developed God is not pleased. Ignorance is not only a disadvantage but a sin where it can be avoided. Education properly acquired broadens the view, strengthens the character, increases the enjoyments of life, and better fits men and women for the service of God and their duty toward their fellowbeings.

We have some excellent colleges in our State—Ouachita at Arkadelphia, for young men and young women: Central at Conway, for young women only; and Buckner at Witcherville, for young men and young women.

We urge our people to send their sons and daughters to these institutions for college training.

We heartly commend our own School—The Baptist Collegiate Institute—now being planned to be built at Brinkley.

The report of the Board of Trustees of Mt. Vernon High School was then read by J. O. Harris, and after discussion, was adopted, as follows:

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES

According to your instruction at the last Association, last Octuber we advertised for a location for rebuilding the school. At our meeting some three weeks afterwards, for the consideration of \$1.000 from Brinkley, and because of the advantages offered, morally and otherwise, it was decided to locate the school at that place.

Since that time we have been laying plans for building as fast as practicable.

We recommend that on account of Brinkley being centrally located, this Association fivite White River Valley Association and Grand Prairie Association to co-operate with us in establishing and maintaining this school.

We have approved the following Constitution, and submit same to you for your consideration:

#### CONSTITUTION

of the Baptist Collegiate Institute, formerly designated Mount Vernon High School.

The conditions of the establishment, maintenance and perpetuation of which shall be as follows:

 We, the Haptist and others, acknowledging, contributing to and festering the same, propose that said school shall be established and incorporated in the town of Brinkley, Monroe county. Arkannas, to be known and denominated the Baptist Collegiate Institute.

11. That the same shall be controlled and supervised by a lioard of Trustees, selected by the Associations, as follows: Each Association shall select one Trustee for every three hundred members or fraction thereof, to the number of one hundred.

/ 111. That said Trustees hold office three years, alternately, as

designate t by their respective Associations.

1V. At all meetings of the Board of Trustees a vote of a majority of the members present shall govern in all questions, provided that not less than three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

V. The teacher or teachers of said school shall be members of a Missionary Haptist church or churches, the same to be selected.

by the ligard of Trustees.

VI. As its name designates, it shall be the purpose of said school to give our boys and girls a thorough Christian education, fitting them for the ordinary duties and responsibilities of life. The curriculum of said school to be such as to prepare them for graduation with the A. B. degree in two years from any high class college.

VII. All property obtained by or for saidschool shall be deeded to the lloard of Trustees and their successors in office, to be held in trust for and in the interest of said school, and is not transfera-

ble without the consent of all Associations in co-operation with said school.

VIII. In case of abandonment or final dissolution of said school, the Board of Trustees shall legally dispose of the property belonging thereto, and apply or disburse the proceeds as the vote of said Board may direct, after discharging all obligations of indebtedness, provided the same is in the interest of Baptist denominational education.

IX. It is understood that this shall go into effect immediately npon its adoption by one or more Associations and they appoint. Trustees.

#### TEMPERANCE

The temperance cause is rapidly gaining ground, both in our State and nation. There are more dry counties in Arkansas and

with sound political economy and an advancing Christian civilization. Intemperance is the hydra-headed monster, whose bite means death—death and damnation. Realizing the evils of the liquor traffic, we urge the churches to take a strong stand on this question and to see that they do not have on their church rolls members who are addicted to drink. We recommend that at all times we work to put down the liquor traffic, by our vote and by example: that we give the officers of the law our ardent support in suppressing "blind tigers," and in prosecuting all violations of the prohibition and local option laws.

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of the Mount Vernon Association that no church should retain any member who votes for the sale of liquors in any form, or who lends his influence to the establishment or maintenance of the saloon.

Therefore, he it resolved by this Association, that all churches are requested to withdraw fellowship from all members guilty of such practice, that fod's name may be honored and His Kingdom advanced in our land.

## Rules of Decorum.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened by singing and prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall be elected by ballot by the members present.

ARTICLE 3. The Moderator shall be considered the judge of order, but any member not satisfied with his decision may appeal.

ARTICLE 4. The Moderator shall be entitled to the privilege of speaking as other members, but not so vote, unless a tie.

ARTICLE 5. All questions shall be introduced by motion, and if seconded shall be opened for discussion, unless withdrawn by the mover or his second. When a subject has been discussed for a reasonable time the Moderator shall, when the question is called for, proceed to take it by calling for the yeas and nays, and if a call for a division is made, he shall call for a standing vote.

ARTICLE 6 Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Only one shall speak at the same time, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject to make personal reflections.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than once upon any subject until all who wish to speak have had an opportunity, nor more than twice without permission.

ARTICLE 8. Every subject introduced for discussion shall be decided before another is offered, unless it be laid over by motion with the consent of the mover and the Association.

ARTICLE 9. The names of the Messengers shall be called whenever the Association shall direct, and absentees marked. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

ARTICLE 10. The appellation "Brother" shall be used in addressing each other.

ARTICLE 11. Any member violating the rules shall be subject to reproof by the Moderator. ARTICLE 12. Amendments or alterations shall be made to these rules when a majority may deem it necessary.

ARTICLE 13. Any case coming before the Association not provided for in these rules shall be governed by the general parliamentary rules.

## Constitution.

- The Confederation of Churches shall be called by the name of "Mount Vernon Baptist Association."
- 2. The object of the Association shall be to promote the glory of God on earth by preaching the gospel of His Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior, the universal spread of the Bible, the word of the true and living God, and by other appropriate means.
- 3. This Association shall consist of Messengers from the Churches now forming this union, and such other Baptist Churches as may hereafter be received as constituent members thereof.
- 4. Every Church shall be entitled to three representatives without regard to the number of their members, respectively, and to an additional one for every fifty members exceeding fifty, provided that no Church shall ever be entitled to more than five. A certificate of appointment or letter from their respective Churches shall be evidence that they shall be so delegated.
- 5. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk or Clerks, a Corresponding Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by ballot by a majority of the members present, immediately after the names of the delegates are enrolled, which officers shall perform all duties, respectively, usually devolved on such officers, and continue to exercise their respective functions until they shall be superseded by a subsequent election.
- 6. The Clerk shall preserve a regular record of the Association and have it present at the meeting of the body, and when they vacate their offices deliver the same, with all other books and papers relative to said office, to their successors.
- 7. The Association shall regard the Churches as independent bodies in all their internal affairs and exercise no ecclesiastical juri-diction or claim any legislative or judicial prerogative over them; nevertheless the Association may exercise authority over its

own members, the representatives of the Churches, and power to withdraw from all Churches which may depart from the gospel as understood and held by this body by becoming either heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice, and should therefore regard the Churches united in this Association with a vigilant eye for good, and may give at its own discretion, and in its own way, advice or information when sought, to any church connected with it.

- It shall be the duty of the Association to ascertain the general condition of its constituent Churches, devise means to promote their harmony and increase their spirituality and efficiency to promote the cause of truth and righteousness.
- 9. The Association shall hold annual sessions to convene on Thoraday Before the first Lord's Day in September in each year, and not adjourn until all of the business shall have been regularly finished, except when circumstances imperiously demand. The place of meeting shall be determined at each previous session and published in the Minutes.
- 10. liaptist Churches not before united in the Association, or those dismissed from other Associations, may be admitted as members of this union on application by a written petition or letter presented by one or more messengers duly appointed by some Church or Churches, provided they give satisfactory evidence that they are orthodox in faith and correct in the practice of the gospel ordinances.
- it. Every minister of the gospel (either ordained or licentiate) whose membership is in, or who may be a pastor of any Church belonging to this body, shall be ex-officio a member of this Association, with the privilege of offering resolutions and speaking, but not of voting unless specially delegated by some Church.
- 12. When in session the Association will be governed by such rules of decorum as it may adopt for itself.
- 13. It shall be the duty of the Churches, respectively, annually to report to the Association their general condition, the number of members in fellowship, the number baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, restored and dead during the year, and the names and postoffice addresses of all ministers (whether ordained or licensed,) designating each, and also the name and address of their clerks. They shall also report on any special matter required, and send up such contributions as they may willingly contribute to aid the body to disseminate more widely the truth as contained in the Holy Scriptures and the establishment of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth.

- 14. The neglect or failure of a Church to be represented by a Messenger or Messengers, in the Association for three consecutive years, shall be cause to withdraw from such Church at the discretion of the Association.
- 15. This Association may correspond by letter or Messenger with any other religious body of the same faith or order.
- 16. A Board, consisting of five members, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum, shall be elected at each annual meeting, whose duty it shall be to devise means to carry forward the benevolent objects of the Association, and the officers of this Association shall be ex-officio members of the Board.
- 17. The Minutes of the Board shall be publicly read, and corrected, if necessary, and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association adjourn.
- 18. Any amendment may be made to this Constitution at any meeting of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided the same shall have been published in the Association's Minutes of the preceding year.
