PROCEEDINGS



Warren, Ark., R. F. D., No. 1, October 5, 1906.

The Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association convened in its Fifty-sixth annual session this day with Ebenezer Church at 10 a. m.

The Association was called to order by the former Moderator, by reading the seventeenth chapter of John. Elder H. H. Street led in prayer.

The Clerk then read the rules of decorum.

As neither of the appointees for the Introductory Sermon were present a motion prevailed that Elder H. H. Street occupy the pulpit and preach the Introductory Sermon at 11 a. m. He preached a very acceptable sermon from Acts 28-2.

Adjourned to meet at 1 p. m.

The body came together at 1 p. m. by singing. The Moderator then read the 23 Psalm.

Brethren J. M. L. Thomasson and Hunter Riley were appointed to read the church letters. The reading was continued to a finish. (For list of churches and messengers see appendix.)

The Association then went into permanent organization, which resulted in the re-election of the present officers to serve for the next year—Elder J. W. Sims as Moderator and Elder Clark Sims as Clerk and Treasurer. Both responded with appropriate speeches.

An invitation was then extended to visiting brethren, to which the following responded: Elder D. E. Gambrell from Judson Association; Elder — Piper, representing the Arkansas Baptist and the Baptist Flag; Elder R. G. Bowers, State Missionary Secretary, and Honorable D. E. Barker.

The Moderator then appointed the following committee on Divine Service: Brethren D. E. Gambrell and N. C. Denson.

A petitionary letter was then submitted from Crossett Church. As the church had been regularly organized it was received. The hand of fellowship was then extended to the delegate from the church.

The time occupied by the Moderator in making a list of appointees was spent in devotional exercises, with Elder N. C. Denson in the chair. The following brethren made short but acceptable

speeches: Honorable D. E. Barker, Elder R. G. Bowers, Elder Piper, Elder D. E. Gambrell and Elder T. G. Morgan.

A motion prevailed not to have preaching tonight on account of bad weather.

A motion prevailed to adopt the order of business as submitted by last year's committee.

A motion prevailed to adjourn to meet at 9:30 a. m. Saturday morning.

Saturday Morning.

The body assembled at 8:30 a. m. by singing. The Moderator then read from John iv.

The call for letters from other churches was responded to by several.

The following resolution was presented by T. G. Morgan:

Resolved, "That the next meeting of this body be held beginning on Saturday at 10 a. m. before the first Sunday in October, 1907."

An amendment was offered but was not adopted.

The Committee on Ministerial Education reported as follows:

A special call of God to the work of the Ministry is both taught in the Scripture, and is necessary to its genuine success. A preacher of the Gospel must of necessity be a leader. By teaching and example he must lead. A leader of people who thinks, must himself be a thinker. A leader of educated people must himself be educated. The spirit of education is active in all civilized countries, and conditions demand education in every calling. We must educate or seriously lose. The forty churches of this Association ought to put several young men each year into this work. Let's pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers. Then let us do all in our power to prepare these young men by education for the highest possible efficiency. Ouachita College is the best place for Arkansas Baptists to educate their young men, and the Theological Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky, is unsurpassed as a school of theology.

A petitionary letter was presented by Macedonia Church. As it appeared that the church had been regularly organized, it was received. The hand of fellowship was extended to the delegates.

The Committee on Home Missions reported as follows:

Home Mission work is a subject of thrilling interest to every informed Baptist in the South. The actual greatness of our country and of our Baptist people and the abundant promise of larger things to come, stirs the blood of the most sluggish. During the past year forty per day walked into the waters of baptism, led by our missionaries. This year an army of about 10,000 missionaries is engaged in actual battle with the arch enemy of souls, under the direction of our Home Mission Board, and the blessings of God were never more abundant. Hundreds of Baptists in this state, and many in this Association, were helped to the Savior under the preaching of missionaries of this board, and many of our most useful churches have been fostered and helped upon their feet in this way. Our Mission work in Arkansas receives help from this source to the amount of \$5,000 per year, which encourages and stimulates us to add thousands more than we would perhaps otherwise do. Thousands of devoted Baptists of other states are praying for our success daily because they are making regular contributions to our Mission through this

channel. Surely we, ourselves, cannot be negligent of such a work. Let us pray daily for its real success and honor God with putting his substance into a work that has His approval in so marked a degree.

The Committee on Associational Missions reported as follows:

We have tried different plans of mission work in our Association, none of which has been as successful as desired. But we believe the better plan is to keep a man on the field. We therefore recommend: First—That our Executive Committee employ a suitable man for all or part of his time to travel as missionary, visiting and holding regular services at the most needy places, as directed by the committee. Second—That during the summer months, the Executive Committee employ a good revivalist to hold meetings with pastorless churches and other places, as there may be hope of accomplishing good. We would earnestly urge the brethren to heartily co-operate with the committee in this work, with their prayers, their counsel and their money. We recommend that each church appoint one of their number to meet with the Executive Committee and use every effort to gain information, as to the need in this work, and to keep his brethren informed, taking regular collections for the work and forwarding same to the treasurer of the committee. We would insist that all of our pastors make special effort to instruct and interest the churches in this great work of sending the Gospel.

The cry coming up from each foreign field is for more laborers. Our cry to God should, therefore, daily be: "Thrust forth laborers." In response to this plea already, more men and women are offering to go, and more are under appointment than ever before. Among these and recognized as among the best are two of our own brethren, W. T. Lumbley and J. S. Compers. We are grateful to have some humble part in this great work. These things constitute a loud call to the churches and brethren of this Association to stir their interest in foreign mission work. Our prayers should be united and our substance consecrated to God for this cause. And our offerings must be, not spasmodic, but syste-

matic, constant and liberal, if we sustain and push forward this cause.

This Association needs, or ought not to need, but little information of our work for orphans. The Baptist Home for Orphans is located in our midst, and ours has been the Banner Association in this work. But we shall have to look well to our laurels, or others shall wear the crown. We are maintaining this year about the same number in the Home as last year—about 65. Some have gone out and others have been received. A considerable sum has been expended in improvements in the Home, and many conveniences added. Brother O. T. Finch is still in the field for the Home, but ill health has prevented his efforts this summer. Our churches ought not to wait for any agent, but ought constantly to be sending in contributions of cash, produce, clothes, shoes, etc., like any other family, their needs are constant and urgent. The religious conditions of this Home, as always, are good. Nearly every child that has arrived at the years of accountability has professed a hope in Christ. They attend Sabbath School and Church regularly, and are well prepared and well behaved. They appeal to our highest and best sympathies and our earnest prayers.
